WILL THEY CALL ON FLEMMING TO RESIGN?

Fredericton Report Says Messrs. Clarke, Morray, Murray and Wilson Much Exercised Over Revelations—Acting Premier Denies

Fredericton, N. B., June 23—A report is in circulation today to the effect that the members of the government at a meeting last evening decided immediately to demand the resignation of Premier Fleming.

Mr. Clarke Denies Hon. Geo. J. Clarke, acting premier in conversation over the long distance telephone this afternoon, denied that the government had decided to demand the resignation of Premier Fleming.

The suggestion made by J. L. Stewart, M. P. F., the editor of the Conservative Chatham World, that the members of the government should hand in their resignations as a result of the revelations in the Dugal inquiry, does not seem to be taken seriously by the honorable members in conversation with the Times one of the provincial ministers.

AN AFTERNOON FROCK.



The construction of the skirt because it is an exceedingly popular model for summer frocks. Six yards of 36-inch material are required to make the dress, but of this 2 yards must be plain for the lower section of the skirt. For the foundation the fallings about the waist-line is first disposed of by taking up a dart in the back. Then the gores are joined, the bottom finished and the placket formed. Now close the center-front of the draped section, leaving edges free below double "oo" perforations. First upper edge, bringing "T" to corresponding small "oo" perforations and tack, stitching upper edges even. Close center-back seam from upper edge to single small "oo" perforation. Place inserted section, creasing on slot perforations; bring folded edge to center-back and press. Sew to back edge of draped section as notched; bring seam to center-back of inserted section and press. Stitch upper edge of inserted section to position. Arrange on foundation, centers even; stitch upper edge along creases of single small "oo" perforations. The puff should now be closed at the back seam from large "OO" perforation to lower edge. Finish edges above for placket. Gather upper and lower edges between double "TT" perforations; arrange on creases of small "oo" perforations. Arrange on foundation, centers even, stitch lower edge over upper edge of draped section, double "oo" perforation at seam of foundation. Stitch center row of gathers along creases of double "oo" perforations, single large "OO" perforation at seam, and stitch upper edges together, single small "oo" perforation at side seam. Adjust a webbing or a straight strip of canvas 2 inches wide in position underneath upper edge of skirt for a stay; stitch upper edges together.

A pleasing model distinguished by a new skirt, having a short three-piece foundation, two-piece draped section and one-piece double puff.

This model shows how cleverly two materials may be combined in the construction of one gown. Figured crepe de Chine is used for the waist and double puff, while the lower part of the skirt is carried out in plain crepe material.

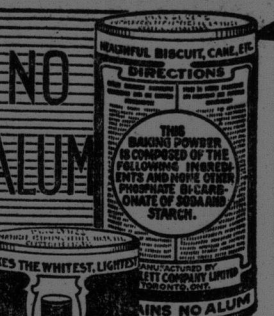
BETTER CREDIT FOR THE FARMERS OF IRELAND

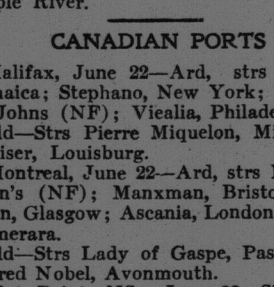
CAROLINE COE'S TESTED RECIPES Egg Lemonade. Beat two eggs—whites and yolks separately until both are as light as possible. To the juice of three lemons add two-thirds cup of sugar and one cup of boiling water. Stir until the sugar is dissolved. Add two cups of chopped ice. Mix the beaten yolks and whites together in a pitcher. Turn the lemonade from another pitcher, that is raised as high as possible into egg. Turn two or three times from one pitcher to the other. Walnut Loaf Cake. Cream one cup of sugar with one-half cup of butter (or butter substitute) until very creamy. Add one-half teaspoon of vanilla and one-half cup of milk. Sift two cups of flour with three even teaspoons of baking powder three times. Add one cup of walnut or pecan meals (broken fine) to the flour; add this to the first mixture. Fold in the stiffly beaten whites of four eggs. Bake in a loaf, thirty-five minutes in a moderate oven.



