CANADA LIFE BENEFACITOR TO FRIENDS IN DISTRESS

How Senator Cox Did a Good Turn For Mr. Bradshaw—Loans Made to Employees—Witness Pleads For Publicity of His Personal Affairs to Show Company is Unharmful.

Senator Cox was yesterday queried by Mr. Shepley as to the advertising expenses of the Canada Life Co., and incidentally the senator said:

"We had a contract with one paper, The Toronto World, I think it was, and I think it was at 6c a line, and they demanded 25c a line, which we refused to pay. This was done by the advertising manager. The fact that we refused to pay that 25c may possibly explain why this commission is here. The criticism commenced the day afterwards. I was fortunately not responsible for the matter, but I have been bearing the brunt of it ever since."

Mr. Shepley: "Perhaps so, but you would not have been too much then?"

Senator Cox took the humorous view of the badinage and laughed heartily with the rest of those present.

"You find that sort of a publication essential?" asked Mr. Shepley.

"I think it is," admitted Mr. Cox. "During the senator's examination E. W. Cox handed to the reporters the following statement, which was not read, but which will go before the commission:

Statement.

J. K. McMaster, manager advertising department Canada Life, in September last a verbatim copy of the report of the commission of insurance for the Michigan was handed each of the six Toronto daily papers. The business manager of the World, Mr. Smallman, informed my assistant, who waited on him, that the matter could not appear in his paper at contract rates. My assistant asked him to leave the matter in abeyance and that I would call on him later, which I did.

Our contract with the World is at a rate of 6c per line and the contract requires that this rate shall include readers, display ads, or annual reports. When I waited on Mr. Smallman he informed me he would have to charge us 10c a line for this matter. I explained the surprise and reminded him that we had signed the contract which he agreed to leave the matter open till my next day. The following day Mr. Smallman called me up and expressed surprise that I had not called on him. I said that as I had not heard from him I assumed he had decided not to accept the copy of the report, which he did. All of the other papers had done so, and again urged the 10c rate, but I made me an offer of 8c per line. This I also refused, telling him that there was no more reason why we should pay 8c than 10c. Finally, and reluctantly he agreed to publish the matter at the contract price of 6c per line. Later on in the day he rang me up and told me that The World would publish the Michigan report at 25c or not at all. I then asked him to return the copy to this office, which he did.

The report appeared in the Toronto papers Sept. 14, 1905, and The World's series of attacks on the Canada Life insurance Co. commenced on Sept. 15, 1905.

Reply.

H. E. Smallman, advertising manager of The World in reply says: The Canada Life Co. was willing to pay the rate of 6c a line which The World is not willing to stipulation that an editorial reading notice, commending the report, also inserted in the World, distinctly refused to publish the report, but as soon as he was gone I put the report in which he asked should accompany it, in an envelope and returned it to the Canada Life.

The regular contract of the Canada Life with The World did not cover the insertion of such a report as was published. It was an average rate of 6c a line, covering display and reading matter, but I did not consider that an special Michigan report could be published at that rate. There was no mention of 8c or 10c, and when I was offered conditional that the higher rate was upon my inserting an editorial notice, I declined to take it at all.

Senator Cox stood in the witness box yesterday, before the insurance commission. He admitted having loaned to an employee \$1,000 on some shares of Dominion Life which he knew that the same employee was playing stocks on margin. Other employees were also loaned money, but the senator disapproved of such methods and the Canada Life had such methods and the Canada Life had out loaning money to servants. At the same time the \$17,000 debt is still being carried.

When Senator Cox arrived in the morning, 30 minutes late, he told Mr. Shepley that he had prepared a statement showing his holdings in all the companies, also his dealings and his company's dealings in buying and selling stocks. This would take up later. Shepley said he would take up the statement after the afternoon session, the senator gave a short address about the statement. He had consulted the Central Canada Co. and Messrs. Ames and Bradshaw Imperial Life, dated Jan. 2, 1902, which recited that the Central Canada L. & S. Co. had 880 shares of the Imperial stock of the Imperial Company, 45 per cent, paid up, and that the purchase price was \$1,000 per share.

MORALES' CONFEDERATES HELPED HIM IN AN AUTO

Spanish Police Are Hot on Trail—Couple Attend Big Review.

Madrid, June 4.—The populace of the Spanish capital gradually is receding from the excitement and the program of wedding festivities is being carried out, altho the nerve-racking tragedy of May 31 is likely to leave a lasting impression.

The principal event to-day was the military review at Carabanchel camp, at which King Alfonso and Queen Victoria were present. The former, who wore the uniform of a captain general, and who was mounted on a handsome bay, galloped along the lines. His escort was composed of officers of all nations in variegated uniforms. The Wadras Regiment, which lost several of its officers and privates by the bomb explosion last Thursday, occupied the post of honor and was enthusiastically applauded.

About 16,000 soldiers and sailors participated in the review. The tribunes were occupied by the members of the royal family, the princes, envoys, etc. were gorgeously decorated.

