How They Eat in Japan

IF YOU could see the things that the people in some countries have for dinner and the way they eat them, you would laugh, indeed, and then if you should visit those countries and do as the other boys and girls do, you would laugh still more.

I believe you would like Japan best. True, you would not have any chair to sit on, nor any knife, fork or spoon, but then you would have two dainty little sticks, which the Japanese children call "chop-sticks," and which they use very cleverly. Then, besides, there is always such a lot of candies and other sweets, and what you could not eat you would be not only allowed, but expected to take home with you. Think of that!

Often, at great feasts, the guests bring their servants, who carry baskets and whatever is left from dinner is packed in these baskets and taken home.

In China you would have the same "chop-sticks," but very different dishes. One especially, I believe, you would like to eat. It is called "live crabs, and very nice ones, too.

Just as dinner is ready, the crabs are put in a dish of vinegar. This makes them quite lively. Next they are served to the guests, and placed upon the table. Then, when every one is ready, the cover is taken off. Those crabs don't hesitate a second, but scramble out and run for their lives.

But the guests are in a big hurry, too. They seize them with both hands, and fling their mouths as full as they can, they swallow the wriggling morsels as though they were the daintiest bits imaginable. I do not know whether they are better or worse than roasted spiders. These you would see in New Caledonia—and some people who have eaten them say they taste like nuts and are very nice.

In India they would serve you roasted worms instead of fruit and nuts, and the Burmah locusts stuffed and fried. In Siam you would be treated to ants' eggs, and some of our own Indians think they can offer a guest no greater delicacy than roasted grasshoppers. So you see there are many kinds of tastes.

In Turkey you must sit cross-legged on a cushion and eat with your fingers from the same dish that every one else uses.

THE RAILWAYS AND THE BOARD OF RAILWAY COMMISSIONERS FOR CANADA.

The railways are not responsible for the car shortage—the people of Canada are themselves to blame for the inability of the carrying companies to furnish the equipment necessary for the carriage of the traffic of the country.

Such was the statement made to the board of railway commissioners by J. W. Leonard for the Canadian Pacific Railway, and E. G. Brownlee for the Grand Trunk Railway. It is false, and no one knows that better than the officials in question.

Not very long ago, during a time when traffic conditions were normal, a Toronto firm was compelled to write Charles M. Hays and call his attention to the fact that it was impossible to get traffic handled promptly in Toronto yard, and yet the official charge of this division has the temerity to go before the board of railway commissioners and assert that the people are to blame for the car shortage.

The statement presented by Messrs. Leonard and Brownlee is the strongest argument we have yet seen, from a railway standpoint, for the enforcement of a reciprocal demurrage arrangement. According to traffic conditions, the railways are not responsible for delays to their own shippers, a reciprocal demurrage law would not affect them to any extent.

CITY MAKES A BARGAIN FOR DON VALLEY LANDS

Special Meeting of Council to Ratify Agreement With C.N.R.—The New Car Line.

A special meeting of the city council will probably be held on Wednesday next to ratify an agreement between the board of control and the Canadian Northern Ontario Railway, whereby the latter seeks to acquire 16 acres of street bridge to the city limits on the east side of the Don, to be used as a freight yard. Under the terms of the agreement considered at yesterday's meeting, the board, the railway is to obtain and convey to the city a roadway 80 feet wide, in return for a strip of land from Rosedale Valley road to North Ravine road, between the old belt line and the C.P.R. tracks, an acreage of about 16 acres of open land and 6 acres of water-covered land. The area of the 80 foot road is about 6 acres, and the difference is to be paid either by payment of \$1000 an acre for land and \$600 for land covered by water, or by conveying to the city other lands east of the proposed road and west of the belt line.

