Both Sides in Legislature Agreed As To Closing

RESUME TUESDAY

Bills Incorporating Grand Falls Power Co. and Paper Company Slated

FREDERICTON, April 24.—The Provincial Legislature will resume again on Tuesday for the last lap of the session.

Starting the week will be the meeting of the Corporations Committee on Tuesday morning to complete consideration of the bill incorporating the St. John's River Power Company, after which the bill incorporating the New Brunswick International Paper Company and that giving the Fraser Companies authority to build transmission lines from Grand Falls to Campbellton for their proposed paper mill there will be taken up.

LOGGING CONTINUES IN NORTH SECTION

Cutting and Hauling Crews to Be Utilized Also For Driving

FREDERICTON, April 24.—Although the month of May is but a few days off, and stream driving in ordinary springs is getting under way at this time, logging and hauling in the lumber woods is still going on in the extreme north of the province. A. T. Murchie, chief engineer, states that these large companies have crews cutting and hauling at the present time, the intention being to have these crews drive the logs as soon as conditions permit.

FORMULA AGREED ON FOR INDIAN PARLEY

Round Table Conference Will Attempt to Solve Problems of Country

Canadian Press Cable. CAPETOWN, S. A., April 24.—In the legislative assembly yesterday Hon. Dr. D. E. Malan, Minister of the Interior, announced that as a result of conversations between the South African cabinet and the Indian deputation which recently visited Capetown in the interests of the Indian residents of the South Africa, who would be affected by the passing of the Asiatic bill proposed by the Hertzog government, a formula had been agreed upon which would form the basis and determine the nature of the proposed round table conference. The round table conference, the minister said, would be a serious and honest attempt to arrive at an effective and amicable solution of the Indian problem in this country.

DR. H. V. PEARMAN DEAD

M., formerly of Halifax, where he was known as a prominent eye, ear and throat specialist. MANY KILLED IN GREEK ARMS BLAST Salonia Reports Estimate Dead up to 25; Eleven Are Injured

ATHENS, April 24—Reports from Salonia say that at least six persons have been killed and eleven injured in an explosion of war materials in a store near Harmateki. It was feared there might have been considerable further loss of life as a large number of workmen were employed in the store. LONDON, April 24—Reports received from Salonia variously estimate the dead in the explosion of war materials today up to 25. A despatch to the Westminster Gazette from Athens, says twenty persons were killed. SOUNDING OUT TRADES UNIONS FOR SUPPORT

Emergency Meeting of Executives Called For Wednesday GOV'T ALSO MOVES Premier and Leaders Devote Utmost Energies To Avert Strike

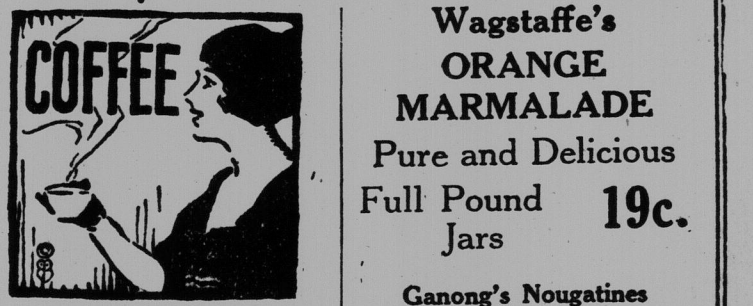
LONDON, April 24—The miners are fighting desperately to secure labor solidarity in support of their case. From one end of the country to the other representatives of the mining leaders are sounding out other trades unions to see what action, if any, they will take if the men decide to fight if no settlement is reached with the owners before the end of the present month. For this purpose an emergency meeting is being called of the miners' delegates in London for next Wednesday and a meeting of the executives of all unions affiliated with the trades union congress is being summoned for the day following. Everywhere today the swift dramatic movements of the last thirty-six hours are regarded with the gravest alarm and it is feared in some quarters that if Premier Baldwin fails to find a basis of settlement Britain will be hurled swiftly into the throes of a gigantic industrial upheaval that will startle the entire world.

POSSIBLE SOLUTION. It seems likely that a possible solution may be found through the gov-

ernment granting a loan to the industry providing that the entire industry is overhauled, unprofitable plus closed and interest on this loan paid in three equal shares by the government, the owners and the miners, the latter share being in the form of reduced wages. Whether or not the miners will accept such a settlement is not known. British Government leaders headed by Premier Stanley Baldwin, are also devoting their utmost energies against a nation-wide coal strike next Saturday.

