




ECLIPSES DURING THE YEAR 1880.

During this year there will be six eclipses—four of the sun and two of the moon.

I.—On the 11th of January there will be a total eclipse of the sun, but, as it will not be visible in these parts of the Dominion, it is not necessary to say anything more, except that its greatest obscuration will be discerned at San Francisco about 4 o'clock evening.

II.—On the 22nd of June there will be a total eclipse of the moon not visible in Montreal, but will be visible west of Washington, in those places where the moon is in full above the horizon.

III.—On the 7th of July there will be an annular eclipse of the sun, invisible.

IV.—On the 1st of December there will be a partial eclipse of the sun, invisible.

V.—On the 16th of December there will be a total eclipse of the moon, visible in Vancouver Island, but not in Montreal.

VI.—On the 31st of December there will be a partial eclipse of the sun. It will be visible in Montreal, beginning at 7.16 in the morning, and ending about 10 minutes past 9.

MORNING AND EVENING STARS.

Venus will be Morning Star until the 13th of July, and Evening Star until the 31st of December. Mercury will be a Morning Star until the 14th of February; afterward, until the 28th of March, an Evening Star. Mercury will also be Evening Star from 2nd June to 5th August, and from the 17th of September to the 23rd of November.



Briegel—Chief Railway Mail Clerk, serving on the following sections of railway: Grand Trunk Railway, Montreal and Kingston, Montreal and Island Pond, Vermont Junction Railway, Shefford Railway, the South Eastern Railway, the Mississippi Railway, Occidental Railway, and the English Mail Train Service between Montreal, Rimouski and Halifax, are attached to the office of the Post Office Inspector, Montreal.

**CITY POSTAL DELIVERY.**

The following are the arrangements in connection with Free Postal Delivery in the City of Montreal:

1. There are no fees chargeable on the delivery of Letters or Papers.
2. There are six deliveries daily, Sundays excepted, in the central portions of the city, commencing respectively at 8.30 a.m., 10.30 a.m., 12.00 noon, 1.30 p.m., 2.00 p.m., and 3.30 p.m., and four deliveries in the other portions of the city, commencing at 8.30 a.m., 11.00 a.m., 1.00 p.m., and 3.30 p.m., excepting, however, in the more distant divisions in the northern and eastern portions of the city, in which there are only two deliveries, commencing at 8.30 a.m., and 1.00 p.m., with an additional delivery at 3.30 p.m. on Saturdays.
3. Letters and papers addressed to particular streets and numbers are delivered without delay by letter carrier.
4. Letters and papers addressed to box and drawer holders are, until otherwise ordered, delivered through the boxes and drawers as usual. Should, however, such letters and papers be addressed to streets and numbers, they will be delivered by letter carriers, unless the sorting clerk should distinctly and promptly remember that the parties for whom intended are box and drawer holders. No letters or papers are placed in the boxes or drawers, unless addressed either to the number of the box or drawer, or to the holder, or to the care of the holder thereof.
5. Letters and papers addressed simply "Montreal," to parties who have neither boxes nor drawers, are delivered as expeditiously as circumstances will permit, either through the general delivery or by letter carrier. If papers and periodicals published in the city are addressed to box or drawer holders in the Montreal Post Office, they will be delivered if pre-paid by postage stamp,  $\frac{1}{2}$  ct. each. Papers or periodicals published in the city are not delivered by letter carriers unless prepaid 1c. each by stamp.

6. Persons desirous of receiving their letters and papers promptly by letter carrier, should request their correspondents to place on the addresses the street and number at which they are to be delivered, as otherwise they will be subject to delays, which it is impossible to avoid.

7. They should also provide themselves with small change for the payment of unpaid postage, as the carriers (who are not allowed to give credit) cannot be detained for its collection. In the event of an unpaid letter or paper not being delivered in consequence of the party to whom addressed having no change, it will be taken back to the office and sent out again for delivery as soon thereafter as practicable. If, on its being tendered a second time, the party to whom it is addressed is not provided with the postage, it will be sent to the general delivery at the head office, where application for it will have to be made.

8. Persons having offices at which they desire their letters and papers to be delivered by letter carrier, should affix a letter box to the door, with an opening from the outside, as otherwise, in case the office is closed, the letters and papers will be delayed until the next delivery. It would also be very desirable that, where convenient, letter boxes should be affixed to the doors of private residences.

9. Persons receiving their letters by letter carrier should, in the event of their removal, advise their correspondents, and at once send their new address, in writing, to the Postmaster.

10. Three postal receiving offices are established :—One in the East, at No. 583 St. Catherine street; one in the North, at No. 311½ St. Lawrence street; and one in the West, at 466 St. Joseph Street, to which the letters and papers will be conveyed by vehicle from the head office four times daily, viz.: at 8 a.m., 10.30 a.m., 12.30 p.m. and 3 p.m., and distributed from thence by letter carrier at the hours already mentioned.

11. These receiving houses are also open for the sale of postage stamps, and the reception of registered and other mailable matter from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m.

12. Street Letter Boxes are visited at 9.15 a.m., 12.30 p.m., 5.30 p.m., and 7.45 p.m. On Sundays at 7.45 p.m.

13. Every effort is used to secure the satisfactory working of these arrangements. If, however, irregularities occur, they should be at once reported to the Postmaster.

**POST CARDS.**

Canadian Postal Cards of 1 cent each circulate within the Dominion and are transmissible, without further charge, to the United States.

Postal Union Cards at 2 cents each, are issued for transmission to Newfoundland, the United Kingdom, and may be used for correspondence with *all Postal Union Countries*.

**RE-DIRECTED LETTERS.**

Letters re-directed from one office to another in Canada *without being taken out of the Post-office*, are not liable to any additional postage on being re-forwarded. This also applies to letters mailed in the United States, addressed to Canada and re-directed to any place in the Dominion or the United States without being taken out of the Office.

**REGISTERED LETTERS.**

Letters intended to be Registered for places within Canada must be prepaid by Registered Letter Stamp, 2 cents, each in addition to the postage. Registration Fee on letters to the United States, 5 cents. The registration fees on letters to the United Kingdom, &c., will be found under the heading "Rates of Postage on Letters, &c."

**PARCEL POST.**

The postage on Parcels addressed to places in Canada and which must be prepaid by postage stamp, is as follows:

Not exceeding 4 oz., 6 cents

" " 12 oz., 12 cents.

and for each additional 4 oz., or portion thereof, 6 cents.

