

RECIPROCITY TERMS WITH THE

Provisions of Agreement Are Announced By Minister of Customs

ITEMS IN THE LIST

Canadian Products Which Are Affected - Twenty Per-Cent Preference Over Goods of Other Countries and an Opening for Newfoundland

Ottawa, July 1—Hon. J. D. Reid, acting minister of trade and commerce, today through arrangements with the home government, made public the reciprocal tariff agreement entered into last April between the Canadian government and a number of the islands in the British West Indies. Briefly, the agreement provides for a preference of twenty per cent of the existing rates of duty upon a large number of articles specified in A schedule and text with a minimum preference in the case of flour and sugar.

Provision is made for taking in the islands of the West Indies not parties to the agreement, as well as Newfoundland, within three years from the time it comes into force.

nto force.

Any of the parties to the agreemen may provide that the concessions granter shall not be applicable unless conveyed by ship direct between the two countries concerned, provision being made in this connection for the regulation of freight rates by the Canadian government.

The agreement is to come into force by proclamation after it has been ratified by the navitae concerned and the secretary of the provision of the secretary of the the parties concerned and the secretary of state for the colonies and may be ter-minated at the end of ten years on a year's notice. The agreement in part follows:

Agreement entered into this 9th day of April by the government of his majesty's Dominion of Canada, represented herein by the Hon. Geo. Eulas Foster, minister of trade and commerce; the Hon. Wm. Thomas White, minister of finance, and the Hon. John Dowsley Reid, minister of customs; and the governments of Trinidad, British Guinea, Barbados, St. Lucia, St. Vincent, Antigua, St. Kitts, Dominica and Montserrat.

It is agreed between the government of the dominion and the governments of the above mentioned colonies severally that:

1. On all goods enumerated in schedule A, being the produce or manufacture of Canada, imported into any of the above mentioned colonies, the duties of customs shall not at any time be more than four fifths of the duties imposed in the colony on similar goods, when imported from any

Reduction in Sugar Duties.

(A) That on raw sugar not above No. 16 Dutch standard, in color, and molasses testing over 66 degrees and not over 75 degrees by the polariscope, the preference in favor of the colony shall not at any time be less than four and a half cents per 100 pounds and for each additional degree over 75 degrees the preference shall not be less than half a cent per 100 pounds.

(B) On all goods enumerated in schedule thereto, being the produce or manufacture of any of the above mentioned colonies, imported into the Dominion of Canada, there shall be no duties of customs; but on the like goods, when imported from any foreign country, the duties of customs shall not be less than those there in set out.

(C) The act of the parliament of Canada and and entitled "an act respecting duties of customs" assented to on the 12th day of April, 1907, as amended by chapter 10 of the acts of the parliament of Canada 1909 shall in addition to the amendments necessary to give effect to the foregoing provisions of this section be amended as follows:

1. Tariff item 135 C to be repealed.
2. Tariff item 137 A to be repealed.
3. So as to provide that upon arrowroot, the produce of any of the said colonies imported into the Dominion of Canada, the duties of customs shall not exceed fifty cents per 100 pounds.

(D) It is understood that the Canadian customs tariff item 135 B shall not be affected by section 2 of this agreement for an effective control of rates of freight.