BUSINESS FEELS DANGER. The stock exchange and business generally felt the danger of impending national catastrophe Friday as Premier Baldwin, A. J. Cook, Secretary of the Miners' Federation, and representatives of the miner owners conferred throughout the day. "You have tied yourselves in a knot," said Premier Baldwin in an address to a joint meeting of miner representatives and operators. "It is my job to untie the knot or cut it. We are working under a time limit which ends May first and time is valuable. Let us get down to business at once, for it will be easier to settle the impending trouble now than after the strike is called."

Dorothy Dix

Every Man is Part Little Boy That Likes to Be Mothered
—So There is No Surer Way for a Wife to Hold Her
Husband Than to Make More Fuss Over Her Big
Baby Than Her Little One.

A WOMAN said to me the other day: "I have two babies, and which is the greater baby I don't know. One of them is 30 years old, the other one is 3 months old, and when they make conflicting demands on my time or attention I don't know to which to give the preference."

"Give it to the big one," I replied "You can find plenty of women to whom you can trust your baby, but you can't find any women with whom it is safe to leave your husband. It is a lot more important to keep your big baby amused and pacified and eating out of your hand than it is your little baby, for an infant in the crib stays put, but a neglected husband is apt to roam."

"MANY women never perceive this. Their first baby looms so big on their horizon that they lose sight of their husbands, and never see them again except as the baby's father."

"And while motherhood can be a career that fills a woman's life, fatherhood is just an incident in a man's."

"HE may be ever so fond of his children, but he wants his wife, also. He can't spend perfectly thrilling evening watching the baby breathe just as naturally as can be. He gets bored to tears with sterilized conversation. He wants his wife to doll up for him as she would for a date. He wants her to be interested in him, and to jolly him, and make a fuss over him as she did before the advent of his dearest rival."

"And it is when a man finds out that his wife has no time for him, and that his nose has been put permanently out of joint by the little stranger who is absorbing her every thought that he first begins straying away from his own hearthstone in search of diversion, which the earnest seeker generally finds. And while wife is sitting at home holding the baby's hand while it sleeps, some other lady is holding hubby's."

"YOU see, the thing that wives forget is the eternal small boy that lives down in the depths of every man's soul to the day of his death. We women haven't got that. The little girl in us dies by the same time we are 18, and when we are grown up we are so terribly grown up and sophisticated."

"But a man never really grows up. He always has the child in him, with childish impulses and childish desires, and the ability to be amused by childish things."

"SOMETIMES wives forget this. Sometimes they are too dull to understand it. So when they see that they are married to great, strong six-foot men, who have made for themselves big places in business, politics, or the arts, and who, perhaps, have hundreds of men under them that they control, they fail to remember that these same men have the little boy in them, who craves to be babied and petted and cooed just as much as if he were 3 months old or 6 months old, instead of his 30 years old or 60 years old."

"A man may be as cold and hard as a sheet of armor plate to the outside world, but he wants his wife to go and gurgle to him, and chuck him on the chin and tell him that he is the most beautiful, darlingest, itty-bitty wonder boy in the wide, wide world, and that his foolish old mother just loves him to death."

"Of course, when wife hands him out this line he tells her to go along and not be silly, and he wouldn't have outsiders hear her for worlds, but privately he just eats it up and asks for more. 'Husbands of forty years standing are just as amenable to baby talk as infants in arms, and if you don't believe it, try it and see for yourself.'

"He wants her to blame the bad old floor that hurt his poor little head, or the cruel knife that cut him, or the horrid little boys who took his milk away from him. And he wants to be kissed and cooed over and patted and mothered and told that everything will be all right tomorrow."

"AND, curiously enough, a wife's kiss, like a mother's kiss, on a man's hurt does have magic and healing in it. It is the women who bind up men's wounds with the comfort of their love and sympathy, who send them back again and again to fight the battle of life until they win out."

"Husbands like their wives to show them off as they do their babies. Of course, every man jack will deny this, but it is true all the same."

"LOOK at the expression on your John's face when you make him tell that perfectly corking story of his, or you brag about how brave he was when he thought the burglar was in the house, or you make him sing for the Joneses, or do that clever card trick of his. "It is exactly the expression your little Johnny wears when you make him show he can pull the cat's tail and make it howl. No man leaves his wife at home when he goes abroad if she knows how to exhibit him properly, nor does he silence her if she is a good press agent."