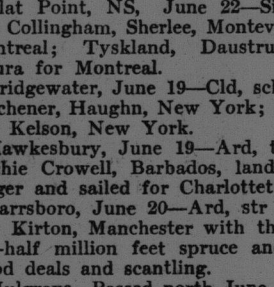

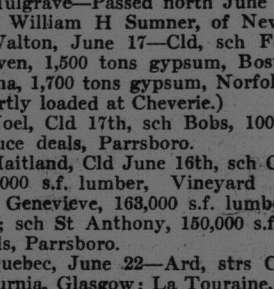

HEROINE OF TITANIC MAY GO TO CONGRESS

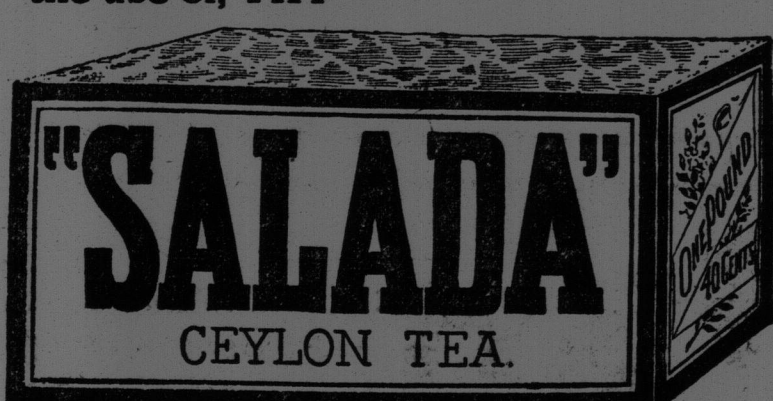


Newport, R. I., June 23.—At last a woman may attain a seat in congress. Mrs. James J. Brown, society leader of Newport and Denver, is being urged to run for United States representative in her district in Colorado, and has the combined support of the progressives and democrats there. When the Titanic went down Mrs. Brown and Mrs. William E. Carter found themselves in a boat in which there was no seam. They "manned" the oars themselves and prevented the loss of women and children from being sucked beneath the surface in the terrific whirlpool which followed the fatal explosion.

In the air nobody knows why. They have no sense of dignity, for they may be found walking with women. Yet the women are to be pitted too. On festive occasions they are dragged around a room to the accompaniment of the most hellish music. Another interesting paragraph is from the pen of a Chinese who had just returned after a tour of Europe and North America. He wrote to a relative as follows: "You cannot civilize these foreign devils. They are beyond redemption. They will live for weeks and months without touching a mouthful of rice, but they eat the flesh of bullocks and sheep in enormous quantities. That is why they smell so badly. They smell like sheep themselves. Every day they take a bath to rid themselves of their disagreeable odors, but they do not succeed. Nor do they eat their meat cooked in small pieces. It is carried into the room in large chunks, often half raw, and they eat and slash and tear it apart. They eat with knives and prongs. It makes a civilized being perfectly nervous. One fancied himself in the presence of sword-swallowers. They even sit down at the table with women and the latter are served first, reversing the order of Nature."—The Chinese Revolution.

### REDMOND APPEALS FOR FINANCIAL AID FOR HOME RULERS

London, June 23—John Redmond's begging letter to the president of the United Irish League at Philadelphia is the first open admission to overseas sympathizers and friends that the Nationalists are preparing to fight for home rule, should the proverbial slip between the cup and the lip occur.

The Irish Nationalist leader having committed himself to the volunteer movement, is anxious to find funds, as well as men, for the organization knowing full well that Sir Edward Carson's army is well provided with financial support by the Scotch and other Unionists.

That the latest developments in connection with the Irish volunteers is inspiring the Nationalists with greater aggressiveness is made clear from a dispatch from a correspondent of the Morning Post, who declares that the tension in Londonderry is due to the increasingly aggressive conduct on the part of the Nationalists. He says that it cannot be exaggerated that every one is awaiting an outbreak which will involve loss of life.

**MAYOR INVESTIGATES**

The investigation into the charge that Louis Corey, through an agent, had attempted to bribe former Commissioner Agar was begun by Mayor Frink yesterday. His worship heard statements by Corey, who denied that he had authorized any such offer, and by Mr. Agar who repeated the conversation between himself and John Frodham. The mayor has not yet decided whether the facts elicited so far warrant a formal investigation under oath. If he decided that this is needed Mr. Frodham will be invited to give a sworn statement of his connection with the matter, as well as the others.

