London, March 14.—The British naval estimates for 1921 1922 call for 91,186,889 pounds gross and 82,479,000 pounds net, it was announced by Lord Lee of Foreham, first lord of the admiralty, today. In a statement explaining the estimates, Lord Lee said they were based on the deverment's relieve of maintain. mates, Lord Lee said they were based on the Government's policy of maintaining a 'one-power standard."

"It is the duty of the admiralty to carry out that policy as economically as possible," Lord Lee's statement continued, "giving full weight to the special geographical, international and other considerations which have arisen since the war. This they are doingin no mechanical spirit nor with insistence upon numerical equality—and recognizing to the fullest the necessity of reducing expenditure to the lowest limits compatible with national security. The admiralty have effected drastic economies and have agreed to assume risks which in ordinary circumstances

economies and have agreed to assume risks which in ordinary circumstances they would regard as difficult to reconcile with full maintenance of the Government's declared policy.

Lord Lee pointed out that the economies included a reduction in the number of capital ships in full commission from twenty to sixteen, as compared with thirty-eight in 1914.

"This is the smallest number that will enable the essential sea-going technical training of officers and men to be carried out properly," the statement asserted.

S. Little to be present when the chairmen of the various committees presented their reports. The mayor was reached by telephone and immediately responded to the suggestion, bringing with him the city treasurer.

Chairman Coleridge met the mayor at the door of the board room and formally escorted him to a seat on the dais alongside himself, while Mr. Bell occupied a seat on the other side.

After a brief word of welcome and explanation, Mr. Coleridge called on Trustee Smith, as chairman of No. 1 committee, to make his report.

No. 1 committee, said Mr. Smith, after going carefully into its estimates, has made a reduction of \$6,425. "In one case, that of the auxiliary classes, we have made a reduction from \$3,000 to \$1,000. With regard to the teachers' salaries we do not feel at the present time that it would be wise to reduce them. If we want the best possible teachers we must pay a fair salary. The obtaining of efficient teachers being one of supply and demand.






