EQUATION OF TIME—ECLIPSES.

[1887]

All the calculations in this Almanac have been adapted to "Mean Time" at St. John, except the Sun's Declination and the "Equation of Time," which are for Mean Noon, Greenwich.

"Mean Time," is that shown by a well-regulated clock, and differs from "Apparent Time," or that exhibited by a Sun-dial, by what is known as "The Equation of Time." When the Sun is slow this is to be subtracted from "Mean (or Clock) Time," and when the Sun is fast, to be added to "Mean Time" to get the "Apparent Time."

CAPE SABLE, N. S.—Revolving white light on Cape; bright 16s., dark, 24s.; Latitude 45d. 23m. 19s.; longitude, 66d. 37m. 11s.; Octagonal white tower, 63 feet above high water. Visible 12 miles in clear weather.

CAPE SABLE, W. E.—A revolving white light, with three flashes at intervals of half a minute, then a cessation of light during a minute and a half, making a complete revolution in three minutes. It is elevated 118 feet above high water, and in clear weather should be seen from a distance of about 17 miles. The tower is an octagonal wooden building, 98 feet high, and is painted white. The illuminating apparatus is catoptric. Latitude N. 45d. 37m.; Longitude W. 66d. 8m.

Steam Fog Whistle on southern point of Cape, elevated about 40 feet above high water, sounds in thick weather, fogs, and snow storms, a blast of ten seconds duration each minute, with an interval of fifty seconds between each blast.

**BRIAR ISLAND, N. S.**—N. W. point, latitude N. 44d. 14m. 57s.; longitude W. 66d. 23m. 30s. Fixed white light, visible 18 miles. Octagon white lighthouse, 98 feet above high water mark.

**BLACK ROCK, N. S.**—South Shore, latitude N., 45d. 10m. 0s.; longitude W., 64d. 48m. 0s. Fixed white light, visible 12 miles. Square white lighthouse, 45 feet above high water mark.

Fog Whistle on extreme point of Cape D'Or, on the opposite side of channel from Black Rock; sounds in thick weather twice in each minute, each blast being of 6 seconds duration, with intervals of 24 seconds between.

**CAPE ENRAGE, N. B.**—On pitch of Cape, latitude N., 45d. 35m. 34s.; longitude 64d. 48m. 55s. Fixed white light, visible 15 miles. White square tower, 120 feet above high water mark.

A Steam Fog Whistle, 150 feet N. E. from lighthouse, sounds during thick weather four seconds in each minute; will probably be heard in calm weather 10 miles, and in stormy weather from three to five miles.

**QUACO, N. B.**—A new Lighthouse Tower has been erected upon the pitch of the Cape at West Head, Quaco, to replace that on the rock off Quaco. Latitude N., 45d. 19m. 30s.; longitude W., 65d. 32m. 0s. It is a revolving white catoptric light, attaining its greatest brilliancy every 20 seconds. It is elevated about 110 feet above high water mark, and should be visible 10 miles from all points of approach seaward. The building is of wood, painted white, and consists of a square tower 40 feet high from its base to the vane on the lantern, with keeper's dwelling attached.

ST. JOHN HARBOR.—End of Bar. Latitude N. 45d. 15m. 10s.; longitude 66d. 3m. 40s. Fixed white light. Visible 10 miles. Lighthouse, vertical black and white stripes, 35 feet above high water.

LEPREAUX.—On Point. Latitude N. 45d. 3m. 40s.; longitude W. 66d. 27m. 30s. Two fixed white lights. Visible 15 miles, 9 yards apart. 81 and 52 feet above high water mark. Tower octagonal, striped horizontally red and white. Latitude N. 44d. 5m. 47s.; longitude W. 66d. 58m. 50s. The light is a fixed white, elevated 60 feet above high water mark, and should be visible 12 miles from N. N. E. round by S. to S. S. E. The illuminating apparatus is catoptric of small size. The building is a square wooden tower painted white, surmounted by an iron lantern, and is 44 feet in height from the ground to the vane on the lantern.

**HEAD HARBOR (Campobello Island).**—North Point. Latitude N. 44d. 57m. 40s.; longitude W. 66d. 54m. 10s. Fixed white light. Visible 15 miles clear weather. Octagonal tower, white, with red cross, 64 feet above high water.

