MR. WETMORE'S IDEA OF PUBLIC
SEN.
Mr. Wetmore in his speech on Declara-
tion Day felt called upon to explain
why he had succeeded in reducing his
party of nineteen in the Assembly to
ten; and he said that the public had seen
Mr. Morton, who was Solicitor General in
the late Government, stamping King's
for a candidate pledged to the present
Government; that it was well understood
that Mr. Morton's support had been
secured by the promise of a good office,
and from this the public could judge of
the means by which the strength of the
Opposition had been reduced. Corrup-
tion is always the first charge which rises
to the lips of incompetency. We mis-
take very greatly the temper of the men,
who, though they voted with the old
Government, felt called upon by a sense
of duty to give the present Government
their support, if they do not take
occasion, when the House next meets,
to tell Mr. Wetmore the light in which
they regard such insults, and the man
who makes them. Mr. Wetmore is
supremely unreasonable if he expects
that intelligent representatives of the
people will follow him along all the
mistaken paths which he chooses to go,
and he has a poor opinion of the sense
of honor which actuates public men if
he imagines they will bow meekly under
his indecent insinuations.

TUPPER AGAINST A NEW BRUN-
SWICK ENTERPRISE.
The Canadian Gazette, of London,
which is recognized as Sir Charles Tup-
per's organ, cries down the Caraque
Railway bonds, lately placed on the Eng-
lish market. It does not say why the
bonds are not valuable securities, but
gives a sweeping sort of ex cathedra de-
nunciation of them. It would be inter-
esting to know what Mr. Kennedy F.
Burns, M. P., will think of this attempt to
injure an enterprise in the success of
which he is so deeply concerned; but we
do not propose to discuss that, as it is
simply a personal matter. We are, how-
ever, all interested in learning it is a
part of the High Commissioner's duties
to decry enterprises which do not hap-
pen to strike his fancy or his pocket ac-
ceptably. We do not profess to know
much about the merits of the Caraque
Railway, but we are not prepared to ad-
mit that it is entitled to the wholesale,
off-hand condemnation of Sir Charles
Tupper. If good reasons exist why this
railway is not to be considered suffi-
cient security for the loan asked, let them
be given; but we protest altogether from
these official stabs in the dark.

A DESIRABLE STANDARD
BEARER.
The Capital in endeavoring to account
for the overwhelming defeat of its party
makes a coarse attack upon Mr. Gibson.
This is a very easy thing to do. Nothing
can be easier than for meanness to con-
ceive and impudence to utter falsehoods
about those they envy and dislike, but it
is too late to expect the people of the
County of York to believe what such
persons as those who write for or control
the Capital have to say against Mr. Gib-
son. If there is in York a man whose
popularity is growing apace that man is
Alexander Gibson, and if he should, in
response to the very generally expres-
sed desire, consent to carry in person
standard of the political party with
which he is associated, his popularity would
be demonstrated in a way that would a-
lash the Capital and its tribe. Wear
without a hope that Mr. Gibson's
sent to give the country the ben-
his ripe judgment. The presence
such a master business mind in Par-
liament would adorn and strengthen the
body, and if he would make the sacrifice

of time and personal convenience which public life would necessitate he would be most cordially received by this constituency and welcomed by people of all shades of politics, except, perhaps, small people like those who try to say unpleasant things about him in the Capital and other such sheets.

THE NORTHWEST REBELLION.
Mr. Blake has made a spirited attack upon the Government in respect to the Northwest Rebellion. He has moved a vote of want of confidence, and supported it in a magnificent speech. It is of course hopeless to expect the motion to be carried. We have not yet reached that condition of things in Canada, when an independent vote can be looked for in Parliament. When men are elected to support a Tory Premier, they give him a lease of their votes during the term of Parliament. There are a few exceptions to this rule, but it is very generally applicable. Consequently, no matter how good a case Mr. Blake and his friends may make out, they will be in a minority. It is well, however, to place the facts on record in a simple form, so that the people can understand them. This Mr. Blake has done, and when his speech is published it ought to be placed in the hands of every elector.

There is unhappily no doubt that the Northwest Rebellion was due entirely to the maladministration of the Department of the Interior. The Half Breeds were treated as though they had no rights which a Tory Minister was bound to respect. The Government knew that serious trouble was at hand, but took no steps to avert it until after blood had been shed and Canada had a civil war on its hands. Then a Commissioner was appointed to redress the grievances of the men whom Middleton's troops were shooting down in their rifle pits.

