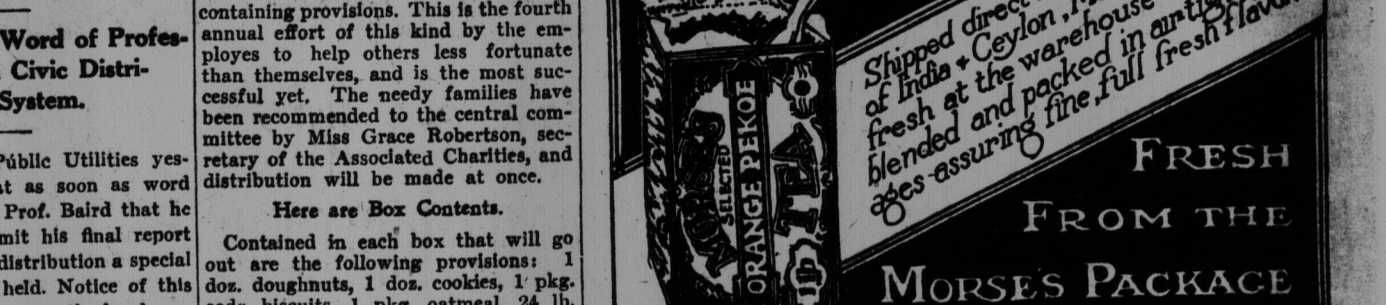

JURY FINDS KID MCGOY GUILTY OF MANSLAUGHTER

Former Pugilist Faces Sentence of From One to Ten Years.

SAYS IT IS UNJUST

Locked Up for 78 Hours, Jury Sets New Record for State.

LOS ANGELES, Calif., Dec. 29.—Kid McCoy, former pugilist, was convicted in Superior Court late today of manslaughter, in connection with the shooting here August 12, last, of Mrs. Theresa Mori. The penalty for manslaughter is from one to ten years imprisonment.

When the verdict was read McCoy's eyes became tear-dimmed as he sat at the end of the counsel table.

"I don't believe it was a just verdict," he said. "If I am not guilty as charged, I am not guilty at all. It was not a just verdict."

Compromise Verdict  
Foreman F. W. Coulter said that the verdict was a compromise one—"just what we could do."

The jury, which was out longer than any other in the legal history of Los Angeles county, had been locked up for 78 hours and had been in actual deliberation for 94 hours. The jury was composed of nine women and three men.

Superior Judge C. S. Crail had no comment to make other than: "I guess it was the best that they could do."

Sentence will be passed Friday. Defence attorneys announced that notice of appeal would be filed at that time.

LAYING OF CABLE TO CUBA IS BEGUN

American End of Line is Made Fast at Manhattan Beach.

NEW YORK, Dec. 30.—The New York end of the cable that is to connect this port and form a link in the Central American and West Indian service of All America Cables, Inc., was brought ashore early Saturday morning at Oriental Point, Manhattan Beach.

It took all morning before the heavy cable was hauled ashore and dragged probably 250 feet across the sand and end anchored in the small cable car station.

The cable will have its southern end at the edge of Guantanamo Bay, near United States naval base, there, approximately 1,500 miles from the New York station.

4,500 Tons of Cable.  
A 1,500 miles of cable weighs approximately 4,500 tons, it was stated, and on the cable steamer Colonia.

A vessel arrived at Bush Terminal on Christmas Day and the next day work of getting the ten miles, or so, is called the short end, on the rig was begun. The new cable will be in express line, it was said, which means that it was constructed for use as well as for capacity. It will be the third of the main cable lines of the All-American Cable. When the cable is connected it will serve as a link between Porto Rico, Panama, San Domingo and other West Indian points.