Fog Trumpet at the North Point of Head Harbor, on the Island of Campobello, in the County of Charlotte. Latitude N. 44d. 57m. 40s.; longitude W. 66d. 54m. 10s. During thick weather, fogs, and snowstorms, the trumpet will sound blasts of 8 seconds duration, with intervals of 35 seconds between them.

**SWALLOW TAIL.**—On N. E. part of Grand Manan. Fixed white light. Visible 17 miles. Latitude N. 44d. 45m. 52s.; longitude W. 66d. 44m. Light-house white octagonal wooden building, 148 feet above high water. A Steam Fog Whistle on extreme N. W. Head of Grand Manan, 80 feet above high water. Sounds in thick weather three blasts of 4 seconds duration in each minute, with an interval of 10 seconds between each blast.

**RICHIBUCOTO HEAD LIGHT.**—This is a fixed white light, situated on Richibucto Head, Northumberland Strait, in the Gulf of St. Lawrence. The light is placed at an elevation of 70 feet above high water, and should be seen in clear weather from a distance of 14 miles. The illuminating apparatus is dioptric or by lenses of the fourth order. The tower is square, about 50 feet from base to vane, painted white, and stands in latitude 48d. 30m. 40s. N.: longitude 64d. 43m. 30s. W. of Greenwich.

**RICHIBUCOTO HARBOR RANGE LIGHTS.**—Two range light towers, erected by the Government of Canada close to the present day-beacons upon the South Beach, at the entrance of the Richibucto River, Kent, Co., N. B. The front building is on the outside of the bank. It is of wood, painted white, and consists of a square tower, painted white, 33 feet high to vane on lantern, with dwelling attached. Latitude N. 48d. 42m. 45s.; longitude W. 64d. 46m. 10s. The light is fixed white, catoptric, elevated 40 feet above high water mark, and should be visible 12 miles. The back tower is distant W. by S. + S. 306 feet from the front one. It is an open framed square tower, 48 feet high to vane on lantern, and is also painted white. **RESTIGOUCHE RIVER RANGE LIGHTS.**—The buildings are all square towers, built of wood, painted white; they are 22 feet in height from base to top of ventilator, and show fixed white catoptric lights.

1. **Dalhousie Range Lights.** Restigouche County, New Brunswick.—The front tower is placed on the public wharf. The light is elevated 24 feet above high water mark. Latitude N. 48d. 4m. 40s.; longitude W. 66d. 22m. 20s. The back tower is placed on Montgomery Island. The light is elevated 27 feet above high water mark.

2. **Oak Point Range Lights.** County of Bonaventure, Province of Quebec. The front tower show two lights, one east and the other west, elevated 40 feet above high water mark. Latitude N. 48d. 2m. 40s.; longitude W. 66d. 40m. 30s. The back tower shows light elevated 45 feet above high water mark, and ranges with the front tower as a guide to vessels crossing the Traverse.

3. **Campbellton Range Lights.** Restigouche County, New Brunswick.—The front tower is placed on a pier beside the railway wharf; the light is elevated 24 feet above high water mark. Latitude N. 48d. 0m. 50s.; longitude W. 66d. 39m. 40s. The back tower is placed on Mr. Moffat's wharf. The light is elevated 34 feet above high water mark.

**HAY ISLAND RANGE LIGHTS.**—Two Range lights have been erected upon Hay Island, Miramichi Bay, Northumberland County, N. B., to enable vessels, in seeking shelter, to clear the point of the shoal off the east end of the island. Latitude N. 47d. 14m. 19s.; longitude W. 66d. 5m. 40s. The front light is fixed white, catoptric, exhibited from a lantern hoisted on a mast 15 feet high. It is elevated 23 feet above high water and should be visible 10 miles. At the base of the mast is a small shed painted red. The back light is distant 210 feet from the front one. It is fixed white, catoptric, elevated 30 feet above high water, and should be visible 11 miles. The building is a square wooden tower, 21 feet high from base to vane, and is painted white.