Parcels intended to pass through the Mail should not exceed 5 pounds in weight, or 24 inches in length, or 12 inches in breadth or thickness, and should be marked "by Parcel Post." Parcels may be registered by affixing a 5 cent Registered Letter Stamp thereto in addition to the Postage.

Parcels cannot be transmitted to any place beyond the limits of Canada, nor can any parcel be forwarded to British Columbia or Manitoba, via the United States, which exceeds in weight the limit of 2 lbs. 3 ozs.

**NEWSPAPERS AND PERIODICALS.**

Newspapers and Periodicals addressed to places in Canada, Newfoundland, Great Britain (by Canadian Steamers), or the U.S., printed and published in Canada, and posted from the office of publication or News Agency, to actual Subscribers or News Agents (including exchanges) are subject to a rate of one cent

**Transient Newspapers and Periodicals, addressed to places in Canada, Newfoundland and the United States:** On all newspapers and Periodicals other than those from the office of publication, including all Newspapers and Periodicals published less frequently than once a month, the postage rate is one cent per 4 ounces in weight, which must be prepaid by postage stamp.

Newspapers and periodicals weighing less than one ounce may be posted singly; if prepaid by postage stamp, one half cent each.

Newspapers from Office of Publications posted for City Delivery are not delivered by Letter Carrier unless prepaid 1 cent each by stamp.

Newspapers and Periodicals published in the United Kingdom, and reposed by News Agents, to regular subscribers are not liable to any additional postage.

#### **MISCELLANEOUS POSTAL MATTER.**

Pamphlets, Occasional Publications, Printed Circulars, Prices Current, Handbills, Book and Newspaper Manuscripts, Printers' Proofs, Maps and Prints, Engravings, Sheet Music, Photographs; Documents, wholly or partly printed or written, such as Deeds, Insurance Policies, Militia and School Returns, or other documents of like nature, wholly or partly printed or written.

When posted, addressed to any place in Canada or the United States, and not exceeding 5 pounds in weight, 24 inches in length, and 12 inches in breadth or depth, must be prepaid by postage stamp at the rate of one cent per 4 ounces in weight, and must be put up so as to admit of inspection. Such books, papers, returns, etc., must not be accompanied by any instructions or directions. Bank notices, advices of goods in transit, and personal notices, are liable to letter rate because intended for the information of a particular person.

The rate of postage on Seeds, Cuttings, Bulbs and Roots is one cent per 4 ounces, the weight of a package not to exceed 4 lbs.

#### **BOOK PACKETS,**

Passing between places in the Dominion of Canada, or to and from Newfoundland, and not exceeding 5 lbs. in weight, 2 feet in length, and 1 foot in breadth or depth, must at be prepaid by postage stamp at the rate of one cent per 4 oz. Book Packets posted for delivery in the Dominion, cannot be registered.

The limit of weight of Book Packets to the United Kingdom is 5 lbs. Book Packets for France, Germany, Italy, Belgium, Netherlands, Portugal, the Azores, Madeira, Denmark and Switzerland, must not exceed 4 lbs. 6 oz. in weight, and 24 inches in length or 12 in breadth or depth.

PATTERN AND SAMPLE POST.

*Canada.*—Patterns and samples of merchandize, not exceeding 24 ounces in weight, when posted in Canada, for places within Canada or Newfoundland, must be prepaid by postage stamp at the rate of One Cent per 4 ounces weight, and put up in such a manner as to admit of inspection. Goods sent in execution of an Order, however small the quantity may be, or articles sent by one private individual to another, which are not actually Trade Patterns or Samples, are not admissible. Registration fee 5 cents.

*United States.*—Patterns and Samples of Merchandise, posted for places in the United States, will continue to be subject to the special rate of 10 cents each, prepaid by postage stamp, and must not exceed 8 ounces in weight.

RATES OF POSTAGE ON LETTERS, &c. FOR BRITISH AND FOREIGN COUNTRIES.

Austria, (including Hungary,) Belgium, Denmark, Egypt, France and Algeria, Germany, Gibraltar, Great Britain and Ireland, Greece and Ionian Islands, Italy, Japan, Malta, Netherlands, Norway, Portugal and Islands of Madeira and Azores, Russia and Finland, St. Pierre et Miquelon, Spain, Sweden, Switzerland, and Turkey, (European and Asiatic), Letters 5 cents, Postal Cards 2 cents, Papers 2 cents per 4 ounces, Registration fee 5 cents. Books and printed matter generally, *Newspapers excepted*, 1c. per 2 oz. Commercial Paper, Legal and other Documents, &c., 5c. for the first 2 oz., and 1c. each additional 2 oz. or fraction thereof. Samples and Patterns 2c. for the first 2 oz., and 1c. for every additional 2 oz. or fraction thereof.

Aden (Arabia), Argentine Confederation, Brazil, British Guineas, Ceylon, China, India (British), Java, Mauritius, Mexico, Peru, Sierra Leone and Strait Settlements, Letters 10 cents, Postal Cards 2 cents, Papers 4 cents per 4 ounces, Registration fee 5 cents. Books and printed matter generally, *Newspapers excepted*, 2c. per 2 oz. Commercial Papers 5 cents for the first 2 oz., and 2c. for every additional 2 oz. Samples and Patterns, the postage is 2 cents per 2 oz. or fraction thereof.

For all places above named the limit of weight of Books, Printed Matter, Commercial Papers, Documents, &c., as well as for *Newspapers*, is 4 lbs. 6 ounces, and of Samples and Patterns, 8 oz.; and the size of a package of samples and patterns is limited to 8 inches in length, 4 in breadth, and 2 inches in depth; these apply to all Postal Union destinations. The limit of weight, however, for Book Packets, &c., to the United Kingdom is 5 lbs. Matter exceeding the limit of weight cannot be forwarded.

#### MONEY ORDERS.

Money orders are issued at every Money Order Office in Canada on every other Money Order Office in Canada, as well as on every Money Order Office in the United Kingdom, Newfoundland and British India. Money orders are also issued at every Money Order Office in the above Countries, payable at the Money Order Offices in Canada. Money orders are also drawn by all the Money Order Offices in Canada on the United States, but the offices of payment in that country are determined by the Post-masters at

They cannot, however, grant two or more orders for sums of or under \$10 in the same day to the same applicant, in favor of the same payee.

UNITED KINGDOM AND NEWFOUNDLAND.

Money orders on the United Kingdom and Newfoundland are drawn in sterling money. If on the United Kingdom, they may be for any sum up to ten pounds. If on Newfoundland for any sum up to twenty pounds.

