MESSRS. EDITORS .- A correspondent of the St. John Sun, dated 13th, has some very good ideas concerning our Smelt fisheries, and also refers to the destruction of small Smelt, and losses to shippers. It is only too true. Much has been said and written about smelt and the manner in which they have been destroyed. I would go further than that writer and ask the Government pro-hibit any bag net of less than one inch mesh, Wallace Ross, the St. John oarsman, to 15th February in any year; the reasons are obvious—bag nets dragging our small rivers and main river channels in the autumn is very disastrous to young bass, sal-mon and other small fry. At this season fishermen are constantly in danger of their lives as the work is chiefly at night and the small Smelt caught at this season and sent to a foreign market in warm weather is disastrous to the trade, as is well known by astrous to the trade, as is well known by the woful appearance of some of our export-ers here. Let us change the tusiness from bag net fishing to the natural way of fishing with hook and line, and oftener without any hook, only a line three feet long with a tough piece of coloured meat or any other substitute, and mark the result, every man, boy and girl, if you like, living near or on the banks of the Miramichi or its feeders, can earn 60c. to \$1.50 per day. As is the case in Bathurst, the inhabitants there, to a large number are employed at this business, and earning the above figures. No bag nets are allowed in Bathurst Harbor; notice the general result—cash is paid for the article, a great number receive it and it is again spent.