An admission that the Half Breeds had claims which ought to be considered, does not by any means imply that they were right in taking up arms. Sympathy with grievances does not imply assent to the means of redress adopted. Yet Sir John Macdonald's principal answer, to Mr. Blake was to charge the Liberals with inciting and sympathizing with the Rebellion. He will find no one to believe him. The record of Mr. Blake and his party upon this question is public and no one will be misled by the hollow talk of a Premier, who has long since ceased to weigh the words which he utters against the Liberal leader.

The responsibility for all the bloodshed and misery in the Northwest rests upon Sir John Macdonald, and whatever Parliament may do, the people will in their own good time give their verdict of condemnation.

GLADSTONE.
The foreign policy of the Gladstone Government has not been reversed by the new Administration. In fact things are going on very much the same as if there had not been a change of rulers. In view of this how wretchedly cheap all the talk and bluster of the Tory papers in Canada about the unpatriotic cause of the Liberal Government appears. We note, too, that the correspondents of the New York papers, whose letters are quoted all over this country as law and gospel, are silent about Salisbury although he is stepping carefully in Gladstone's footsteps. The truth of the matter is that Gladstone struck the key note of the politics of the future. The era of Democracy is at hand; when the people rule we will have universal peace and equity between nations and not until then. Imperialism, with its huge standing armies of idle men sapping the life of the nations, with its bloody wars filling millions of graves with the best youth of the age, with its corruption and oppression, dies hard. But it is dying all the same, and the day will come when Gladstone's name will receive its meed of honor, as that of one of the first apostles of the new politics.

NOTES AND COMMENTS.
The charge is made by Mr. Wetmore and his newspaper organs that the magnificent majority which Mr. Wilson had was obtained by improper means. The charge is absolutely false, and they know it is false. The electors of York will remember that when nearly three thousand of them voted confidence in the Government, Mr. Wetmore and his party had the effrontery to state that this vote was corruptly obtained. These malignant disappointed people not only insulted, but a whole constituency.

Opposition say that they did not vote to win; that they knew several before election that they were not to win; but in thirty days from Friday, some of them will begin to wonder why they made such a ridiculous mistake as they did on the day before yesterday. We know that they voted to win. We can tell them of 1,000 reasons why we know that on Friday they thought they were dead of winning.

The Farmer says that it bears its crushing defeat as gracefully as possible. There is not the slightest doubt about it, though there may be a question about the degree of gracefulness with which anybody can be crushed. When Jumbo happens accidentally to step on a toad, the toad may get itself into as graceful a position as possible to meet its impending doom, but all that any bystander takes note of is that it is crushed. But we are glad that the Farmer recognizes that it and its friends are crushed. They may also make up their minds to stay crushed.

How the Tories Work It.
OTTAWA, July 8.—When Lord Lorne made his celebrated trip to the Rockies it will be remembered that His Excellency gave out as a reason for refusing to allow newspaper correspondents to accompany him that he was paying the cost of the trip. Subsequent developments disclosed the fact that \$10,000 was disbursed on account of the trip by the mounted police. The charge on the country does not appear to have stopped here, as after the lapse of four years Purcell & Ryan, railway contractors, who carried Vice Regal party over the section of the Canadian Pacific they were then constructing, appear here with a big claim for transport and sundry expenses disbursed by them. It is understood the Government will pay the claim, as the general elections are not far distant and a grand election fund will be required.

NORTHWEST TROUBLES.
The charge upon which the Rebel Chief will be tried.

