THIRTY-EIGHTH ANNUAL REPORT.

With the opening of another year, we are again glad to welcome you here, as friends and subscribers. It seems but a short time since we met at our last Annual Meeting, yet we have another year's work, the 38th in the Home's history to report, another year of stewardship, with its trials and successes, its joys and sorrows.

We began the year with 78 little ones to take care of, 77 were added to the list during the year, parting with 52 of them in different ways, of whom our Corresponding Secretary will give a detailed account, having in residence 103 on the 30th of September. So large a family of growing girls requires much watchful care, patience, and perseverance so that the greatest good may be accomplished with the resources placed at our disposal.

The managers feel encouraged in their work, for they see the influence of those more immediately connected with the management of the Home is bringing forth good results. They know that many a child is not only rescued from misery and shame, but is brought up under elevating influence and taught to be intelligent and virtuous. True, we regret, we have had exceptions; these are generally found among those who have not been secured early in life.

The year that has gone has been both a trying and a consoling one. The great number of applicants has taxed our ability and resources, yet we are thankful, that none were sent away. The coming winter it is feared will be a very hard one for the unemployed poor. It is expected there will be many opportunities for the Home to extend a helpful hand, by affording a comfortable shelter to homeless little ones.

The yearly benefits derived from these and other legacies can only be realized by managers, especially when the collectors return from their weary house to house collections with the pathetic report "I have worked harder than ever, with poorer results."

The comparative freedom from epidemics and sickness has been a constant source of consolation. Only one of this large family was taken by death, and she was called to the better land while at the Sick Childrens' Hospital.

The managers feel very grateful thanks to their Medical Staff, for the care and almost daily attention they have given to the Home. They wish to express their gratitude for the kindness and care their children have received in the Isolation Hospital, the Hospital for Sick Children, and to thank the management of the Lakeside Home for kindnesses and benefits derived from a sojourn there by some of their more delicate little ones. They would also like to bear tribute to the great attention and comfort bestowed by the management of the "Home for Incurables" upon Minnie Lee, once a child of this Home, who at the age of 19 was dying of consumption and homeless. Their response to our appeal, "If she is one of your girls and incurable, she is welcome" touched our hearts. Minnie enjoyed their care and protection until she entered into rest, rejoicing by faith in sins forgiven, and with the hope of a joyful resurrection. We are indebted to many christian workers for their help and sympathy. The Ven. Archdeacon Boddy continues faithful to his class of elder girls, who look forward to his weekly instructions with much interest and pleasure. Mrs. McGee and her willing workers being in the Sunday School, sowing the seed and by faith waiting for the harvest. It is with extreme regret that the resignation

of Mrs. McGee is accepted, for twenty-five years her work of love has been, from Sunday to Sunday going on, constant and faithful.

The average daily attendance for the year was 63. The children were the happy recipients of 20 books given through the liberality of the late Jessie Ketchum.

To the kindness of the Public School Board, we owe grateful thanks for the rental of the school room.

The want of a good library is greatly felt, in order that the reading of suitable books might be at the disposal of the girls. I feel sure our kind friends only need this hint, and will not forget our empty shelves when rearranging their well supplied book cases.

It is with sorrow that we record the death of a dearly loved honorary member, Mrs. Robt. Gilmor. Her name appears on the original (first) Board of Management formed in 1863. Through all the trying period of the Home's history she was one of its faithful workers and true friend.

I cannot close without expressing our regret at the absence from our annual meeting of our loved first Directress, Mrs. Scott. She is sojourning in Europe for the benefit of her health. Our prayer is, that the means employed to restore her may be blessed, and that we shall soon welcome her home.

REPORT OF INDENTURE CHILDREN FOR 1894.

