## THREE GOVERNMENTS JOIN THE HUE AND CRY FOR BANK ROBBERS

### U.S., England and Greece Seeking Criminals

### LOOTED BANK AT NEW WESTMINSTER

### Gang Got Away with \$272,000 and Afterwards Evaded Arrest in Chicago—How Police Lieut. Burns' Plan Failed to Work.

Chicago, Ill., Sept. 23.—The United States authorities, the English Government, and the police department of Greece joined today in the effort to run down the missing members of the band of safe robbers who looted the Bank of Montreal at New Westminster, B. C., of \$272,000 and after making their way to Chicago flooded the underworld of the city with Canadian bills. The escape of the men created one of the greatest police scandals in the history of the Chicago department.

The Greek government was brought into the search by the disappearance of Louis Colover, who is said to have known secrets concerning the robbers' escape. Colover is an interpreter for Miles J. Devine, attorney for James Sides, the Greek saloon keeper, in whose place Police Lieut. Burns says he was knocked unconscious in a single-handed attempt to arrest two robbers. Police efforts today were devoted largely to tracing clues in connection with the large quantities of Canadian bills of large denominations which have been offered for exchange in Chicago since the robbery. A \$50,000 note of the New Westminster bank was offered at one bank by two Greeks the day before Burns was overpowered in Sides' saloon.

Sides was questioned today by the police about the \$10,000 in Canadian money which recently came into his possession.

The story of Lieut. Burns' encounter with the two safe blowers was told today by a bar tender in Sides' saloon. "I knew Burns was a policeman as soon as I saw him," he said. "The two men we tried later to arrest had been in the back room for several hours. They looked to me like farmers. Burns had no coat and had the sleeves of his shirt rolled up. He drank at the bar several times and walked into the back room and looked around more than once. He had plenty of chance to take the men, because he was behind them and could have covered them with his gun before speaking."

"After a while he went in and sat down with them."

"Who are you?" I heard one of them ask. Burns said "The big Dick (slang for detective), and I'm going to take you to the station." Then the fight began. Burns tried to have the strength to pull the trigger. The men then gave him a good trimming. They took their time about going out. I would know them again. They spent only small change here, buying beer. I did not see them spend any Canadian money.

Acting Chief of Police Schuetler said that Sides is the only person now held by the local police in connection with the escape of the bank robbers. He denied in positive terms that any Chicago police officials are under suspicion of graft in the case.

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## FIGHT FOR UNIVERSAL SUFFRAGE

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## BAUQUET TO DIET OF THE EVENING

### Twenty-two Hundred Guests and Spectators Attended to Do Honor to Canada's Able Premier.

### CONGRATULATED ON GOVERNMENT'S WORK.

That which is not essential to other nations is the very life of this Empire."

## WEST FAVORS DEFENCE PLAN

### Premier Fleming Found Sentiment Strongly in Favor of Canada's Participation in Empire's Naval Expansion.

### Ottawa, Sept. 23.—Premier Fleming, of New Brunswick, who is here today en route home from the Canadian Forestry Convention in Victoria, told the Canadian Press in an interview that he had found in the west a very strong feeling that Canada should do something in a practical way toward the general defence of the Empire.

### The west is taking a very keen interest in the navy problem," he said. "Most of the talk of divergence of sentiment between east and west is merely talk. Those responsible for it forget the steady influx from Eastern Canada. We are deploring losing our best, but in the end it is going to be a good thing in that it will promote unity of sentiment that could not be obtained in any other way."

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## MCGARTY TRIMS JACK HARRISON

### Strengthens Claim to Middle-weight Championship of the World by Defeating English Champion in Two Minutes.

### New York, N. Y., Sept. 23.—Eddie McGorty of Oakbrook, who claims to be the top notcher among middleweights, added strength to his argument tonight when he made short work of Jack Harrison, champion of England, who holds the consolation belt. After knocking out Dave Smith, the Australian champion, in the first round at Madison Square Garden three weeks ago, in the same ring tonight he knocked out the British champion in two minutes 55 seconds.

### The men agreed to weigh in at 6 p. m., at 160 pounds and both were under that weight. McGorty weighed in at 165 and Harrison at 163. McGorty opened up with a right and left to the face and then staggered the Englishman with a left hook on the jaw.

