

## REPORT OF THE GRAND CHANCELLOR.

OFFICE OF THE GRAND CHANCELLOR, GRAND LODGE OF ONTABIO, K.P., WINDSOR, June 10th, 1884.

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## Officers, Representatives and Past Chancellors :

In accordance with custom and the requirements of the Constitution, I have the pleasure of submitting my Report as Grand Chancellor for the past year.

Another Pythian Period has quickly passed, and through the blessing of Divine Providence we are again permitted to assemble together at this our 13th Annual Session to exchange fraternal greetings, to review the record of the past, and to legislate anew for the promotion of harmony, the securing of the permanency and the advancement of the interests of our beloved Order in Ontario. May devotion to the principles of our Order, a deep and abiding interest in its perpetuity, and a correct appreciation of our responsibilities actuate us one and all in a sincere and earnest endeavour to apply ourselves to the duties devolving upon us, that we may arrive at conclusions which shall eventuate in lasting benefit to the Order universal, and those we have the honour to represent.

In meeting together again around our Pythian Altar let us. at the threshold of our deliberations, with grateful hearts acknowledge our thanks to the Supreme Chancellor above for the preservation and advancement of our Order ; and, conscious of our dependence, seek guidance and wisdom from Him in our legislation.

### APPOINTMENT OF DISTRICT DEPUTIES.

REPORTS FROM DISTRICT DEPUTIES.

(The Reports from District\_Deputies (excepting Port Arthur, from whom I have at this writing received no report) generally show a gratifying increase of membership, financial soundness, efficiency in work and continued interest in the Order.

## OFFICIAL CORRESPONDENCE.

Although the number of Lodges in the jurisdiction is small, I have had a large amount of correspondence, and have endeavoured to give prompt attention to all communications.

Copies of all my official communications, comprising nearly 250 letters, and covering 450 letter pages, are submitted in Letter Books B and C.

NEW LODGES.

Having received an application from Harrow, Essex County, in the organization of which I received invaluable assistance from P.C. George Pearce and Bro. W. G. Baldwin, of Friendship Lodge, No. 16, of Windsor, both of whom joined the new Lodge by card, I granted a dispensation for a Charter, and on September 7th, accompanied by P.G.C. C. A. Mack, of Detroit, and twelve Knights from Friendship Lodge, I visited that village and instituted Erie Lodge, No. 21, with thirteen charter members, and installed the following officers :

I also issued a Commission to P.C. W. G. Baldwin, to act as my Deputy.

I received valuable assistance on this, as on many other occasions, from P. G. C. C. A. Mack, of Detroit. His services have always been at my disposal when required, and I take this opportunity of publicly acknowledging his knightly courtesies.

February 9th, I received an application through P. C. F. J. Fitzgerald, London East, signed by eleven members of Myrtle Lodge, No. 2, of London, accompanied with withdrawal cards, asking for a dispensation for a new Lodge in London East. I granted the dispensation, and on February 19th, accompanied by Bros. Grosscup, Lowe and Howson, of Friendship Lodge, I visited London East, was joined there by Grand Vice-Chancellor D. J. Peace, of Hamilton, and instituted Mizpah Lodge, No. 22, with fifteen charter members, and installed the following officers :

I issued a Commission as D. D. G. C. to Bro. F. J. Fitzgerald, to whom, and Bro. Poulton, credit is due for the organization of this Lodge, and their careful attention to all the details preparatory to the work of institution. I am also indebted to the brothers from Windsor and V. G. C. Peace, of Hamilton, for their kind assistance on this occasion, and to the brothers of the new Lodge for their hospitable entertainment after the close of the ceremonies. I would respectfully recommend that Charters be granted to these two new Lodges.

### RESUSCITATION OF OLD LODGES.

#### Port Arthur.

A desire having been expressed by members of the Order in Port Arthur to resuscitate the Lodge in that distant portion of our jurisdiction, after consultation with the Executive Officers, it was deemed advisable that I should make an official visit to that point, and also visit Sault Ste. Marie, and endeavour to resuscitate these Lodges, which had been dormant for a number of years past, although they had never surrendered their charters or returned their properties.

On October 9th I left Windsor hoping to accomplish my object and arrive home in about ten days, but having the misfortune to be shipwrecked on the steamer "Ontario," which ran on the rocks and was sunk in Lake Huron, near Port Elgin, necessitating an enforced camping on the beach and a delay of a week awaiting another steamer, I did not arrive in Port Arthur until the night of Sunday, the 21st.

Owing to a difficulty in securing a lodge room we could not get a meeting until Wednesday evening, the 24th, when, assisted by Bros. Frier and Leishman, of Winnipeg Lodge, No. 1, and Bro. C. B. Brown, of Mariola Lodge, of Marion, Ohio, whom I was fortunate in meeting there, and assisted by old members of Crusader Lodge, I conferred the Page, Esquire and Knight Ranks on three new candidates.

