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

WARREN C. WINSLOW DIED SUDDENLY

Well Known Chatham Barrister and Politician
Passes Away On Christmas Day

Chatham, N. B., Dec. 26—Warren C. Winslow, a leading barrister and a former mayor of Chatham, passed away at his home Christmas morning at 8.30. Mr. Winslow was born at Chatham, January 6th, 1862. He leaves a widow and six children to mourn his demise. Mrs. Winslow was formerly Miss Carville of St. John, and the children are Pelham E., of the Bank of Montreal, Toronto; Frank Warren, of Vancouver; Arthur O., of Regina; Margaret, Mary and Edith at home. One brother and three sisters also survive. These are E. P. Winslow, Bank of Montreal inspector of Toronto; Mrs. H. Montgomery Campbell, of Sussex, N. B., Mrs.

WOULD ABOLISH THE BAR ROOM

Mr. Winslow was a prominent member of the Knights of Columbus. The funeral will be held tomorrow morning at 9 o'clock.

REV. TERENCE MAGUIRE PASSES AWAY

Beloved Priest, Well Known On the Miramichi
Passes Peacefully to His Reward

The death of Rev. Father Maguire in Chatham hospital yesterday after two days illness from acute obstruction of the bowels removes a clergyman well known and well beloved in Newcastle where from 1901 till last August he was the trusted and efficient assistant of Rev. Father Dixon of this parish.

Rev. Terence Maguire was born about 50 years ago in County Cavan, Ireland. He studied philosophy and theology in All Hallows, Dublin, to fit himself for work in Salford diocese under Bishop (afterwards Cardinal) Vaughan. Being too young for ordination he went to Salford and continued his studies in Scholastic theology in the Bishop's palace there. On reaching the proper age he was ordained and remained in St. Patrick's church Manchester, some five or six years. He was then sent by Bishop Vaughan to America to collect for an orphanage asylum and because Manchester air did not agree with his health he received leave of absence and remained in America, taking up pastoral work in New Jersey under Bishop Wigger. Upon the latter's death, Father Maguire was admitted to Chatham diocese, where Bishop Rogers assigned him to Newcastle, where he labored with great success and acceptance for nine years, when he was appointed parish priest of St. Margaret's.

Rev. Father Maguire took suddenly ill from acute obstruction of the intestines on Saturday last; he could not officiate in church on Sunday and was brought to Hotel Dieu, Chatham yesterday at 3 p. m., but was unable to stand an operation, and died at 5.30.

He leaves a mother and several sisters at home in Ireland and two brothers, prominent in shipping and insurance circles, in New York and New Jersey.

Rev. Father Maguire's work in Newcastle and all places where he was stationed was of a helpful and permanent nature. He was a sincere and kindly man and will long be remembered and his good deeds will follow him. May he rest in peace.

FEDORENKO FREED BUT RE-ARRESTED

Winnipeg, December 19—Savva Fedorenko, who has been held under an extradition warrant here, and whose case has attracted wide attention, was on Saturday discharged from custody by Judge Robson, under a writ of habeas corpus. He enjoyed his liberty only a few moments, however, as he was immediately placed under arrest again on a charge of attempted murder, preferred against him by the Russian Government.

It looks as if the case had just begun, as the Russian Government has seven other charges to prefer against Fedorenko. Should he be finally committed for extradition, however, the Minister of Justice may step in and refuse to give him up, if he has reason to believe that he is wanted for a political offence.

AGED 103

Mrs. Alexander Mazerolle died at Esquimaux recently at the age of 103 years and 6 months. Deceased was born at Esquimaux in 1807, and baptised by Rev. Father T. Parent, a missionary of the Miramichi. She was 12 years old at the time of the great Miramichi fire, and well remembered it.

AGAIN IN THE COURT'S CLUTCHES

Judge Barry has granted the application of the J. B. Snowball Co. for a winding up order for the Miramichi Pulp & Paper Co. having a claim for \$5000, and Mr. W. B. Snowball has been appointed provisional liquidator. There will be a meeting of creditors on Friday, Jan. 6th, to appoint a liquidator. The men's claim for wages ranks first.—World.

NEAR TRAGEDIES

Sunday morning a young man employed as blacksmith in one of Sinclair's camps was found in Bridgetown with hands frozen. He had evidently lain out the greater part of the night.

Saturday night a young man the worse of liquor was picked up on the ice near town lying in "several inches of water. He was conscious but unable to walk. It is not known where he got the liquor, as both Newcastle and Nelson are under the Scott Act—Advocate

THE NEW YEAR

Before another issue of the Graphic will reach its readers the new year will be upon us. The year 1910 will be long remembered in Campbellton; it will be the year in history from which all events will be dated. Let us hope and trust that the year 1911 will be a prosperous one; that the town will grow and increase in importance from this date onward; that our civic rulers will administer the affairs of the town wisely and that a year hence we can look back upon a year well spent.

THE COUNTY TAXES

The collector of rates for the Parish of Addington, of which Campbellton forms the greater part is endeavoring to collect the taxes as assessed before the fire and many and loud are the protests which are being uttered.

Not only are the taxpayers asked to pay a reasonable rate but they find that this year the county tax has nearly doubled. It behooves us to ask the reason.

The citizens of the town of Campbellton are called upon to pay forty-one percent of the contingent fund of the county. That is we pay nearly half the cost of administering justice, pay the county officials, the Board of Health accounts and this year the account of the Provincial Hospital for nervous diseases.