There are at present 39 children indentured out ; last year there was the same number, but of these 13 have been replaced by fresh children and new homes ; 7 girls were returned to the Home, 3 of them being over 16 years, have been placed out for wages, under my guardianship. Every month they go with me to spend their wages, thereby giving them a chance to select their own clothing and guiding them in the matter of purchases, so that upon attaining the age when they leave our care they may be fitted to spend their money properly. Four have been allowed to return to their own friends, the persons with whom they were indentured being willing they should do so ; two ran away but one was persuaded to return to her place and steps are being taken to bring the other back. In alluding to this case I would mention that we have been criticized for not allowing the relatives of a girl indentured out, to know where she is residing, but this case proves the wisdom of our rule. The girl was in a good place, well cared for and contented. By persistent application and promises of non-interference the lady with whom the girl was indentured at last gave permission for the mother to know where she was. The consequence has been that the mother has induced the girl to run away. No one would encounter the trial, trouble and expense of bringing up one of these children with the certainty that as soon as they attain a useful age the relations would remove them, for if the relatives obtain access to them they render them unhappy and discontented and mistresses are forced to return them, even in cases where they do not run away. In speaking in this wise and advocating total separation between a girl and her mother I may be charged (as I have been) with unwomanly and unmotherly feelings, but when a woman neglects her child and is quite contented to have it away from her during its infancy, and brought up on charity, until the child becomes old enough to earn its own living, then I do *not* believe in the motherly tenderness so suddenly revived. To hear them talk you would suppose we were separating a devoted mother from her child. We have a case at present : the child has been left with us since she was

three years old, she is now thirteen and indentured out and the mother is distracted about it. For years she was quite satisfied to have her brought up on charity, but now that the girl can earn money and is a desirable acquisition, she is determined to obtain possession of her and she has tried every means to do so, and has been a perfect thorn in my side for the last two years.

I am thankful to say the children are all well and, with some few exceptions, seem happy and contented. The fees are all paid up, and I am glad to say that a girl, hitherto thought incorrigible, has become much steadier and is well liked in her place. Another who has repeatedly changed her home is now doing very well, and one who is mentally below the average has greatly improved and writes me nice little letters saying how contented and happy she is. Before closing I must refer to an item published in the *World*, and which (although written to as regards the falseness of the statement) it has not retracted. A girl from our Home, with a dissolute father, had been returned to him with shocking results. The item claimed that it was through the ladies of the Home that this girl was sent to her father. On the contrary we protested against the proceeding, and not till official and governmental strain was brought to bear on us would we give way, and then only when a bond had been entered into and the police specially charged with the oversight of the home. Hearing some reports that all was not right we notified the party who had removed the girl from the Home but was assured that everything was right and the next thing the father was arrested, and the *World* comes forward to charge the ladies with having forced the girl into a dissolute home on the sentimental feeling that she could reform the father. In this case the ladies were not to blame as they only gave the girl up on being forced to do so.

MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL MEETING.

At the hour appointed, four o'clock p.m., the 26th of October, the Lieutenant-Governor and Mrs. Kirkpatrick were welcomed at the entrance of the Girls' Home by the children singing God Save the Queen and presenting their patroness with lovely white chrysanthemums. His Honor was also favored, as were the gentlemen who kindly accepted to take part in the afternoon's programme, by being decorated with a chrysanthemum, to which happy allusions were made.

Mr. Arthur Baldwin opened the meeting with a sympathetic prayer for the past mercies and for a future blessing on the Home.

His Honor, as chairman, expressed the pleasure he enjoyed in being present, alluded to the change in the time of the year for holding the annual meeting, and gave the following reasons for it:—

- 1st. That the published reports, financial and otherwise, of the Home might agree with the report which is required by the Government up to the 30th September.
- 2nd. That the Home might be brought more prominently before the public at the time the collectors are soliciting subscriptions.
- 3rd. That new members may be added to the Board of Management, in order that districts may be assigned them for collection.

4th. That the labour of compiling reports.