On the next night, Thursday, 25th, I conferred the three ranks on six candidates, and installed the following officers of Crusader Lodge No. 5:

### Sault Ste. Marie.

On my way to Port Arthur I called on a number of the old members of Algoma Lodge No. 11, and made arrangements to resuscitate that Lodge on my return journey; but owing to the great amount of detention, and ascertaining it would cause me another week's delay, I was reluctantly compelled to forego the pleasure it would have otherwise afforded me, and I commissioned Bro. Wm. Turner, as D. D. G. C., to act for me, and Algoma Lodge No. 11 was resuscitated on November 19th, and the following officers were installed

Too much credit cannot be accorded to Bro. Turner for the zeal he has manifested in the work of again placing Algoma Lodge on a good footing.

#### Chatham.

Yesterday, June 9th, accompanied by Past Chancellor Armstrong, of Detroit, and Representatives Hatch, of No. 1, and Smith, of No. 4, Toronto, I visited Chatham and resuscitated Marmion Lodge No. 15. Seven candidates were initiated, six of whom also received the Esquire and Knight Ranks. In addition to these and the old members, several Knights were admitted by card. I installed the following officers:

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OFFICIAL VISITATIONS.

Recognizing the importance of official visits for the purpose of exemplifying the secret work and assimilating the same in the various Lodges, I have devoted what time was at my command in visiting all the Lodges in the jurisdiction; and, when practicable, installed the officers, and exemplified the work in the different ranks.

On October 2nd, I visited Mystic Lodge No. 1, Toronto, work being done in the three ranks. P. G. C. and S. R. G. H. Mitchell in the C. C. chair is sufficient evidence that it was done efficiently.

October 3rd, I visited Ivanhoe Lodge No. 4, Toronto, and conferred the third rank.

November 14th, I again visited Ivanhoe Lodge, Toronto.

November 15th, I paid an official visit to Charity Lodge No. 20, of St. Catharines, conferring the Page rank and exemplifying all the secret work.

November 19th, I visited Red Cross Lodge, of Hamilton, conferring the Esquire and exemplifying the other ranks.

January 2nd, I installed the officers in Ivanhoe Lodge, Toronto; and performed a like duty in Friendship Lodge, Windsor, January 7th.

January 8th, I visited Myrtle No. 2, in London, and installed the officers. May 21st, I met members of Mystic and Ivanhoe Lodges, in Toronto, in joint session.

Thursday, May 22nd, paid an official visit to Charity Lodge No. 20, St. Catharines, and exemplified all the secret work.

Friday, May 23rd, visited conjointly the members of Myrtle No. 2, and Mizpah No. 22, in London East, conferring the Page and Esquire ranks.

May 25th, I officially visited Red Cross Lodge No. 3, of Hamilton, accompanied by V. G. C. Peace and G. P. Vale, and, assisted by these officers, conferred the Esquire and Knight ranks on two candidates.

I have made three official visits to Erie Lodge No. 21, at Harrow, including the institution, viz., September 7th, September 18th and December 4th.

Chatham has been visited four times in connection with the reorganization of a Lodge there.

Friendship Lodge, of Windsor, having honored me by re-election to the C. C. chair for four successive terms, it is needless to state the fact that I have appreciated the honor, and was absent from my post only when the more responsible duties as your Executive head called me elsewhere. These visitations, in connection with the official visit to Port Arthur and Sault Ste. Marie (comprising a journey by rail and steamer of about 1,600 miles, necessitating an enforced absence of 21 days), besides two visits to Sarnia, have been supplemented by unofficial visits to Lodges in Michigan, and a visit to New Orleans during the late session of the Supreme Lodge.

### OFFICIAL DECISIONS AND RULINGS.

As has been the case with my predecessors, many communications from the various Lodges have been received asking for rulings on minor matters on which a simple reference to the Subordinate Lodge Constitution and Bylaws would render clear; and since the publication of the Revised Official Digest, prepared by S. R. R. E. Cowan, rendering questions of law easily accessible and decided, I trust members will-avail themselves of the opportunity afforded them of reference to this channel. All the Lodges in the jurisdiction have, at my suggestion, been furnished with copies by the G. K. R. & S.

I submit for your approval questions received, and my rulings and decisions thereon :

#### From Myrtle Lodge No. 2, London.

1. QUE.—"Can a brother in arrears be legally elected as one of a Committee to investigate charges against a brother?"

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# Grand Lodge of Ontario.

ANS.-No. (See Art. x., sec. 11, of Constitution.)

2. QUE.-" Can a member of such Committee give evidence before the Committee of which he is a member ?" Ans.-Yes.

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3.  $Qv_{E,--}$  Is there a form of oath or obligation for witnesses?"

Ans.-No. Witnesses shall testify on their honor; and if Knights, on their honor as such.