Money orders on the United States are drawn in Canada currency, and may be for any sum not exceeding \$40. Postmasters are, however, at liberty to issue two or more separate orders on the United States for \$40 each. The rate of commission is:—

The Deputy Postmaster-General of Malta and Gibraltar are authorized to issue money orders on the several money order offices in Canada. Money order offices in Canada do not, however, grant money orders on Malta and Gibraltar.

POST OFFICE SAVINGS BANK.

The Post Office Savings Banks are open daily for the receipt and re-payment of deposits, during the same hours as for the transaction of money order business.

The direct security of the Dominion is given by the statute for all deposits made.

Deposits of one dollar, or of any number of dollars, will be received from any depositor at the Post Office Savings Banks, provided the deposits made by such depositor in any year ending the 30th June, do not exceed three hundred dollars (except in special cases to be specially authorized by the Postmaster-General,) and provided the total amount standing in such depositor's name in his ordinary deposit account in the books of the Postmaster-General do not exceed \$1000 exclusive of interest.

No interest will be allowed on any sum over and above one thousand dollars in an ordinary deposit account.

Interest calculated yearly at the rate of FOUR DOLLARS per cent per annum, is allowed on deposits, and is computed from the first day of the calendar month next following the day on which the deposit is made, up to the first day of the calendar month in which moneys are withdrawn. The interest is calculated on the thirtieth day of June in every year, and is then added to and becomes part of the principal money.

Deposits may be made by a Trustee on behalf of another person, in the joint name of such Trustee and the person on whose account such money is so deposited; but the prepayment of the same, or any part thereof, cannot be made without the receipt and receipts of both the said parties, or the survivor or survivors, or Executors or Administrators of such survivors, whose receipt and receipts either personally or by agent appointed by Power of Attorney, which Power of Attorney in the

case of Minors may be exonerated by such Minor if of or exceeding the age of fourteen years, is alone a valid discharge, except in case of insanity or imbecility of the party on whose behalf the deposits were made, when the Postmaster-General may, on proof of the fact to his satisfaction, allow re-payment to be made to the Trustee alone. Deposits may be made by or for the benefit of any person under twenty-one years of age.

In case of minors under the age of ten years, the declaration must be made by one of the parents or by a friend on behalf of the minor.

Repayment to a minor over ten years of age shall be made in the same manner as if he were of full age. Deposits may be made by married women, and deposits so made, or made by women who shall afterwards marry, will be repaid to any such women.

Postmasters are forbidden by law to disclose the name of any depositor, or the amount of any sum deposited or withdrawn.

No charge will be made to depositors on paying in, or drawing out money, nor for postage or communications with the Postmaster-General in relation thereto.

The Post Master-General will always be ready to receive and attend to applications, complaints or other communications addressed to him by depositors or others relative to Post-Office Savings Bank matters.

## MONTREAL WATER WORKS.

*Extracts from By-Laws Nos. 55, 66, 82, enacted April 20, 1873.*

Sec. 5. It is expressly forbidden to any occupant of a house or building, or any part thereof, supplied with water from the said water works, to furnish water to others, or to use it otherwise than for his own use, or to increase the supply of water agreed for, or to waste it, or to practice any fraud upon the said Corporation with regard to the water so supplied.

Sec. 6. All persons taking the water shall keep the distribution pipe within their premises in good repair, and protected from frost, at their own expense; and they shall be held liable to the Corporation for all damages that may result from their failure to do so.

Sec. 7. No person shall fraudulently connect any pipe with the water pipes of the Corporation, or with any pipe, cistern or apparatus connected therewith, or to or into which the water from the said water works shall flow or proceed; or shall fraudulently use or otherwise misappropriate the water supplied by the city, or knowingly permit the same to be fraudulently used or misappropriated.

Sec. 8. If any person supplied with water by the Corporation do, or permit to be done, anything in contravention of this by-law, or fail to do anything prescribed by this by-law, the superintendent, or his deputy, may cut off the water supply, and cease to supply such person with water so long as the cause of complaint remains, or is not remedied.

Sec. 9. No person shall wrongfully cause or suffer any pipe, valve, cock, cistern, bath, soil-pan, water-closet or other apparatus or receptacle to be out of repair, or to be so used or contrived as that the water supplied to him is, or is likely to be wasted, misused, or unduly consumed.

Sec. 10. No alteration shall be made in any of the pipes or fixtures inserted by the city, except by its agent or officers.

Sec. 11. No person supplied with water from the said water works by meter, shall be allowed to connect, or cause to be connected, any pipe or other fixture between the Corporation's service pipe and the meter.

Sec. 12. No person, unless duly authorized by the water committee, shall open any hydrant in the said city, or lift or remove the cover of, or draw water from the same.

Sec. 13. No person shall turn on or turn off the water in any manner, or interfere with any of the water pipes or valves belonging to the city, without the license of the water committee, or of the said superintendent.

Sec. 14. No person shall pass the railing enclosing the reservoirs of the said city, or shall defile or deposit any filth or offensive matter in the said reservoirs, or on the bank or ground adjacent thereto, belonging to the said city, or shall allow any dog or other animal to jump into the said reservoirs, or upon the said bank or ground, or shall pass or remain upon the said bank or ground after 10 o'clock in the evening; or shall do or cause anything to be done tending to defile or corrupt, to disturb or agitate the waters of the said reservoirs.

Sec. 15. No person shall draw or use water from the River St. Lawrence, or elsewhere, for the purpose of selling the same in any part of the city.

Sec. 16. No person shall draw or use water from the water works in the said city for private fountains, or for hand hose for watering purposes, or for building or manufacturing purposes, unless such person shall have previously obtained from the superintendent of the said works a written permission to that effect, and paid the respective rates charged in the subjoined tariff, for the supply of water in such cases; and in no case shall the said hose be used for sprinkling or watering the streets between 9 o'clock in the forenoon and 5 o'clock in the afternoon.

Sec. 17. No person shall use any hand hose of a larger size or nozzle than one-fourth of an inch orifice, or use any hand-hose for the purpose of washing horses, coaches, omnibuses or other vehicles.

Sec. 18. No meter shall be used for determining the quantity of water supplied by the said works, unless the same shall have been previously submitted to and approved by the said superintendent.

Sec. 19. The several rates enumerated and specified in the tariff contained in the subjoined schedule, shall be and the same are hereby imposed for water to be supplied from the water works of the said city.

Sec. 20. The said rates shall be due and payable to the city treasurer, in advance, on the 15th day of August, every year, by the occupant or lessee, or occupants or lessees, of all buildings, part of buildings or tenements in the said city, supplied with water from the said works, as well by those who shall consent as by those who shall refuse to receive the water pipe to supply the said water, or to use the same.