### Keeping his man continually on the defensive he sent right and left blows to the head and after a smashing right to the face and a right uppercut under the chin, he hooked Harrison's jaw with his left, sending him down for a count of nine. The Englishman got up groggy and McGorty chased him around the ring, landing three rights and three lefts on the head, and with another left hook put the Englishman down for a second time for a count of nine.

### As soon as Harrison was on his feet McGorty landed two straight lefts to the face and a right across the ear, rocked him with right uppercuts and then repeated with a left hook which sent the Englishman to the floor for the third and last time. ## IS EXECUTED FOR MURDER OF HIS WIFE

### Chester S. Jordan Pays Full Penalty of the Law After Spending Four Years in Prison.

### INSANE JUROR CAUSES DELAY.

### Murderer's Cabman Responsible for the Discovery of Crime.

### Boston, Mass., Sept. 24.—Chester S. Jordan paid the full penalty of the law at 12.14.30 o'clock this morning when for the murder of his wife at their apartments at Somerville, on Sept. 1, 1908, he was electrocuted. This case presented one of the most peculiar technical difficulties that has ever stood in the way of justice.

### A suspicious cabman was responsible for the discovery of the murder of Mrs. Chester S. Jordan, for which Jordan was executed this morning. The murder was committed at their apartments in Somerville, on Sept. 1, 1908. During a quarrel with his young wife, an actress, Jordan struck her and knocked her down a stairway. The next day he dismembered her body, placed the head and some other parts in a stove in an unsuccessful attempt to burn them, and packed the remainder of the body in a trunk.

### His actions in driving about the city with the trunk aroused the suspicions of his cab driver, who reported to the police. He believed his passenger had stolen the trunk. While the police were investigating Jordan attempted to jump from the window of his room. Later he admitted that the body was that of his wife, whom he had killed during a quarrel two days before.

### Jordan was born 33 years ago in Indianapolis, Ind., and while on the stage married Honorable O'Reilly, known in vaudeville as Irene Shannon. Jordan was brought to trial on April 20, 1909 and found guilty of murder May 4, 1909. Four days later one of the jurymen became insane and was committed to an asylum. The State Supreme Court refused to grant an appeal for a new trial and Jordan was sentenced to die during the week of March 12, 1911. A writ of error being granted an appeal from the decision of the state court, was taken to the United States Supreme Court, but the appeal was denied on May 27, 1912, nearly four years after the commission of the crime, and Jordan was executed a second time to die.

## ENDORSEMENT OF COVENANT

### Ulster Unionist Council Approves Text of Document to Which Followers Will Subscribe on Saturday.

### Belfast, Sept. 23.—The Ulster Unionist Council today confirmed the text of the covenant against Home Rule to be signed by the Unionists throughout the province on Sept. 23.

### The document declares that Home Rule would be disastrous to Ulster and Ireland, subversive to civil and religious freedom, and perilous to the unity of the Empire. It pledges the signatories to stand by one another in defending for themselves and their children their position of equal citizenship in the United Kingdom and in using all means which may be found necessary to defeat Home Rule in Ireland. In the event of an Irish parliament being forced upon them they solemnly and mutually pledge themselves to refuse recognition of its authority.

## FIRST FRUITS OF NEW ARRANGEMENT WITH OLD COUNTRY

SHOOT HIMSELF IN A WEST END HOTEL

Englishman, Recent Arrival in City, Suicides in Western House—No Inquest will be Held.

W. H. Wiles, an Englishman, killed himself in the Western House, on Rodney street, West End, yesterday by shooting himself through the temple with a revolver.

Wiles was a middle-aged man, who leaves a family in England. He had been working in Derby, Northumberland county, until a couple of months ago, when he came to this city. During the exhibition he had a booth in the building where he sold birch bark articles, and is said to have done considerable business.

Wiles was about the hotel on Sunday conversing with the other boarders, and appeared to be in fairly good spirits.

Yesterday morning he was called about 9 o'clock and answered from his room that he would get up soon, but he did not do so.

At 10 o'clock yesterday afternoon as Wiles did not put in an appearance, there was another call made to his room, but he did not answer repeated knocks at his door. A carpenter was working on the house, and on looking into the bedroom window he saw the lifeless body lying across the bed. The door was opened, and it was then discovered that the man had shot himself through the head.