4. QUE.—" Should the evidence be read to a witness and signed by him ?" Ans.-Not necessarily. All the evidence should be reduced to writing

by the Committee and read over to the witnesses for approval or correction. 5. QUE.—" Does it require all the members of the Committee to be present at the investigation of a charge ?"

Ans.-In the absence of one or more members, the majority of the

whole may proceed with the investigation.

6. QUE.-" Should witnesses be excluded from the room except when being examined ?" ANS.-Yes.

7. QUE .- "Are meetings of the Committee open to members of the Lodge?"

Ans.-No. No person other than a witness under examination, the parties to the charge (accuser and accused), with their counsel, and the members of the Committee should be present during the proceedings.

8. QUE.--- ' Art. xii., sec. 11.-- ' Every member not interested '-- Who does this mean ? P

Ans .-- Accuser and accused only.

9. QUE.—" In the event of a brother being elected to serve on such Committee to replace one disqualified or resigning, shall the fact of the change annul the previous organization of the Committee and the election of chair-

Axs.-No. The filling of a vacancy does not affect its standing or organization.

10. QUE.—" Is it imperative on the chairman to notify each and every member of such Committee and witnesses in writing to attend an adjourned meeting, they being verbally instructed by the chairman to attend, hour, place, and date being mentioned by him at the adjournment ?"

Ans.-The verbal summons of the chairman under such circumstances is sufficient for all who were present.

An adjournment sine die would require a written notification.

11. QUE.-" Can counsel for plaintiff or defendant have the case adjourned from time to time on petty excuses?" Ans.-It is a matter for the Committee to decide whether such applica-

tions are reasonable and valid.

12. QUE.—" Is the chairman of Committee entitled to vote as a member as well as give a casting vote as chairman?"

An -Yes. In all cases where his vote would affect the result, or when the vote is by ballot, it is his privilege.

13. Que.—" Has a D. D. G. C. a right to look over the books of the Lodge at any time to satisfy himself as to a brother's standing?"

Ans.-Yes.

14. QUE.—" Has a D. D. G. C. the authority to give a decision verbally to the Lodge?"

Ass.—No. (See Art. v., sec. 12, G. L. Constitution.) All communications from Lodges to him and his answers should be made in writing.

In answer to a request from Myrtle Lodge No. 2, of London, for another year's extension of the dispensation granted them by my predecessor to confer the three ranks on candidates for \$6; I replied as follows :

"I feel that in justice to your membership and the Order at large, I must respectfully decline my official sanction to such extension. Under your by-laws, as stated in your communication, you guarantee to your members \$3 per week sick benefits; \$40 funeral benefits, and \$40 annually to the widow of a deceased brother, whilst the annual dues paid by members amount to only \$6 per annum. In undertaking the noble mission for which our beloved Order was instituted, viz., to visit and care for the sick, to bury the dead, to care for the widow and educate the orphan, we, as Knights of Pythias, are assuming grave responsibilities, and must, in justice to those dear ones whose future is in our keeping, conduct the business of our Lodges on business principles, and make provision for the possibilities and inevitable responsibilities of the future. From the Financial and Numerical Reports from your Lodge to Grand Lodge for the year ending December 30th, 1882, I find you had at the latter date a membership of 59; that during the year you had expended in relief \$139.50, and that although your receipts from all sources amounted during the year to \$469.33, the total amount of funds on hand and invested by your Lodge amounted only to \$83.59. I submit these figures to the earnest, careful consideration of your Lodge membership, in a spirit of Pythian friendship, and would urge upon them the absolute necessity-having due regard to the duties they have assumed-to discount the certainties of the future by increasing rather than reducing the fees for ranks, and grading the dues from all new members according to age, as has been wisely done in most of the other Lodges."

### From Charity Lodge No. 20, St. Catharines.

[Letter Book C, 5.]

1. QUE.—" On the 18th July, 'A,' a member of this Lodge, was taken sick, and went the next day to a health resort in New York State for treatment, and was away about four weeks; on his return he submitted the following certificate to the Visiting Committee:—'August 11th: This is to 188

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certify that 'A' has been under medical care for four successive weeks in July and August of this year, and during that time was not able to work." He did not apply personally or in writing, the Visiting Committee reporting him entitled to four weeks' benefits, and they were granted by the Lodge. 'B' objects to payment on the grounds that 'A' did not comply with Art. ix., sec. 4, of the Constitution, and that the certificate presented is invalid ?"

I ruled as follows on this question :

1st. The payment of weekly benefits is a distinguishing character, and may be regarded as a fundamental principle of our Order; and such benefits as may be provided by the Constitution and By-laws of Subordinate Lodges are secured to their members as rights and not as charities, through the contribution of certain stipulated dues by all such members at regular and

2nd. A member sick and entitled to receive benefits from his Lodge does not forfeit his right to the same (he still remaining sick) by leaving the country under the advice of his physician for the purpose of endeavouring

3rd. A sick brother does not forfeit his right to benefits by leaving the jurisdiction of the Relief Committee of his lodge without their consent or the

4th. Art. ix., sec. 4, does not apply to this case, "A" residing within the jurisdiction of his Lodge when taken sick, and merely removing temporarily for the purpose of restoring his health.