"And husbands like their wives to baby them about their faults. No man ever gets over wondering why his wife takes his little slide-stepping so much more seriously than he intends it. He never understands why she can't understand that it isn't because he has ceased to love her or means to be disloyal to her, but just because the boy in him has to play hooky now and then. And she binds him to her with hoops of steel if she has him close enough to get just as his mother did, and spank him and kiss him and forget all about it."

"SO my dear, I said, 'if you want to be happy though married, make more fuss over your big baby than you do over your little one. Believe me, there is no better recipe for how to hold a husband than just to baby him.'"

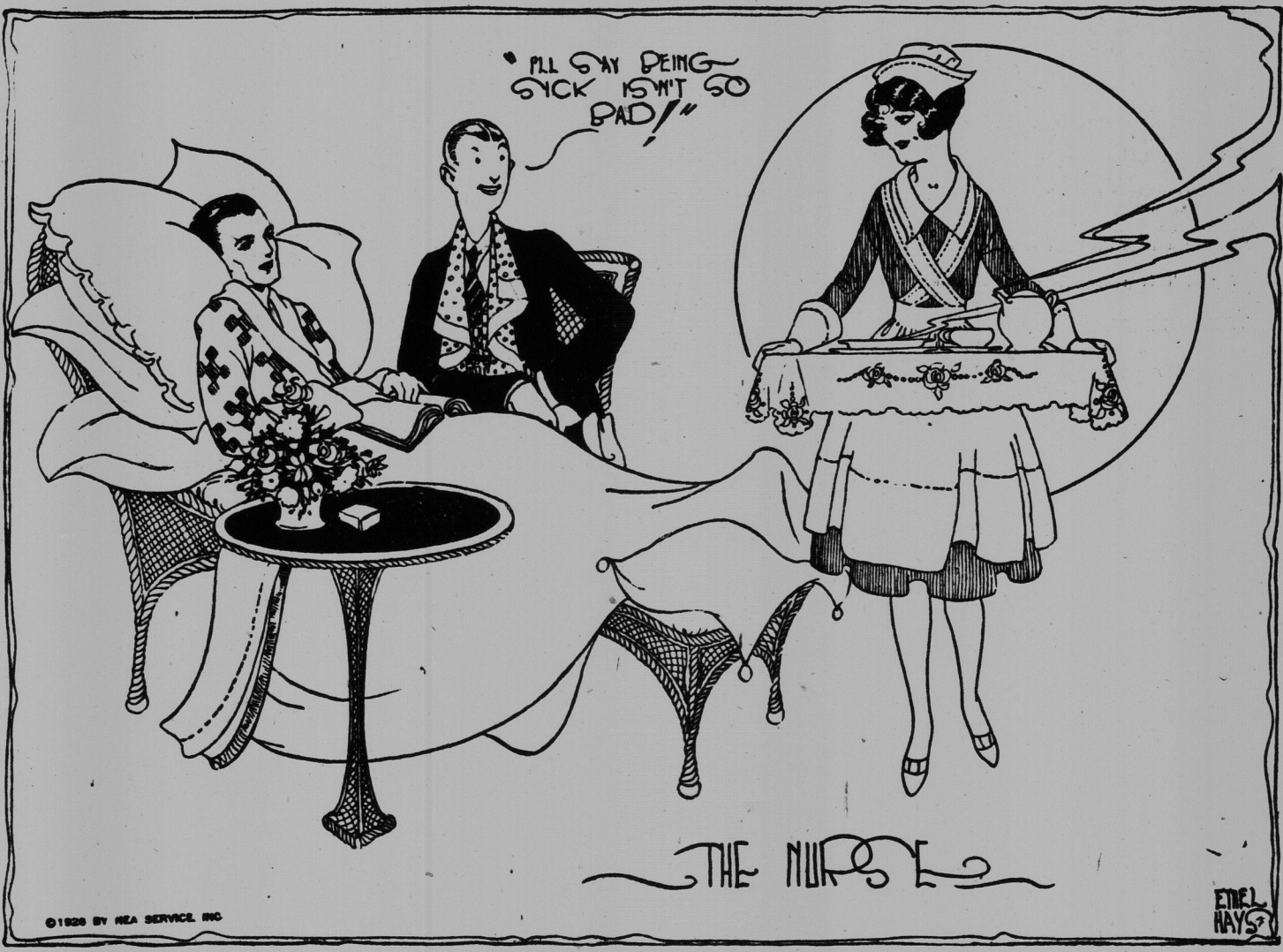

TODAY'S RECIPES:
Cabbage and Pineapple Salad—Mix two cups of finely shredded raw cabbage with one chopped pineapple, one-half cup of finely cut celery and one and one-half cups diced pineapple. Sprinkle with one teaspoon of salt and moisten with one-half cup of mayonnaise. Serve on crisp lettuce leaves.

