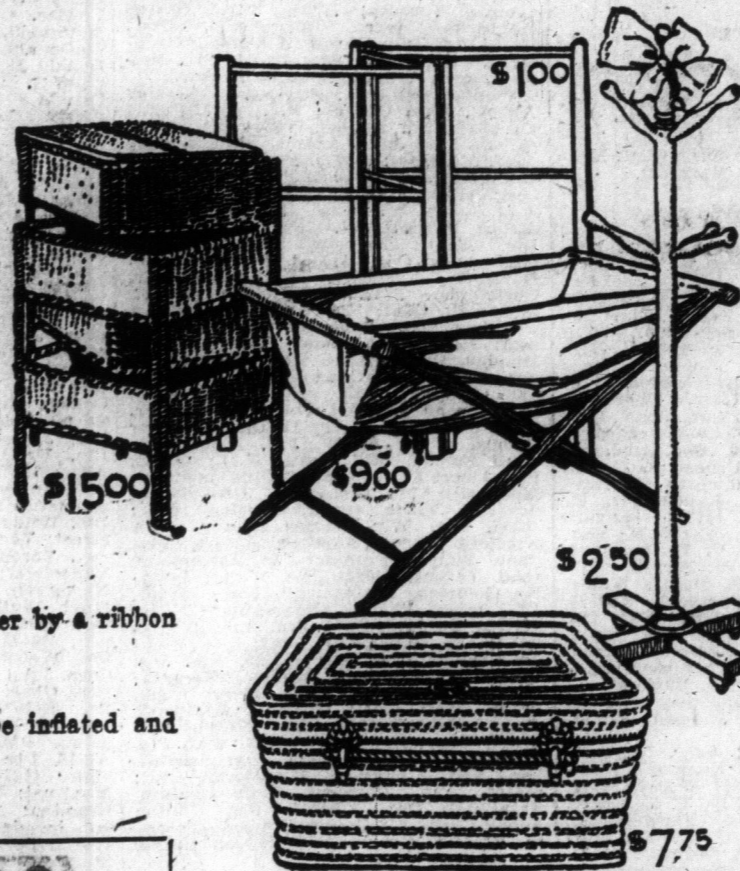

the program, the magnetism of the leader and the enthusiasm of the band.

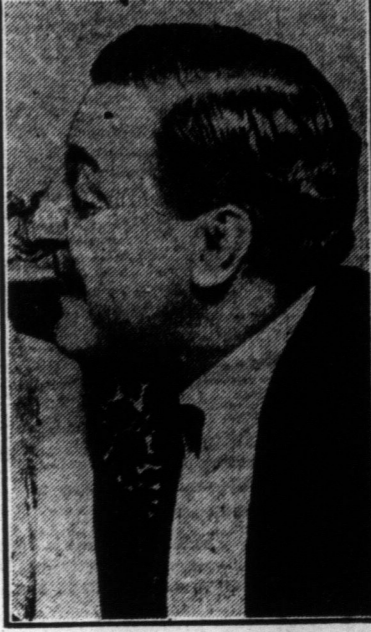
### CLOSING EXERCISES OF BETHUNE COLLEGE

### GOVERNMENT FURTHERING AGRICULTURAL EDUCATION

The Policy of the Federal Authorities is Bearing Good Fruit.

That the policy of the federal government in providing a subsidy of ten million dollars, spread over a period of ten years, toward furthering agricultural education in the different provinces, is bearing good fruit is abundantly proven by the second annual report of the commissioner of agriculture. It shows that while much remains to be done before a great deal has been achieved. Teachers have had to be trained and for this purpose, and short courses have been held in connection with all the agricultural colleges. Funds for this purpose came out of grants made by the Dominion under the act. New buildings have been erected, old buildings enlarged, schools better equipped, higher salaries and more experienced instructors engaged, teachers specially trained, college extension work greatly extended, boys and girls' competitions encouraged, the district representative system widened and developed, demonstration methods increased in number and improved in scope and character, and women's work at home and abroad aided institutionally and otherwise.

MANY SINN FEINERS INTERNED IN ENGLAND

More Than Sixteen Hundred Held. Tho Many Others Were Freed. DUBLIN, June 25, 9:55 p.m.—An official statement has been issued by the military government regarding the prisoners taken in connection with the recent rebellion in Ireland. The number at present interned in England is 1,614 and 52 women convicted under the Defence of the Realm Act, 160 men, 1 woman; released from the Richmond barracks, Dublin and England, 1100 men, 71 women.

