### TAILORS' STRIKE NOW NEARLY ENDED

Three Hundred Journeymen Have Joined Union, and Rest Are Expected to Soon Sign Up—Strikers Have Received \$14 Per Week for Seven Months.

The leaders in the journeymen tailors' strike in this city, which has been waged since March 1, believe the end is now in sight. More than 300 tailors have joined the strikers, and the 50 or so that are still at work will strike before the end of the week if the anticipations of Hugh Robinson, the official Canadian representative of the International Union, are sustained. On Sunday a mass meeting was held in Zion Institute on Simcoe street, when the gathering, composed partly of strike-breakers, was addressed by Dr. Shayne. As a result of this effort, additional tailors laid down their scissars yesterday morning, and as some of these are sub-contractors, over 60 names were added to the list of strikers. There remain now only 50 tailors at work in Toronto, and a number of them have indicated their intention of quitting work before the end of this week.

Yesterday morning 11 tailors employed by Michael Jacobs in his shop at 459 West Adelaide street, walked out on the complaint that Jacobs had broken his agreement made six months ago to maintain a union shop.

Receive Strike Pay. Since the 250 tailors, members of local union 122 went on strike, seven months ago, they have received \$14 a week from the funds of the International Journeymen Tailors Union. This organization has already spent \$50,000 on the present Toronto strike, and, according to Mr. Robinson, is willing to spend another \$100,000 if that is necessary. Considerable sympathy has been aroused in local labor circles on behalf of the striking tailors. During the past week \$500 has been contributed to their funds, \$300 from Bricklayers' Union No. 2 and \$200 from the District Trades and Labor Council. Mr. Robinson showed a World reporter cheques received yesterday, to be used in the fight, one for \$5 from a union in Butte, Mont., and another for \$2 from Phoenix, Ariz. The local garment workers, who number 2000 in the Toronto organization, are ready to back up the tailors if their assistance is required. H. D. Rosenbaum, general organizer of the garment workers, stated last night that he did not believe that would be necessary, however, as he looks for a settlement by the end of the week.

### WILL EXONERATE LABOR OFFICIALS

McNamaras and McManigal Acted Independently of Union, Declares Attorney Harding.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Oct. 8.—(Can. Press.)—What the defence will be in the trial of the 45 men accused by the government of complicity in the "dynamite conspiracy," was outlined before the jury today by William N. Harding, attorney for the defendants.

Mr. Harding said at the outset it would be shown that the executive board of the International Association of Bridges and Structural Ironworkers never appropriated a dollar to be used for dynamiting. He asked the jury to suspend judgment until after the witnesses had testified. If anyone connected with the union diverted the funds for any illegal purpose, the guilty persons he said it would be shown, were not among the present defendants.

"When you have heard all the testimony," said Mr. Harding, "we think you will have concluded that about three men were engaged in the nefarious work of dynamiting, and that those three men already have pleaded guilty."

"Jobs" Not Sincere Term.

Referring to letters written by Frank M. Ryan, president of the Ironworkers' union, to various business agents, which the government used in showing that "jobs" was the term used to designate explosions against employers of non-union labor, Mr. Harding said it would be shown that "jobs" meant only new work which offered opportunity for union men to get employment. He added it would be upon the very letters which the government quoted in the indictments that the defence expected to rest its case.

Once Mr. Harding became so vehement in answering District Attorney Charles W. Miller, that Judge A. R. Anderson interposed. "The court will make allowances for your enthusiasm for the defendants, but it is not necessary for you to split the ears of the jurors in an opening statement."

The district attorney had just completed an address to the jury of 22 hours, covering five days.