Commissioner of Industries Thompson was well pleased with the progress yesterday afternoon of the negotiations between the board of control and the King Radiator Company of Montreal, who desire to establish a large industry, covering 16 acres, on the filled in lands at the foot of Cherry-street. The terms as informally agreed upon, provide for a 21 years' renewable lease of the land extending southeast from the bridge over the Don below the foot of Cherry-street to Keating's Channel, excepting a roadway 100 feet wide, along the channel, the land, which has a frontage of 500 feet on Cherry-street, extends west 1400 feet to a point opposite Parliament-street and 600 feet to the foot of Bay-street. The company must pay a yearly rental of \$100 per acre for filled in land and \$25 per acre for land covered with water. They promise to erect buildings worth \$125,000, and to employ a minimum of thirty-two hands to the acre for at least ten months in each year. They also promise to pay for the piling and cribbing on the west side, and to carry out the work within the time specified. The board was not unanimous. Commissioners Ward and Hubbard declaring against the plan, while the continuation of the route to the foot of Cherry-street was supported by Mr. Rust, while Mr. Rust withdrew it, and suggested as an alternative car line on Elizabeth-street, from College-street to Grenville-street, along Grenville-street and Surrey, place to St. Alban's-street, and thence to Queen's Park, extending north along the west side of the east crescent of the park, and including a strip about 14 feet wide, the grass plot.

Mr. Rust bespoken particular support for his plan for a car line up Bay and Grenville-street, while outside of certain sentimental objections to the invasion of Queen's Park, he considered the remainder of the project entirely feasible. Controller Harrison wanted to take a route from College-street to Spadina-avenue, and by Harbord and Clinton-streets to Dupont-street, and the mayor asserted that the city should have both lines. The wisdom of appointing Mr. Gibson as an expert architect to make a valuation of the buildings in the line of the proposed car line, and the fact that the city should have both lines, was also discussed. In obedience to the will of the council, the board agreed to include in the 1907 estimates \$44,000 for establishing a "helicopter" signal, service, an alarm police station, and a stable for Agnes-street police station.

As the city architect cannot carry out the steel structural work on the new central fire station by day labor, Controller Ward, while in Ottawa, obtained a prolongation till Feb. 19 of the time for receiving petitions from the city, which will allow the city's new application re Yonge-street bridge to be presented.

The mayor is afraid that the value of city land would suffer thru the annexation of the 1600 acres intervening between the city and East Toronto. The Union of Canadian Municipalities has now a Union of Provincial Municipalities formed, and active in every province of the Dominion. It is therefore being proposed to alter the method of representation of membership in the union by constituting it into a federation of provincial unions, with a few of the larger cities and towns as direct members.

DISCUSS LICENSE REDUCTION BUT WON'T ATTEMPT IT

The Council Might Be Favorable, Effort Might Be Misconstrued.

There was an earnest two hours' discussion in room No. 404 in the Temple Building between the hours of 4 and 6 Friday afternoon.

Summoned by W. J. Armstrong, grand councillor of the Royal Templars of Temperance, the gathering discussed the advisability or otherwise of submitting to vote at the city council the question of a still further reduction of the city's licenses. A. M. Featherston, Controller, presided, and those present were Ald. James Hales, Ald. J. J. Graham, Ald. Foster, Ald. Adams, Controller Hockley, C. P. Marter, Dr. Mackenzie, G. F. Scott, Rev. Mr. MacGillivray, Rev. John Neil, Dr. Bryans and others. The chairman explained that the meeting was wholly informal, and was designed to get an expression of opinion on submitting the question to a vote of the council. The belief was expressed that the city council is favorably disposed toward a substantial reduction in the number of liquor licenses. It was pointed out, however, that at the last municipal election the issue was not a live one, but attention was called upon to declare themselves on the matter, and in view of this fact it was decided to waive the question for another year. "We want to be perfectly fair in this matter," said the chairman, "and while a reduction of, say twenty-five licenses, would undoubtedly carry in the council, it might be regarded as a smart move and we cannot afford that. Wait until next year." An organization was effected, and an adjournment was made to meet at the call of the president.

Scott, of Walkerton, will receive applications at a meeting of the executive to be held next Wednesday, at 8 o'clock, at the residence of Guelph, Chatham, Woodstock, Stratford, St. Thomas, Brantford, Alton, and other districts. Central districts are Elgin, Grey, Hamilton, Kent, Lincoln, Monck, Nipissing, Norfolk, Oxford, Ontario, Rainy, River, Welland, Wellington, Waterloo, Eastern, North York and Wentworth will be specially visited.

SHORT HOURS, HARD WORK PRINCIPLE OF MANAGEMENT

Why Relief Was Not Forthcoming to the Telephone Girls.

Large crowds continue to throng the court room where the telephone commission is prosecuting its enquiry into the operators' strike.