REGINA, July 8.—The following is the indictment against Riel: 6th day of July in the year of our Lord, 1885, Town of Regina in the Northwest Territories, before Hugh Richardson, Esq., one of the stipendiary Magistrates of the Northwest Territories, exercising criminal jurisdiction under the provisions of Northwest Territories Act, 1880: Louis Riel—you stand charged on oath before me as follows: The information and complaint of Alexander Stewart, of the city of Hamilton, Province of Ontario, Dominion of Canada, Chief of Police, taken the sixth day of July, in the year of our Lord, 1885, before the undersigned, one of Her Majesty's stipendiary Magistrates in and for the said Northwest Territories of Canada, who saith: First—that you, Louis Riel, being a subject of our lady the Queen, not regarding the duty of your allegiance, nor having the fear of God in your heart, but being moved and seduced by the instigation of the devil as a false traitor against our said lady the Queen, and wholly withdrawing the allegiance, fidelity and obedience which every true and faithful subject of our said lady the Queen should and of right ought to bear towards our said lady the Queen, on the twenty-sixth day of March, in the year aforesaid, together with divers other false traitors to the said Stewart, unknown, armed and arrayed in warlike manner, that is to say, with guns, rifles, pistols, bayonets and other weapons, being then unlawfully, maliciously and traitorously assembled and gathered together against our said lady the Queen, most wickedly, maliciously, traitorously did levy and make war against our lady the Queen, at a locality known as Duck Lake, in the said Northwest Territories of Canada, within this realm, and did then maliciously and traitorously attempt and endeavor by force and arms to subvert and destroy the constitution and government of this realm as by law established and depose our said lady the Queen from the style, honor and kingly name of the imperial crown of this realm, in contempt of our said lady the Queen and her laws, to the evil exempt of all others in like case offending, contrary to the duty of the allegiance of him, the said Louis Riel, against the form of statute in such case made and provided, and against the peace of the Lady, Queen Victoria, her crown and dignity. Clause two: And the said Alex. David Stewart further saith that the said Louis Riel, being a subject of our lady the Queen, etc. [This clause is word for word like clause one, excepting that for Duck Lake substitute Fish Creek, and for the 26th day of March substitute the 24th day of April. Clause three is the same as clause two, excepting that for April 24th substitute ninth, tenth, eleventh and twelfth days of May, and instead of Fish Creek substitute "the locality known as Batoche," clause four is the same also; clause 5 is the same as clause 2, both as regards date and place; clause 6 is the same as clause 3, with the date and place the same.] Sworn before me the day and year first above mentioned at the town of Regina in the North West Territories of Canada. (Signed) A. D. STEWART, HUGH RICHARDSON.

YORK MUNICIPALITY.

A Big Deficiency Reported in the Funds of the Council.

Sec'y-Treasurer Rainsford Resigns—Mr. Wilson takes his Place.

Very Important Reports from the Special Committees.

The third session of the County Council convened Wednesday morning at 9 o'clock. Minutes of last session read and approved.

Coun. Rowley, from the committee appointed at last meeting to inquire into the Secretary-Treasurer's accounts, submitted the following report:

The Secretary-Treasurer's Accounts.
The committee appointed at the last January session of the Municipal Council of the County of York to examine the Secretary-Treasurer's accounts, beg leave to submit the following report:

The resolution under which the committee was appointed was passed at the last January session of the said Municipal Council, and was as follows:

"Resolved, That a committee be appointed to examine the Secretary-Treasurer's accounts since 1879, and further, that the committee be authorized to employ an expert accountant, if they deem it necessary, to assist them in their labors, using all proper economy in the matter of expense, and that they be required to report the result of such examination at the next July session."

Councillors Rowley, Murphy and Pinder were appointed a committee under this resolution. The committee was called to meet at the Secretary-Treasurer's office on May 14th, when Couns. Rowley and Murphy met pursuant to notice. Your committee had the Secretary-Treasurer before them and made a preliminary examination of his accounts, and it was thought desirable that the examination of the accounts should be extended back at least as far as November 30th, 1879, and it being deemed necessary to secure the services of an expert accountant, Mr. Wm. Wheeler, of Fredericton, was employed in that capacity.

Herewith annexed is a statement prepared by Mr. Wheeler, after a full and exhaustive examination of the Secretary-Treasurer's accounts, showing the amount for which the Secretary-Treasurer was responsible to the county at the close of each half year since November 30th, 1879, to November 30th, 1884, both inclusive, the amounts to the credit of the Municipality of the People's Bank at the close of each of the half years, and the deficiency to be accounted for by the Secretary-Treasurer at the close of every half year.