The review was followed by a musical competition this afternoon, and a gala ball to-night at the palace of the Duchess Fernan Nunez, which was attended by the members of the Spanish royal family and the visiting princess and envoys.

Members of the family of Manuel Morales, the perpetrator of the bomb outrage, are expected to arrive in Madrid to-night. The burial of the assassin probably takes place tomorrow in some obscure place.

The police are on the track of the accomplices of Morales in his flight. It is not known whether Morales fled to-night. He is believed to have escaped from Madrid, and a canvass of all the automobiles is going on. The movements of Morales in his flight were traced thru the sublighting of his car. He exchanged his clothes, where he was hiding, and the reward of \$5000 offered for the apprehension of the would-be regicide and five children of the guard who apprehended Morales. A popular subscription will also be raised for the widow.

Preston Need Not Tell House Backs Up Premier

BUT SIR WILFRID OFFERED TO BREAK PLEDGE OF SECRECY IF MR. BORDEN WOULD RECEIVE INFORMATION IN CONFIDENCE—BOURASSA WOULD GO AFTER STRATHCONA.

Ottawa, June 4.—(Special.)—The sphynx-like Preston having worn out two committees this afternoon occupied the attention of the house.

Mr. Monk (Jacques Cartier) moved a resolution reciting Preston's refusal to answer questions addressed to him by the committee respecting the persons who composed the North Atlantic Trading Company, and ordering his appearance, as for contempt, at the bar of the house on Wednesday afternoon. He quoted many authorities in support of the motion.

Mr. Laurier admitted that there was no doubt about the power of the house. But was it advisable to exercise it? The policy of the government was to support the saluings of the various standing committees. But apart from that, what was the issue? Mr. Preston had received certain information in confidence. He had pledged his word not to reveal this information, should we compel him to violate his pledge? The continental nations were opposed to emigration propaganda, arrest and prosecution, in vexatious, and in violation of the principle of the North Atlantic Trading Company, secrecy had been insisted upon and promised.

He read the letter from Lord Strathcona and Smart's reply. He dwelt on the fact that no formal charge was made by any member against any individual, but he had challenged some member of the opposition to put his seat in jeopardy by making a formal charge.

He finally offered an amendment to Mr. Monk's resolution reciting that no formal charge was made against any individual, but that the motion was justified in the exceptional circumstances and conditions surrounding the case.

CONDITIONS "REVOLTING" SAYS PRESIDENT OF PACKING HOUSES

PROMPT ACTION IS URGED

**GAVE COLONIES PREFERENCE
 IN THE DEAD MEAT INDUSTRY**

Present Law Useless to Effect Reform—Suggests Inspection Tax on Each Animal Slaughtered—Further Report to Be Made—What Commissioners Have Discovered.

Washington, June 4.—President Roosevelt to-day submitted to congress a message transmitting the report of the special committee appointed to investigate into the conditions in the stock yards of Chicago.

"This report," says the president, "is of a preliminary nature. I submit it to you because it shows the urgent need of immediate action by congress in the direction of providing a drastic and thorough inspection by the federal government of all stock yards and packing houses, and of their products, so far as the latter enter interstate or foreign commerce. The conditions shown by even this short inspection to exist in the Chicago stock yards are revolting. It is imperatively necessary in the interest of health and of decency that they should be radically changed. Under the existing law it is wholly impossible to secure satisfactory results."

"When my attention was first directed to this matter an investigation was made under the bureau of animal industry of the department of agriculture. When the preliminary statements of this investigation were brought to my attention they showed such defects in the law, and such wholly unexpected conditions that I deemed it best to have a further immediate investigation by men not connected with the bureau, and accordingly appointed Messrs. Reynolds and Neill. It was impossible under the existing law that satisfactory work should be done by the bureau of animal industry. I am now, however, examining the way in which the work actually was done."

"Before I had received the report of Messrs. Reynolds and Neill, I had directed that labels placed upon each package of meat food products should state only that the carcass of the animal from which the meat was taken had been inspected at the time of slaughter. If inspection of meat food products at all stages of preparation is not secured by the passage of the legislation recommended I shall be compelled to order that inspection labels and certificates on canned products shall not be used hereafter."

Dangerous to Health.

"The report shows that the stock yards and packing houses are not reasonably clean, and that the method of handling and preparing food products is unclean and dangerous to health. Under existing law the national government has no power to enforce inspection of the many forms of prepared meat food products that are daily going from the packing houses into interstate commerce. Owing to an inadequate appropriation the department of agriculture is not even able to place inspectors in all establishments desiring them."

Odessa, June 4.—A thunderstorm of extraordinary violence, accompanied by a deluge of rain, swept this city and district to-day.

Seven persons were drowned and four were killed by lightning, which set fire to a number of buildings.

CHINESE INTERPRETER HAS LIFE THREATENED

Court Official in Montreal Has Incurred Enmity of His Brother Celestials.

Montreal, June 4.—(Special.)—Mr. King Tung Sung, the official Chinese court interpreter, received a letter from some one in Vancouver to-day, advising him of threats against his life.