The salient features of yesterday's proceedings were brought out in Inspector Maw's evidence. He apparently wished to convey the impression that the "listeners" only recorded conversations when requested to by the subscribers, and that these records were always guarded by the company as strictly private. Mr. Curry asked if it really made any difference to the witness, who said that he usually gave instructions as to when the listener should button, what the conversation was about, for instance, or a private business discourse was going on between Toronto and Buffalo. Mr. Maw said such a case would by no means be tampered with unless the company had been previously requested to record it, and then it would certainly be treated as strictly private.

Counsel wanted to know why one Miss Leslie, a listener, had been dismissed by himself. "Because she was observing a wire and had no instructions to watch. Fairly also because she was found to be talking to a subscriber." Mr. Maw advised that the company had been drawing 60 hours every day overtime from the girls, for which nothing was paid. In the three weeks changes 32 girls were found to be on an extra hour and a half or two hours after doing the 5-hour shift, for nothing. Another witness, who said that the employees are required to report for duty fifteen minutes before their time expires, if they fail to do this they have to make up 15 minutes before they leave.

Miss L. Robert, a witness, gave a straight-forward line of evidence, touching upon the events leading up to the strike. She had told the girls that they were to be on duty every day, and that the girl who was to be called had called her "a Montreal scab."

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Margaret Irwin, chief operator in the South Exchange, had not told any operator that the long hours would be lightened, other than hinting that the new College branch was opened, their work would be naturally lighter.

A Letter in Evidence.

Manager Dunstan's letter to the head office, which had brought about the change of hours and salaries, was read. It called attention to the fact that an \$18 a month salary was not sufficient to attract a desirable class of applicants, and he recommended increasing the hours and wages and lessening the load. He recommended "To Mr. Curry, Mr. Dunstan stated he had found it possible to lessen the load to a considerable extent by rearranging the hours, and there was not much to be done."

"Why was no effort made to relieve the pressure before the long hours came in?"

"Because we acted on the principle that operators should work harder in short hours than long."

Witness said he could give no idea

to what extent the load could be lightened per operator. Mr. Curry interjected that it was no wonder they had quit, for if the management didn't stand for what they knew, there would be no modification of strain, and the hours were to be increased.

"Was it ever agreed upon that a 20-minute intermission would be given in the middle of the morning and afternoon shifts, under the eight-hour schedule?"

Mr. Dunstan said it had been agreed in all discussions, and the superintendent and inspector had been instructed to carry out that plan. They hadn't followed it up.

"No, and possibly gave it no further thought," said Mr. Curry.

Mr. Clark, local inspector, stated there had been no discussion pertaining to "unloading" as a relief to operators, prior to the trouble; nor was it discussed until Monday, Jan. 28. Even the manager, Mr. Maw and himself had taken up the matter of crossing wires on switchboards, and filling in vacant positions.

Mr. Maw said the only way of relieving the load was by putting on more girls and filling in the relief. No mention had been made of this till Jan. 28, and then the trouble was on.

The enquiry continues to-day.