### THE INEFFICIENT AND THE TARIFF

(The Canadian Courier)

Hon. George E. Foster made a strong point at the Manufacturers' Banquet in Montreal last week when he said he did not want to see the tariff used as an excuse for lazy and inefficient manufacturers. Skill, economy and honest workmanship, he pointed out, will do as much for the manufacturer as the tariff has done.

This is a splendid message. Coming as it does from an avowed and life-long protectionist, it should be a warning to the Canadian manufacturer to do his best. The days of high protection are not likely to be long in this country, and the manufacturer who is wise will prepare for the inevitable. He must so organize and perfect his business that he will be able to sell his goods on a free-trade basis. The tariff is there, but he should be selling on a basis which will enable him to succeed if that tariff is lowered or eliminated. This is the aim of the older manufacturers should be close to it now and the newer keeping it in front of them as a goal to be reached at an early date.

A tariff for revenue only would average about fifteen per cent, and every manufacturer who is wise will be preparing for the day when Canada will adopt that policy. Investors in industrial stocks should also keep this in mind and buy stocks only in such industries as seem likely to be in that position at an early date. Many investors have already taken warning, and this accounts in a measure for the recent drop in steel and iron securities.

THE INQUIRY

The zeal of the Standard to have all the facts brought out in connection with the inquiry into the Dugal charges concerning timber leases gives rise to the hope that the government organs will be equally urgent in having the most complete investigation made in the matter of the Valley Railway charges.

It is hoped that the work on Orange street, for which the residents have petitioned, under the terms of the paving act, will be carried out, and that similar petitions will be received from residents of other streets.

SOCIAL CENTRES

Miss Margaret Wilson, daughter of President Wilson, is a strong advocate of the use of school buildings as community centres. She told the General Federation of Women's Clubs in Chicago that every town should have a salaried civic secretary to promote community work.

Buenos Ayres, the capital of Argentina, has now a population of more than 1,500,000. The population of the city has practically doubled in fifteen years. The fact is significant of the development that is taking place in South America.

Montreal Star (Conservative)—"The recent exposure of political conditions in New Brunswick will be most painful reading throughout Canada. It may be too soon yet to decide just how far the contagion has spread and who are implicated, but it is abundantly clear that a whole-souled and rigorous house-cleaning is needed, and that the people of our sister province should not rest satisfied until it has been shown that such transactions are surely and severely punished when they come to light."

The Standard is grieved that the Times has not paid lofty tributes to the new knights, Sir Robert Borden and Sir George Foster. This journal may at least express its gratification that the honor of knighthood did not fall upon the Hon. Robert Rogers or upon any of Mr. Borden's Nationalist allies.

A correspondent complains that the Times is entirely too moderate in its comments on the revelations made before the Royal Commission, and asks what the Standard would do if it could get such a chance at Mr. Carvell, Dr. Pugsley or any other leading man of the Liberal party. We know as a matter of fact that the Standard is now denouncing Mr. Carvell, Dr. Pugsley and everybody except those responsible for this great scandal.

Referring to the issue of Canadian Northern bonds to the par value of \$45,000,000, the Ottawa Free Press makes this interesting statement—"Finance Minister White has been selling Canadian government bonds in London in such quantities recently that the value of Dominion securities has dropped. The last twenty-five millions had to be sold at 98. The government fears that the forty-five million Canadian Northern issue will have to be disposed of at such a low figure that enough cash will not be obtained to enable the road to be completed. If this is so, the Canadian Northern will have to come back to parliament next year for more assistance."