From this statement it appears that the balance in the hands of the Secretary-Treasurer, according to his accounts on November 30th, 1879, was \$5,340.88, at which date there was on deposit at the People's Bank, to the credit of the county, \$4,211.01, leaving a balance due of \$1,129.87. On June 30th, 1880, this deficiency had increased to \$2,403.40. On November 30th, 1880, it was \$2,178.63. On June 30th, 1881, it was \$2,406.36, and by November 30th, 1881, it had increased to \$3,622.06. On June 30th, 1882, when the Secretary-Treasurer should have had in his hand \$2,408.72 according to his accounts, he had nothing in hand, but had overdrawn the account at the People's Bank \$2,252.55, making a deficiency of \$4,661.27. On November 30th, of that year, the deficiency was \$6,324.01; on June 30th, 1883, it was \$6,624.73, but by November 30th of that year it was reduced to \$3,284.94. There was a further decrease during the next six months, the deficiency on June 30th, 1884, being \$3,029.23. This was increased to \$3,129.30 up to November 30th, 1884. On that date, that is at the close of the last county fiscal year, the accounts showed that the Secretary-Treasurer held moneys belonging to the county to the amount of \$6,236.70, but the amount on deposit to the credit of the county at the People's Bank on that date was only \$3,037.34, leaving the sum of \$3,199.36 unaccounted for.

Your committee did not consider the accounts since November 30th last to be included in the scope of the reference to them. Your committee beg to call the attention of the Council to the extraordinary circumstances that the condition of things above set out has existed for many years. It appears to the committee that a system of auditing the county accounts which makes it possible that the Secretary should be permitted to be in funds to the amount of \$4,298.72; when at that very day its account at the bank was overdrawn \$4,155.93 must be radically defective.

Your committee would also call the attention of the Council to the fact that each parish has annually paid so much into the sinking fund, no general sinking fund account has been kept, and that the general sinking fund account, as by law required, been kept it is difficult to understand how the deficiency could have occurred.

Your committee feel great regret at being compelled to make so unfavorable a report; and recommend that the Secy. Treasurer of the county in future exercise the closest supervision of the county accounts. And your committee would further recommend that a standing audit committee of three members, one of whom shall be the Auditor, be appointed, who shall have power to examine all the county accounts, and who shall have access to the bank account at any time, and whose duty it shall be to report semi-annually to the Municipal Council.

Your committee also recommend that the Secretary-Treasurer be required to balance his accounts at the close of every month. Your committee think it just to the moral standing of the Secretary-Treasurer to state that from evidence submitted to them it would seem as though the deficiency in his accounts has arisen from the misapplication of funds by employees who had charge of his books and cash in whom he universally secured to have every confidence, and your committee are well informed that criminal prosecution against one of these employees is now pending, and therefore feel themselves precluded from making any further reference to the facts.

The expense of the committee's investigation is \$50, the amount of Mr. Wheeler's charges.

The Secretary-Treasurer has the benefit of any checks having been drawn and presented at the Bank at time of taking the different balances.

Moved and carried that the report just read be adopted.

On motion of Coun. Moody Mr. George Gains and Other Stales were appointed constables for Prince William.

Councillor Lawson moved that John London and Wm. Graham be appointed constables in the parish of Canterbury.

Coun. Martin moved that the following be added to the list of parish officers:

Southampton—Levi Moore, Road Surveyor, in place of H. Draper, and the following to be appointed constables: John Hammond, Jas McDonald, Fred Stairs, and Richard Rogers.

Gabriel Tompkins, surveyor in place of E. Tompkins, resigned.

Coun. McMennamin asked if the Secretary-Treasurer had tendered his resignation yet.

The Warden replied that he had.

Coun. Goodspeed moved, seconded by Coun. Colter, that Mr. Rainsford's resignation be accepted. Carried.

Coun. McMennamin moved that William Wilson be appointed Secretary-Treasurer.

As no other nominations were made, the Warden declared Mr. Wilson elected.

On motion resolved that Mr. Wilson file his bonds and security for the sum of \$20,000.

Coun. Jamieson moved that George Brown be appointed pound keeper in the Parish of Canterbury in place of John Boden, deceased.

On motion of Coun. McMennamin the following names were added to the list of parish officers of Stanley for 1885: Wm. Turnbull, Commissioner of Bye Roads, in place of Gilbert Pringle, resigned; Joseph Wade, constable, and Thos McDonald Road Surveyor.

John Buddick was appointed Road Surveyor for the Parish of Manners-Sutton.