Sec. 21. All charges for specific supplies or for fractional parts of the year, shall be payable in advance and before the water is let on.

Sec. 22. In buildings occupied as offices, where there are water closets in the building, each tenant of an office or suite of offices, will be charged, in addition to the tariff rate, a water closet tax.

Sec. 24. In all cases of non-payment of the rates imposed by the present by-law, for thirty days after the same are due, the said Council, or any duly authorized officer charged with the management of the said works, may cut off the supply of water from any building upon which the said rates shall be due, or from any one in default to pay the said rates, which shall not prevent the said rates from running as before, and the water shall not be let on, for the use of any such defaulter, except upon payment of all arrears due.

Sec. 25. Any person offending against any of the provisions of this by-law or of the said tariff, shall for each and every such infraction, be liable to a fine not exceeding twenty dollars, and costs of prosecution, and, in default of immediate payment of the said fine and costs, to an imprisonment in the common gaol for a period not to exceed two months, the said imprisonment to cease upon payment of the said fine and costs.

Persons desiring to supply their own meter may do so, with the previous sanction and written permit of the Superintendent of the Water Works.

When water is required for purposes not specified in the foregoing tariff, the rate shall be fixed by the Water Committee.

## ADULTERATION OF FOOD.

Extracts from 31st Vic., chap. 8.

"An Act to impose License duties on compounders of Spirits; to amend the 'Act respecting the Inland Revenue,' and to prevent the Adulteration of Food, Drink, and Drugs." 26th May 1874."

3. "A license to carry on business and to act as compounder, and to sell by wholesale the articles compounded under such license, may be granted to any party who had complied with the provisions of this Act; provided that the granting of the license has been approved by the District Inspector of Inland Revenue, and that the party has, jointly and severally, with two good and sufficient sureties, entered into a bond with Her Majesty, her heirs and successors, in the sum of one thousand dollars, and such bond shall be taken before the Collector of Inland Revenue, who shall cause such sureties to justify as to

their sufficiency before him, by affidavit endorsed upon such bond, and shall be conditioned for the rendering of all accounts and the payment of all duties and penalties which the party to whom the license is granted will become liable to render or pay under the provisions of this Act, and that such party will faithfully comply with the requirements thereof, according to their true intent and meaning, as well as with regard to such accounts and penalties, as to all other matters and things whatsoever."

4. "The party in whose name a license is granted to act as a compounder, shall, upon receiving such license, pay to the Collector of Inland Revenue, the sum of fifty dollars.

14. Gives authority to appoint analysts of food, drink and drugs.

15. Empowers Revenue Officers to seize and destroy adulterated articles, when so reported by the analyst.

22. "Every person who shall wilfully admix, and every person who shall order any other person to admix with any article of food or drink, any deleterious or poisoning ingredient or material to adulterate the same for sale, and every person who shall wilfully admix, and every person who shall order any other person to admix any ingredient or material with any drug, to adulterate the same for sale, shall, for the first offence, forfeit and pay a penalty of one hundred dollars, together with the costs attending the conviction, and for the same offence shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and be imprisoned for a period not exceeding six calendar months, with hard labor."

23. The penalty under this clause, for selling or offering for sale any adulterated article of food or drink is one hundred dollars for a first offence; for a subsequent offence, two hundred dollars; and in either case, the adulterated goods are to be seized and forfeited to the Crown.—See clause 15.

24. "Any person who shall sell an article of food or drink, or any drug, knowing the same to have been mixed with any other substance, with intent fraudulently to increase its weight or bulk, and who shall not declare such admixture to any purchaser thereof, before delivering the same, and no other, shall be deemed to have sold an adulterated article of food or drink, or drugs, as the case may be, under this Act:

"Every person who mixes or causes to be mixed with any intoxicating liquors sold or exposed for sale by him, any deleterious ingredient, that is to say, any of the ingredient specified in the second schedule to this Act, or added to such schedule by any Order in Council made under this Act, or any ingredient deleterious to health;

" Every person who sells, or keeps, or exposes for sale, any intoxicating liquors mixed with any deleterious ingredient; and

" Every compounder, or dealer in, and every manufacturer of intoxicating liquors, who has in his possession, or in any part of the premises occupied by him as such, any adulterated liquor knowing it to be adulterated, or any deleterious ingredient specified in the second schedule hereto, or added to such schedule by order of the Governor in Council, for the possession of which he is unable to account to the satisfaction of the Court before which the case is tried, shall be deemed knowingly to have exposed for sale adulterated liquor, and shall be liable for the first offence, to a penalty not exceeding one hundred dollars, or to imprisonment for a term not exceeding one month, with or without hard labour; and for the second or any succeeding offence, to a penalty not exceeding four hundred dollars, or to imprisonment for a time not exceeding three months, with or without hard labour.—See 28 Vic., chap. 36.

*Regulations governing Food Analysts.*

a. On receipt of a sample from the Revenue Officer authorised, as provided in the Act above cited, to take such samples, the Analyst shall open sample, and in the presence of that Official shall carefully mix equally and divide sample into two parcels, one of which he shall keep for analysis, the other he shall seal up with his own seal and deposit with Inland Revenue Officer.

b. The Analyst shall preserve a portion of his own sample for future examination. But, if the substance be of such a nature as to undergo alteration by keeping a short time, such as milk, the first analysis shall be final; and in such case no analysis shall be held valid, unless report be sent in within twelve hours of the taking of the sample, and in such case duplicate samples shall be unnecessary.

c. The Analyst shall impartially perform the duties of his office, and shall not give the result of his analysis or the names or addresses of parties whose samples may be submitted to him to any one, except when called upon to do so in his report to the Department, or before a Court of Law, in conformity with his duties under this Act.

### MEMORANDA.

**AFFIDAVITS**.—In all cases in which affidavits are made on an entry to cover the admission of goods of special rates for special purposes such as cordage for ship purposes—the entry clerk should attach a memorandum of the fact to the invoice for the information of the Appraiser; and in all cases in which articles are imported for such special uses, such as for the "fisheries" for "ships use," &c. the importers' affidavit should declare that they will be actually used for such purpose.