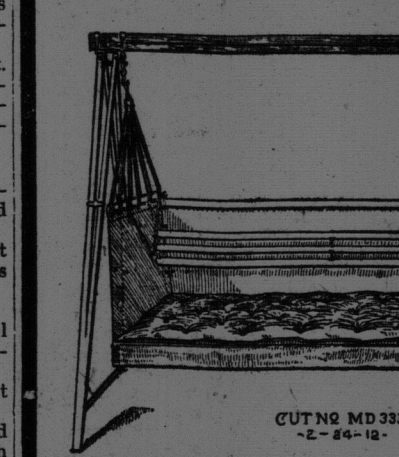

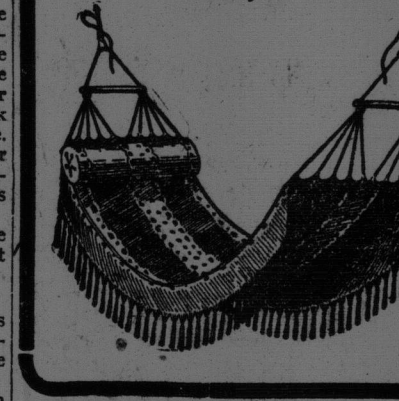

HOME RULE FOR SCOTLAND

To the Editor of the Times: Sirs—The verdict of the country at the election in Great Britain will determine the position of home rule for Scotland in the new British parliament. We may expect to see a legislature in Scotland within the next six years; if they are in the minority, the question will be shelved. That, in short, is the situation. Now what ought to be done by those who wish a government of Scotland at the next parliament. The general election is only a matter of days. No time must be lost. The future of the country, for five years, depends on the exertions of the next few or ten months. It is imperative therefore that every organized effort to educate and influence public opinion should be promptly and generously supported. The International Scots Home Rule League, although formed only last year, has built up a representative organization, which it seeks to utilize in view of the near approach of the general election. Its sole object is to further the patriotic demand for a Scots Parliament. The movement, through its enterprise, has been planted across the seas, so that what formerly was the desire of Scotland is now the aspiration of the race. In the "Scottish Nation" it has provided an organ which has done valuable work in bringing prominently before the public the claims of Scotland to control its own affairs. The League has obtained the support of leading members of fifty-four Scottish town councils. It took an important part in securing the success of the Bannockburn, by securing the right to govern the country in accordance with our traditional ideals, are called upon, as their ancestors were, to make some sacrifice. Instead, however, of spending their substance in the purchase of weapons to slay opponents, they may apply it to win them over to the national cause. BOSTON LAWYER

SHOT AND KILLED BY INSANE WIFE

Boston, June 21—Henry H. Folsom, of the law firm of Powers, Folsom & Powers, of this city, was shot and killed by his wife, Mary Hardy Folsom, while the couple were driving in a car on the Exeter New Hampshire railroad station toward their farm in Rockingham about 8:30 o'clock yesterday afternoon.

Mrs. Folsom is under arrest at Exeter. She is said to be demoralized and to have exhibited homicidal tendencies for several months, even grasping the wife of a neighbor by the throat and threatening to kill her.

After Mrs. Folsom had been arrested, she was asked why she had shot her husband and to this she replied: "Because I loved him. I was afraid he was going to marry another woman."

Mr. Folsom was the son of Channing Folsom, of New Market, formerly superintendent of public education in New Hampshire. He was 48 years old and was graduated from Dartmouth in 1892 and was a Phi Beta Kappa man. He was also a star on the varsity football team for two years. He studied for two years at the Boston University school of law, leaving there to enter the firm of Powers, Folsom & Powers.

In 1901 he married Mary Hardy, daughter of Capt. W. W. Hardy, of Dover (N. H.), and the couple lived in and about Boston, their latest residence being on Central street, Somerville. Miss Hardy was a graduate of Smith College and a talented woman.

Quebec, June 22—Maintaining its record for producing contradictory statements that cannot be reconciled to one another, the Empress of Ireland wreck inquiry today unearthed a fact, when it was given the exact location of the hull of the ship at the bottom of the St. Lawrence, which again drew attention to the different explanations of the positions of the ships at the time of the disaster.

On the map it was found that the resting place of the Empress is one mile and a quarter south of the place where Captain Kendall, the commander, says she was hit, and one mile northwest of the point at which Chief Officer Tuftens of the collier Storstad, contends the collision happened. The location of the wreck was explained by Captain Gagnon, of the Dominion marine department, who bought it.

The taking of evidence was interrupted twice today because the members of the commission and the lawyers for the government, the C. P. R. and the Storstad had to attend a reception given the Duke of Connaught in the court house, and a luncheon given to the emperor-general by Mr. Justice Levesque and the Quebec district judges in the Chateau Frontenac.