Jas A. Vanwart tendered his resignation as Auditor to the Council.

On motion of Mr. Scott seconded by Mr. McMennamin, Mr. John Black was appointed Auditor.

Council adjourned until 2 o'clock.

WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON.

Mr. Wilson presented to the Council the necessary bonds and securities for his office, which were accepted by the Council.

Coun. Colter, from the Jail Committee, submitted a few items of debts contracted, for Council to consider whether such should be paid.

On motion the items were referred back to the committee to take such action as they deemed advisable.

Councillor Howe submitted the report from committee to examine into the general accounts.

Coun. Murphy asked, in connection with the report on accounts, for information concerning the issuing of debentures.

Coun. Colter explained that he and the Secretary-Treasurer spent a considerable time and trouble in issuing new debentures, and advised the Council to remunerate the Secretary. The county was saved over \$500 by their services.

Coun. Goodspeed objected to ex-Warden Colter receiving any remuneration, but thought the Secretary-Treasurer should be paid.

Coun. Sloan thought extra payments to committees appointed was a poor precedent to establish, but would not object to the Secretary being paid.

Councillor Howe, while he thought it was a poor policy for any councillor to support extra being paid, wanted to know whether it came under the bona fide duties of the Secretary. If so, it should be paid.

Councillor Sloan said that resolutions were made a few years ago defining the duties of the Secretary-Treasurer.

Coun. McElroy made enquiries concerning whether the assessment tax on Wild Land would be made for the current year under the recent changes.

Mr. Wilson said he thought the assessment would be made under the law as changed this year, but for the benefit of the county would make inquiries to see.

Councillor Colter thought a considerable trouble would occur in making assessment on the Wild Land and suggested that Mr. Loggie should furnish maps for the convenience of assessors.

Coun. Sloan moved that Byron Eady, Merrieth and John Pickard be appointed drovers for the parish of Bright.

Coun. Lawson moved that license be granted to Harris Akerley, for the sum of one dollar per annum, to run a ferry between M. Lemmence's, in Southampton, to the Dow meeting house in Canterbury, for the period of three years. Permission was granted.

Coun. Colter moved, seconded by Coun. McNally, that a committee be appointed to ascertain the amount of wild land taxable under the new law.

Couns. Colter, Rowley, McMennamin, McElroy and Pinder were appointed.

Coun. Rowley moved that a standing audit committee of three be appointed, one of which to be an auditor to examine at any time all county and parish accounts, who shall have power to examine the bank accounts of the municipality at any time, and who shall report semi-annually to the Council.

Coun. Rowley moved that Mr. Rainsford be paid \$100 for his liabilities for his extra services, but this action to form no precedent for the future. Carried.

Coun. Lawson moved that \$20 be paid to Henry B. Rainsford for legal services in Canterbury. Carried.

Coun. Lawson, from the committee to examine in the Secretary-Treasurer's account, submitted the following report:

We the undersigned committee appointed to examine the Secretary-Treasurer's accounts from the 20th Nov. 1884, to the 6th July, beg leave to report that we have attended to that duty and find the Secy. Treasurer's accounts show that during the term he had received the sum of \$1,471.88, but your committee from the information before them cannot certify to any correctness thereof. The payment for the same period amounts to \$8,155.68. Assuming the receipts to be correct there should be a balance on hand of \$5,200.70, whereas the actual balance on hand is only \$36.25-100, but Mr. Rainsford has been allowed \$4,612.74 which leave the actual deficiency \$2,642.74.

Coun. Rowley moved that a committee, one of whom shall be the Warden, be appointed to verify the Secretary-Treasurer of the amount of his indebtedness and endeavor to collect the same before the next meeting of the Council.

The Warden, Couns. Rowley, Colter, Gilman, and Lawson were appointed members of said committee.

On motion of Coun. Goodspeed the Warden was authorized, owing to the lack of funds in municipality, to borrow money from the People's Bank to meet certain payments which will soon have to be made.

Moved and carried that the GLEANER and Capital reporters receive the sum of \$5 each.

On motion resolved that the printing committee be instructed to keep the bills of stationery, etc., separate from the General fund.

Coun. Colter moved that the new Secretary-Treasurer be instructed to take proceedings against all delinquents on or before the first of November.

Council adjourned sine die.

Assessment Appeal Committee.
