

THE SITUATION IN EUROPE

ITALY'S BAD DEFEAT MAY BRING ABOUT A CHANGE

It may restore the Entente between Great Britain and Germany—Italy is in need of aid—King Humbert's Position—More Mob Violence—Proposed Franco-Spanish Alliance.

London, March 7.—It is held in certain diplomatic circles that Italy's disaster in Abyssinia will restore the entente between Great Britain and Germany. They Give Aid to Italy? The French newspapers are of the opinion that Great Britain and Germany must aid Italy in some practical way. There are very few exceptions, the London newspapers express strong sympathy with Italy.

The Morning Post, of all the papers, suggests that financial assistance should be extended to Italy. This is just the assistance that Lord Salisbury dare not attempt to give. He might agree to the occupation of Kassala by British troops, and give his assistance to the Italians, using Sciamaglia as a route for a new attack on the Abyssinian province of Gaba, but to deal with the rotten Italian finances would be fatal to the Cabinet.

Signor Crispien's last appeal to European financiers, however, was futile, but the negotiations ended in secret help being given to Italy through a German syndicate which guarantees the repayment of the money advanced.

What an Extended Fight Means. The Statist says that if Italy confesses that she has been beaten by Abyssinians and withdraws her troops from Abyssinia, her finances, though they will not be in a hopeless condition, will be decided to restore her prestige. It will involve the expenditure of £1,000,000, and the nation will ultimately sink beneath the overwhelming burden. Until the Italian Cabinet shall be reformed, diplomacy will be ineffectual. If the current opinion in the official circles here is right, Lord Salisbury will advise the Emperor to position and make peace with King Menelik.

May Change the Situation. New York, March 7.—A London special says: Italy's defeat in the battle of Adua is regarded as the turning point in Europe as an event of the first magnitude. It is believed that its effect upon the political situation of Europe will be of far reaching consequence. Already the dissolution of the Triple Alliance is discussed in the principal capitals as if accomplished. Some say the old league of the three empires—Germany, Russia, and Austria—will be replaced by a new one. Italy and France will become friends again. Still others affirm that if England fails to give the assistance King Humbert in this emergency, British isolation soon will become more unaccountable than it has been.

It is persistently asserted in Berlin, Vienna, and London that Germany and Austria have given Italy peremptory advice to abandon Abyssinia, and that King Humbert has replied that he would abdicate his throne rather than comply. There is good authority for saying that Italy will within a few days, test Great Britain's friendship by endeavoring to float a large loan with English assistance. The indications multiply hourly that the regrouping of powers which has been foreshadowed for several years is at length at hand. French sympathy with Italy in her great misfortune is remarkable. It is held that the result of the downfall of Crispien and by the fact that the impression prevails in France that the assistance of Austria are declined to throw overboard their unfortunate ally, Russia. In this, as in all other complications of the last few months, it is the power that regards the situation with equanimity. It is scarcely worth while to speculate in regard to the result of the great secret war which will be fought all Europe is again getting on better books.

More Mob Violence Reported. The domestic condition of Italy is extremely serious. The mob violence does not justify the fears expressed in some quarters, that King Humbert's throne is in danger. To Keep Their Sons Out of It. Milan, March 7.—The Woman's Moral and Intellectual Society of the city has issued a manifesto calling on Italian mothers throughout the country to prevent their children from going to Abyssinia. Similar appeals have been issued in Pavia and Turin.

Business Resumes Service. Paris, March 7.—A large number of Italians are reported to have crossed the frontier from Italy into France, with the object of escaping service. A Franco-Spanish Alliance. Canon DuMoulin Reports His Advice to Women—Dr. Henderson's Sermon on the Neglect of the Church—The Female Evangelists Attract Crowds to New Richmond Methodist Church.

Canon DuMoulin gave a very outspoken sermon in St. James' Cathedral yesterday morning on the Lord's Day and neglect of public worship. He called it a message to non-church-goers and irregular attendants.

First, he showed that the day of God and the worship of God are matters of divine ordination, not of ecclesiastical establishment. The preacher pointed out the difference between the old Jewish Sabbath and the Lord's Day, and showed the continuity of the observance of the latter from the Apostles to the present time.

There are 38 Anglican churches in this city, and at least 200 other places of worship open every Lord's Day. How do we avail ourselves of them? Some have replied: "I wish, but I have no time." "I wish, but I have no money." "I wish, but I have no inclination."

Irregular and spasmodic church-goers were next dealt with. For these in the great majority of instances there was no solid ground. They were found to be "staying in church" because they were afraid to go to church, or because they were too busy to go to church, or because they were too lazy to go to church.

The great plea for absence from God's house is the need of fresh air, exercise and recreation. This plea is the greatest difficulty with which ministers of religion will have to deal in the next ten years. There are many who would go to church, but they are too busy to do so.
