



# THE HUMMEL AFFIDAVIT; HOW THAW SPANKED EVELYN

NEW YORK, March 20—Although nuch has been hinted as to the cruelty of Harry K. Thaw as told in Evelyn Nesbitt's alleged affidavit of 1903, the document, a copy of which was admitted in evidence at Thaw's trial for killing Stanford White, is far more shocking in its charges than had been expected.

She was hardly able to walk.

Another statement in the affidavit is that Thaw tried to get her to make charges against a married man inlimical to him, to the effect that he had given me, and was confined to my room about two weeks.

SHIPPING IN THE BAY Pilot Boats Were Partly Disabled-

Steamer Innishowen Head is

The shipping that was caught out in the bay yesterday had a rough time. The pilot boats Howard D. Troop and David Lynch were out in the thickest of it and arrived in port this morning somewhat disabled. The Troop had her main boom broken.

The Lynch lost both anchors and chains and had her foresail blown

The big Donaldson Liner Athenia rode the storm out in the bay and came into port this morning docking at Sand Point where her 500 passengers disembarked and will go west this afternoon. The Athenia had a rough voyage out but sustained no damage. On Tuesday when the Allan liner Sardinian arrived in port Pilot Henry Spears reported that the Head liner Innishowen Head was passed off Blonde Rock, steaming only about two knots an hour and apparently disabled. She did not, however, ask for assistance. The tug Lord Kitchener was dispatched down the bay in search of the disabled steamer, but returned about 10.30 o'clock on Tuesday night for shelter, and Capt. Stevens of the Kitchener reported being unance to locate the Head liner. It is thought that with yesterday's heavy storm the steamer has put out to sea. Up till two o'clock this afternoon the local agents, Wm. Thomson and Co., had received no word from the steamer.