**BUCTOUCHE RANGE LIGHTS.**—Two Range Lights erected upon Dixon's Point, on the South side of Buctouche Harbor, Kent County, N. B., to guide vessels into Buctouche Harbor. The front building is situated on the Point near the water's edge, and close to the previously existing front beacon. Latitude N. 46d. 27m. 40s.; longitude W. 64d. 38m. 50s. The light is fixed white, catoptric, elevated 36 feet above high water mark, and should be visible 11 miles in the direction of the range. The tower is a square wooden one, 30 feet high from the base to the vane on the top of the lantern, and is painted white. The back range light is distant 1,050 feet N. W. by W. from the front one; the building is similar, 34 feet high, and shows a light also similar, elevated 41 feet above high water, and visible 12 miles.

**TWO RANGE LIGHTS.**—erected upon Church or Indian Point, on the North side of Buctouche Harbor, in the County of Kent, N. B. The front light is fixed white catoptric, elevated 23 feet above high water mark, and should be visible 9 miles in line of range. Latitude N. 46d. 29m. 30s.; longitude W. 64d. 40m. 30s. It is situated close to the road which runs along the shore from Buctouche Village to Church or Indian Point. The back range light building is 1,900 feet N. N. W. 4W. from the front one. The light is fixed white catoptric, elevated 53 feet above high water mark, and should be visible 12 miles in the direction of the range. Both buildings are small square towers, 23 feet high from the ground to the tops of the roof, painted white with red roofs. The two lights in range lead into the harbor through the deepest channel, clear of all obstructions, from the line of range of the Dixon's Point Lights to the point where the channel turns abruptly to the westward to enter the Buctouche River.

**FOX ISLAND RANGE LIGHTS.**—The Beacon Lights on the North West end of Fox Island, Miramichi Bay, N. B., have been moved, and a third light added, and the lights as now arranged are in operation. All show fix. & white lights, which should be visible 8 miles, from lanterns hoisted on mast; at the base of each mast is a shed painted white.

One of the lights is situated within 100 feet of the most northerly point of the island. It is elevated 50 feet above high water mark, and has a post 40 feet high. Latitude N. 47d. 8m. 5s.; longitude W. 65d. 2m. 20s.

The second light is distant 1,081 feet S. E. 4S from the first named, and will be 46 feet above water mark, with a post 38 feet high.

The third light is distant 254 feet S. W. from the first named, and will be 36 feet above water mark, with a post 28 feet high.

The first and second in line range N. W. 4W. into the old Horseshoe Channel.

The first and third in line range N. E. through Portage Island Channel.

The second and third in line range W. by N., leading to the upper buoy, of Horseshoe Shoal.

**CAPE JOURIMAIN, STRAITS OF NORTHUMBERLAND.**—Latitude 46d. 10m. 0s. N.; longitude 63d. 51m. 0s. W. Visible from all points of approach from S. E. around by N. to W. The Lighthouse is an octagonal wooden pyramidal building, painted white, 40 feet high, elevated 72 feet above high water, and stands 66 feet from the extremity of the cliff. The Keeper's house, a one and a half story wooden building, painted white, is situated 50 feet to the westward of the lighthouse.

**GOOSE LAKE, MISCOU ISLAND, BAY DES CHALEURS.**—A revolving white light, elevated 40 feet above high water, and showing a flash every minute, is exhibited at this lighthouse, and is seen at a distance of upwards of 10 miles. The lighting apparatus has two faces, and makes a complete revolution every two minutes. The tower is a square wooden building, 20 feet high, with a dwelling attached, and painted white. The illuminating apparatus is catoptric.

**HERON ISLAND, BAY DES CHALEURS.**—This light is a fixed white light, elevated 66 feet above high water, is visible from all points seaward, and in clear weather is seen at a distance of 12 miles. The tower is a square wooden building, 20 feet high, and painted white. The illuminating apparatus is catoptric.

**CARAQUET ISLAND, BAY DES CHALEURS.**—Square tower on keeper's dwelling. White.

**MISCOU FOG WHISTLE.**—A Steam Fog Whistle has been erected on Misco Island, at the entrance of the Bay of Chaleurs. The whistle is sounded twice in each minute.

