### THREE HUNDRED PER CENT PROFIT

Romantic Story of Dominion Textile Company.

(Toronto Globe Editorial.)

The story of the Dominion Textile Company as unfolded before the Parliamentary Committee on the Cost of Living is so romantic that it would have been unfair to the public if the tale had been buried in a dry financial statement. The company was organized only in 1905, but it has done amazingly well for its age. It issued preferred stock to the companies it took over, and adopted the favorite device of creating millions of common stock, mostly water, as a pledge of its faith in the future. The net earnings in the past fiscal year were \$3,474,752. After deducting rentals, bond interest, preferred dividends, and war taxes, and making ample allowance for depreciation and replacements, there was available \$1,500,000 as profits or surplus. The company has a surplus of \$1,159,888 which was added to previous surplus of \$2,189,114—total \$3,349,002. The 21,000,000 common stock for which no dollar has been paid has been valued as high as \$100 a share. It was estimated that the company had bought 1,222,000 shares at \$22 a share, but the price had risen to \$30, but the company had not paid for them. It should go to itself, not to competitors. The Dominion Textile Company is a busy infant, but it would resist any attempt to deprive it of its tariff protection. The country has a whole nursery of the same kind.

### HUN WARSHIPS IN GERMAN WATERS ARE REPORTED SENT DOWN

Were Anchored Off Kiel, Wilhelmshaven and Other Points. Weimar, June 22.—(By the Associated Press)—The German warships were not surrendered to the Allies and which have been anchored off Kiel, Wilhelmshaven and other points, have been sunk by German sailors manning them, according to a report received here from a reliable authority. According to the report there were twelve German war vessels, besides destroyers, which were in German waters, not having been turned to the Entente under the armistice provisions. London, June 22.—Early this morning a violent explosion occurred close to the spot where one of the German warships was sunk yesterday, says a Kirkwall despatch to the Central News. A huge column of water and much debris was thrown up. The single German warship, which remained anchored last night, has gone aground. All the German crews have been placed aboard the British battleship Royal Sovereign.

London, June 24.—News of the German government's agreement to sign the peace terms resulted in patriotic demonstrations throughout Germany. In Berlin, Munich and other large cities, the dispatch agents, processionaries formed and marched along the principal streets, the participants singing war songs and cheering the generals of the old empire.

London, June 24.—Admiral Von Reuter, scuttled and sunk in Scapa Flow, will be court-martialed for having broken the armistice conditions, says the Daily Mail today. The newspapers add that the details of the trial of the Admiral will be arranged by the Allied Council in Paris.

LIBERAL GOVERNMENT RETURNED TO POWER Sixty-Eight Liberals and Nine Conservatives Elected in Quebec.

Montreal, June 23.—Sir Louis Gauthier goes back to power in Quebec with a slightly reduced majority as the result of the Provincial election today. His former strength was 65 Liberals and 6 Conservatives. His present strength, leaving out Pontiac and the electoral last election but returns for which are not to hand tonight, is 68 Liberals against 9 Conservatives and 2 Labor Union men.

BELGIAN RULERS WILL VISIT AMERICA.

Brussels, June 23.—(French Wireless Service)—Before President Wilson left Belgium, it was announced today, King Albert and Queen Elizabeth accepted his invitation to visit the United States. The Belgian rulers probably will go to America in September.

### OLD 73rd REGIMENT TO HAVE NEW NAME.

### First Comprehensive Idea of Proposed Reorganization of Militia Units.

If present plans for the reorganization of the New Brunswick militia are carried out there will be a new infantry unit to be known as the 26th New Brunswick Regiment consisting of five battalions.

This name of New Brunswick's only infantry unit in the Canadian corps will be perpetuated and the five existing militia battalions embraced. The latter will be known by numbers 1 to 5, according to their seniority, which is 67th, 71st, 73rd, 74th and 62nd, so that the present 73rd Northumberland Regiment will become No. 3 Northumberland Battalion of the 26th New Brunswick Regiment.

The three batteries of field artillery which fought throughout the war, the 2nd, 3rd and 4th, will be reorganized as the 1st, 2nd and 3rd batteries of the 8th Field Artillery, thus perpetuating the New Brunswick unit of that branch of the service in the field known widely as "Anderson's Battery." The cavalry units, including the 8th, 14th and 28th Hussars and the P. E. I. Light Horse will be known as the Canadian Mounted Rifles, the 1st Brighton Engineers will retain their name under which they fought throughout the war, the Corp of Guides will merge with the Intelligence Corps, the C. A. M. C. will become affiliated with the 14th Field Ambulance, the Army Service Corps with the 2nd Divisional Train and so on with the various services.