The thanks of the retiring Board of Management to the public, was tendered by Mr. Massie, in well chosen and appropriate kindly remarks, seconded by Mr. A. M. Smith, who, though feeble in body, felt he could not miss the opportunity of saying a few words for the ladies who, he knew, worked hard for the cause in which they were interested.

A vote of thanks was passed by Mr. Baldwin to the chairman, who responded with kindly good wishes for the Home's welfare, and expressed with thanks to the managers, the pleasure he had in being present.

Benediction pronounced, the guests adjourned to the dining hall where the children were made happy by being the recipients of a lovely cake, surmounted by the Union Jack, the gift of their Patroness. Having cut the cake a social cup of tea followed, while choice music entertained the guests.

The floral decorations in the school rooms, of colored leaves and berries, were very pretty and the lovely display of palms and flowers in the board room, showed great taste on the part of the teachers and the decorative committee.

The 38th Annual Meeting closed a year of much cause for gratitude.

The unexpected announcement that \$2000 had been bequeathed to the institution caused quite a flutter of surprise and thankfulness, full-filling, as it did, the command, "Be ye doers of His word and not hearers only."

MEDICAL REPORT OF GIRLS' HOME.

The medical staff have very much pleasure in reporting that there have been practically no serious cases of illness in the institution during the past year. Four of the children have been sent away for treatment, viz.: Maggie Knox, who in January broke her leg and was sent to Victoria Hospital; Kate Blackwell, who was sent to the Isolation Hospital with a diphtheritic sore throat, in June; Maud Auttonson, who had granular eye-lids and went to Victoria Hospital in August, and Lillie Plummer, who was also sent to the Children's Hospital, in August, for treatment of an abscess. These children have all again returned to the Home and are in excellent health.

Treatment of the ring-worm cases have been vigorously carried out and with excellent results. Of the twenty-one children who were isolated with this obstinate disease at the beginning of the year there now remain only eight, and four of those are practically well though still isolated.

In July, in accordance with instructions received from the Board of Health, all of those who had not previously been attended to, were vaccinated. Fifty-two in all were vaccinated and in every case successfully.

We have only one death, that of Emily Patterson, who for a year had been in the Victoria Hospital for Children, suffering from pulmonary phthisis, to which she succumbed on April 14th.

At the October meeting of the Lady Managers the Medical Officer in charge recommended the removal of the worn-out block pavement covering the premises in the rear of the institution and the substitution thereof of grass or gravel. This was promptly complied with and the change, we are sure, will be a beneficial one from a sanitary point of view.

We again desire to thank Mrs. Bright and her assistants for their watchful care of the children and for the thoroughness with which medical directions have been carried out by all the attendants.

YOUR HONOR,—

Dear friends,—In presenting our 39th report we fear it must necessarily appear to you, as the same old story.

While admitting this we feel we owe, and we trust you will join with us in grateful acknowledgements to our Heavenly Father who has continued His loving, watchful care over us, and rejoice with us for the measure of prosperity which has fallen to our portion, and for the continued usefulness of the Home.

It could scarcely be expected that it would pass through another year of general depression without sharing some of the trials incident to hard times, which the Treasurer's statement will bring prominently before you. We hope that returning prosperity will enable all to continue their good deeds and give an opportunity to many others to bestow *true charity*, "a plant divinely nursed, its fruits on earth, its growth in heaven."

At the beginning of the year there were 103 children in residence; admitted during the year, 68; discharged, 73. On Sept. 30th, 1895, 98 names were on the register, showing a total of 171 having been in the Home during the year.

We feel a pleasure in knowing that our Home is open to all classes, the wanderer, the erring one. We have orphans of respectable parents, children of struggling mothers, deprived of the help and care which makes them feel their helplessness so great; we have motherless children whose fathers, in trying to earn their support, miss the help-meet who kept the home in order, and sacrificing their feeling to the children's good, commit them to our care; and we have little ones orphaned in the saddest sense, whose only idea of home is the care and protection received whilst sheltered in this Institution. All are welcome.

