

SIX IRISH REBELS ARE EXECUTED IN MOUNTJOY PRISON

BOARD OF EDUCATION IN THREE-HOUR SESSION CUTS \$30,000 FROM ESTIMATES

Ignore Request From No. 1 Committee of the City Council Asking for \$100,000 Reduction—Teachers Will Get Salary Increases Promised by Trustees.

After being in session for over three hours this morning, the board of education decided that in the interests of the city of London and the maintenance of efficiency of its schools, no cut was possible in the salary schedule prepared by the board and included in its estimates presented to No. 1 committee of the city council last week.

The board of education today, after a three-hour session, cut \$30,000 from its estimates for the year 1921-22. The board's action was taken after a long and heated discussion.

REV. J. O. L. SPRACKLIN NOT TO SPEAK IN TORONTO DURING THE REFERENDUM CAMPAIGN

Influence From Within Methodist Church Has Been Brought To Bear To Cancel His Engagements in Queen City—Plans To Bring "Pussyfoot" Johnson From the United States Not Likely To Be Carried Out.

Toronto, March 14.—Rev. J. O. L. Spracklin of Sandwich will not speak in Toronto in the referendum campaign. He was to have spoken in Elm Street Methodist Church, but influence was brought to bear from within the church which resulted in his not appearing.

It is also likely the plans to bring "Pussyfoot" Johnson from the United States will also be interfered with.

The matter was discussed with the Canadian Press this morning, but the referendum committee issued a statement to the effect that it did not intend to invite outside speakers to come to Toronto at this juncture in the prohibition campaign.

Questioned this morning regarding the statement of Rev. Mr. Spracklin at Paris yesterday, that his life had been threatened by the Determination League, Chairman J. D. Flavell of the Ontario License Board said today he had never heard of the threat nor had the attorney-general's office heard of it.

Opinion is that the threat was the work of some fanatic acting for himself. No such league is known here.

CAPITAL SHIPS IN NAVY TO BE REDUCED TO 16

Less Than Half in Full Commission at Outbreak of War.

London, March 14.—The British naval estimates for 1921-22 call for 19,156,800 pounds gross and 23,479,000 pounds net, it was announced by Lord Lee of Farnham first lord of the admiralty, today.

WILL REQUIRE SEVEN WEEKS TO PRESENT WORKERS' ARGUMENT

Railroad Wage Controversy Again Before U. S. Government Board.

Chicago, March 14.—The railroad wage controversy and the rail executives' plea for the abrogation of the national agreements governing working conditions in the shop crafts were again before the United States Railway Labor Board today.

The board was prepared this morning to continue hearings on the rebuttal of labor chiefs to the rail manager's plea for the nullification of the national agreements on the ground that they imposed an unjust and unequal burden, and constituted a financial burden which headed the transportation system of the country for insolvency.

It is rumored that a resolution may be introduced in the Senate to declare the seat of Senator George P. Fowler vacant on the ground of non-residence in New Brunswick.

IRISH FACTIONS PLAN DIFFERENT CELEBRATIONS

De Valera's Supporters Not To Be in New York Parade.

New York, March 14.—Canadian Press.—The St. Patrick's Day Parade this year will be a test of strength between two Irish factions in New York, the adherents of Eamon De Valera, "president of the Irish Republic" and the "Friends of Irish Freedom" who apply to the leadership of the United States Supreme Court Justice Daniel P. Cohan.

De Valera's supporters will not boycott the parade, instead they will hold meetings and entertainments for the benefit of the Irish Relief Fund.

CITIZENS' LIBERTY LEAGUE BEGINS ONT. CAMPAIGN

Toronto, March 14.—A general appeal for funds to wage a campaign for the upholding of personal liberty, has been made in circular letters to householders of Toronto, by the Citizens' Liberty League, headed by I. F. Heilmuth, K. C.

It is planned to hold many meetings to endeavor to produce a majority of "Noes" at the provincial referendum on April 14, in regard to the prohibition of the import of liquor into Ontario.

PRINCESS RECOVERING. Athens, March 14.—Princess Anastasia, wife of Prince Christopher, who underwent a serious operation last week, continues to improve, and is taking solid foods.

CHURCH UNION MAY MEAN CORRUPTION OF PROTESTANTISM

Fear Expressed by Rev. A. C. Bingham in Egerton Street Church.

