Another Version of the Mutiny Given by Ludwig Flohr, Originally a Prisoner.

(Special Correspondence of the Sun.) LIVERPOOL, G. B., March 19.—At the police court this morning, further evidence was given before Mr. Stewart in the charge of mutiny and murder against Otto Monson, aged eighteen; Gustav Rau, aged twenty-nine, and William Smith, aged thirty, sailors on board the British bark Veronica.