Coroner P. L. Kenney was notified and after viewing the remains, gave permission for the removal of the body to Undertaker Beattie's rooms.

In the room near the body was found the following note: "May God have mercy on my soul. I can't bear the agony of this place any longer. Bless and take care of my dear children and may their life be far smoother than my past has been. Good-bye to all."

(Signed) W. H. WILES. P. S.: No person is to blame for this rash act but myself."

TOOK NEGROES TO BRIARTOWN; THREE FARMERS WERE SHOT

Colored Folk Never Allowed to Remain in Town—Violation of Precedent May Cost Men Their Lives.

Muscogee, Okla., Sept. 23.—Because they imported negro cotton pickers to Briartown, where negroes never have been allowed to stay, three farmers, Sam Robinson, W. L. Larrimore and John Hilton, were shot late last night. It is said Robinson and Larrimore probably will die. More trouble is feared and a large force of deputies has been sent to Briartown.

It is reported that citizens organized to drive the newly imported negroes out of the section, and when some of them went to the places of the farmers, found them defending the blacks. Then the shooting began.

Partridge are reported in abundance and with the excellent weather for hunting the sport is being thoroughly enjoyed. So far there have been some nice moose heads received in the city, but it is expected that the real large ones will soon put in an appearance.

WIDE INTEREST IN THE PREMIER'S MONTREAL SPEECH

British Newspapers Publish Lengthy Accounts of Premier's Address at Banquet on Saturday.

POTATO SITUATION.

The Montreal Star has the following regarding the potato situation at Montreal: "Potatoes around Montreal seem to be undergoing a universal degeneration. Local conditions at the present time are such as to cause the local dealers extreme uneasiness. They state that the potato grown on the island of Montreal and in the immediate vicinity is practically banned from the market. Their best customers, such as hotels and steamer, refuse to buy it owing to its diseased condition. The canker infection is held wholly accountable for the condition of the crops. The potato canker is a virulent fungus disease and has done tremendous destruction to the crops throughout Europe in the past few years. It has done so much harm in Europe that the Dominion Government deems it necessary to bar the importation of European potatoes to Canada."

CHINESE POLICE CHIEF OBJECTS TO BEING DISMISSED

Threatens to Destroy City of Foochow and Large Force is Dispatched from Peking to Remove Him.

Washington, Sept. 23.—The American consul at Foochow, China, reports the situation as extremely critical. It is reported that the Peking government is sending a large force to remove from office the chief of police at Foochow, who, by detrying the authority of the central government threatens to destroy the city in case he is attacked. The consul reports unrest in the country districts around Foochow.

WIDOW OF ACCIDENT IN FREDERICTON ON SATURDAY IS DEAD

ONTARIO'S LICENSE REVENUE

Toronto, Sept. 23.—Ontario's revenue last year from the sale of licenses for motor vehicles totalled \$64,851,222, double the sum received for 1910, which was \$32,394,000.

GENERAL SECRETARY OF NATIONAL COUNCIL SAYS ORGANIZATION IN DOMINION WILL BE SELF-GOVERNING NEXT YEAR.

Charles W. Bishop, general secretary of the National Council of Young Men's Christian Associations of Canada, arrived in the city last evening and when seen by a Standard representative said that the work was in a flourishing condition and that good results were being obtained. When asked of the new national council, Mr. Bishop said that last June it was decided to partly separate the Canadian associations from the International association. This separation goes into full effect on the first of January, 1913, thus making the Canadian association a self-governing body. At the meeting held at Toronto at which this step was decided upon, counsellors were appointed for each city, J. Hunter White being the representative in St. John. Mr. Bishop came to the city from Montreal last evening where he has been looking over the association and will spend the next few days getting in touch with the existing conditions here. Although this is his first trip east from Toronto, Mr. Bishop is very enthusiastic over the work from which he expects excellent results.

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Canada's commerce, resources and development, and lists of the principal industries and sources of supply. These officials have received instructions to pay particular attention to any reports of interest to Canada.

In an interview in the Globe, which bears all the earmarks of having been carefully prepared in advance, the Police Magistrate attempts a somewhat tardy defence of the subject of "remands" in reply to a criticism which the Standard felt called upon to make in connection with a case which came within his jurisdiction.