Expressing the fear that Protestantism may become corrupt like other great religions of the past, Rev. A. C. Bingham, preaching at Egerton Street Baptist Church last night, reviewed in an interesting manner the growth of Protestantism and briefly outlined the dangers which he foresees.

Against Corrupt Times. "Protestantism," he said, "commenced in Germany 400 years ago under the protection of a Saxon prince and through the instrumentality of Martin Luther. Through the mystical and mighty influence of the Word of God Luther was encouraged and enthused to take his stand against the corruption of his time."

"The two factors that led to that corruption were the ambition of the church to be big, and the wrong method of collecting money for church purposes. 'Great religions, like rivers, snowballs and glaciers, when they become big pick up a lot of foreign substances which only corrupt them. History repeats itself and I am sure that the future of Protestantism, Denominationalism has in my estimation got to be an afraid,' concluded Mr. Bingham, 'that church union, like other big religious movements, will through its very size tend to corruption and the undoing of Protestantism.'"

IRISH STARVING BY WAYSIDES; RELIEF APPEAL MADE HERE

Monsignor McKeon Says the Newspapers Publish Cooked and Censored Reports.

About 500 members of the Holy Name Society recalled Holy Communion in St. Peter's Cathedral at the 8:30 mass Sunday morning. The preacher was Right Rev. Monsignor McKeon, who congratulated the men on their large attendance. He also read a letter from Bishop Fallon regarding the present troubles in that country, intimating that the collection at the masses on St. Patrick's Day would be devoted to the relief of this distress.

Rev. D. C. MacGregor Says Unorthodox Creeds Fail To Survive.

"It is no evidence that a man is an advanced thinker when he says that Christ was only a teacher," was the statement of Rev. D. C. MacGregor in his sermon yesterday morning on "The Deity of Jesus." That men of similar views exist in Christ's day was proved by the fact also that through all the centuries the various sects that have not acknowledged the fact that Christ is the Son of God have become extinct.

Centre of Conflict. "Christ is the centre of a struggle and conflict today," said the preacher, "and Christians should have a reason to give the world for their faith that is the Divine Son of God, and the ultimate proof of Christ must be a personal experience that permits the statement, 'I know whom I have believed, and am persuaded that he is the Son of God who has done nothing in the way of sending out representatives, and their existence has been brief.'"

Land close to cities is far too valuable to be used for pasturing, and dairy farms are often as far back as 200 miles from their metropolitan market. So the cost of drying and being must be added to the cost of the milk itself. Pasteurization, sterilization of bottles and utensils, refrigerating and laboratories where the milk is tested, become items in the cost. You are buying protection against a fluctuating supply. The milk output is greatest in the spring, and the surplus in the dealer's hands must either be wasted and become dead loss or turned into some by-product, such as butter, cheese, ice cream, etc., which cannot hope to compete with the specialising dairies. You are paying for leaf and broken bottles—each one costs, six cents—for service to customers who buy small quantities at irregular periods, for accounting, administration, inspectors, and the incidental expense of an organized business; but at that, milk is still a cheap food for the money.

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

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BRITISH GOVERNMENT POLICIES ON ONE POWER STANDARD FOR NAVAL ESTIMATES ARE DROUGED

Navy Estimates Show a Reduction of About Ten Million Pounds—Four Big New Battleships May Be Laid Down Shortly.

LONDON, March 13.—The navy estimates for 1921-22, to be made public tomorrow, will show a reduction of some millions of pounds on the net estimate from the last fiscal year, which was \$34,772,000, according to the forecast of the political correspondent of the London Times. He says that the reduction of possibly ten million pounds sterling, and understands that, following upon the inclusion of the sub-committee on imperial defence, the Government has decided in principle that the capital ship must continue to be the main unit of an effective fleet.

Adhering to the policy of the "one power standard," enunciated by Walter Hume Long, former first lord of the admiralty, last summer, the Government says the corresponding orders that the remaining 30 capital ships constitute for the present an adequate basis for the maintenance of the one power standard.

But at least four of these ships will presently need to be replaced, the forecast continues, "the construction of four vessels of their type will eventually be necessary."

After consultation with the Dominion government next June, it adds, orders may be placed for the building of these four new vessels, but it is possible that in the meantime beginning may be made by laying down two.

