

The Why? of Another Victory Loan

WHEN, on the morning of November 11th, 1918, the guns were hushed and glad tidings flashed across the world, there followed with the Nation's Prayer of Thanksgiving, one yearning query, which found echo in the faster beating hearts of wives, mothers, fathers, brothers, sisters and sweethearts. That query was, "How soon will our boy be home?" And, from France and Flanders, from Italy and Egypt, from Palestine and from far-off Siberia, there came an answering echo, "How soon, how soon, may we go home?"

CANADA caught the spirit of these longings, and at once resolved to satisfy them. It was an appalling task. Shipping was tragically scarce. The composition of the Army of Occupation had not then been settled. And other parts of the Empire as well as Canada were looking for the speedy return of their men.

THE problem was this. The half-million men that Canada had overseas had taken more than four years to transport to the field of battle. To bring them home in a few months was a gigantic undertaking—one to tax all Canada's ingenuity and resources. Canada solved the problem, but it meant crowding into a few short months, an expense for demobilization which it was impossible to foresee.

THEN, too, besides the sentimental aspect of the necessity for bringing the men home quickly the economic side could not be overlooked. That was, to transform efficiently and speedily the nation's army of fighters into a national army of

Up to August 15th, 20,495 soldiers had applied for land under the terms of this Act; and 22,281 applications had been investigated, and the qualifications of the applicant approved. For this purpose Canada this year requires \$24,000,000. These national expendituses are war expenses. They will be accepted readily by every citizen who gives thought to the task which Canada faced following the Armistice, and to the success with which she has met it.

National Working Capital

Canada needs national working capital, so that she may be able to sell on credit to Great Britain and our Allies the products of our farms, forests, fisheries,

mines and factories. You may ask "Why sell to them if they can't pay cash?"
The answer is, "Their orders are absolutely essential to the continuance of our agricultural and industrial

The magnitude of these orders and the amount of employment thus created, will depend upon the success of the Victory Loan 1919.

The "Why" Farmers and manufacturers (and that includes the workers on these orders) must be paid cash for their products. Therefore, Canada must borrow money from her citizens to give credit, temporarily, to Great Britain and our Allies. Actually, no money will pass out of Canada. If Canada does not give credit, other countries will; and they will get the trade, and have the employment that should be ours, to distribute amongst their workers. And remember, we absolutely need these orders to maintain employment. If we don't finance them business will feel the depression, employment will not be as plentiful, and conditions everywhere will be adversely affected.

For Transportation Money must also be available to carry on the nation's shipbuilding programme, and other transportation development work.
For loans to Provincial Housing Commissions who are building moderate priced houses.

These, then, are some of the things for which Canada needs national working capital. She is in the position of a great trading company, and her citizens who buy victory Bonds are the shareholders.

Those who give thought to our outstanding obligations to soldiers, and to our need for national working capital, cannot fail to be impressed with the absolute necessity for the

CANADIANS IN RHARI UNIVERSITY.

A New Branch Has Been Opened at Ripon In Yorkshire Where Young Men Who Have Been Fighting for Their Country Are Now Bel Prepared for Degrees as Scholars

BOUT 25,000 Canadian soldiers in England and France, who are awaiting their re turn to Canada, are studying in the Khaki University of Canada that branch of the Overseas Ministry of Militia and Defence that under takes to teach the men anything from reading, 'riting and 'rithmetic to theology, medicine, engineering, etc. The latest, and probably the most ambitious, branch of this service is a concentration camp at Ripon, in Yorkshire, where students wishing to take up studies leading to a university degree can be accommodated. Five hundred students is the capacity of this camp, and between two and three hundred have already registered.

registered.

The universities of Canada are aiding the scheme in every way. They have promised to recognize every credit or standing granted by the university when it holds its final examinations in June. They have even loaned members of their teaching staff to the university. The chief lecturer in history, for instance, is Prof. George M. Wrong of Toronto University, who is undoubtedly Canada and the contraction of the contrac Prof. George M. Wrong of Toronto University, who is undoubtedly Canada's chief historian. Prof. Coleman, also of Toronto University, who during the war has been engaged on research work for the Canadian Government, lectures in biology, and the other members of the faculty are educationists of tried ability.

Textbooks are provided free to dit the men. What this means mer happreciated when one considers that the textbooks used by an ordinary university s'udent cost anywhere from \$25 to \$35 when he purchases them himself.

The range of subjects studied is wide indeed for so young an organization. The following faculties have been established;
Junior matriculation.
Arts (1st, 2nd, and 3rd year).
Science (1st and 2nd year).

Surveying Theology (1st, 2nd and 3rd years). Law (1st, 2nd and 3rd years). Agriculture (1st and 2nd years).

The university spirit predominates at this khaki school and military dis er this knaki school and military dis-cipline, though nominally retained, is not found necessary. Every stu-dent is too keenly interested in his work to require to be paraded to his

The department of theology is especially fortunate, as it has taken over the Anglican Training College of the diocese which has its centre in Ripon Cathedral. Here they have a fine library and all the other advantages that go with a theological college. To help the men of other denominations, the Presbyterian, Baptist, Methodist and Congregational churches in Canada have each sent over one of their own ministers to supervise the training of students every organ and nerve in the are driven out, and the weak, to supervise the training of students

All the men who are attending the university have signified their willingness to remain in England until June 30 in order to complete their courses. They are willing to do this, because instead of paying university fees, buying books and paying board to attend a Canadian university, every man is completing one year of his training with no expenses in the it seems is the sensible thing to his training with no expenses in the way of fees, books or board bills, and they are receiving their army pay and subsistence in addition.