MODERN SURGEONS WORKING MIRACLES

Marvels Revealed at Convention of Association

SOUND MUSCLES SHIFTED

Living Bones Are Grafted in Order to Correct Deformities or Replace Diseased Structure—Marvels of Grafting

Philadelphia, June 22—Remarkable operations to cure deformities, such as the shifting of sound muscles to replace those paralyzed by disease, the grafting of living bones from one part of the body to another to help cure tubercular osteomyelitis, and to prevent spinal curvature, and other surgical marvels were revealed at the American Orthopedic Association meetings here.

New principles in the surgical treatment of paralysis of the muscles, due to the destruction by disease of the governing nerve cells, were advanced by Dr. T. William Nathan, who described a method by which strong, healthy muscles and tendons were shifted from one attachment to another, taking the place of those paralyzed. This method, he said, would distribute the muscular power of the body by using flexor muscles to walk or stand erect are now walking without the aid of crutch or cane, and can even climb stairs unaided, according to Doctor Nathan.

Cat bone grafted into dog bone grows fast, and in ten weeks becomes transparent and looks like the dog bone, according to Dr. W. E. Callie, who presented a careful analysis of a long series of experiments into the inner mysteries of how transferred bones unite. Paralysis of the foot, cured by a delicate operation of grafting the cartilage between two bones of the foot, the astragalus and the scaphoid, gouging the two denuded bones together, resulting in an ankylosis or stiffening which was removed by the method of grafting, according to Dr. H. E. Soile.

MARVELS OF GRAFTING

Curvature of the spine, due to permanent paralysis of the muscles which normally keep the spine straight, is being cured by another remarkable operation described by Dr. H. E. Callie. This consists of cutting straightening the crooked spine, splitting the vertebrae and inserting a bone graft taken from the leg.

The celebrated Albee operation of grafting a section of bone from the leg to the spine to take the weight of tubercular vertebrae and permit them to fuse together, was described through a large part of the afternoon meeting. Dr. F. H. Albee, of New York, the proponent of the method, was present and took a prominent part.

London, June 22—The issue of a loan of \$200,000,000 at three per cent is expected shortly to be made by the Union of South Africa. It is understood the issue price will be 97 1/2.

Washington, June 22—The supreme court today reversed the decision of the eighth United States circuit court of appeals, which held that the vows of poverty in Catholic public policy.

TOO MANY STUDENTS

It is Getting to Be a Serious Matter in Germany and Austria

Berlin, June 22—Too many university students is the old complaint being renewed in both Germany and Austria. The trouble in Berlin and Germany as a whole concerns the medical students mainly. The flood of them has grown so rapidly that the ministry of education is puzzled over some way to lessen it.

In Austria, the complaint is general. The Associated Press correspondent at Vienna reports that Professor Wettstein, rector of the University of Vienna, in a recent appeal to the Austrian Diet for funds for a students' home, declared that 20 per cent of students were living under conditions of poverty that they were half starved and sometimes without shelter. In some instances, he said, the student was unable to go to his room at all during the day as it was used as a workshop. They were actually forced to spend their spare time in cafes and cheap restaurants.

Two Fatalities Frederick, N. B., June 22—A four year old boy named Goodine, was killed today near Kingsclear when one of the Hibbard Company's construction trains ran over him, cutting his body in two.

Frederick, N. B., June 22—Charles Dow was accidentally shot and killed today in the woods near here when a Winchester rifle which he was carrying was discharged. Wells Coles who was with him, was injured when the ball passed through Dow's upper arm and entered his thigh.

ATTITUDE OF STEAMER LINES TO CANADA AN IMPORTANT MATTER

London, June 22—When the Atlantic pool conference renews its deliberations in London on August 8, it will still, notwithstanding its earlier sessions in Berlin, London and Cologne, find itself facing one problem which is apparently no nearer solution now than at the close of the first meeting of the conference. This is the attitude of the British lines doing business with Canada as in their quota under any renewal of the existing pool.