5th. It was not essential or necessary for "A" to apply personally or in writing to the Lodge for his benefits on his return, such being the duty of

6th. The Relief Committee having reported to the Lodge that "A" was<sub>i</sub>entitled to receive four weeks' benefits, they must apply for an order to be drawn for the amount he is entitled to under the By-laws at the next

7th. The physician's certificate in this case is valid and legal.

2. QUE.-""A' became sick on Friday, October 5th, and did not go to his work. He instructed 'B' (a member of the Lodge) to report him as sick to the Lodge, which met same evening, but 'B' does not attend, and therefore 'A' is not reported sick that evening. 'B' informs the Chairman of the Visiting Committee on Monday, the 8th, and on same day the C. C. visits him and finds him sick. On Friday, 12th, the Visiting Committee report 'A' entitled to one week's benefit, \$4. The Lodge refuses to accept the report of the Committee, and whilst admitting that 'A' was sick during the stated time claim that 'A' was only entitled to receive \$2 according to Art. vi. of the By-laws, he having failed to report himself sick to the Lodge at the first regular meeting after he became sick. (1.) Must the brother report himself to the Lodge or the Visiting Committee? (2.) What does the term 'during such time ' mean in Art. vi., in By-laws ?"

Ass.—(1.) The fact of Brother "A" having reported himself sick to a member of his Lodge was equivalent to a report to the Lodge to all intents and purposes, it being further evidenced by the fact that the Visiting Committee acted thereon, and reported his case at the next regular meeting. (2.) During his sickness or disability.

RULING.—" A " is justly entitled to one week's benefit, \$4, as prescribed by the By-laws, Art. vi., sec. 1, for each full week's duration of such sickless or disability (he being otherwise qualified).

3. A Committee appointed to investigate charges against a member has concluded the taking of testimony and given notice to the Lodge of its intention to bring in a report at the next Convention.

QUE.--" Should said Committee's recommendation only refer to the question of Guilty or Not Guilty; or should it in addition recommend the punishment, if the former?"

Ass.—The Committee should report to the Lodge the result of the investigation, with resolutions covering the punishment which they recom-< mend the Lodge to adopt. When the report is read, the accused should be permitted to make his statement, the Committee being allowed to reply, and the Lodge then votes upon the resolutions of the Committee.

4. At a regular Convention of the Lodge a motion was passed to loan a brother \$20 without security, repayable within a year from date.

Q UE - ``Is such loan legal under the By-laws? Does it not require notice of motion ?''

Ass.—(1.) There is nothing under your By-laws (see Art. ix., secs. 4 and 6) to prevent the loaning of money to a brother by the Lodge; but the Constitution, Art. ii., sec. 4, provides that it requires the consent of twothirds of the valid votes cast. Art. iv., sec. 10, of the Constitution, provides that the Lodge Trustees shall invest in such loans, stocks or other securities as the Lodge may direct. (2.) Notice of motion is required (see By-laws, Art. ix., sec. 4), in voting donations for all sums exceeding \$10, and does not apply to an investment or loan.

5. QUE.—" Does any appropriation (for fitting up a Lodge room) require notice of motion ?"

ANS.—This is a matter for local legislation, and your By-laws contain no provision requiring such notice.

6. QUE.--(1.) "Has a Lodge the right to do with its 'general fund' what it pleases ?" (2.) "Are there no restrictions ?"

Axs.-(1.) The disposition of Lodge funds is a proper subject of local legislation. (2.) Not unless provided in Lodge By-laws. A Lodge has a perfect right by vote of its members at a regular convention to instruct its Trustees or a Special Committee to furnish, loan or rent Lodge room. 188

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BY-LAWS. I have approved of By laws submitted by Erie Lodge No. 21, and also of Revision of By-laws by Friendship Lodge No. 16, copies of which are

An addition to By-laws of Charity Lodge No. 20, providing for the

election of a Medical Examiner or Lodge Physician, was approved by me. Art. vi., sec. 1, of their, By laws reads as follows :-Sick Benefits-Every Knight who is a member of this Lodge for six months, and who is in good standing, if tendered incapable of following his usual occupation by sickness or other disability, not caused by intemperance or immoral conduct of any kind, shall receive a benefit of \$4 per week during such sickness or disability, provided always that any brother a resident of this city, or within three miles of it, being sick or disabled, and not reporting the fact to the Lodge during such time, shall receive the sum of \$2 per week, and then only after producing full and sufficient proof of such sickness or

