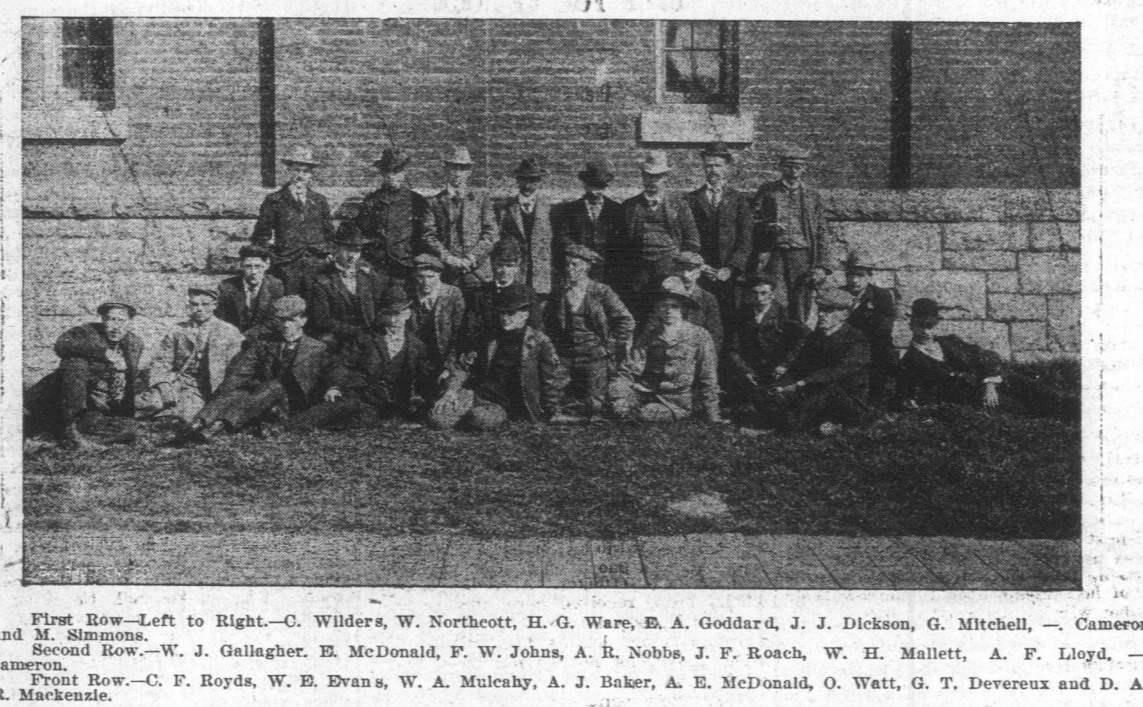

Second, that on account of the physical configuration of the country, and the peculiar conditions which exist, the cost of administration is many times greater than it is in other provinces.

Third, that on account of our remoteness from the wholesale centres of the East, from which we receive a very large percentage of our supplies, the freight rates impose an additional burden which is not felt in Eastern Canada.

As has been announced by the Premier, Sir Wilfrid Laurier has agreed to a second conference, which will take place this fall, at which, with more leisure at their disposal, the two governments will go more fully into the case.

An increase in these items over last year, of say \$544,093, and if we deduct the amount of public works, \$310,000, we arrive at an increased expenditure for administration and carrying on government during the year of \$234,093.

In other words the revenue for 1901 shows an increase of about 7 per cent, whilst the increase in items just noted, \$234,093, or 22 per cent. I might here call attention to the enormous increase in civil government salaries in 1901, \$50,400, and in 1900, \$40,000, in two years nearly \$100,000 for salaries alone.

Now let us turn to the abstract of the revenue and expenditure for the six months ending 31st last: We find the expenditure \$1,325,500.93, and the receipts \$741,245.19, making an additional deficit of \$584,255.74.

Turning to the estimates for the year ending 30th June, 1902, we find the Finance Minister calculates to receive \$2,140,751.05, nearly \$400,000 more than in 1901, yet the first six months yield only \$741,245.19. Then again, he estimates for the remainder of the financial year 1902, at \$2,480,135.50, and in this first six months has spent \$1,325,999.93, or in other words, the proportionate half spent during the year of \$2,140,751, by about \$300,000, while the estimate is \$100,000 in excess.