**SHEDIAK BEACON LIGHT.**—Two lights on Point du Chene wharf, in the Harbor of Shedia. Latitude 46d. 14m. 20s. N.; longitude 64d. 31m. 0s. W.

**POINT ESCUMINAC LIGHT.**—This lighthouse is situated in Miramichi Bay, North latitude 47d. 4m. 30s. West longitude 64d. 50m. 30s. It is a fixed bright light, elevated 70 feet above high water. A th'd order French dioptric lighting apparatus has been placed on this tower, which is visible for 25 miles.

**BAY DU VIN ISLAND RANGE LIGHTS.**—Two range lights are erected on the West end of Bay Du Vin Island, Miramichi Bay, County of Northumberland, N. B., to enable vessels seeking shelter to clear the point of the

### Time for Going Through the Falls.

The Falls are level or still water at about three and a half hours on the flood, and about two and a half on the ebb, so that they are passable four times in twenty-four hours, about ten or fifteen minutes each time. No other rule can be given, as much depends on the floods in the River Saint John, and the time of high water or full sea, which is often hastened by high winds, and in proportion to the height of them.

### TIME BALL.

The Time Ball on Northern Tower of the Custom House Building, will be hoisted half its elevation each day (Sundays excepted) at fifteen minutes before one o'clock. At one minute before one o'clock it will be hoisted its full length; and at one o'clock, mean time, the Ball will be dropped. A Chronometer, keeping correct Greenwich time, should then show 5h. 24m. 15s., and the difference between this and the time shown by a Chronometer, is its true error on Greenwich time at the moment. As the above hour of one o'clock, when the Ball drops, represents 5h. 24m. 15s. at Greenwich, the error of a Chronometer may be ascertained no matter where the ship is lying. Masters of vessels arriving at St. John should compare their Chronometers by the Time Ball, as it will enable them to get the sea rate, which frequently varies from harbor rates. Latitude 45d. 16m. 42s. North; Longitude in time 4h. 24m. 15s. West of Greenwich.

*Fifth District* to comprise all that part of the City outside of the Fourth District, that lies between and within the City line on the North, the Southerly line of the General Public Hospital Grounds, the Northerly side of Jordan's Alley (so called), lying between Waterloo and Brussels Streets, Easterly side of Brussels Street, Northerly side of Clarence Street, Easterly side of Saint Patrick Street, Easterly side of Wentworth Street, and Southerly side of Main Street.

*Sixth District* to comprise all that part of the City outside of the Fifth District, which lies between and within the Northerly side of Clarence Street, Easterly side of Saint David Street, East side of Pitt Street, and South side of Main Street.

*Seventh District* to comprise all that part of the City lying to the South of the South side of Main Street, and to the East of the East side of Pitt and Saint David Streets, and to the South of the North side of Clarence Street.

*Eighth District* to comprise all that part of the City lying to the Northward of the North side of Clarence Street, to the Eastward of the East side of Brussels Street, and Northward of the Northerly side of the said Jordan's Alley, and Northward of the Southerly line and bound of the General Public Hospital Grounds.

Single wagon or other one-horse vehicle for hauling purposes, with horse-load and one man, such single team load not to exceed two thousand pounds weight, 9 cents; same as last mentioned, without load, 7 cents. Double wagon or sleigh, not loaded, 12 cents. Double wagon or conveyance for carrying passengers, horse and one man, 15 cents. Double wagon, or other vehicle for hauling purposes, with horse-load and one man, such load not to exceed four thousand pounds weight, 13 cents; same as last mentioned without load, 12 cents; if load over prescribed weight, in any case, an added rate for every additional one hundred pounds weight of one cent. Barrel, 2 cents; bag, containing 2 bushels, 2 cents; firkin, keg, or box of like size, 1 cent; cask of lime, 4 cents; pipe, hogshead or puncheon, 15 cents; for every fifty pounds weight, and not exceeding one hundred pounds weight, of iron, steel, or other article, not hereinabove enumerated, 1 cent; if above one hundred pounds weight, for each additional fifty pounds weight, 1 cent. All other things and articles not hereinabove enumerated, to be in proportion to the foregoing scale of rates.