Escarole Salad—Wash the escarole, shake it dry and let it stand on ice in a bag to crisp. When ready to serve, break it in pieces. Push a clove of garlic into a cube of bread and lay in the bottom of a salad bowl. Arrange the escarole in the bowl and when ready to serve mix thoroughly with a French dressing, made as follows: Four tablespoons of olive oil over the salad. Mix one tablespoon of malt or tarragon vinegar with one-half teaspoon of salt and one-eighth teaspoon of white pepper. Pour this over the salad and mix all together with a fork, tossing the salad until thoroughly blended.

Stuffed Braised Liver—Make a deep cut the length of the liver, using calf, beef or lamb liver. Fill with stuffing and skewer or the firmly. Spread liberally with bacon fat or drippings.

Women's Council Hears Of Matter of Minimum Wage

Resolution of U. W. M. Societies Reaches Body—Other Matters

Important resolutions were before the Saint John Women's Council at its meeting yesterday afternoon in the Church of England Institute, but because of the lengthy program arranged for the meeting consideration of these resolutions was adjourned to a meeting to be called on May 2.

One resolution was to the effect that the council express satisfaction and approval of the act now on the statute books which deals with the protection of the unmarried mother and the child born out of wedlock and urge the government to make no amendments to that act, other than those which would further uphold the rights of the unmarried mother and her child.

This resolution was brought in by Mrs. E. A. Young, who said the matter had been discussed at an emergency meeting of the Social Service Council on the previous day because of recent government action.

Another resolution before the meeting was to be forwarded by the United Women's Missionary Societies of the city asking the council to urge the enactment of legislation to provide a minimum wage law for girls and women.

Mrs. H. B. Peck, first vice-president, was in the chair and the afternoon program, which was very greatly appreciated by the members, included the reading of papers which had previously been given before the University Women's Club of the city. Miss Muriel Corkery gave a paper on "The History of Confederation," Miss Lesley Fickett read a paper on "Parliamentary Procedure," Miss L. Evans gave a paper on "The Union of the Maritime Provinces," and Miss Barbara Dobson's paper was on "The limitations of the Dominion and provincial parliaments and the duties of the senate."

Miss Florence Estabrook, president of the University Women's Club, had charge of the meeting during the special program. Heartly thanks were extended to the speakers and to the University Women's Club for a most enlightening series of addresses.