An amendment was submitted to me by the Lodge for approval, providing for the striking out of the words 'during such time,' and inserting

the words 'within three days,' to which I refused assent, ruling as follows: I cannot sanction this amendment. It is not in accordance with the tenets and principles of our Order that an unfortunate sick brother, otherwise beneficial, should be deprived of his just benefits for omitting, perhaps unavoidably on his part, or on account of physical inability, to report his illness to the Lodge in such a limited time. Owing to a sudden accident or severe illness a brother might be rendered unconscious or insensible, and his friends not knowing the necessity of immediately reporting the fact to the Lodge, he would, on a harsh and arbitrary technicality, be deprived of benefits perhaps essential to comfort and support

## P. G. C. KING'S PAMPHLET.

Bro. P. G. C. King, of Toronto, has since our last session furnished additional evidence of his zealous interest in behalf of our beloved Order in Ontario in the voluntary contribution of a second pamphlet from his facile pen. I refer to that published and distributed in November last, entitled "Some of the Duties and Responsibilities of a Knight of Pythias." It is replete with counsel and advice, and should receive the careful and attentive perusal of every Knight in Ontario. It has received the highest commendation of the Pythian journals, several of them having published it in full.

## THE ENDOWMENT RANK.

I would strongly urge upon the Representatives to recommend to the membership in the various L dges in the jurisdiction a better support of this beneficial feature of our Order in availing themselves of the advantages of safe provision for life insurance at a moderate cost.

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Although only organized in 1878, up to March 31st the large amount of \$2,135,936 had been paid in benefits to the families of 1,363 members of the three classes in that Rank.

This branch of our Order, I regret to say, has not progressed as rapidly as was to have been expected, considering the success resulting from the organization of Alpha Division at Hamilton during the last session of the Grand Lodge.

I had hoped for the appearance at the parade in honour of the Grand Lodge here of organized Divisions from Toronto and Windsor at least, but owing to delay caused by changes in the uniform at the late session of the Supreme Lodge their institution has been temporarily deferred.

I feel satisfied that this feature of our Order will prove a valuable aid in attracting membership to our Lodges, and contribute materially to the growth and popularity of the Order in our jurisdiction.

### CONDITION OF THE ORDER.

For the numerical and financial standing of the Lodges I refer you to the reports of the G. K. R. & S. The record of the year shows a satisfactory increase on the whole; but in order to a favourable comparison with our sister jurisdictions, renewed zeal and increased interest must be manifested by all.

Naturally much is expected from your Executive Officer for the time being; but in the work of organizing new Lodges, in promoting the dissemination of our principles and increasing the membership and efficiency of existing Lodges, every true Knight should, in view of his obligations, aid and assist him to the extent of his ability.

#### THE SUPREME LODGE.

During my visit to New Orleans at the late session of the Supreme Lodge, through the courtesy of our Representatives, I had the honor of introductions to many of the leading officers and Representatives of that august body, and could not but feel emotions of pleasure at the deep and abiding interest in the welfare of Ontario evinced by each and all of them.

We have cause for pride in the distinguished honor conferred on our Representative, Bro. King, in his election to the station of Supreme Prelate, the third highest honor in the gift of that body, and in the selection of Toronto as the next place of meeting for the Supreme Lodge of the World. We should, one and all, evince a Knightly appreciation of their fraternal interest in bestowing these coveted honors, by united, valiant work, which will result in placing our jurisdiction high upon the roster of Grand Lodges. # REPORT OF THE GRAND KEEPER OF RECORDS AND SEAL.

OFFICE OF THE GRAND KEEPER OF RECORDS AND SEAL,

GRAND LODGE, K OF P., OF ONTARIO,

TORONTO, June 7th, 1884. To the Officers and Representatives of the Grand Lodge :

I beg to submit for your consideration my Report for the year ending May 31st, 1884.

## CONDITION OF THE ORDER.

It affords me great pleasure to be able to submit a more satisfactory Report on this subject than I have been able to do for some years back. As will be seen from the Numerical and Financial statements attached to this Report, all our Lodges have enjoyed a prosperous year. An increase of 20 per cent. has been made in membership, nearly 40 per cent. in receipts, and over 100 per cent. in amount on hand and invested. There is not a Lodge on our Roll but what has held its own or increased ; none have gone back-

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During the year the Grand Chancellor has, I believe, paid an official visit, at least once, to every Lodge in the jurisdiction, with very beneficial results. Crusader Lodge No. 5, of Port Arthur, and Algoma Lodge No. 11, of Sault Ste. Marie, which, while always on our Roll, have been dormant for some time back, were again revived through his visit, and satisfied him that a successful future was in store for them. The latter Lodge has fully carried out his expectations, but the former I have been unable to get any word from since. I think it would be well to have the Deputy at Sault Ste. Marie visit it, and find out exactly how matters stand. This could be done at very little expense to Grand Lodge, and would be money well expended.