The editorial in question contained some statements which were untrue. The Standard was made to tatter the statement, "That it is unfair to a prisoner, whether he is guilty or not, that he should be remanded time after time, simply for the COURT'S CONVENIENCE."

The Standard maintains that too often the Police Magistrate consults his convenience in cases of this kind. He wastes time and the money of the citizens by confining unrepentant prisoners in jail while he pores over cases decided in the London courts which he cites at length in giving his judgments.

With regard to the authorship of the article the Magistrate says: "The Standard recently had an editorial which the editor did not write—which was written, I am informed and believe, by an individual whose office is on Princess street."

CANADA AND THE BRITISH CONSULAR SERVICE.
Closer trade relations within the Empire have long been the aim of Mr. Foster, the present Minister of Trade and Commerce, and already during one short year in office he has completed a treaty with the West Indies and has opened negotiations for a trade agreement with Australia.

Office room in British consulates will be afforded to Canadian commercial representatives when it is possible and convenient to make this arrangement. In such cases the consular office will assume no responsibility for the direction or work of the Canadian representatives.

These arrangements resolve themselves into this, that Canadians can use the British consular system to obtain information about foreign countries, and that foreigners can repair to British consular offices and obtain information as to Canadian conditions and opportunities. It is also to be noted that an avenue is opened for the building up of a Canadian consular service.

REDISTRIBUTION.
(Vancouver News-Advertiser.)
The effect of the next Redistribution Bill upon the representation of the Maritime Provinces is being discussed more or less in the Eastern press.

The warm tribute paid to Mr. Borden in the banquet at Montreal is but symbolical of the sentiment which prevails in the hearts of the people of this Dominion who realize the crisis through which this country passed a year ago.

At Halifax yesterday Sir Wilfrid Laurier admitted frankly that reciprocity of the type which he proposed was not wanted by the Canadian people. It would appear, therefore, that Sir Wilfrid has abandoned any intention which he may have entertained of renewing the fight for the Pact.

CLOSING STOCK LETTER.

New York, Sept. 23.—The market continued active and strong today with many issues reaching new high prices for the movement. The engagement of a substantial amount of gold for import and the comparatively small loss sustained by the banks in their operations with the sub-treasury since Friday, together with the comparatively low rates of 4 1/4 c. for renewal of call loans formed the chief cause of the buying movement, but general news was also of very favorable character. A sale of Lake copper at a fraction over 18 cents for immediate delivery succeeded a movement demand for the metal which had been advised from the steel industry indication that new business was coming in such volume that it was only a question of a short time until further advance in prices would force itself. A completion of the earnings of the leading roads for the month of July showed an increase of over ten per cent. and from all reports the weekly reports of the mercantile agencies will reflect a further increase of activity in all lines of trade. The steel stocks, the anthracite coalers and the copper issues, as well as a number of specialties, reflected a substantial buying since the advance was maintained against a heavy volume of realizing. The selling at times suggested that distribution on a moderate scale was going on but it was only natural that some profit-taking should come on the market. The market appears to be still a purchasing on all fair reactions.

RECORD PRICES SECURED ON MARKET

New York, Sept. 23.—Some new high records for the year were established in the course of today's stock market. United States Steel and Amalgamated Copper touching high marks with other issues of less prominence. Trading was again heavy, though under last Friday's total, but the rise was several times checked by obvious profit-taking and further bear opposition. The latter element, from all accounts, has been largely eliminated, however, and no small part of today's advance may reasonably be attributed to outside or investment demand. The market derived some encouragement from last Saturday's relatively favorable bank statement and further gold engagements, \$2,500,000 being taken in London.

Other news of the day contributed to the movement, including an announcement of an advance in pig iron and advice from the west which dealt with the traffic situation. Apparently the movement of freight for the next few weeks will be limited only by the available supply of railroad equipment and shippers of general merchandise are complaining of discrimination by the railroads in favor of Shewan's.

Best prices today were scored in the last hour, Amalgamated leading the rise to the accompaniment of 18 points. Boston hat copper was selling there at a fraction over 20 cents per ton. Equipment issues and the H.V. stocks also were in demand, but Reading and Lehigh Valley were under slight pressure.

Call money opened at 4 3/4 per cent with a slight increase of supply. Time money rates fell back slightly on the improved banking position. Acceptances of commercial paper were larger, western institutions absorbing a considerable volume.