We have also had children admitted temporarily whose widowed mothers had to be sent to Hospital for treatment. When health was restored we gave them their loved ones back. The joyful reunions, with the expressive look and broken thanks for the protection and care bestowed upon them, showed the appreciation they felt for the helping hand in their season of affliction.

It is gratifying to know that the majority of our Indentured girls are appreciated. In several instances where one is sent to any locality applications for others followed. This phase of philanthropic work requires great tact and thoroughness. The applications far out-number the going-out children, and having a choice of *home*, the surroundings are all considered in connection with the disposition, character and ability of the child to be sent. Applications for adoption are frequent and it will be a subject for the consideration of the new Board whether it would be well to give children for adoption as well as indenture, as loving, kind hearts have had to seek elsewhere for little ones to cherish and to bring up as their own.

We owe grateful thanks to the Ven. Archdeacon Boddy and the Rev. Arthur Baldwin for their zealous efforts in the spiritual welfare of the children, and to that band of christian workers in the Sunday school, who so faithfully devote themselves every Sunday to the children's good.

Some lives there are to Angels' seem akin,
Dwelling on earth yet keeping ever near the golden city's gates
So they may hear the harmony before they enter in.

The average daily attendance in the day school was 84. This school is still under the able management of Miss McKee and Miss McMaster who continue most faithfully

"To pour the fresh instruction o'er the mind,
To breathe the enlivening spirit and to fix
The generous purpose in the glowing breast."

The annual prayer meeting which inaugurates the opening of the Home was an especially happy one. It being children's day they were assembled in the Board room and sang some beautiful hymns. Kind friends, clergymen of different denominations, gave short addresses on

obedience, love and prayer, which latter was called "the poetry of language," to pray from the heart and with hearts purified learn the blessing of service. This devotional hour was felt to be one of blessing to all present.

To those who made Christmas a joy in the Home our grateful thanks are tendered; to the friends of the Punch and Judy entertainment, which brought merry peals of laughter from the wondering little ones; to Mr. Harold Jarvis, who most kindly contributed to the evening's pleasure by singing for us in his usual sympathetic and hearty style, we owe sincere thanks.

To Mr. Osler we are deeply indebted for many kindnesses, but especially would we refer to the enjoyable drive of two hours round the city and for the crowning treat of a "grand garden party." The remembrance of these pleasures had to suffice for the summer for although many kind outings were planned for the children they could not be accepted owing to an epidemic of measles in June, followed by one of scarletina. As cases developed they were immediately sent to the Isolation Hospital where they received every attention. We take this opportunity to publicly thank the officers in charge for their kindness. Fresh cases appearing in September they were also deprived of their long looked for treat, "a day at the Exhibition."

To our medical staff we are deeply indebted for daily visiting and prompt action to alleviate suffering.

The Home is in a sanitary condition and the rules of the health officer have been most rigidly enforced. It is expected that with the clear bracing air of autumn all fear will be removed.

To our Solicitor, Mr. Neville, our thanks are again due for wise counsel in matters of great importance. To Mr. Richard Lee, for kindness in auditing the Treasurers statement.

To Mrs. Coleman and all those subscribers and friends who have in any way contributed to the well-being of the Home, or the pleasure and comfort of its inmates, the management pray that God will abundantly prosper you and that His blessing will rest upon you and your good works.

Kind thanks are herewith expressed to the proprietors of the *Globe*, *Mail-Empire*, and *News*, for notices on behalf of the Home, free of charge. The Managers also most gratefully acknowledge the Government grant and that of the City Council.

Mrs. Bright is still with us, her health was not robust during part of the year but she has quite recovered and with thankful hearts we feel her capacity and kindness cannot be too highly appreciated in the responsible position she holds. She is ably assisted in the duties of the Home by Mrs. Bowers and Miss McMillan, who have our respect.

While the Managers have much cause to be thankful yet it is with sincere regret that they miss from their Annual Meeting to-day the genial, kindly face of *one* who was ever present on these occasions, and who always manifested his interest in the Home by "helping to bear the burden." We shall long remember the late Mr. A. M. Smith.