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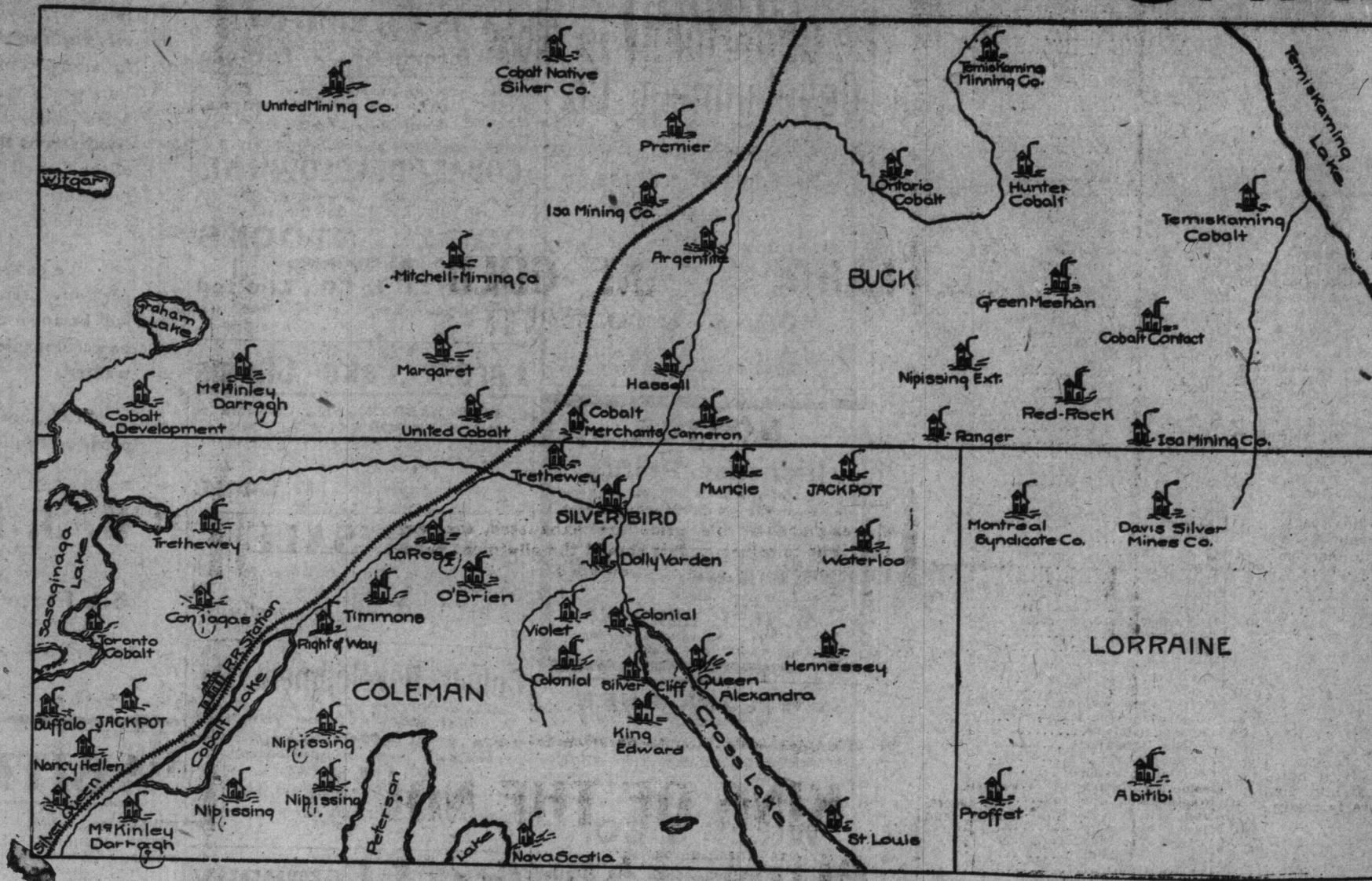

It is surrounded on all sides by mines of shipping prominence, and much interest has been centered in the property and many enquiries have been made as to the number and quality of the discoveries. There are three shafts on the property, two of which are being equipped with machinery. It is said that cross-cutting in these three shafts has disclosed to date 24 veins of ore similar to that of the adjoining mines, some of which run high in value in argenteite.

A week ago to-day vein No. 25 was broken into in cross-cutting from shaft No. 1 and was found to consist of 8 inches of solid metal, a wall of rock of 30 inches and then another with 8 inches of solid metal ore. The vein runs in the neighborhood of 1800 ounces of silver to the ton, and the wall rock carries good silver values.

Installing Machinery.

The work of installing the machinery is progressing rapidly. A 100 horse-power boiler, a large steam compressor, hoist and drills are being put in, and good and commodious camp buildings. A large boarding house sufficient to accommodate 100 men, together with cloak room, office, assay plant, etc., are practically completed. Supt. Simard is a man well thought of in camp and has about 80 men at work.

It will be remembered that this was

the first property listed on any stock exchange. Early in 1906 before the period of great Cobalt activity the proposition was taken over by a London banking house, and its shares are practically all held across the water, and it looks as if they got a good thing.

In Casey Township.

For the past year, more or less interest has been centered in the discoveries made in the Township of Casey, on account of their proving the silver-bearing area to a much greater extent than had been expected, by even the most sanguine supporters of the camp extensions, Casey Mountain, as it is called in the Township of Casey, is about 15 miles from Cobalt and about 7 miles from New Liskeard.