FRANCE WILL COMBAT CAMPAIGN OF CALUMNY

PARIS, June 25.—The chamber of deputies last night appropriated 25,000 francs (about \$5,000,000), as a secret fund for the ministry of foreign affairs to be expended by Alexandre Ribot, minister of finance, in this amount was necessary to defend France abroad against a campaign of calumny.

GREECE GIVES FORMAL NOTICE OF ACCEPTANCE

Premier Zaimis Delivers Note to Representatives of Entente Powers. PARIS, June 24, 3:30 p.m.—The entente powers have been formally notified by Greece of their acceptance of the terms of the military armistice with their demands. Premier Zaimis, says a Havas despatch from Athens today, has delivered a note to representatives of the entente reciting the terms of the armistice and concluding: "The Greek Government, taking account of their final declaration, hereby agrees to execute integrally the foregoing demands."

MEAGRE ALLOWANCE OF MEAT IN BERLIN

Eight and Three-Quarter Ounces Per Head Weekly Prescribed. AMSTERDAM, via London, June 26, 12:49 a.m.—A despatch from Berlin says that the new meat tickets will be in force in Berlin from today (Sunday). Two hundred and fifty grammes (about eight and three-quarter ounces) of meat will be allowed per head weekly.

FIFTEEN THOUSAND MEN LEAVE FOR FRONT TODAY

New England States Supply National Guardsmen for Prompt Service. NEW YORK, June 25.—Fifteen thousand national guardsmen from the States of New York, Massachusetts, Connecticut and New Jersey will start for the Mexican border tomorrow, Major-General Leonard Wood announced late tonight.

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OSHAWA CARRIES TAXATION BYLAW

Assessment on McLaughlin Plant is Fixed by Big Majority.

OSHAWA, June 24.—The bylaw to fix the assessment of the McLaughlin plant, on which the vote of the property holders was taken today, received practically the unanimous approval of those who attended the polls, the vote being 780 for the bylaw and 29 against. The interest of the citizens in the bylaw and their anxiety for the welfare of the town is evidenced by the large vote polled, considering the unfavorable weather, over two-thirds of the possible voters being recorded and by the unanimity of the verdict. Supported by every vote, the bylaw is now a fact. It is expected that a large addition to the plant of the Chevrolet Company will be commenced immediately, which will be constructed to take care of the domestic trade and also with a view to future export business. It is anticipated that the firm will undertake much more extensive additions with a view to export trade in McLaughlin and Chevrolet cars, which may be possible as a result of trade relationships resulting from the war. Oshawa has shown in the past that it invites and encourages new industry. It is expected that the bylaw will constitute some of the most important in Canada.

EARL OF SELBORNE HAS LEFT CABINET

President of Board of Agriculture Opposed to Irish Policy. SEVERAL UNIONIST MEMBERS ARE EXPECTED TO GIVE UP OFFICES. LONDON, June 25, 11:15 p.m.—The Earl of Selborne has resigned the Presidency of the board of agriculture, according to an official announcement tonight. He will make a statement in the house of lords on Tuesday. The general belief is that Lord Selborne resigned on account of the government's Irish policy. He has been a strong opponent of the home rule policy. Other Conservative resignations from the cabinet are rumored.

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Assessment on McLaughlin Plant is Fixed by Big Majority.

OSHAWA, June 24.—The bylaw to fix the assessment of the McLaughlin plant, on which the vote of the property holders was taken today, received practically the unanimous approval of those who attended the polls, the vote being 780 for the bylaw and 29 against. The interest of the citizens in the bylaw and their anxiety for the welfare of the town is evidenced by the large vote polled, considering the unfavorable weather, over two-thirds of the possible voters being recorded and by the unanimity of the verdict. Supported by every vote, the bylaw is now a fact. It is expected that a large addition to the plant of the Chevrolet Company will be commenced immediately, which will be constructed to take care of the domestic trade and also with a view to future export business. It is anticipated that the firm will undertake much more extensive additions with a view to export trade in McLaughlin and Chevrolet cars, which may be possible as a result of trade relationships resulting from the war. Oshawa has shown in the past that it invites and encourages new industry. It is expected that the bylaw will constitute some of the most important in Canada.