No load of greater weight than four tons weight, including the vehicle on which the load is carried, shall be permitted to go upon the floats or approaches to the ferry, or upon any ferry boat; and there shall be no privilege for the carriage, by ferry, of any weight greater than four tons in any load.

CORPORATION ANCHORAGE.—Vessels not exceeding 50 tons, 75c.; 50 to 100 tons, \$1; 100 to 150 tons, \$1.25, 150 to 200 tons, \$1.50; 200 to 250 tons, \$1.75; 250 to 300 tons, \$2; 300 to 350 tons, \$2.25; 350 to 400 tons, \$2.50; 400 to 450 tons, \$2.75; 450 to 500 tons, \$3; 500 to 550 tons, \$3.50; 550 to 600 tons, \$3.50; 600 to 650 tons, \$3.75; 650 to 700 tons, \$4; 700 to 750 tons, \$4.25; 750 to 800 tons, \$4.50; 800 to 850 tons, \$4.75; 850 to 900 tons, \$5; 900 to 950 tons, \$5.25; 950 to 1000 tons, \$5.50, and 30c. for each additional 50 tons.

#### TABLE FOR FORETELLING THE WEATHER.

This table, and the accompanying remarks, are the result of many years actual observation; the whole being constructed on a due consideration of the attraction of the Sun and Moon in their several positions respecting the Earth, and will, by simple inspection, show the observer what kind of weather will most probably follow the entrance of the Moon into any of its quarters, and that so near the truth as to be seldom found to fail.

OBSERVATIONS.—The nearer the time of the Moon's change to noon or midnight, the more nearly will the result accord with the prediction.

The space for this calculation occupies from ten at night till two next morning.

The Moon's change, first quarter, full and last quarter, happening during six of the afternoon hours, i. e., from four to ten, may be followed by fair weather; but this is mostly dependent on the wind, as is noted in the table.

**Limit of weight per Sample Post, 24 oz., Dominion and Newfoundland; 8 oz., Great Britain and the United States.**

**\*Items cannot be registered.**

**Packets by Parcel Post should be so labelled.**

**Packets by Book and Sample Post must be so put up as to admit of easy inspection.**

**Envelopes closed and simply clipped at the ends cannot be forwarded by Book Post.**

## MONEY ORDER OFFICE.

In sending money by Mail it is always best to transmit by Money Order, if possible. If sent by letter it should always be registered.

MATTER WHICH CANNOT BE FORWARDED THROUGH THE POST.

Any Explosive substance, glass, liquid, or other matter likely to entail risk or injury to the ordinary contents of the mail, will be sent to the Dead Letter Office, Ottawa.

Spectacles and eye-glasses, if securely put in cases not likely to allow the contents to escape if broken in course of conveyance, may be sent by Post within the Dominion on prepayment of parcel post rates.

RE-DIRECTED LETTERS.

Re-directed letters to places within the Dominion or United States will be forwarded without any additional charge if returned promptly to the office.

Letters sent to or received from a Country of the Postal Union, and afterwards re-directed to any place in Canada, or a country in the Postal Union, will be forwarded even if taken out of the office and re-addressed; but if re-addressed to a place where there is a higher rate of postage, the difference of Postage will be chargeable.

NEWSPAPERS AND PERIODICALS.

Newspapers and Periodicals Addressed to Places in Canada, Newfoundland, or the United States, printed and Published in Canada, and Posted from the office of Publication, or News Agency, to actual Subscribers or News Agents in Canada, the United States and Newfoundland, resident elsewhere than at the place of publication, are FREE. Such newspapers and periodicals must be issued not less frequently than once per month.

Newspapers posted for City Delivery will not be delivered by Letter Carriers, unless pre-paid by 1c. stamp.

Transient Newspapers and Periodicals Addressed to Places in Canada, Newfoundland and United States. On all Newspapers and Periodicals, other than those specified above, the postage rate will be one cent per 4 ounces in weight, which must be prepaid by postage stamp.

Newspapers and Periodicals published not less frequently than once a month and weighing less than one ounce may be posted singly, if prepaid by postage stamp one half cent each. Newspapers for the United Kingdom must be prepaid 1c. for each 2 oz.

