Immediately after this, Mr. Whitney formally handed over to Mr. Gamey a sealed packet containing the statement and attendant documents read by the member for Manitoulin last Wednesday. ### TWO CANADIANS ON THE TRIBUNAL

Mr. Justice Armour and Lt.-Gov. Sir Louis Jette Chosen.

Ottawa, March 17. - Mr. Justice Armour of the supreme court of Canada, and His Honor Sir Louis Jette, Lieutenant-Governor of Quebec, were chosen yesterday as members of the Alaskan tribunal. These two gentlemen, with Lord Alverstone, chief justice of England, will be the British jurists. Everyone will admit that Mr. Justice Armour and Sir Louis Jette come well within the category, partial jurists of repute," that is called for by the treaty, and as for Lord Alverstone, he stands in the very forefront of the judiciary of the empire. Neither of the three has taken the slightest part in the controversy touching the boundary, and their impartiality and strict sense of fairness make them representatives of whom Great Britain and Canada may well be proud. In making these appointments Canada has done her part to insure an absolutely fair adjustment of the dispute, and has demonstrated to the world that she has every confidence in the justice of her contentions. 

LETTER CARRIERS' SALARIES. To the Editor of The Advertiser:

A short time ago a Toronto letter carrier called upon me and complained that letter carriers were underpaid, stating that his pay was \$7 50 a week, and giving me to understand that this was the regular pay of Toronto letter carriers. Thinking that this scale of pay was too low, my sympathy for the letter carriers was awakened, and I wrote to the postoffice department at Ottawa upon the subject. Shortly afterwards I received an answer which has quite changed my view. The substance of which was as follows: Some 20 years ago an act was passed fixing the wages of a letter carrier at \$30 a month or \$360 a year on appointment, and providing for increases of \$30 a year until the maximum wage of \$600 a year was attained. Under this law it took a letter carrier eight years It was also the practice then as it is now to furnish letter carriers with uniforms. Last session another act was passed under which a person is ap-pointed a probationary letter carrier for six months, to see if he is likely to prove fit for the work. During these six months he is paid at the rate of \$1 25 a day, or \$391 25 a year. At the expiration of six months he is paid at the rate of \$1 50 a day, or \$469 50 a year. At the further expiration of two years, he is raid at the protection of two years. years he is paid at the rate of \$1.75 a day, or \$547.45 a year, and on a further two years he is paid at the rate of \$2 00 a day, or \$626 a year. If the duties which he is performing are of a omewhat responsible character he is paid at the rate of \$2 25 a day, or \$704 25 a year. In addition to each of these amounts he is also entitled to a bonus of \$20 a year for good service. According to this law a person becomes entitled to \$2 00 a day, or \$626 a year, after a service of four and a half years. He is also given two weeks leave of absence each year with full pay. A carrier is also supplied with uniforms

for winter and summer, boots, tunics, overcoats, caps, hats, etc.

In former days the hours of work ran up to nine and ten hours a day. Today a day's work is limited to about eight hours. The department pays the street railways for conveying the carriers to and from their work. When riers to and from their work. 



Hon. John Dryden and Prof. Zavitz Make Fine Addresses.

Mayor William Geddes occupied the chair at the evening meeting, which was well attended, considering the inclement weather and the fact that there were counter-attractions in the town. The chairman, in introducing the speakers of the evening, referred to the progress the school had made, and some of the ex-cellent results it had brought about. The first speaker was Professor Zavitz, who began by saying that twenty years ago he had been a student at the Strathroy high school, and he was pleased to find on his return that so many improvements had taken place in the town. ments had taken place in the town.

The average of all these seeds showed that the largest seed produced 23 tons per acre, the medium 20%, and the smallest 14. There they will get an education similar to that to be received at the high school, with more, and will get it under circumstances that will not draw them away from farm life.

"Every young man ought to make his choice of a calling and should be loyal to it. If he chooses farming, then he should delight in its advancement. The ideal farmer is not above his business. 