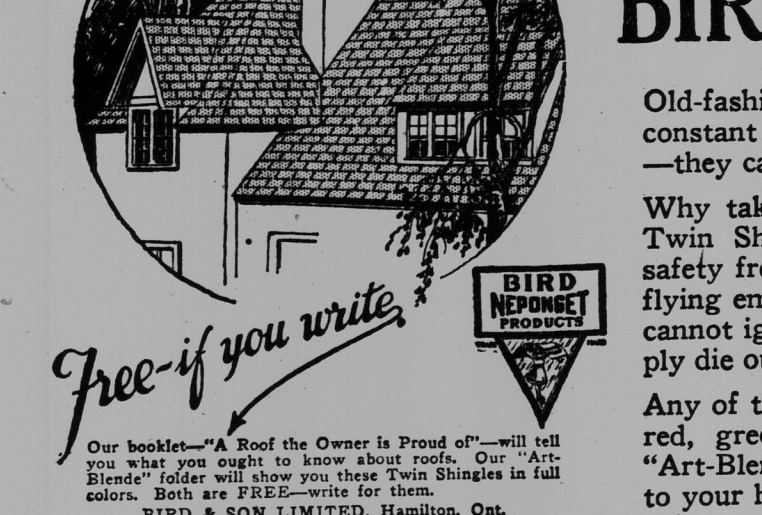

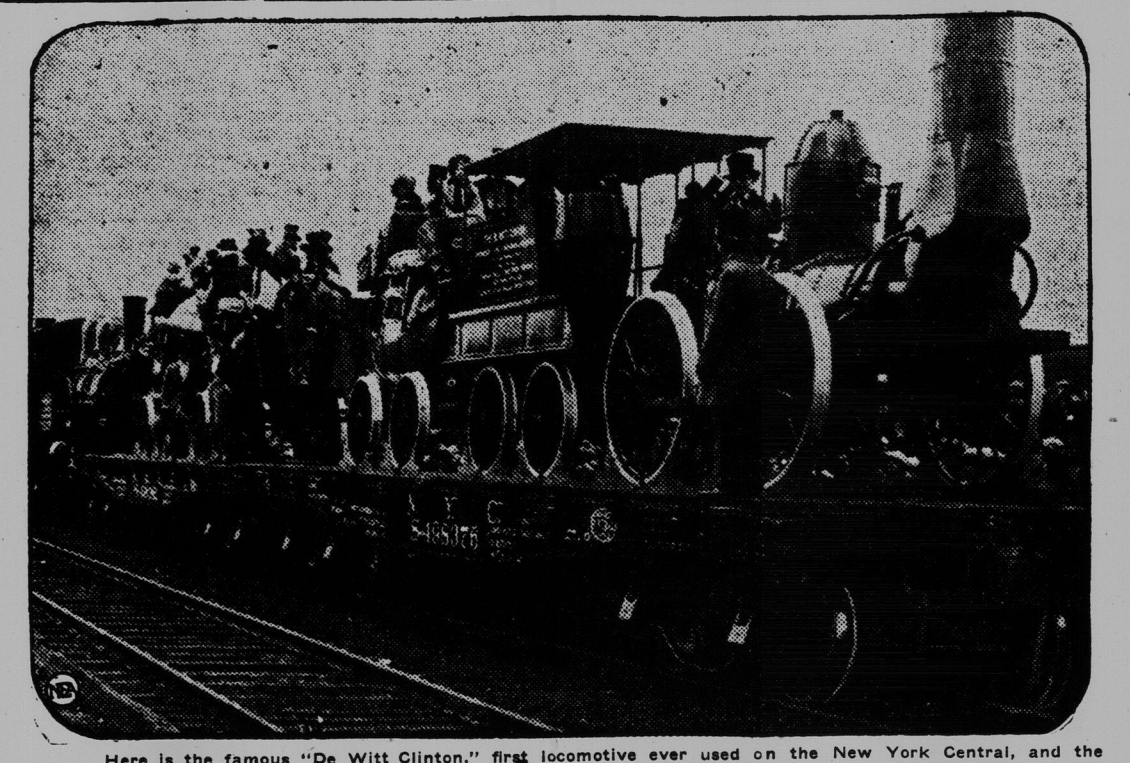

INITIAL OUTLAY AT GRAND FALLS RAISED \$500,000

\$1,500,000 Construction In First Two Years Required By Power Bill

TAX ON POWER MADE BELOW FALLS DEBATED

Veniot Objects To Any Toll Being Charged On Such Developments

FREDERICTON, April 23—The proposed tax of \$2 per horse power on any development below the Grand Falls by the Province of New Brunswick asked for by the new Saint John River Power Company, Limited, formed for the Grand Falls project, proved a stumbling block to the corporations committee in its consideration this afternoon of the bill incorporating the company.

N. C. Head, representing the International Pulp and Paper Company, Ltd., told the committee he felt that it was through the Grand Falls development such lower sites would be benefited and that in placing the amount at \$2 the company felt it was going as low as possible.

Hon. P. J. Veniot, leader of the oppo-

sition, took the stand that the province had given the company valuable rights at Grand Falls, and it was not fair that the province should pay toll for any such development. He declared he would press for taking of this tax and, if necessary, he would move an amendment in the House. He said he could well understand the representatives of the company present could not decide this important point, and his suggestion that they get in touch with their principals and tell them of the committee's stand on the matter was adopted. Hon. E. A. Kelly, chairman of the N. B. Power Commission, expressed a similar view and the section was stood aside until next week.

SECTION LAID OVER.

The original drafting of the bill said this would be based on installed capacity, but S. R. Watson, chief engineer of the Provincial Commission, objected and said this should be proportioned on a basis of the increased dependable power caused by the storage above.

Mr. Head agreed to an amendment that the cost be on the ratio of the respective increases of dependable continuous power at each site created by the storage. This did not suit and the whole section was set over.