FORMER KAISER CLAIMS THAT HE WAS A GENUINE DOVE OF PEACE Tried For Thirty Years To Avert Wars, He Says, in Book He Has Written—Foiled by Perfidious Machinations of Great Britain, France and Russia.

THE HAGUE, March 13.—In the book he has written for private distribution, in an effort to show that Great Britain was responsible for the war, former Emperor William of Germany today speaks always of himself in the third person. He points William II. as a man who tried for 20 years to maintain peace in Europe, but says he was foiled by the "perfidious machinations of Great Britain, France and Russia."

As long ago as 1905, the former kaiser says, he tried to found a league of nations. Although no full copy of the book is yet available, and both the former emperor's entourage and the Dutch and German Governments are worried because of the publication of the contents of the volume have leaked out to indicate the general trend of the entire work. The leak was principally due to the Berlin correspondent of the Rotterdam Maasbode.

Tells of Visit. The correspondent says the book begins with notes as far back as 1884 (William succeeded his father as king and emperor in 1888). "In some places," says the correspondent, "the document is very interesting, especially notes of August 13, 1911, where he treats of the visit of William to Czar Alexander III. at Narvik, when the czar said he intended to restore a monarchy in France. But already, says the kaiser, the Russian French military agreement had been negotiated saying that in the event of mobilization of any member of the triple alliance (Germany, France and Russia), a mobilization of French and Russian forces would be ordered immediately, and these armies thrown into action at once."

Under date of April 15, 1918, the former emperor writes: "A British proposal for an alliance of Germany against Russia is declined."

CORNWALL-DEVON REUNION PLEASURES Five Hundred Natives of England Enjoy Program At Y. M. C. A.

Typical in every respect of nights spent in Greater London, was the Cornwall-Devon reunion at the Y. M. C. A. on Saturday night. Over 500 natives of these two counties and the great city of London, gathered for the occasion, and all voiced their opinions of it as being one of the best of the evenings that have been held. A demonstration of the new points of interest in the European metropolis, for the residents of the city, Littleton, they realize how quickly it had grown and how low building prices could be carried out successfully. Pictures pertaining to this were of a very educational nature. The scenic parts of the counties were shown and it was quite evident that the English spectators wished to be back in their native land.

MRS. BEAL, PROMINENT CHURCH WORKER, DIES After an extended illness, Mrs. Martha Beal, wife of C. J. Beal, died at her home, 431 Waterloo street, on Sunday. She was for many years a prominent worker in the Women's Christian Temperance Union, and for over 10 years member of Dundas Centre Methodist Church, Woodland, Berkshire, England. She came to Canada with her parents in 1871, residing in this city ever since. Besides her husband, Mrs. Beal is survived by three sons, Carl G. Beal of Toronto; H. B. and Arthur Beal of this city; two daughters, Miss Marion Beal in Elmwood, and Miss Adeline at home, and one sister, Miss Rhoda Shuff of London. The late Dr. Norman Beal was son.

DECLARES WOMEN ARE TO BLAME FOR CONDITIONS

Ex-President of Provincial U. F. W. O. Scores Immodesty of Dress.

ST. MARYS, March 12.—The local branch of the U. F. W. O. held a pleasant social evening in the town hall in the form of a reception for new members and their wives. Mrs. Vanstone, the president, occupied the chair. The principal speaker of the evening was Mrs. Brody of Newmarket, ex-president of the Provincial Union of the U. F. W. O. She stated that at the present time the blame for conditions throughout the country is placed on the shoulders of the men, but they were not to blame; it was the farm women of Canada who were falling down in their work. "Do not blame the young girls of Canada for going about 'dressed,' which today practically means undressed, she said. I have seen grey-haired women attending social functions in the city of Toronto dressed far more vulgarly than young girls. We see our daughters go about with their low-necked dresses, pink brooches, unfastened, and worst of all, dresses up to their necks. Here the speaker made a slight pause, which provoked laughter.

Men Are Busy. Men are looking after the commercial side of national building, so now it is up to the women to look after the social and educational side. Our children should be educated to higher ideals in our schools. At least 85 per cent of our boys and girls never pass public school, then let us have them educated right there in the proper manner so that when they go out into the world they will feel they have learned something which will be a blessing to them in after years; let us impress upon them the responsibility that will be theirs. We can reach all the people through our public schools; then let us make it interesting.