The Canadian lines demand, it is learned, that their Canadian business of the last five years be taken as the basis for the quota to be assigned them. This business, however, has fallen off sharply in the last year, dropping, in fact, to fifty per cent of the former figure, and the other members of the pool object to any division of business that does not take this decline into account. Director Ballin of the Hamburg-American Line proposed that the half of the five-year average be taken as a basis for reckoning the Canadian line's quota, with the proviso that as soon as this business should show an increase of twenty per cent the lines in question should be entitled to a revision of their quotas.

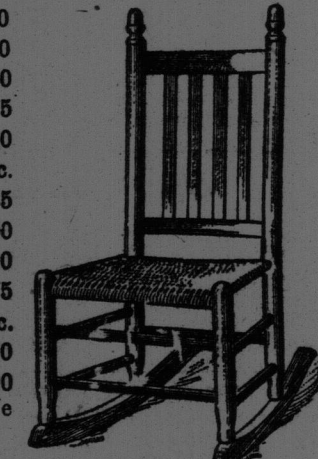

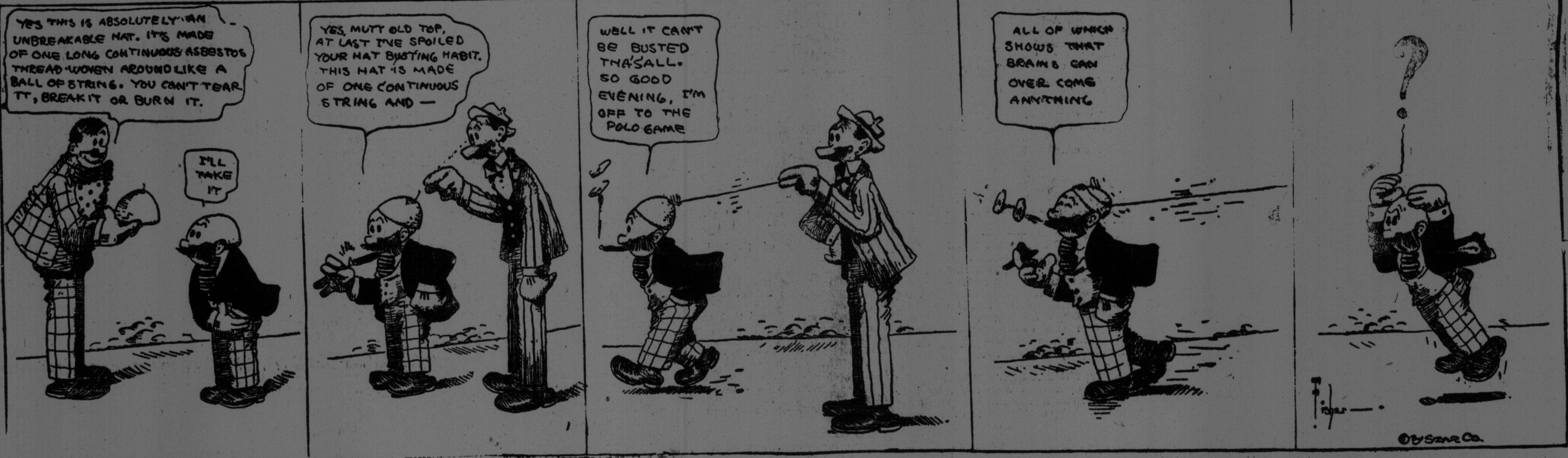

SEWER CONTRACT FOR COREY'S FIRM

Mayor Will Not Sign Until After Investigation

REPORT ON POLICE INQUIRY

Council Would Not Lessen Mayor's Authority—Another Move For Incinerator—Higher Interest For City Bank Balances

Tenders for laying a new sewer main in Market square were opened at the weekly meeting of the common council yesterday afternoon and the contract was awarded to Tobias, Corey, Stevens and Stevens. The Corey mentioned in the firm name is the same to whom exception was taken on a previous contract because of an allegation that an agent acting for him had attempted to bribe the former commissioner of public works. Under the circumstances the mayor intimated that this contract would also be held up until his investigation of the alleged offer of graft has been completed.

Later in the session the commissioner submitted a report showing that the tenders figured out as follows: Michael George, \$1,407; Peter Farris, \$1,289; Moses and French, \$1,259; and Tobias, Corey, Stevens and Stevens, \$1,046. The last, being the lowest, was recommended for acceptance.