The earnest hope is that as these faithful friends are called to receive the welcome "enter thou into the joy of thy Lord," others may come forward to fill the vacant chair, and by their example influence others "to do good."

It is our pleasure to welcome home and have with us to-day our First Directress, Mrs. Scott. She has been connected with the work for over twenty years. Her judgment and knowledge eminently qualify her for the position she now occupies.

The collectors will soon be at your doors; may we ask for them a welcome and an increased liberality, enabling us to carry on this important work of relieving the hungry, sheltering the homeless, raising the dark cloud that hangs over the lonely and weary, by showing them the "silver lining" in kind deeds, and encouraging them to look unto Him who said "I will never forsake thee."

REPORT OF INDENTURE CHILDREN FOR 1895.

There are at present 35 children indentured out, all of them in Ontario, with the exception of two, whose mistresses having moved away and the girls being willing to follow them, we have given permission to them to do so. Out of the 35 children, only two are discontented and these do not complain of ill-treatment, or hard service, but have been rendered discontented by the mothers who having neglected them in youth, are now professing the fondest affection, and urging them to break their indentures and return to them. One of them has done so, and although she has been thrown on the charity of Toronto since she was three years old, and her mother only reclaimed her now when she is fifteen, and able to earn money, yet unless at the cost of an expensive action at law, we have been unable to force the mother to restore her to the person to whom she was indentured.

I draw attention to this case, as the Ontario Legislature having these cases in mind, formulated an act last session through which we hoped to prevent this again happening. This Act has proved a broken reed, by the insertion of the clause "that the parents must sign away their right to the child."

Some of the parents, when we take their children are in jail, some having deserted their families, are in distant countries and have left no clue by which we might have them, yet it seems they can return when the children are grown up, and give us endless trouble

It is to be hoped at the next session of Parliament, this will be remedied. The greatest care is taken in the selection of homes for our girls, and I have many letters testifying to the kindness and care of those with whom we have placed them. I subjoin one from a girl whose indentures have expired. I correspond with the girls, and can always give the relatives true and particular accounts of each girl, and they can always correspond through me if they wish to do so. We have to regard the right of those who having taken children from this home whilst young and useless, have fed, clothed and taught them through years of helplessness. Six girls during the past year have attained the age of

eighteen, and have had the usual sum of money paid over to them. I am glad to say these indenture fees are all fully paid up. The girls look back with pleasure to their residence in the Home, and have a most affectionate remembrance of Mrs. Bright, Mrs. Bowers and the other officers of the Home. I am thankful to say that during my term of office now of four years duration, we have had no deaths, and only one or two cases of slight illness among our indenture children. I think this speaks well not only for the homes in which we have placed them, but also for the care and attention they receive in "Our Home" before leaving so that they are strong, healthy and well fitted to begin the battle of life.

MEDICAL REPORT OF GIRLS' HOME.

Ladies,—Until within the last three months there were but few cases of sickness in the institution.

Lillie White was sent to Victoria Hospital with pneumonia on October 26th, 1894, and returned November 24th, 1894. Edith Nunnely, also with pneumonia, went to the Children's Hospital November 20th, 1894, and returned December 4th, 1894.

In March the three were sent to the Toronto 30th, Katie Blackwell, Lillie Milligan was not and has not yet returned.

On June 21st Emma she was removed to Victoria.

Early in June a case removed to the Isolation. On the same day a second until the end of August until about forty had been of the children were admitted all but two cases, which these not recovering until attention and are now

On August 28th a case of scarlet fever. She has been followed by several. These children are all returned shortly.

Since the outbreak admitted to the Home any public gatherings.

The general health the epidemics would prevent.