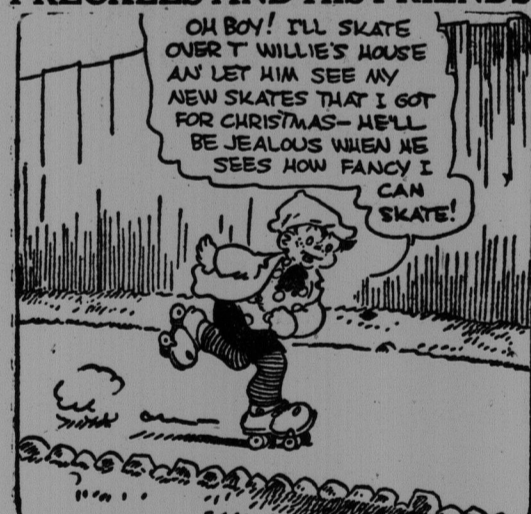

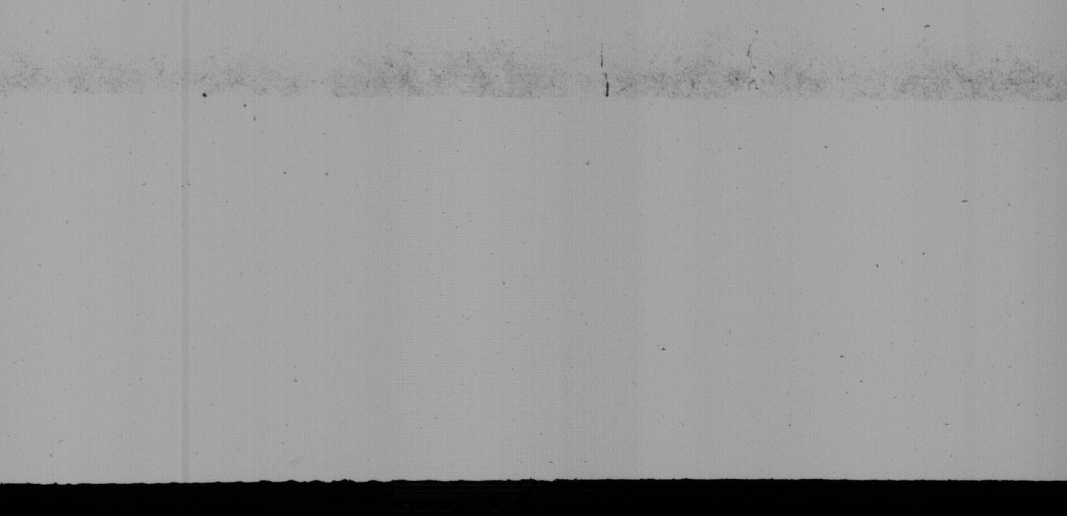

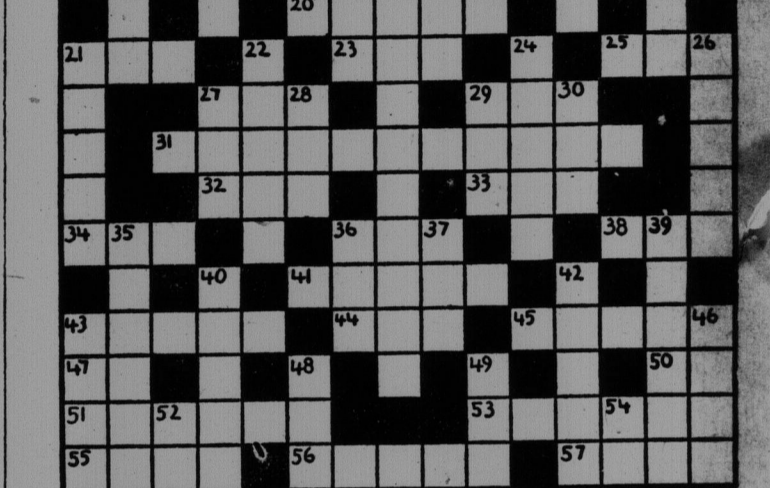
CROSS-WORD PUZZLE
