WEEKLY.

Wheat has been advancing steadily all week. The gain so far is 7c per cwt, \$1.10 being the price a week ago, and \$1.17 today. The supply has been light. Rainy weather is said to have damaged the Northwest crop. This, coupled with light receipts in Ontario, and the other fall wheat belts, and the war scare, are considered the cause.

Oats have advanced 8c per cwt during the week. Light receipts and reports of smaller output at threshings created anxiety to buy among speculators, and consumers were forced to bid prices up; 80c to 82c was today's price.

Barley was steady; feeding grades sold at 75c to 80c; malt at 90c to 93c. Old corn brought 80c. No rye, beans or buckwheat offered. Peas were active and scarce at 80c to 90c, the latter being an exceptional bid.

Deliveries of provisions were light, and prices in all kinds were firm and in some a good deal stronger. Chickens and eggs met the chief advances.

The supply of vegetables was good, considering the weather. Prices show an advance in potatoes of 5c a bag, and steady prices for all others, with the exception of cabbage, which were very plentiful and slow of sale.

Fruits are slow and unchanged. The supply of meats was light, and not much change occurred in prices. Sales were hard to make, the inquiry being light.

Live hogs sold slow at \$4, demand steady. Hay was steady at \$5.50 to \$7. Quotations:

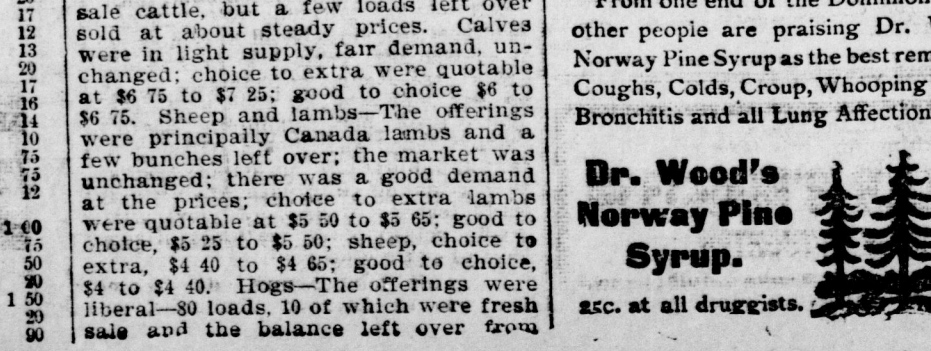