The discussions on the bill started in the morning and lasted throughout the afternoon, being of a marked friendly nature.

Outside of this one section the bill was agreed to, while rapid progress was made in examination of the schedules attached. The committee will sit again on Tuesday morning.

Considerable discussion ensued over the section calling for an expenditure of \$1,000,000 in actual physical construction within two years from the passing of the act. Hon. Mr. Tilley thought this was not enough and Mr. Head agreed to raise the amount to \$1,500,000, subject to final decision next Tuesday.

Mr. Frezer pointed out he was dependent for his extensions on the actual completion of the work. He was not particular regarding the naming of the amount as to the finishing of the work.

INCREASED TAX ON N. B. TELEPHONE CO.

Present Plan Would Bring \$4,000 Annually to Province, \$13,000 Later

FREDERICTON, April 23—A tax increase from the New Brunswick Telephone Company, Limited, which is expected to bring in about \$4,000 extra annually to the municipalities, is proposed in a bill introduced in the House this afternoon by Premier Baxter.

The bill more particularly relates to municipal taxation. In lieu of any taxation upon real and personal property and income any of any municipal license or other fee, the company under this bill will be taxed on the total gross exchange service revenue (exclusive of revenue from long-distance tolls) received from the operation of its exchanges other than Saint John, as follows:

(A) Upon such revenue from any exchange which is included in exchanges with subscribers up to 1,000 inclusive at the rate of 3 1/2 per cent per annum.

(B) Upon such revenue from any exchange up to 5,000 subscribers, at the rate of 4 1/2 per cent per annum.

(C) Over 5,000, the tax will be 5 1/2 per cent per annum.

Later a bill will be introduced providing for taxation by the province on the long-distance tolls. This tax will amount to 10 per cent of the gross revenue and will mean an increase of about \$9,000. The act will come into force on Jan. 1, 1927.

These two increases will mean the telephone company will have to pay \$13,000 a year additional for taxation purposes in the province.

Plan of 10,000 Welsh to Come Here Queried

OTTAWA, April 23—J. S. Woodworth (Labor) Winnipeg North-Centre, called attention in the House this afternoon to a report appearing in an English newspaper to the effect that 10,000 Welsh miners were coming to Canada in connection with a big scheme which would revolutionize coal mining in Canada. If this report was correct, had these men been informed of conditions in the Dominion?

Hon. Charles Stewart, Acting Minister of Immigration and Colonization, replied that he had no knowledge of the scheme to bring these miners to Canada or of the proposed development. He would, however, make enquiry.

Crushed by Block of Stone Falling From Building Top

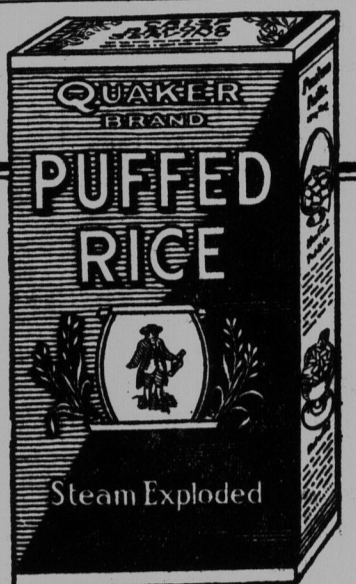

NEW YORK, April 24.—Several major league managers are entertaining doubts about the benefit of spring exhibition games between major league clubs.

From a business point of view, inter-league exhibition games are practical because a large part of the heavy expenses of a training camp can be defrayed by the gate money from the exhibition games.

Players do not draw salary for playing in these exhibition games and they do not care to risk salary arms legs or backs in unnecessary chances on uncertain playing fields.

Take the New York Yankees and the Brooklyn Robins for an example. When they started their spring series they were not taken too seriously as pennant possibilities but the Robins, with a fine looking pitching staff, entertained first division hopes.

The Yankees got away to a flying start and murdered the best pitching Brooklyn had for fourteen consecutive victories. The Yanks got the winning habit, gained faith in themselves and returned to New York with a club that looks like a pennant possibility.

That spring series between the two clubs may turn out to have been the makings of the Yankees and it might be even better in proportion.

The spring exhibition games have become so thoroughly established that some minor abuses already have been noticed and it is understood that Commissioner Landis will ask the club owners this winter to give him control over these games.