Since our last session two new Lodges have been added to our number, both being instituted by the Grand Chancellor. The first one was instituted on September 7th, 1883, at Harrow, in the County of Essex, and is named Erie No. 21; the other is Mizpah No. 22, at London East, and was instituted on February 19th, 1884. Full particulars will, no doubt, be submitted to you by the Grand Chancellor in his Report.

In addition to the above, I understand that on the 9th inst. the Grand Chancellor will reorganize Marmion Lodge No. 15, of Chatham. In connection with this I desire to inform the Grand Lodge that, at the request of the Grand Chancellor, I forwarded the effects of Damon Lodge No. 8 for use in re-organizing the Lodge. Both of these lodges were located in the same place, and met in the same hall, the properties belonging only to No. 8, but were loaned or rented to the other. The Grand Lodge has the power to dispose of the effects of a lodge that surrenders its charter, to the best advantage, and the proceeds, after paying any debis that may be due, placed to the credit of the defunct Lodge. In this case, however, I am informed that there is little or no likelihood of No. 8 ever being resuscitated. and it is the desire of No. 15 to have the properties made over to them, as many members of No. 8 have signified their intention of affiliating with the one about to be re-organized. The only debt unpaid by Damon Lodge that I know of is due to Grand Lodge, and the amount is only \$3.66. The properties were forwarded by me on the understanding with the Grand Chancellor that I should bring the matter to the attention of the Grand Lodge, and let it be dealt with there. It is a question whether we have the right to take into consideration the likelihood of a defunct lodge being resuscitated or not. It appears to me that it should always be looked upon in the light of a possible possibility, and treated as such.

#### SEMI-ANNUAL REPORTS.

I am pleased to say that during the past year the majority of the Lodges have forwarded their reports within a reasonable time after installation, but there are yet one or two which can make considerable improvement in regard to promptness. The Committee on Returns and Credentials can see the date of the reception of each report.

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## JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS.

In compliance with your instructions, I have had the proceedings of the last two sessions printed and distributed to the Lodges. The funds of Grand Lodge not being sufficient to defray the cost I made a pro rata levy on the Lodges that were in existence at the time of our last meeting. The amount then paid by each Lodge I placed to their credit, instead of charging it. against them, as contemplated by section 10 of the Report of the Committee on State of the Order. This course I adopted, subject to your approval, on account of other Lodges having been revived or instituted before the issue of the Journal, as I believed that it would be only just and fair that an expense of this nature should be shared by all alike.

# SUPREME REPRESENTATIVES' REPORT.

To the Grand Chancellor, Officers and Members of the Grand Lodge of Ontario : BRETHREN,-Your Representatives to the Supreme Lodge K. of P. of the World herewith submit their report of the proceedings of that body at its Thirteenth Session, held in the City of New Orleans, State of Louisiana,

beginning April 22nd, 1884, and continuing for the space of ten days. The Supreme Lodge was called to order at 10 o'clock a.m. of that day by the Hon. John P. Linton, Supreme Chancellor. All the officers except the Supreme Inner Guard were present; also, Justus H. Rathbone, the founder and first Past Supreme Chancellor; S. S. Davis, P.S.C.; D. B.

Woodruff, P.S.C.; G. W. Lindsay, P.S.C., and about seventy-five Supreme Representatives from forty Grand jurisdictions.

The Reports of the Supreme Officers were presented, and by sections referred to various Standing Committees. From these reports we extract some points of general interest. The Supreme Chancellor reports the extension of the Order since last session into British Columbia, Manitoba and Nova Scotia, Provinces of Canada; while additional territories in the United States, and even sections of Mexico, have now Lodges of the Order. Washington, Utah and Arizona Territories have increased in membership, and now possess each a Grand Lodge of its own, and to this Session of Supreme Lodge, for the first time, sent Representatives. With reference to the Supreme Chancellor's proposed visit to Ontario Grand Lodge, he

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especially desired to respond to the invitation on account of its being the only Grand Jurisdiction beyond the limits of one nation, but the meeting unfortunately occurred at a time when he found it impossible to attend. From visitations, correspondence and reports received from the Supreme K. of R. and S., the Supreme Chancellor was able to say :--"I am able to report advisedly as to the condition of the Order, and it affords me great gratification to be able to say that the period intervening since last session has been a period of unexampled prosperity. In every jurisdiction advance has been made; and in many of them, notably Iowa and Kansas, the growth of the Order has been so great as to outstrip the most sanguine anticipations of the most sanguine brethren." The Supreme Chancellor reports 33 new subordinate Lodges organized under the jurisdiction of the Supreme Lodge in Provinces or Territories where no Grand Lodge existed. Since the Session of August, 1882, in Detroit, until the end of March, 1884, there was the magnificent gain of 3 Grand Lodges, 235 Subordinate Lodges, and 28,327 members, giving an exhibit at the latter date, in round numbers, of 40 Grand Lodges, 1,948 Subordinate Lodges, and 140,000 members in good standing-in itself a large army. At the Detroit Session the Report gave only 102 Subordinate Uniform Rank Divisions. There are now 232, and 10 Grand or Regimental Divisions. The Sections of the Endowment or Beneficiary Department have also largely increased, and there are at the present time 576 in active and efficient operation. As an evidence of the good work of this branch of the Order it may be stated that 11,623 members in the first class were, on the 31st day of March, 1884, carrying an insurance of \$1,000 each; 14,883 members in the second class were carrying a \$2,000 beneficiary certificate, and 441 aged members in the third class were carrying a \$1,000 insurance. During the single year ending March 31st, 1884, \$139,000 was paid to the families of 139 deceased members in the first class; \$390,000 to families of 195 deceased members of the second class; while \$2,604 was paid to families of members in the third class, or a total of \$531,000 paid in one year in the Beneficiary Department alone.

