ELLIS SLANDERING ST. JOHN.

John V. Ellis, M. P. in his speech on the short line in the House of Commons, said in regard to St. John: We have witnessed year by year a decline in our population rather than an increase. The general policy of the government has been against us, and year by year, as the numbers have made their mark, they have found the population of the city declining. The figures of the last two years for last year were less than they were in 1887 or 1888 and I do not know that there has been any increase in one year over another during that period.

A SPECIAL ISSUE.

On April 23rd, the EVENING GAZETTE was nine months old. Two years ago on April 30th, the first issue of THE SATURDAY GAZETTE made its bow. The aim of the publisher was to produce a distinctively St. John newspaper, and when the weekly merged into THE EVENING GAZETTE on July 23rd, 1887, this idea was perpetuated.

HALIFAX IS SAD.

The defeat of the Short Line bill in the Senate makes the Halifax people very sad, and likewise very angry. They were so sure the bill would be passed and St. John side-tracked for their benefit that the defeat of their hopes is not easy to endure. The Acadia Recorder is naturally enough the most violent of all the Halifax papers, and its present exultation is in proportion to its recent exultation at the supposed triumph over St. John. It says: "The necessary consequence of this bill is to deprive the inhabitants of the Maritime Provinces of a guaranteed fund or yearly subscription list to supplement its present endowment. These endowments now amount to \$165,000, they give the college an income of \$8,000 a year, and it appears that \$200,000 would be needed to maintain the institution properly. This means a capital sum of \$750,000 which the churches of Nova Scotia, and New Brunswick are asked to contribute, and of this sum New Brunswick is expected to give one half. The churches of New Brunswick are the best judges of how they will dispose of their own money, and the Gazette has no objection to them giving \$27,500 or any other sum to support a college in Windsor, N. S. Still we think that such a sum might be much better employed in strengthening the weak congregations throughout New Brunswick, and in giving the undersized rectors a slight supplement to their inadequate salaries. The principal reason for the existence of King's College, seems to be that it is a Church of England institution, and that its students are required to attend chapel twice a day. It is expected to supply the Maritime Provinces with Church of England Clergymen, but the number required is not great, probably not more than five a year on the average, and \$12,000 seems a large sum to pay for such a supply. We think it is a great pity that the proposal to amalgamate King's college with Dalhousie, which was favored by many leading clergymen in Nova Scotia, was not carried out. Were this done both institutions would be greatly strengthened, and while both Churches and Presbyterians might maintain their own theological halls, one staff of professors would serve for the arts and humanities. In our opinion the multiplication of small colleges in the Maritime Provinces is a great evil, and a positive detriment to higher education, especially when such institutions have the power to confer degrees, and use that power as freely as many of them do. We hope to see the time when all denominations will agree to form one great University for the Maritime Provinces, one that will be strong enough to carry respect abroad, and with an equipment such as some of our existing colleges can afford.

THE MAGISTRACY OF THE NEW CITY.

There has been a great deal of interest taken in the question of the appointment of a police and civil magistrate for St. John, and the public read yesterday with great interest the Gazette's account of what occurred at the meeting of members of the government and their supporters. The previous day, the people of St. John, with few exceptions will be gratified to hear that the present able and efficient magistrate will not be displaced to make room for Mr. Ritchie. This we are able to announce on the highest authority. The Attorney General regards the matter as a local quarrel, to be settled by the members for the city and county of St. John themselves; one in which he is not called upon to interfere. As they have been able to agree upon a change, and as in point of fact three of them are strongly opposed to the removal of Mr. Ritchie, we will assume as they are at present, and Mr. Peters, under the terms of the act will continue to hold office until the expiration of the new city. By this action the Attorney-General has justified the good opinion which the Gazette has always expressed of him for ability and good sense. The St. John members who opposed Mr. Ritchie's appointment have simply voiced the general sentiment of their constituents, and they have saved this high office, which is second to none in the Province, in importance, from being made a political football. Mr. Ritchie had obtained it, as a reward for political services, as a reward for political services at some future date, when another government comes into power, and Mr. Ritchie himself, removed from office under such a system, would find himself in a much worse position than if he had continued in the practice of his profession and in political life.

Town Talk.

Nature abhors disfigurement. She is just as prone to hide her deformities and scars as a sensitive and high-spirited woman.