The penalty of only \$100 or imprisonment for forty days for ringing false alarm of fire was mentioned by Com. McLellan with notice that he would present a resolution for an amendment providing for imprisonment for at least six months.

A feature of the meeting, interesting because of the light it shows on the feeling of responsibility for public recreation entertained by the council, was the decision to provide funds for police supervision of crowds at public ball games where no admission fee is charged.

Mayor Frink's report on the alleged irregularities in the police pay rolls was submitted to the common council yesterday afternoon. The mayor reported that the charge that policemen were credited with extra time months after the extra duty had been performed had been supported but that, in view of the circumstances, the custom was not indefensible. He recommended a better system of checking the time books and also that provision be made for paying the men for over time work.

As a result of Mayor Frink's action in seeking better terms for the city's banking business the civic treasury will be enriched by an extra half of one per cent on all credit balances at the bank during the next three years. Replies to his invitation to submit terms were opened at the meeting of the common council yesterday and it was found that the Bank of Nova Scotia, which looks over this business with the other affairs of the Bank of New Brunswick, offered the most attractive proposition. Under the new arrangement the city will receive four per cent interest on all credit balances instead of three and a half per cent as in the past.

The Bank of Nova Scotia offered an overdraft of \$900,000 at 4% amounts in excess to be arranged for specially; credit balances to bear interest at 4 per cent, the agreement to extend for three years from July 1.

A proposal by Com. Potts to take from the mayor the authority vested in him to exercise supervision over civic contracts met with unanimous opposition from the other members of the council when the resolution was introduced yesterday afternoon. Com. Potts explained that he wished to avoid further delay in connection with the contract for erecting the retaining wall around Victoria square and moved that each commissioner, with the common clerk, be authorized to execute contracts for matters relating to his own department. The other commissioners denounced the suggestion and the motion was defeated.

Another move for the construction of an incinerator and the collection of ashes, garbage, etc., was made by the common council yesterday when they adopted a resolution moved by Com-

FORCED TO ABANDON EFFORTS TO SECURE DEAD FROM EMPRESS

Quebec, June 22—All attempts to get the 800 bodies entombed in the sunken hull of the Empress of Ireland were abandoned today, following the conference between Lt. Commander Forbes of H. M. S. Essex and the divers of the man-of-war at the scene of the wreck, as a result of the death of Edward Cossboom, of New York, on Sunday from his fall off the slimy hull of the ship.

Lt. Commander Forbes reached Father Point today and his investigation showed that the accident happened while the water was at low level, that every precaution for deep diving operations was properly carried out, and that no better conditions for carrying on the work could be expected.

Lt. Commander Forbes notified Captain Walsh, marine superintendent of the

C. P. R. of these facts, and suggested that the divers from the Essex be sent back to their ship here.

Captain Walsh, after consulting with Captain Watson of H. M. S. Essex, reluctantly decided that everything possible had been done to secure the bodies and that nothing could be gained by the divers remaining at Father Point. They were accordingly ordered to return to their ship.

This decision of the C. P. R. does not affect the operations of the company attempting to salvage the ship, but it is thought here it will also be compelled to give up diving operations.

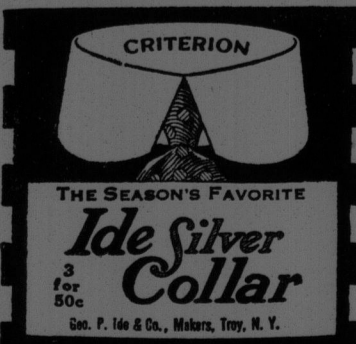

In conclusion I would refer to the excellent spirit which prevailed in the school throughout the year. This I know to be due in a large measure to the influence of the older boys in the school and especially of the boys in the fifth form. It is upon the boys of the fifth form that most of the responsible offices, under the supervision of the staff, are placed and in the manner in which they fulfill the duties of these offices and their example generally has a very good influence upon the other boys. When I testify to the good influence exerted by these boys and the social relations which existed between the staff and them, I know that I am voicing the opinion of all the masters. It is with very genuine regret that I bid farewell to those boys. I would like for them all possible success in their different careers and, for the school, that their mantle may fall upon the shoulders of their successors.