**DISCOUNTS, TRADE.**—Broad cloths—union and all wool—usual discount, 5 per cent. and 1-37th allowed for measurement. Leicester goods—knitted goods, except hosiery —  $\frac{1}{2}$  per cent. Hosiery (proper), 2 $\frac{1}{2}$  per cent. Nottingham lace goods, 12 $\frac{1}{2}$  to 15 per cent. Horrock's White Shirtings, A, & B, 6 per cent. and 2 per cent.; H, & M, 8 per cent. and 2 per cent.; Black crepes, 5 per cent.

**DISCOUNTS FOR CASH.**—Invoices of Dry Goods representing less than a credit of 60 days shall be considered cash values, and shall be subject to such addition as may be necessary to bring them to the fair market credit-values. The usual cash discount on all kinds of staple goods is 2 per cent. and on fancy goods 5 per cent. On HARDWARE SHELF Goods the usual discount for cash is 6 per cent. On heavy goods, 2 $\frac{1}{2}$  to 5 per cent. Note: If the discount for cash be mentioned on the invoice it should not be allowed or deducted. If the invoice be net cash, i.e., the discount taken off the prices, the equivalent of such discount shall be added, to arrive at the fair credit-value. The ordinary credit in the United Kingdom for hardware is from four to six months, Sheffield, 4 months; Birmingham goods, 6 months; 5 per cent. discount on steel goods, 2 $\frac{1}{2}$  to 3 per cent. on heavy, for remittances on receipt of Bill of Lading are cash discounts. The same credit will apply to invoices of the same goods from the United States. Exceptionally, on a few items of heavy goods, such as wine and spirits, the discount for cash is from 4 to 6 per cent.

**DRUGS AND CHEMICALS.**—The same term of credit applies to drugs and chemicals imported from the United States; from England the usual term of credit is 3 months, and the discounts for cash are from 2 to 5 per cent.

**EXPORT DUTY.** forms part of the value for duty; and in sugar invoices is not to be considered as an expense on which duty is to be remitted in cases of direct importation.

**FOREIGN CURRENCIES.**—Invoices representing foreign depreciated currencies should be accompanied by an affidavit by the shipper before the British Consul at the place of purchase, as to the fact of purchase having been made in said currency, and a certificate from the Consul as to the value of said currency at the time.

**FURNITURE.**—Terms of credit in the United States, usually four months. An invoice of sixty days and under should be considered a cash invoice. The discount for cash is 5 per cent.

**GROCERIES.**—It has been decided that invoices of groceries from the United States representing a credit of less than sixty days, shall be considered as cash invoices, and brought up to the fair market credit-value.

and it follows that the 2½ per cent. discount of the invoices of such articles is a trade discount.

**INVOICES.**—No alterations in, is to be allowed on the part of the Importer or Customs Officer whether in regard to trade discounts or any other matter.

**INVOICES.**—Press Copies or duplicates should not be accepted. The original should be insisted upon as required by law.

**JEWELLERY AND FANCY Goods.**—Any invoice showing a credit of less than sixty days, from the United States, should be considered a cash invoice and treated accordingly. Cash invoices from Europe are very rare indeed — the terms are usually four months and even six months. Five per cent is allowed in the United States for cash.

"MAKING UP CHARGES" clearly forms part of the value of goods for duty, and it is not always possible to ascertain the exact weight.

MOLASSES may be taken at 13 1-5 lbs. to the Imperial Gallon, where the actual weight cannot be ascertained.

NICKEL comes also under the names "Cathode and Anode."

PACKAGES. The following tariff of value for packages containing goods paying a specific duty is given as a guide in cases where such values cannot be otherwise ascertained:—

These Flasks in former lists were considerably overvalued.

**PAPE.**—The usual terms on paper, in the United States are from 60 to 90 days. Any credit under 60 days should be considered cash. In Great Britain 4 to 6 months is allowed as a term of credit. Cash discounts in the United States from 2 to 3 per cent.; in Great Britain the cash discounts vary from 2½ to 5 per cent. Settlements within 30 days are properly cash transactions.

**SPIRITS, WINES, &c.**, should not be allowed to remain in sufferance warehouses for any length of time without gauging.

**SUGAR**.—Sampling for grading. The sample should be taken by an officer of Customs only, or under official supervision, and from the bilge of the cask right through.

The practice of reducing the invoice value of sugar proportionately for loss of weight by drainage, wherever it has been practised must be discontinued hereafter in the entry of sugar, the specific rate to be charged upon the actual weight as ascertained on arrival, and the *ad valorem* upon the actual value where purchased; that is, the value represented by fair and legitimate invoices, being the amount the purchaser pays for the sugar.

Grading and weighing should be done immediately on arrival; and on no account should sugar be allowed to remain in sufferance warehouses for any length of time without grading and weighing.

**TEA AND COFFEE**, imported by Canadians from a country other than the United States, but passing *in transitu* via the United States, the whole quantity in the original invoice must be brought into Canada to warrant the treatment of the importation as other than a United States purchase.

**TONS OF IRON, &c.**, when not otherwise specially mentioned in the tariff, consist of ..... 2,000 lbs.

**UNIVERSAL**.—The term “Universal” in the 22nd section of the Customs Act (40 Vic., cap. 10), is interpreted as not extending beyond the country in which the goods are purchased; that is to say, the usages of trade in one country cannot be held to govern the usages of trade in another country.

The proportionate duty on such fractional parts of a degree of proof spirits containing in wine over 26 per cent. by Sykes' Hydrometer, as may be in future or has been heretofore determined by the application of the proper test. Thus, one-third of a degree would require an addition of one cent: two-thirds, two cents; but in all cases the whole duty must include the three cents for each degree, and *pro rata* for each additional fractional part of a degree over 26 per cent. of proof spirits.

All goods imported into Canada from the United States under arrangements with the purchasers for delivery, with transportation charges and Canadian duty paid, shall be valued for duty at the fair market value thereof, including all expenses to the frontier of the said United States.

DUTIES AND EXEMPTIONS FROM DUTY.

40 VIC., CHAP. 10, SEC. 4.

4. On each and every non-enumerated article which bears a similitude, either in material, quality or the use to which it may be applied, to any enumerated article chargeable with duty, the same rate of duty shall be payable which is charged on the enumerated article which it most resembles in any of the particulars before mentioned; if any non-enumerated article equally resembles two or more enumerated articles on which different rates of duty are chargeable, the duty on such non-enumerated article shall be the same as that on the enumerated article which it resembles, paying the highest duty; on all articles manufactured from two or more materials, the duty shall be that charged on the article (if there be a difference of duty) which is charged with the highest duty; spirits and strong waters, from whatever substance distilled or prepared, having the flavor of any kind of spirits or strong waters subject to a higher duty than whiskey, shall be liable to the duty imposed on spirits or strong waters of which they have the flavor.

