Discuss the Superannuation Question-In Re Victoria College.

MONTREAL, Sept. 25.—At yesterday's session of the Quadriennial Conference Rev. J. T. Pitcher read the report of the superannuation fund. It recommended That any minister who leaves the work, not necessarily for other employment, shall forfeit out the constitution of the amount he has paid into the fund; that the assessments for each year be based on the income of the previous year; that the Investment Committee shall also be an advisory committee to the treasurer. It declined to recommend the abolition of the present system of assessment, and recommended a commission to consider the whole construction of the fund during the quadriennium. In answer to a memorial asking that the salries of ministers be assessed ? per cent. for this fund, it recommended that this be granted for all ministers whose salaries exceed \$900, while all ministers whose salaries of continuing the assessment system and make it a voluntary offering.

Rev. W. W. Carson warmly defended the assessment system. This fund was the guarantee of the church that their ministers will be protected in their old age, and if it were weakened the axe would be laid at the root of the itinerant system.