The Supreme Treasury contained on April 1st, 1884, exclusive of money for endowment purposes, \$25,529.55.

The expenditures for the same purposes made by the Subordinate

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Lodges under the Jurisdiction of the Supreme Lodge, amounted to \$3,891.60, which added to the former amount makes a grand total for relief purposes of \$372,908.37, exclusive of the beneficiary payable by the Endowment or Insurance scheme of the Order. The death benefits from the Endowment Rank paid from 1878 to March 31st, 1884, aggregated the immense sum of no less than \$2,135,936. The foregoing facts and figures cannot but carry conviction to the minds of every person reading them, that the Order of Knights of Pythias is doing a noble work.

It affords us pleasure in this connection to report that an able and hard working Finance Committee reported that the books of the Financial Officers are correctly kept, and that not a cent of money has gone astray. Further, the bonds by these officers are large and safe, and ample to protect the Order even though the incumbents were disposed to be dishonest.

On the first day of the session the usual Standing Committees were appointed. Your Representatives were assigned positions on some of these. Representative Mitchell was Chairman of the Committee on Unwritten Work, and Representative King was a member of the Committee on State of the Order, also of the Special Committee on Deceased Officers and Representatives, and likewise of a Special Committee to fix the date of the next meeting.

On the call for business from Grand Jurisdictions, your Representatives presented the Resolution of Invitation from Ontario Grand Lodge to Supreme Lodge to hold its session of 1886 in Toronto. This, with similar resolutions from Colorado, California, Illinois, and Massachusetts, were referred to the Committee on Mileage and Per Diem, who, after deliberation, reported back to Supreme Lodge that they were unable to agree upon a place, and asked Supreme Lodge to decide the matter. The Supreme Lodge adopted this course, and immediately Supreme Representative King rose and moved that Toronto be the next place of meeting, supporting the motion with a strong speech, which secured for that city the largest vote on each ballot taken. All the other places named were again moved and supported by stong speeches. Several votes by ballot were recorded, Toronto each time gaining, though hard pressed by Boston, until by a vote of 41 to 32 Ontario

As there was a diversity of opinion as to the time, a special committee of three was appointed (Supreme Representative King being one of that number) to give the matter full consideration and report. The Supreme Lodge finally adopted the 2nd Tuesday in July, 1886, as the date of the

Early in the afternoon of the second day the Supreme Lodge adjourned to attend the reception ceremonies tendered by the Grand Lodge of Louisiana at a place called "West End," a beautiful pleasure resort, where the Supreme Lodge was received by Governor McEnery, who, by the way, is a member of Stonewall Lodge, in New Orleans; by City Attorney Bucks, representing the Mayor, on behalf of the city, and by the Grand Chancellor of the Order in that State. Responses were made, by Supreme Officers, and Representatives were made to feel thoroughly at home.

On the third day the parade was held, in which Supreme Lodge participated; and, as usual, was a magnificent display, and was witnessed by an immense throng of people, numbering perhaps not less than 75,000. It will be opportune here to state that from first to last all visiting Knights were made to feel that they were the guests of a large-hearted community, and that hospitalities were unbounded, and on a scale never before equalled. Receptions, excursions, balls and banquets were but a portion of the hospitalities showered upon the Representatives. Among the speakers at the banquet Representative King spoke for Canada, and at the installation of the Grand Lodge Officers of Louisiana, by Supreme Lodge Officers, Representative Mitchell officiated as Supreme Inner Guard, and Representative King was among the few who addressed that body at the conclusion of the installation ceremonies.

A large portion of the time of the Supreme body was consumed in discussing proposed changes in the Endowment and Uniform Rank Laws, as well as considering the decisions of the Supreme Chancellor and proposed amendments to the Constitution. We strongly commend all to carefully read the proceedings, which will shortly be published, and will at this time merely submit the more interesting and important legislation in outline.

