It is regarded as significant that, while Illinois Cenral, Louisville & Nashville, St. Paul and other high-class stocks were being marked up two and three points a day, such medium-priced issues as Atchison, Baltimore & Ohio, Southern Pacific and the Steel stocks were almost stationary. But these issues, tho attractive mediums of speculation in a public market, have too much bulk to be inviting to the manipulators, who are responsible for the present professional market.