We have again to efficient aid in all cases vigilance exercised by way and have most seen

In March the three children who were still affected with ringworm were sent to the Toronto General Hospital. Nelly Sully returned April 30th, Katie Blackwell May 13th, and Lillie Milligan May 17th. As Lillie Milligan was not entirely cured she was sent back to the Hospital and has not yet returned.

On June 21st Emma Duffin fell down stairs and injured her leg; she was removed to Victoria Hospital and returned July 31st.

Early in June a case of measles occurred. The child was at once removed to the Isolation Hospital whence she returned about July 15th. On the same day a second child contracted the disease and from then until the end of August one after another of the children was taken ill until about forty had had it. The disease was of a mild type and none of the children were at any time seriously ill. Recovery was perfect in all but two cases, where the eyes remained weak and inflamed, and these not recovering under ordinary treatment were sent to have special attention and are now steadily improving.

On August 28th a child was found to be suffering from a light form of scarlet fever. She was removed to the Isolation Hospital and has been followed by seven others, the last one having gone Sept. 30th. These children are all making good recoveries and some of them will return shortly

Since the outbreak of measles neither children nor visitors have been admitted to the Home, nor have the children been allowed to attend any public gatherings.

The general health of the children is good. Had it been otherwise the epidemics would probably have assumed a much more severe form.

We have again to thank Mrs. Bright and her assistants for their efficient aid in all cases of illness among the children. But for the vigilance exercised by them disease might often gain considerable headway and have most serious consequences.

CONSTITUTION OF THE GIRLS' HOME.

1. This Institution shall be called the "GIRLS' HOME," and have for its object the rescue from vice of young girls, and the bestowal of careful attention to their religious, moral and temporal welfare; also the maintenance and support of girls from two to fourteen years of age.

2. Children are given out to parties furnishing suitable references; on payment of five dollars in advance and five dollars per annum till the child is fifteen, then ten, fifteen and twenty dollars for the next three years respectively; these sums, except the first, to be invested for the said child's benefit and given to her at the expiration of her term of service.

3. The management shall be trusted to a Committee of not more than forty-five ladies, chosen at the Annual Meeting, out of which shall be elected by ballot Directresses, Treasurer, Secretary, Corresponding Secretary, and Superintendent of Districts. All vacancies shall be filled by ballot, on a majority vote at a monthly meeting after at least one week's notice. Should it happen at any meeting that no Directress be present, then the ladies in attendance, if sufficient to form a quorum, may elect some one of their number to take the chair, the lady so appointed to have, for the time being, the same authority in all respects as Directress.

4. No alteration shall be made in this Constitution, except at the Annual Meeting; and notice of any proposed alteration must always be given to the Board, at least one month previous to such Annual Meeting.

RULES FOR THE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT OF THE GIRLS' HOME.

1. Regular meetings of the Board of Managers shall be held every Tuesday, at 10.30 a.m., the first Tuesday in the month being the day of the Monthly Meeting, for which all important business shall be deferred. Special meetings may be called by the Secretary, upon an order from the 1st Directress, or, in her absence, at the request of any three members.

2. All meetings shall be opened and closed with prayer, and be opened as soon after the appointed hour as a quorum shall be present, which shall consist of five members at a Monthly and three at a Weekly Meeting, being conducted in the following order:

1st. The Secretary shall read the minutes of the preceding meeting, which shall be signed, or in case of a Monthly Meeting, all the meetings during the past month; inform the meeting of any correspondence that has taken place, and read the general Reports of the condition of the Institution.

2nd. The presiding lady shall place all resolutions before the meeting, declare the decision to the Secretary, and, if an equality of votes occur, give the casting one, in addition to her vote as member of the Board.

3. As soon as the meeting is opened (when a quorum is formed) all conversation not addressed to the presiding lady shall be pronounced by her to be out of order, and stopped.

4. Any lady allowing three months to pass without being present, or notifying her inability to attend to the Secretary, shall have her name struck off the list of the Managing Committee.