Newspapers and Periodicals, published in the United Kingdom, and brought by mail to Canadian Booksellers or News Agents, may be remailed by such Booksellers or News Agents, FREE of Postage.

GENERAL REGULATIONS.

No information is permitted to be given by Postmasters respecting letters which pass through a Post Office, except to the persons to whom

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they are addressed. Postmasters are not permitted to furnish any information respecting the names or addresses of persons who receive correspondence at their respective offices.

A letter, once posted, becomes the property of the person to whom it is addressed, and must be forwarded according to directions. On no application, however urgent, can it be delivered back to the writer, or to any other person.

Any obscene or immoral book, pamphlet, picture, or other publication, of an indecent or immoral character, or any letter upon the outside or envelope of which there are words, devices, matters or things aforesaid, is not permitted to pass by post.

Any article supposed to be liable to Customs Duties, which is received by mail from any other country, will be sent to the nearest Collector of Customs.

Letters addressed to mere initials, or fictitious names, will not be delivered, unless addressed in care of a resident, or to some box in the Post Office.

Letters containing Gold or Silver Money, Jewels or precious articles, or anything liable to Customs Duties, cannot be forwarded by Post to any of the Postal Union countries except the United States.

USEFUL HINTS.

Never send money or other articles of value through the Post Office except either by Money Order or Registered Letter.

Make complaints and inquiries in writing.

Preserve and request correspondents to preserve envelopes of missing or delayed letters.

Business men should be careful to authorize but a limited number of persons to receive their letters; and only those in whom they have full confidence.

Have a letter box on your office door.

REGISTERED LETTERS.

Letters intended to be Registered, when addressed to places in Canada, must be prepaid by stamp, 2 cents each; to the United States, 5 cents each, in addition to the postage rate. For Newfoundland, registered letters, 2 cents; other articles 5 cents in addition to the postage.

All letters for Registration should be posted 15 minutes before the hour of closing ordinary Mails, and 30 minutes before closing of English Mail.

No letter will be accepted for Registration addressed either to initials or what may appear a fictitious name, and any such Registered Letters received from another office, or deposited in the Letter Box for Registration will be at once sent to the Dead Letter Office for disposal.

Registered Letter Stamps of the denomination of 2 and 5 cents may be obtained at the usual places.

The following articles shall be prohibited to be imported under a penalty of two hundred dollars, together with the forfeiture of the parcel or package of goods in which the same may be found, viz:—

Books, printed paper, drawings, paintings, prints, photographs or representations of any kind, of a treasonable or seditious, or of an immoral or indecent character.

Reprints of Canadian copyright works, and reprints of British copyright works which have been also copyrighted in Canada.

Coin, base or counterfeit.

The importation into Canada of all goods manufactured or produced, wholly or in part, by prison labor, or which have been made within, or in connection with any prison, gaol or penitentiary, is hereby prohibited under a penalty of two hundred dollars, together with the forfeiture of such goods, and the parcels or packages in which they are contained.

The importation and manufacture of oleomargarine, butterine, and all such substitutes for butter is hereby prohibited, under a penalty of not less than two hundred nor more than four hundred dollars for each offence, and the forfeiture of such goods, and of all packages in which they are contained.

## EXPORT DUTIES.

Shingle bolts, per cord of 128 cubic feet,	.....	\$1.50
Spruce logs, per M feet, board measure,	.....	\$1.00
Pine logs, per M feet, board measure,	.....	\$2.00

Provided that the powers vested in the Governor in Council by the Act 42 Vic, cap 15, sec 6, shall be extended to and apply in all respects to the above named articles, and that the Governor in Council may increase the duty on pine logs to three dollars per thousand feet board measure.

## EXPORTS PROHIBITED.

The export of deer, wild turkeys, quail, partridge, prairie fowl and woodcock, in the carcass, or parts thereof is hereby declared unlawful and prohibited, and any person exporting or attempting to export any such article shall, for each such offence, incur a penalty of one hundred dollars, and the article so attempted to be exported shall be forfeited, and may, on reasonable cause of suspicion of intention to export the same, be seized by any officer of the Customs, and if such intention be proved, shall be dealt with as for breach of the Customs laws.