The district has been examined by several engineers, and the recent discoveries there of the rich values in silver have proven quite conclusively that the prospect there is as good as anywhere in the entire Cobalt camp. The formation is of a slate conglomerate and that part of it which is owned by the Casey-Cobalt Silver Mining Company consists of a very sharp upheaval of rock. Other parts of the mountain have various depths and earth over it, much the same as is elsewhere found in Cobalt. The Casey-Cobalt Mining Company is the first company to do any extensive work in this field. This was the property that was discovered by John Bucknell and is generally called the Bucknell mine. There are, however, four other companies carrying on active operations in this section, "The Abitibi," "The Sutton Bay," "The Cleopatra," and the "Crested." **Bucknell Shows Thore Work.**

While considerable development work has been done on all the properties mentioned it is at the "Bucknell" or Casey that the most thorough work has been done, and where preparation has been made for the immediate installation of machinery. A good vein has been located on the Abitibi, which is believed to be an extension of the Bucknell vein, but it has not been traced as yet far enough to disclose whether this is so or not. A shaft is being sunk on this property and a good attempt being made to genuinely develop.

Supt. Bailey is in charge at the mine, and Doc Deadman of the Soo, who has a host of friends in Cobalt, is the engineer in charge. At present this is the Abitibi and Cobalt property that is most thought of in the camp. On the Bucknell three shafts are being sunk, and in shaft No. 1 over 60 feet of drifting has been done on a vein of cobalt and niccolite. Over half a car of this ore is stacked and in the ore house and as much more is ready to be brought up the shaft.

Ready to Ship.

In an interview to-day President Mitchell stated that the mine would be ready to ship its first carload at any time, but the first would not be

made until the mine was equipped and ready to follow it up with regular shipments. Shaft house, boiler house and camp buildings are constructed. Two 40 horse-power boilers are on the way now to the mine—a 12 by 18 inch air compressor, Atlas-Chalmers-Bullock type, 4 air drills and complete plant also ordered.

The proving up and development of this camp extension are practically due to the efforts of Mr. Mitchell and his associates, and mean more to the camp than any yet recorded.

SLAB OF NATIVE SILVER

Found in the Main Shaft of the Red Rock Mine.

Cobalt, Feb. 8.—(Special).—The greatest excitement in the camp since the strike on the main shaft of the Red Rock. The day's news that a large slab of native silver had been found during development on the main shaft of the Red Rock. The vein, which is being worked on this property, is similar to that on the Green-Isle, Red, and the news of this strike has confirmed the already favorable opinion of the Red Rock property. Specimens of the new find are on exhibit here.

DIRECT WIRE TO CAMP

Is Being Installed by Toronto Brokerage Firm.

A direct wire into Cobalt camp is expected to be in full operation by Monday next. The wire is being installed by a leading Toronto brokerage house and shows considerable business prospect. The demand for Cobalt stocks of a good kind is keener in Cobalt than at any other point, and this wire will enter to this demand by putting the dealers in direct touch with the Toronto market.

BUCKE PROPERTIES BOUGHT.

To Be Merged and Put on Montreal Market.

Cobalt, Feb. 8.—(Special).—The Groux and Farr claims, Lot 2, Con. 3, of the Township of Bucke, have been purchased by Montreal capitalists for \$50,000. Negotiations for these two properties have been going on for several weeks, but the final transaction was only completed today. It is understood that the properties will be merged and the notation put on the Montreal market.

Grant for Mining Institute.

H. Mortimer Lamb of Montreal, secretary, Col. Hay George Campbell and Eugene C. Gault, on behalf of the Canadian Mining Institute, saw Hon. Frank Cochrane and asked for a grant to assist in entertaining the delegates to a convention to be held in Toronto on March 6, 7 and 8.

LAW REQUIRES PUBLICITY.

Nevada Mining Companies Must Publish Business Statements.

There is a law in force in Nevada relative to foreign mining corporations of which a great many interested in Nevada camps know very little.

In order that the laws of the state may be properly complied with, it is necessary to publish in a daily paper for the period of one year a statement of the business done by the various mining companies during the year 1906. The statute is as follows:

Section 1—All foreign corporations doing business in the State of Nevada shall, during the month of May of this year, and in each succeeding year, in the month of January, publish a statement of their last year's business in some daily newspaper in the State of Nevada, for a period of one week.

Section 2—The secretary of the company publishing the statement shall file a copy with the several assessors of the State of Nevada.

Section 3—Any corporation coming within the provisions for this act which shall neglect or refuse to file a statement as required by Section 1 of this act, shall be liable to a penalty of \$100 for each month that the published statement remains unfiled with the several assessors of the state.