5. The Treasurer shall receive and take charge of all moneys belonging to the Institution, as well as the children's fees, keeping account of the same. All accounts shall be brought by her before the meeting of the Managers every month.

6. The Corresponding Secretary shall keep account of all children given out from the Home, and correspond with them at least once a year, and shall keep account of and read all correspondence respecting them, at the Board Meetings.

7. The Secretary of Districts shall arrange with the collectors all details of the districts to be visited, and take charge of the lists of subscription in the Annual Report.

8. The Secretary shall direct all the correspondence, keep account, as far as practicable, of all the children in the Institution—giving a general report thereof at the Monthly Meeting, at which she shall regularly attend, but never be called upon to preside, minute the proceedings, and take the names of the ladies present.

9. Two members of the Committee shall be appointed by the Secretary to visit the Home daily each week, ascertain from the Matron the behaviour of the children, as well as whatever may be requisite for them and for the house, and report the same at the Regular Weekly Meetings. The 1st Directress, Treasurer, Corresponding Secretary, and Secretary shall not be of the number of Daily Visitors.

10. Any three Managers, including a Directress, may admit applicants up to the age of fourteen, with the doctor's certificate insuring them to be free from disease.

RULES AND REGULATIONS FOR THE MATRON AND CHILDREN OF THE GIRLS' HOME.

1. The Matron shall be competent to take charge of all the children, as well as to conduct the household affairs generally, and also to instruct the girls between the ages of five and fourteen, in sewing, knitting and household work.
2. She shall admit any applicant not younger than two years, or older than fourteen, upon the doctor's certificate—subject always to the approval of the Board.
3. The charge for each child of such parents or friends who are able to pay, shall be \$5 per month, unless an exceptional case should occur. If more than one child of the same parent or friend gain admittance, a reduction may be made as approved by the ladies of the Weekly Committee.
4. The Matron shall daily inspect the cleanliness of the children, see that they attend the day school punctually and regularly, and every morning and evening conduct family prayers.
5. The children shall rise at 6 a.m. from May 1st to October 31st, and at 7 a.m. from November 1st to April 30th. The time for going to rest to be from 5 to 8 p.m.
Children under fourteen are not allowed to wash or scrub more than three hours a day.
6. Meals to be at regular hours. Breakfast at 8 a.m.; dinner at 12; tea at 5 p.m. Grace to be said before and after meals by the elder children. The Matron and one servant to be present.
7. All children of age to do so, shall regularly attend Sunday-School, and also Divine Service once every Sunday, in charge of the Matron, or some other competent person, and in the afternoon attend the Sunday-school in the Institution.
8. Parents or friends of the children shall be admitted to visit them on Wednesday afternoon from 3 until 5 o'clock. Persons wishing to come on other days must obtain a permit from the Board.
9. The Home shall be open to the public any afternoon during the week.

TERMS OF INDENTURE OF THE GIRLS' HOME.

Parties taking a child from the Home are required to provide the said child, during the whole period of service,—viz., till the child is eighteen years of age—with all necessary and proper food, clothing, lodgings, medicine and medical attendance, to bring her up in the principles of the Protestant religion, to pay due attention to her moral and spiritual culture, and to allow her to attend Sunday School and place of worship regularly, to instruct the child in reading, writing, and plain needle work, and in general household duties, to pay into the Home in advance, the sum of five dollars; and at the end of the first and each year of service until the child attains the age of fourteen, the sum of five dollars; when fifteen, ten dollars; when sixteen, fifteen dollars; when seventeen, twenty dollars; which money is invested by the Board for the child's benefit; and further, to provide the said child, at the expiration of her term of service with a good new suit of clothes. In case, through protracted illness or death, or any other cause, the parties fail to carry out their various obligations, the Home reserve to themselves the right of resuming their control over the child, or of taking such measures to secure her rights as they may deem necessary.

In case the parties taking a child shall not be satisfied with her, they have the power of returning her to the Home, after satisfying the Board that such action would be to the interest of all concerned.
