Valued Additions to Museum

From St. Andrews Mrs. E. Lee Street ciety in St. John three gifts that are highly valued additions to the museum collections. The gifts are an early seal of the province of New Brunswick, a pair of burnished steel spurs worn by Colonel Green, of the 42nd Regiment, and an old clay pipe which is a relic of the Miramichi fire. Each of the three gifts has special claims to attention and each will be of much interest to the visitors to the museum. Provincial Seal.

Provincial Seal.

The old seal of the province of New Brunswick was made in the reign of George IV. and is about four inches in diameter. It is made of bees wax covered with heavy parchment. A remarkably clear impression has been made in the wax and its parchment covering and in spite of the passing of time the seal shows no signs of deterioration. On one side the British coat-of-arms is shown and on the other is New Brunswick's early official representation in heraldic design. The design represents a narrow river thickly wooded on its banks and having zome roughly fashioned huts along the shore, while in the middle of the river is seen a wooden vessel carrying sails full spread.



SPORT NEWS GLEANED FROM WORLD'S CENTRES

HANDS THIS YEAR

Very Few High Spots in the Fistic Game Were Recorded.

A POOR YEAR

New Heavyweight Material Did Not Live Up to Expectations.

NEW YORK, Dec. 30.—(By the associated Press.)—Despite a record-reaking amount of activity, marked y no little color, the 1924 boxing ampaign passes into history with few ominant developments or sensational

results.

Lacking any high spot comparable with the memorable Dempsey-Firpo battle of 1928, the season was noteworthy chiefly for a final and unsuccessful invasion of America by Georges Carpentier, the downfall of Luis Angel Firpo from the ranks of heavyweight title contenders, and the passing of two veteran champions, Joe Lynch and Johnny Dundee. Another important development was approval of a new law permitting 12-round bouts in California in 1925 and forecasting a big ring revival on the Coast.

Two Title Changes. Only two world's title changes took

place in the ring, both occurring in bantamweight ranks. Abe Attel Gold-stein dethroned Lynch in a colorless

bantamweight ranks. Abe Attel Goldstein dethroned Lynch in a colorless 15-round bout at Madison Square Garden in March, but lost the crown nine menths later, on Dec. 19, to Eddie (Cannonball) Martin, aggressive young Brooklyn scrapper, who, at 21, is the youngest titleholder in the ring.

The other break in the ranks of champions came when Johnny Dundee, durable little Italian warrior, forfeited without a struggle the featherweight fitle he had won the year before from Eugene Criqui, gallant French fighter.

Dundee relinquished the title, which he had not once defended, because of his inability further to make the 126-pound limit, and the New York State Athietic Commission has launched an elimination tournament, the survivor of which will be recognized by that body as the new feather champion.

It seems likely that the result of this procedure also will be universally accepted, thus shattering pugilistic predient that a champion can lose his crown only in the ring.

Starting out with prospects of an innusual amount of title activity, the year fell far short of expectations in this respect for a variety of reasons. The failure of Jack Dempsey, heavyweight king, to defend his crown no loubt had its effect on the rest of the ranks, while suspensions by ring authorities, 11th hour mishaps, and a disinclination on the part of several thampions to risk their crowns were other factors to bring about a dearth of championship activity.