A new officer, called the Supreme Secretary of the Endowment Rank, was created, upon whom devolves the duties in connection with the Endowment Rank heretofore discharged by the S. M. of E., with the additional duties arising from the Fourth or graded class. He is required to report semi-monthly to the S. M. of E., and transmit therewith all moneys in his hands, and also report quarterly to the Supreme Chancellor; he is required to furnish bonds in the amount of \$50,000; he must be a member of the Supreme Lodge and of the Endowment Rank.

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Sections of Endowment may be instituted on application of five Knights in good standing, and three members will constitute a quorum.

Though special meetings may be called, only one regular meeting is required, and that is fixed for the month of December in each year. Ballotting and Ritualistic work are abolished.

A Fourth class of Endowment, or graded class, has been created, whereby payments are made mon hly, and vary according to age.

Applicants between the ages of twenty one and fifty may be admitted into the First and Second classes; those between the ages of fifty and sixty into the Third class, and those between the ages of twenty one and sixty may be admitted in the Fourth class.

A new obligation for members entering the Endowment Rank was adopted.

A Special Committee, which for a long period have been engaged upon the work of preparing general laws for the government of the Uniform Rank feature of the Order, reported, and their report was without change adopted. Under this new law Adjutant-General Carnahan, Supreme Representative of Indiana, was appointed by the Supreme Chancellor as Major-General of that branch of the Order. The rank, which is in no way under the control of Grand Lodges, will be most thoroughly and efficiently organ-

The founder of the Order presented his amended Ritnal for a special memorial service, which, after slight amendment, was adopted. The service is intended for either a public or private meeting of the Lodge, when assembled to commemorate the virtues and character of a deceased brother.

In concluding this brief report we feel constrained to say that Ontario has every reason to appreciate the consideration shown to her through her Representatives, in that we have secured all, and more than all, for which we have striven. Supreme Lodge in a twofold manner has proven to the world the universality of the Order's character, by first of all selecting one of your Representatives for one of the most exalted positions in her government, viz.: the office of Supreme Prelate, the third highest position in the Executive; and, secondly, by determining to sit beneath the protection of the British flag at the capital of this Province to legislate for the best interests of all who attain membership, and for the protection of those dependent upon them when death, the common leveller of mankind, severs the double tie that bound them on the one hand to this Society, and on the other to their family. Then let it be the aim of every Knight in this Grand Jurisdiction to show to the Supreme Lodge that he individually, and the Order collectively, appreciates the honors bestowed.

We trust that our labours on your behalf have justified your choice of

us to represent you in the Pythian Parliament, and that the future advantages to our Order in the Province will be great from the anticipated visit and public demonstration in 1886.

# REPORT OF SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON DISTRIBUTION.

Your Special Committee on Distribution, to whom were referred the Reports of the Grand Lodge Officers, would report and recommend :

"Lodges shall provide for carrying into effect the beneficial character of the Order, by providing for the payment of weekly benefits in case of disability, and funeral benefits in case of the death of a member; and weekly benefits shall not be less than one dollar per week, nor funeral benefits less

Extract from S. L. Journal, page, 1,428, Session 1877 :

"That, under the existing Constitutional provision, the minimum benefits, as designated in clause 22, sec. 2, Art. viii., of the Supreme Lodge Constitution, must be paid to each member of the Lodge from the time he becomes a member. It will be noticed that this does not require the full benefits to be paid, but only the minimum for such probationary period as each Lodge may fix."

Your Committee would recommend that each Lodge in this jurisdiction, whose By-laws conflict with the above, be directed to so amend them

3. Your Committee firmly believe in the importance of official visitations by the Grand Chancellor. They not only secure uniformity in Ritualistic work, but tend to infuse an active interest among the members.

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When lack of interest is shown or indifference displayed by the Executive, the same spirit is almost sure to be found in the lodges. It afforded us much pleasure to read the account of the work done by the Grand Chancellor in this respect, and we feel sure that nothing we can say would enhance the pleasure he derived from trying to uphold and carry out the trust confided to him. We are confident that we but voice the sentiments of every member of this Grand Lodge when we say, "Well done, thou good and faithful servant."

4. In regard to the Endowment Rank, your Committee cannot do more than endorse what has already been said by their predecessors on this subject. It is a matter which concerns each individual member rather than a collective body, and its advantages are well displayed by the literature of the Rank. We believe it to be a cheap and safe insurance, and give it our cordial recommendation.

5. Your Committee fully endorse the remarks of the Grand Chancellor on the subject of Uniform Divisions. We believe, however, that those who were about to organize divisions acted wisely in waiting for the latest legislation of the Supreme Lodge, and hope to soon hear of their institution. We would strongly urge upon every lodge the advisability, when possible, of organizing divisions, as we consider this branch of our Order not only ornamental but useful and beneficial.

6. We have carefully examined the numerical and financial statements submitted by the Grand Keeper of Records and Seal, and note with pleasure the increase of both membership and finances in the several lodges. We sincerely trust that the gratifying prosperity of our Order for the past year may continue in the future.



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