42 VIC., CHAP. 15, SECTIONS 4, 5 AND 9.

4. The value of all bottles, flasks, jars, demijohns, carboys, casks, hogheads, pipes, barrels, and all other vessels or packages, manufactured of tin, iron, lead, zinc, glass, or any other material, and capable of holding liquids,—crates, barrels and other packages containing glass, china, crockery, or earthenware, and all packages in which goods are commonly placed for home consumption, including cases in which bottled spirits, wines, or malt liquors are contained, and every package, being the first receptacle or covering enclosing goods for purpose of sale, shall, in all cases not otherwise provided for, in which they contain goods subject to an *ad valorem* duty, be taken and held to be a part of the fair market value of such goods for duty, and when they contain goods subject to specific duty only, such packages shall be charged with a duty of customs of twenty per centum *ad valorem*, to be computed upon their original cost or value; and all or any of the above packages described as capable of holding liquids, when containing goods exempt from duty under this Act, shall be charged with a duty of twenty per centum *ad valorem*; but all packages not hereinbefore specified, and not herein specially charged with or declared liable to duty under regulations, and being the usual and ordinary packages in which goods are packed for exportation only, according to the general usage and custom of trade, shall be free of duty.

5. On all goods imported into Canada, subject under this Act to *ad valorem* duty upon which a drawback of duties has been allowed by the Government of the country where the same were manufactured, the amount of such drawback shall, in all cases, be taken and considered to be a part of the fair market value of such goods, and duty shall be collected thereon; and in cases where the amount of

such drawback has been deducted from the value of such goods upon the face of the invoice under which entry is to be made, the Collector of Customs, or proper officer, shall add the amount of such deduction and collect and cause to be paid the lawful duty thereupon; and the fair market value of all goods imported into Canada shall be understood to be the ordinary wholesale price at which the same are sold for home consumption in the country where they are purchased or manufactured, without deduction of any kind because of any drawback paid or to be paid thereon, or because of any special arrangement between the seller and purchaser having reference to the exportation of such goods, or the exclusive right to territorial limits, for the sale thereof, or because of any royalty payable upon patent rights, but not payable when goods are purchased for exportation, or on account of any other consideration, by which a special reduction in price might or could be obtained; Provided that nothing herein shall be understood to apply to general fluctuations of market values.

9. In determining the dutiable value of goods, except when imported from Great Britain and Ireland, there shall be added to the cost of the actual wholesale price or fair market value, at the time of exportation in the principal markets of the country from whence the same has been imported into Canada, the cost of inland transportation, shipment and trans-shipment, with all the expenses included, from the place of growth, production, or manufacture, whether by land or water, to the vessel in which shipment is made, either *in transitu* or direct to Canada, subject to such regulations as may be made by the Governor in Council.

*Ashes.*—Dyde & Major, inspectors, College street.

*Chap. 45, 37 Vic., 1874.*—The inspector shall charge the sum of 10 cents for every hundred pounds of pot or pearl ashes inspected by him; 25 cents for each pew head furnished; 15 cents for cooperage and repairs on each barrel—said cooperage to include nails and end hoops of barrel; 25 cents for putting in a barrel, partly filled, the additional quantity thereof necessary to fill the same, whenever duly required to do so; 25 cents per barrel in all cases where lime, raw ashes, damaged ashes, or other trash, have been packed or mixed with pot or pearl ashes, for extracting or separating the same.

*Flour.*—L. A. Boyer, inspector, 88 Common street. Fees, 2 cents per barrel for inspecting and branding (exclusive of cooperage). “When any less quantity than 100 barrels of flour are offered for inspection, the Inspector shall be entitled to receive the full fees that would accrue to him on 100 barrels. When the Inspector, in his judgment, deems it necessary to strip or empty out the floor, to find out if there is the proper weight of flour in any cask, he shall be entitled to 2 cents for each barrel so stripped or emptied (if it prove to be of short weight,) in addition to the 2 cents per barrel for inspection and branding.”






Morin, corner St. Sacrement and St. Nicholas streets. “Every inspector or deputy inspector who shall inspect and brand or mark any cask or package of pickled fish, or in bulk, or any fish oil, in accordance with the provisions of this Act, shall be entitled to fees at the following rates, which shall be paid by the original owner or the person who employed him in the first instance:—For each tierce of salmon, salmon-trout, or sea trout, 15 cents; each half tierce, 10 cents; each barrel, 15 cents; each half barrel, 10 cents. For each barrel of mackerel, 10 cents; each half barrel, 5 cents. For each barrel of herring, 5 cents; each half barrel, 3 cents. For each barrel of shad, 10 cents; each half barrel, 7 cents. 



barrel, 3 cents. For each barrel dry-salted codfish, hake, halibut, catfish, ling, or pollock, 5 cents; each half barrel, 3 cents. For each barrel of bass, 10 cents; each half barrel, 7 cents. For each barrel of cod tongues, cod sounds, halibut or eels, 10 cents; each half barrel, 7 cents. For inspecting, gauging and branding each puncheon of oil, 20 cents; each hogshead, 15 cents; each tierce, 20 cents; each barrel, 15 cents. In reckoning packages of oil a barrel is from 20 to 34 gallons; a tierce from 35 to 51 gallons; a hogshead from 52 to 89 gallons; a puncheon from 90 gallons upwards—all Imperial measure. The foregoing rates shall be reckoned exclusive of salt, pickle, cooperage, storage, and labour employed in washing, rinsing, cleaning, nailing, screwing or repacking and pickling any fish. For branding or marking Newfoundland fish, which have been inspected in Newfoundland, 2 cents per barrel. For inspecting empty packages, 1 cent. The owner may employ his own cooper to act under inspector.

*Leather and Hides.*—T. Hawkins, inspector. “Every inspector shall be entitled, for the inspection of such hides, to a fee of 5 cents for each hide in lots under 100 in number, and 4 cents for each hide in lots over 100 in number. 



## INSPECTION OF WEIGHTS AND MEASURES.

The Act amending and consolidating the laws relating to Weights and Measures, assented to 15th May, 1879, comes into operation 1st July, 1879, and among other things, provides that :—

"The unit or standard measure of capacity, from which all other measures of capacity, as well for liquids as for dry goods shall be derived, shall be the gallon, containing ten Dominion standard pounds weight of distilled water, weighed in air against brass weights, with the Water and the air at a temperature of 62° of Fahrenheit's thermometer, and with the barometer at 30 inches."

