A Pretty Wedding. The largest gathering that has ever attended a service in S. Mary's Church, Chatham, assembled there on Tuesday evening at seven o'clock to witness the celebration of the marriage of Mr. Fredrick Neale, of Liverpool, England, and Miss Mignowitz, third daughter of the late G. A. Blair, Esq., St. Stephen's Magistrate of Chatham. The church was handsomely decorated with flowers and a magnificent floral bell—the work of Mrs. J. J. Pierce—was suspended from the arch, above the chancel steps. The youthful and handsome bride, who, it is unnecessary to say, never looked better, was attended by Misses Beattie Sackville, Madge Sutherland (of Sydney, C. B.), Bertha Pierce and Helen Blair, while the groomsmen were Mr. Ernest Blair, who was assisted by Master Roy Muirhead. The seats nearest the chancel were occupied by the wedding party, and the officiating minister, Messrs. C. A. C. Bruce, W. C. Stikeman, Richard Hutchinson and Percy Tucker, together with the manifold desire of all present to contribute to the happy auspices of the union, resulted in the maintenance of the best possible order and decorum, notwithstanding the manifest eagerness of the general congregation to witness the interesting ceremony. Master Fredrick Neale, brother of the bride and organist of St. George's, St. John West, presided at the organ and as the bridal party proceeded by Rev. Canon Forsyth and the surprised bride went up the middle aisle, "Wedding Hymns," "The Voice that breathed 'er Eden' was sung as was also the Deus Misericordiae in its proper place in the service. The bride was given away by her brother, Mr. Gordon M. Blair, of the Bank of Montreal, Calgary, and the whole ceremony passed off in an entirely satisfactory manner, the calm and self-possessed demeanor of the bride being in excellent keeping with the perfection with which the bridegroom and all the members of the party acquitted themselves.

It is creditable to the large and mixed congregation present that there was not even an attempt on the part of anyone to leave the church at the close of the ceremony, until after the bridal party, clergy, choirists and wedding guests had preceded them, an observance of the proprieties which is more emphasized in large churches than in the smaller ones. The bride party and wedding guests proceeded to the residence of the bride's mother immediately after the ceremony, where a collation was partaken of and speeches were made to the toast which are usual upon such occasions. Canon Forsyth proposed the health of the bride and groom, referring to the Christian virtues of both, and the kind and excellent services of the bride in church work, as well as those of Mr. Neale in the choir, during his former residence in Chatham.

The bride's acknowledgments were made in a few well chosen words, which elicited the hearty applause of the whole company. He proposed the bride's health and Mr. Ernest Blair responded, as did Mr. Gordon Blair to the toast of the bride and groom, which was proposed by Judge Wilkinson.

The presents of the bride were unusually large in number and rich in value. A large number of the guests accompanied the young couple to the railway station, where they took the 9.25 train for the upper provinces, most of the party going with them as far as the junction, with the usual accompaniment of rice-showers and the traditional oil-sipper in abundance.

A Poor Showing. The London Timber Trades Journal is very outspoken in its references to the showing made by the past year by the well known firm of Bryant, Forvis and Bryant of London and Liverpool. It says:—

The balance-sheet of this company for the year ending March 31st, 1890, which has been published in the London and Liverpool, is not the most satisfactory unsatisfactory document of the kind which has ever come under our notice, and, although the long delay in issuing it had to some extent prepared the trade for an unfavorable report, we feel sure that had we not been anticipated such a tale of disasters and mismanagement.

The Canadian loan is divided into two items, £18,363 being the amount of bad debts made in connection with the London and Liverpool, and £18,000 the estimated debt upon securities in Canada; but how this latter arises, whether in connection with advances to Smith, Wade & Co., or anybody else, not a single word of explanation is afforded.

The third and last item of loss is on the depreciation of stock since March 31st, which is estimated at £7,000, or about 94 per cent. on the entire stock. We are, of course, in the possession of any statement as to how the stock is taken—whether at cost or market price—unable to criticize this estimate of depreciation, and we can only observe that in this respect the company appears to be better off than many of its neighbors.

The loss which is the result of the year's business, may therefore be summarized as follows:— Loss on ordinary trading, £6,888 Bad debts—Davies & Murphy, 15,363 Estimated deficiency in securities, 18,000 Depreciation in stock, 7,000 £47,260

In the preparation of these accounts the directors had therefore to face the unpleasant task of providing for a loss on the year of £47,260, without, if possible, infringing on the capital. To do this they had to make a statement of the liabilities of the company by cancelling their bills and debiting the extent of £25,000, thereby increasing to the extent of £22,260 the already large amount of the reserve fund, which is now £212,500, and a small balance from last year's account, reduced to £25,488, which with characteristic "agenceness" is carried forward to "next account." What the "next account" will be, or how, or by whom it will be prepared it would be rash to forecast, but we play rather on the Dutch more than two centuries ago. The Good Work Will Go On. Public sentiment here and throughout the State shows an overwhelming sentiment in favor of the ratification of the new charter of the Louisiana State Lottery Company, which will be submitted to the people of the State at an election in 1892. The present charter does not expire until 1895. However long before that time the State of Louisiana will have made provisions to extend the contract with the Lottery Company until the year 1919. Of course there is an excitement about this matter, because it is regarded as a forgone conclusion. The Louisiana State Lottery Company has very generously made preparations to increase its contributions to the charities and public works in the State and these present charter expires to give way to a second charter expiring in the year 1919. —New Orleans (La.) City Item, August 6.