Section 4—Any district attorney in the state is competent to sue to recover the penalty, or the attorney-general. The first county suing thru its attorney shall secure the penalty, and, if no suit is brought for the penalty by any district attorney, the state shall have the right to recover thru its attorney-general.

Section 5—All acts and parts of acts in conflict with this act are hereby repealed.

YORK COUNTY AND SUBURBS

EAST TORONTO IS SPLIT ON THE RAILWAY QUESTION

Northern Wards Will Support the Beaches Route—Afraid of Losing the Traffic.

East Toronto, Feb. 8.—(Special.)—A new and startling phase of the railway entrance situation has developed as the result of the action of the eastern municipalities in resolving to petition the Dominion government to allow the railways to enter by the Beaches route. Steps were taken here today to send a strong deputation to Ottawa, asking the government to allow of the Beaches route. Ward three, which is the most vitally interested, is the most active in the matter, but it is expected that ward two will join hands in seeking to permit the passage of the several lines thru the town if necessary.

"Better to have a few residences in the residential section moved than have the G.T.R. give the town the go-by," is the way in which the residents of the north end of the town are looking at it.

"It," said a property-owner, "the railways prevented from running along the Beaches, and take the route suggested, a mile or two to the north of Little York, the workshops will follow as a matter of course, and East Toronto will be the loser."

"We never received any consideration from the citizens along the beach," said another, "either in our fight for better car service or anything else, and now we are going to look out for ourselves."

Down along the front there is consternation at the turn of affairs, and the opinion is freely expressed that the work of the citizens anxious to keep out the railways will be greatly increased by the action of the north end. The fine farm of Andrew Heron, a short distance to the north of the town, has been purchased by the House of Providence, and will be used for the same purposes as that recently sold to the Amusement Company on Leuty-avenue. The farm contains 150 acres, and the property will be turned over to the House of Providence within the next two months.

Mrs. William Bell, Mrs. Andrew Bell, Mrs. John Downs and Mrs. Wm. Snider are daughters. The funeral will take place at St. John's Cemetery, Norway, on Monday at 2.30 p.m.

King, at the residence of her son-in-law, W. S. Smyth, 32 Albany-road. The deceased was 70 years of age, and had been ailing for some time. She was a widow of the late John W. King of St. Catharines. The funeral will take place on Monday morning at 7.30 o'clock at the Union Station, thence to St. Catharines.

Hall, school trustee for ward five, writes The World as follows: "In the last issue of The Leader and Recorder a letter appeared, signed by Councillor Chapman, charging a majority of the public school board of this city with the existing public money on the installation of a heating and ventilating system in two of the public school buildings, and as Mr. Chapman's letter might impress some of the members were in a measure correct, there by doing six, at least, of the members a serious injustice, and you permit me space to state a few facts regarding the systems employed? Mr. Chapman's home is in such close proximity to the Carlton school one would expect him to visit the school and ascertain the facts before making the assertions contained in his recent letter. After considering carefully the most approved and up-to-date methods of heating and ventilating, a decision was made in favor of the low pressure steam heat and gravity system of ventilation as the most economical and best adapted to our schools. The board's architect prepared specifications and tenders were called for in the regular way. The tenders mentioned by Mr. Chapman in his letter were not for the system approved by the board, and, consequently, were not considered. Mr. Paterson's tender was for a cast-iron boiler; the architect specified a steel boiler, and Mr. Paterson withdrew his tender. That of Ryderson & Co. was accepted. After the installation of the plants it was found necessary in some more exposed rooms to increase the radiation, which has been done, and the schools are heated in a most satisfactory manner, as the thermometer readings will show. It is not necessary, as stated, to close any hall radiation to heat the rooms, and the classrooms are heated to the same temperature as the classrooms, and the fuel consumed is less than one-half the amount required by the warm air system. Last year Annette-street School used 140 tons of coal; the estimate for this year is 60 tons, and as the winter advances it is apparent it will not exceed that amount. The board have not taken over the plants, they have paid any money on them. Fifty per cent. of the purchase money only is to be paid for the final tests are made, and the balance in one year, when they will have passed thru another winter. Surely Mr. Chapman will admit that the council even do not safeguard the public funds more than this. The schools are open, and the systems in operation.