The system of accounting in vogue at Dalhousie is anything but fair to the town of Campbellton and some remedy should be found at once. For instance, The town of Campbellton, as a health district, pays all its Board of Health bills, yet we annually contribute forty-one per cent. to pay the larger Board of Health accounts of the county. A year ago the ratepayers of this town were assessed to pay for the keeping of patients in the Provincial Hospital. This was a heavy burden, but this year we are called upon to pay forty-one per cent. of the Provincial Hospital's account against the different parishes. In passing the accounts at the session of the County Council it frequently happens that accounts rightly chargeable to the different parishes are charged to the county. A year ago the parish of Dalhousie held an election to fill a vacancy in the Council. When the accounts for this election were before the council they were passed as county accounts and the town of Campbellton is obliged to pay forty-one per cent. of this. These are only a few instances, and a remedy should certainly be found. The town of Campbellton for the next ten years will have all it can do to pay its own indebtedness without shouldering a large percentage of that of the parishes.

The county council after the fire met and voted \$1000 toward the relief of the town of Campbellton. This means that the taxpayers of this town will be obliged to put their hands in their pockets and pay \$410.00 to be spent in relief work.

SERIOUS FIRE

The residence of Mr. P. J. Young, of Renous Bridge, the well known member of the Renous Bridge Lumber Co., was practically destroyed by fire on the 19th and Mr. Young himself was badly burned about the face and hands. B., and James of Whitneyville who has lived for the past number of years with his sister. The funeral service was conducted at the home by her pastor Rev. E. E. Mowatt assisted by Rev. H. D. Worden, (Baptist.) Mr. Worden visited Mrs. Forsythe several times during her illness and a few hours before she died sang—"We're nearing the city," and "Over the river faces I see."

Mrs. Forsythe was a consistent christian and a member of the Presbyterian church for a number of years. Although paralyzed for seven years she was never known to murmur. The registered voters numbered, in round numbers, 7,000,000 in Great Britain and 700,000 in Ireland. In about 100 constituencies there was no election, which accounts largely, especially in Ireland, for the difference between the registered vote and the vote cast.

As compared with the result last February, the Conservatives have lost one seat, the Liberals three, and the Independent (O'Brien) Nationalists one; while the Redmondite Nationalists have gained three and the Socialists two. The conservative opposition is one seat worse off than last time. It would appear that the Government, being returned three times in succession, have now a clear mandate to curb the House of Lords; provide for payment of members of Parliament; disestablish the Anglican church in Wales, where the great majority of people are non-Anglican; give to Ireland as well as to Wales, Scotland and England, a local legislature to look after all merely local affairs, the essential unity of the British Islands as one state being left unimpaired; and bring about many other long-needed changes in the political, social and economic condition of the people. Tariff reform, put forward by the Conservatives, failed to develop much strength.

Distribution of seed Grain and Potatoes

From the Central Experimental Farm, Ottawa, 1910-11.

By instruction of the Hon. Minister of Agriculture a distribution is being made this season of samples of superior sorts of grain and potatoes to Canadian farmers for the improvement of seed. The stock for distribution has been secured mainly from the Experimental Farms at Indian Head, Sask., Brandon Man., and Ottawa, Ont. The samples consist of oats, spring wheat, barley, field peas, Indian corn (for ensilage only) and potatoes. The quantity of oats sent is 4 lbs., and of wheat or barley 5 lbs., sufficient in each case to sow one twentieth of an acre. The samples of Indian corn, peas and potatoes weigh 3 lbs. each. A quantity of each of the following varieties has been secured for this distribution.

Oats.—Banner, Abundance, Danish Island, Wide-Awake, Thousand Dollar Improved Ligowo—all white varieties.

Wheat.—Red varieties:—Marquis and Early Red Fife (early beardless sorts of high baking strength.) Rep Fife (beardless), Preston and Huron (early, bearded) White varieties:—White Fife (beardless), Bobs (early, beardless).

Barley.—Six-rowed: Mensury and Manchurian (a selection from Mensury). Two-rowed: Standwell and Invincible.

Field Peas.—Arthur and Golden Vine.

Indian Corn (for ensilage).—Early sorts: Angel of Midnight, Compton's Early and Longfellow. Later varieties: Selected Leaning, Early Mastodon, and White Cap Yellow Dent.

Potatoes.—Early varieties: Rochester Rose, and Irish Cobbler. Medium to late varieties: Gold Coin, Curman No. 1, and Money Maker. The later varieties are, as a rule, more productive than the earlier kinds.

Only one sample can be sent to each applicant, hence if an individual receives a sample of oats he cannot also receive one of wheat, barley, peas, Indian corn or potatoes. Applications on printed cards or sheets, or lists of names from one individual, or applications for more than one sample for one household, cannot be entertained. The samples will be sent free of charge through the mail.

Applications should be addressed to the Dominion Cerealists, Experimental Farm, Ottawa, and may be sent in any time from the 1st of December to the 15th of February, after which the lists will be closed, so that the samples asked for may be sent out in good time. Applicants should mention the variety they prefer, with a second sort as an alternative. Applications will be filled in the order in which they are received, so long as the supply of seed lasts. Farmers are advised to apply early to avoid possible disappointment. Those applying for Indian corn or potatoes should bear in mind that the corn is not usually distributed until April, and that potatoes cannot be mailed until danger from frost in transit is over. No postage is required on mail matter addressed to the Experimental Farm, Ottawa.