"Provided always, that until the 1st day of May, 1880, the wine gallon of 231 cubic inches may be used in any case by special understanding between the parties to any contract or agreement for the measurement of liquids, and the ratio or proportion which such measure shall bear to the standard shall be as follows: six wine gallons shall be equal to five standard gallons."

From the above, it will be seen that the use of the Winchester bushel and its subdivisions becomes illegal from the 1st July, 1879, and that the use of the wine measure is permitted for liquids only until the 1st of May, 1880, from which date its use becomes illegal.

With reference to unstamped weights, measures and weighing machines being in the possession of manufacturers of or dealers in such articles, it is enacted:

"That the manufacturer of or dealer in weights, measures or weighing machines, who has in his possession for sale, any weight, measure or weighing machine, shall not be bound to have the same inspected and stamped according to this Act, so long as the same remain in his manufactory or warehouse, but no such weight, measure or weighing machine shall be removed from his premises, sold or taken into use for trade without having been inspected and stamped."

For the avoidance of inconvenience, therefore, it might be well that manufacturers and traders should keep on hand a sufficient stock of stamped weights, measures, scales, &c., for supplying the wants of their customers.

Instead of an annual inspection as heretofore provided for; this Act provides for a bi-annual inspection of weights and measures. But this provision is not intended to prevent Inspectors of weights and measures from testing the accuracy of weights, measures and weighing machines at any intervening period.

FISH AND GAME LAWS  
OF THE  
DOMINION OF CANADA.

PROVINCE OF ONTARIO.

The following is the new Game Act in the Province of Ontario, giving the season when game may be killed:—

Deer, moose, elk, reindeer, or cariboo, from the 15th day of September to the 15th day of December, inclusive.

Wild turkeys, grouse, pheasants or partridges, and prairie fowl, between the 1st of October and the 1st day of February.

Quail, between the 1st day of October and the 1st day of January.

Woodcock, between the 1st day of August and the 1st day of January.

Snipe, between the 15th day of August and the 1st of May.

Mallard, grey duck, black duck, wood or summer duck, and all kinds of teal, between the 1st day of September and the 1st day of January.

Other ducks, wild swans, and geese, between the 1st day of September and the 1st day of May.

Hares or rabbits, between the 1st day of September and the 1st day of March.

No person shall have in his possession any of the above animals or birds or any portion of them during the close seasons. They may be exposed for sale, nevertheless, for one month, and no longer, after such periods, or had in possession at any time for family use, but in all cases the proof of the time of killing or taking shall be upon the party so in possession.

None of the animals or birds above mentioned shall at any time be taken by means of traps, snares, gins, baited lines, or other similar contrivances. Any person may destroy any such traps, snares, &c., which he may discover, without incurring any liability for so doing.

No one shall take, destroy or have in possession the eggs of any of the birds mentioned, at any time. No batteries, sunken punts, or night lights allowed in the killing of swans, geese or ducks. No ducks to be killed from dark until daylight.

Beaver, muskrat, mink, sable, martin, raccoon, otter and fisher may be hunted and killed only between the 1st of November and the 1st of May.

The fine for killing deer, &c., out of season shall be not less than ten dollars, nor more than fifty dollars, for each animal.

For having in possession the birds or eggs of any of the birds protected at any time, not less than five dollars, nor more than twenty-five dollars, for each bird or egg.

For killing any of the fur-bearing animals out of the season, not less than five dollars, nor more than twenty-five dollars, and a similar fine for any other breach of the Act. In all cases the whole of the fine to be paid to the prosecutor, unless the convicting justice has reason to believe that the prosecution is in collusion with and for purpose of benefiting the accused.

PROVINCE OF QUEBEC.

No elk, cariboo, deer, or their fawn, or hare, shall be hunted, taken or killed between the 1st day of February and the 1st day of September in any year.

No grouse, ptarmigan, partridge, woodcock or snipe shall be shot at, hunted, taken or killed between the first day of March and the first day of September in any year.

No person shall fire at, hunt, take, kill or destroy any wild swan, wild goose, or any kind of wild duck, sea duck, widgeon or teal, between the first day of May and the first day of September, in any year, in that part of the province west of the city of Three Rivers, nor between the fifteenth day of the month of May and the first day of the month of September in any year, to the east of that town.

Nevertheless in that part of the province to the east of the place known as the "Brandy Pots," in the River St. Lawrence, the inhabitants may, between the 15th day of the month of May and the first day of September in each year, hunt, take or kill for food only, any of the animals mentioned in this section.

No woodcock, snipe, wild swan, wild goose, or wild duck of any kind, or sea duck or teal shall at any time be shot at, hunted, taken or killed between one hour after sunset and one hour before sunrise.

No animal or bird, named in the foregoing sections, except hares, shall be taken or killed at any time by means of any rope, snare, spring, cage, net or trap of any kind.

No engine shall be at any time, for such purpose, placed, constructed, erected or set, either wholly or in part; and any person finding any engine so placed, constructed, erected or set, may take possession of or destroy the same.

No person shall at any time, disturb, injure, gather, or take the eggs of any species of wild fowl; and all vessels or boats employed in disturbing, gathering or taking the eggs of any species of wild fowl, may, as well as the eggs, be confiscated and sold.

No wild cat, marten or pekan shall be hunted, trapped or killed between the fifteenth day of April and the first day of November, and no mink between the fifteenth day of April and the fifteenth day of October, in each year.

No person shall hunt, trap or kill :—

Any otter between the first of May and the first of October, in each year.

Any beaver between the thirtieth of April and the first of September in each year.

Any muskrat between the first of June in each year and the first of April following, for the districts of Quebec, Saguenay, Chicoutimi, Montmagny, Kamouraska, Rimouski, and Gaspé, and between the first of May of each year and the first of April following for the remainder of the province.

No person shall at any time use or employ strichnine or other deleterious poison, either mineral or vegetable, nor any spring gun, to hunt, take, kill or destroy any animal whatever.

Every game-keeper appointed by the commissioner of crown lands shall forthwith seize all animals or birds mentioned in the preceding sections, or any portion of such animals or birds found by him in the possession or custody of any person during any forbidden period, and which appear to him to have been taken or killed during such period, or by any of the illegal means set forth in sections 5 and 9 of this act, and he shall bring them before any justice of the peace, who shall declare them confiscated either in whole or in part.

All animals or birds, or portions of animals or birds so confiscated shall belong to the game-keeper.