Mr. King states that the letter tells him that a certain portion of the Chinese colony in Montreal are against him, and that they are preparing a subscription fund of \$50,000 to present to the man who will end the interpreter's life. Mr. King has advised Chief Carpenter, and an investigation will be made.

The supposed reason for this attack upon the life of Mr. King is that he has been acting too honestly with the Chinese in this city. Since his appointment to official court interpreter, he has been considered unfriendly to some of the celestials of the city, because they think that he does not take their part in court enough, and he tells too much truth when he is translating from Chinese to English.

King is a Christian and has a wife and a little child living in the city.

Edwards has just been delivered at the penitentiary to begin a life sentence.

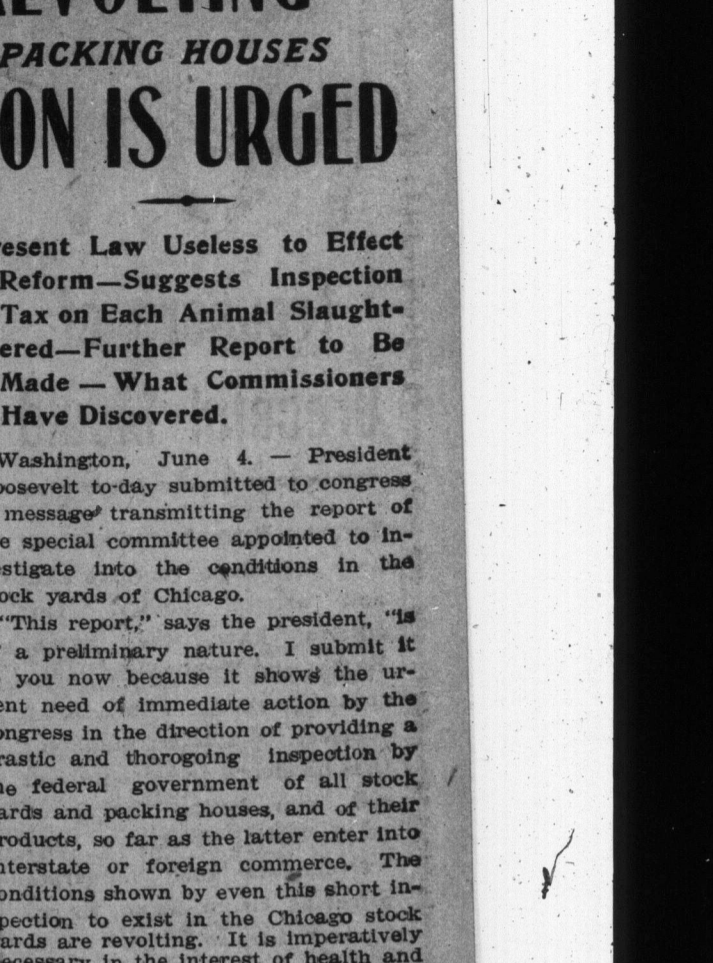

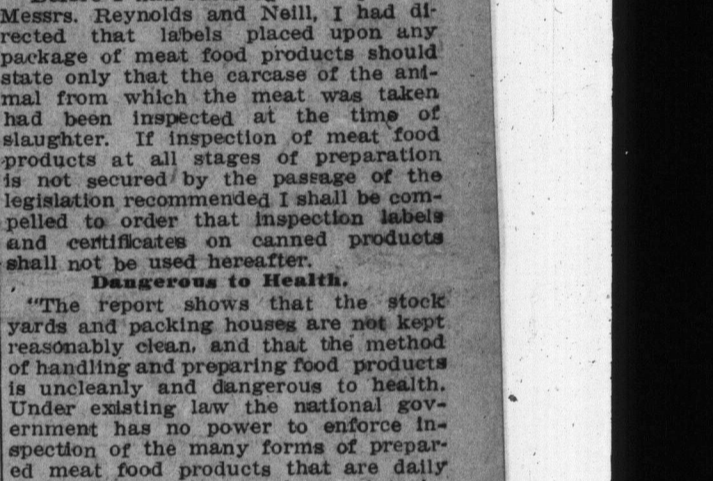

AUSTRALIA HOPES TO PROFIT THROUGH BUILDING OF RAILWAYS

Can Thus Give Immigrants Special Rates to Offset Other Canadian Advantages.

(Canadian Associated Press Cable.) London, June 4.—Postmaster-General Smith of the Commonwealth says: "The Canadian emigration policy has been one of the needs of doing something to push Australia. Australia can offer as satisfactory prospects to the emigrant from Great Britain as Canada. Canada is nearer, but it must be remembered the railways of Canada are in private hands, while the railways of Australia are in the hands of the state. The result of this is that when the emigrant arrives in Canada the cost of transit to destination in the interior to the individual or country is greater than it had gone to Australia, where the facilities afforded immigrants on railways. These things ought to be known, and preparations are being made with a view to placing the facts before intending emigrants."