No person shall have in his possession, custody or care, any animal or bird already mentioned, or any part of such animal or bird, with the exception of the skin, during the period in which by the act the killing thereof is prohibited, or which appears to have been taken or killed by any of the means forbidden by this act; but every such animal or bird, or any portion or portions thereof, may be bought or sold (when lawfully taken), during fourteen days, to be computed from the expiration of the various periods respectively fixed by this act for the killing thereof.

Every such game-keeper may cause to be opened, or may himself open, in case of refusal, any bag, parcel, chest, box, trunk, or other receptacle, in which he has reason to believe that game killed or taken during the close season, or peltries out of season are hidden.

Every offence against any of the provisions of this act shall be punishable by a fine not exceeding fifty dollars, and recoverable summarily or on information or summons duly issued by a justice of the peace.

Such justice of the peace, on the proof which shall be thereof made, may impose the penalty, with costs, and such penalty shall belong to the informer.

In default of immediate payment, the offender shall be imprisoned in the common jail of the district within the limits of which the offence was committed, for any period of time not exceeding three months.

Every magistrate shall have power to convict on view.

Suits brought in virtue of this act need not be begun by deposition or information on oath of the plaintiff or complainant, provided always that the purport of the complaint or demand is sufficiently set forth in the writ or in a declaration annexed thereto.

The evidence of the complainant alone, or of any one witness, shall be sufficient to support a conviction.

No proceeding under this act shall be quashed, annulled or set aside by *cavillorari*; but an appeal may be brought before the circuit court of the district in which the offence took place, in the same manner as appeals under the municipal code.

No prosecution shall be brought after twelve calendar months from the day of the committing of the offence.

The commissioner of crown lands may appoint officers to superintend the execution of this act, and of any other act, which may be hereafter passed respecting game in this province.

The commissioner of crown lands or any person by him thereunto empowered, may grant written permissions to all persons desirous *bona fide* of procuring birds, eggs of fur-bearing animals, for scientific purposes, during the close season; and the person who shall have obtained such permission shall not be liable to any penalty imposed by this act, provided that he produce, within two months next after the period in which he shall have hunted under such permission, a statement under oath specifying the kind and quantity of game and fur-bearing animals taken by him for such scientific objects.

**CLOSE SEASONS FOR FISH.—(Applies to Que., & Ont.)**

Salmon—From 1st August to 30th April, for net-fishing; from 31st August to 30th April, for fly surface fishing.

No salmon fry, parr or smolt to be caught; and no salmon or grilse under 3 lbs. weight. If caught by accident, to be released.

White Fish from 1st to 10th November in Ontario, and from 10th November to 1st December in Quebec.

Salmon Trout, Lake Trout (*or lunge and Winnoniche*)—From 15th October to 1st December in Quebec, and from 1st to 10th November in Ontario.

Speckled Trout, (*Salmon Fontinalis*.) Brook or River Trout. From 1st October to 31st December in Quebec, and from 15th September to 1st May in Ontario.

Bass—From 15th April to 15th May in Quebec and Ontario.

Pickerel (*Dort*)—From 15th April to 15th May in Quebec and Ontario.

Maskinongé—From 15th April to 15th May in Quebec and Ontario.

No person shall during such prohibited times, fish for, catch, kill, buy, sell, or have in possession, any of the above mentioned kinds of fish.

## CUSTOMS DEPARTMENT.

### Regulations Governing Travellers' Carriages, &c., Crossing the Frontier.

To ensure uniformity at the frontier ports in dealing with "carriages of travellers and carriages laden with merchandise," and to afford the utmost facility to parties visiting the Dominion for transient purposes, consistent with the protection of the Revenue, the Minister of Customs has approved of the following "Regulations and Restrictions":—

1st—Regular stages and hacks, when the owners or the drivers are known to the officers, may be allowed to cross the frontier and return, within two days, without being required to make an entry at the Custom House, subject only to the ordinary examination, search and inspection.

2nd—Travellers intending to remain within the Dominion for a longer period than two days are required in all cases to report and enter their horses, carriages and travelling equipage; and in cases where they do not intend to leave at the same point at which they enter, or are uncertain on that point, they will deposit with the Collector the full amount of duty on such horses, carriages, and other dutiable articles, to be returned only on their furnishing satisfactory evidence that the same articles have been returned unchanged to the United States. Travellers intending to leave at the port of entry may be allowed to enter as above, and, in lieu of cash, to give a bond, with an approved resident surety, covering the amount of duty, and with the additional condition that such bond shall be enforced if the time specified therein be exceeded.

3rd—The time to be allowed travellers in either case shall not exceed one calendar month; and if that time be exceeded, the entries shall be considered *bona fide* entries for duty, and be included in the accounts of the port.

4th—All monies received by Collectors on deposit, under the above Regulations, shall be, if possible, deposited *ad interim* in a bank, in the Collector's name; and if there is no bank available, then in some other place of security under the Collector's credit, and a separate account of the receipt and disposal of such deposit should be sent quarterly to the Department.

5th—The entries in such case should contain such a description of the horses, carriages, &c., as would enable the Collector or other officer to identify them on their leaving the Dominion; and a copy shall be furnished the owner or other person making such entry, which shall be his permit for travelling in the country.

## Parcels Post Rates within the Dominion.

1. The rates, to be prepaid by postage stamp, on parcels posted in Canada for destinations within the Dominion to which parcels can be sent, are as follows:

For each parcel weighing not less than 4 ozs..... 6 cents  
For " do. exceeding 4 ozs., and not exceeding 8 ozs. 12 cents

For each additional 4 ozs., or fraction of 4 ozs ..... 6 cents

It will be observed that provision is thus made for a reduction of charge on small parcels not exceeding 4 ozs. in weight, and that the general scale of charge will be 6 cents for 4 ozs., instead of, as heretofore, 12½ cents per 8 ozs.

## Transmission of Spectacles and Eye-glasses by Mail.

2. The exclusion of glass from the Mails is so far modified, that spectacles and eye-glasses, if securely put up in cases not likely to allow the contents to escape if broken in course of conveyance, may be sent by Post within the Dominion on prepayment of the above parcel post rates.

## Circulars Printed by the Electric Pen, &c.

3. The term "*printed circulars*" is extended to include circulars produced by the electric pen or other mechanical process, easy of recognition by the officers of the Post Office, as well as when printed by the ordinary process of printing type, engraving, or lithography.

## Letters, &c., Mis-sent.

4. When letters or other postal matter is mis-sent and reaches a Post Office for which it is not intended, the Postmaster, when sending on the same to what he judges to be the right destination, should be careful to mark thereon "Mis-sent to —", adding the postmark of his office.
