London, Dec. 21 .-- European statesmen and politicians are to-day chiefly concerned with the question whether France means to pursue the quarrel with Bulgaria. It is assumed that M. Ribot has not acted without previous consultation with his good friends in St. Petersburg, and that his action may be preliminary to the reopening of the whole Eastern question wherein lie grave dangers. But the best informed people believe that the time is opportune neither for France nor for Rusia to set the Balkans in a blaze, and that the action of the French foreign office will be confined to protests at Constantinople. Little Bulgaria will not yield an inch. She has managed to grow and prosper in spite of the open hostility os the mighty Czar and secret machinations of his agents; and having withstood Russia she feels that she can safely defy France in a matter in which she is in the right.

A humorous feature of what appears to be a tempest in a teacup is that it is doubtful whether M. Chadourne, the offending correspondent of the French newspapers who had been expelled from Bulgaria, is entitled to call himself a Frenchman. One of his parents was not French, and there is no doubt that he was born in Constantinople. He is not at all an interesting person, and as a journalist he is beneath contempt. The proposal to petition the Government in favor of imposing a £3 poll tax on immi grant aliens has been rejected by the London Trade Council, after very full dis-cussion, and nothing more is likely to be heard of it. The arguments which found most favor with the members of the Coun-



Was ever there such an outrage since the days of irresponsible Family

Compactism? It has been said that as Lieutenant-Gover nor Letellier dismissed his Ministers becaus they ignored him and unconstitutionally submitted measures to Parliament before consulting him, Lieutenant-Governor Anger is justified in his action. The conduct o Mr. Letellier's Ministers, as is well pointed out by Hon. THE United States Navy Department has already purchased from this country 4.536 tons of nickel matte, containing about one-fifth that amount of nickel. With nickel-steel armor definitely resolved upon for ship armor in the States, and the nickel alloy likely to enter into other manufactures of steel for Government purposes, a continuous increase in the demand for the metal may be expected. Gun shields and the guns themselves, projectiles, engines, the hulls of vessels, and, in fact, almost all the steel used, may possibly hereafter receive a percentage of this metal. In the merchant marine and the various applica-tions of steel in the mechanic arts the same introduction of this alloy may go on, especially should the supply prove practically inexhaustible, thus bringing down the price, and should the processes of treating the ore also be cheapened. As the New York Times points out, Canada has already eclipsed New Caledonia in the production of nickel, and the reports of its discovery here and there in Provinces as widely separated as Nova Scotia and Ontario indicate what may be expected.

Sarnia, Dec. 19.—All Grand Trunk custices is now carried on through the tunnel, and the yards at Point Edward and Fort Gratiot, which a few weeks ago were crowded with trains and buzzing with the hum of industry, are now almost as silent and deserted as the Egyptian pyramids. The local trains run up there, but all through trains, passenger and freight, go the other way.

The opening of the tunnel route and the onsequent shortening of the distance be-tween Chicago and Buffalo is said to have already perceptibly increased the business of the Grand Trunk.

Two tunnel engines are kept with steam up; one of these takes a train through from the station on this side and then brings a train back; then the other engine takes a train through and brings one back, and they continue to alternate in this way. They handle a train of 24 loaded cars easily. Each tunnel train has its own conductor, engineer and trainmen, whose duty it is to take the train through from this side and bring one back, the regular conductors, engineers and brakemen going on at the stations on each side. It took the first regular passenger train that went through the tunnel just 1 minute and 58 seconds to go from portal to portal.

The Health of London

Dr. Hutchinson Makes His Annual Report,

Showing the City's Record for 1891 to Have Been Exceedingly Good.

Of the sanitary work done during the year 124 visits were made to country dairies and 222 samples of milk examined at the health office, besides many samples of water. Nineteen contaminated wells were closed, 23 caused to be cleaned, 13 persons made to connect their premises with the common sewers, and a careful inspection of all meats sold upon the market. In general, the meat was all of good quality. Some was condemned and destroyed. One carcase, that of a sheep, offered for sale by a Westminster butcher or (dealer, was found to be affected with tuberculosis. One hundred and five citizens' complaints were received, comor dealer, was found to be ameted with tuberculosis. One hundred and five citizens' complaints were received, compared with 76 last year, which might suggest to evil-minded persons a lack of charity and brotherly love among the people of London. Many anonymous letters are received complaining that this person or that has an infectious disease in his or her family which has not been reported. These statements, upon investigation, are generally found to be incorrect.

The draining of what is called "Geary's Flats," in the 6th ward, by direction of the Board of Health, was a sanitary work which will prove of great benefit to that part of the city, but much of the good resulting from this will be negatived unless sewers are laid down on Craig street and part of the Wortley road in order to intercept the sewage which still flows into these flats.

One of the most important things in connection with the sanitary condition of the city is the plumbing. On several occasions

city is the plumbing. On several occasions I have directed the attention of the local live in rented houses from slow poisoning by sewer gas. The frequent and thorough flushing of the sewers in dry weather is absolutely necessary for the preservation of the public health, but as our sewers are constructed it is impossible to flush them in the way it should be done in order to accomplish the desired results with as little waste of water as possible. Much of the force of the water is lost before reaching the sewer proper by having to pass through so many angles. To obviate this I would recommend that manholes be placed at the intersections of the trunk sewers like the one the city engineer recently put down at the Wellington and Waterloo crossings.

A number of deaths recently occurred in a neighboring city from contagious diseases contracted at public funerals. In this city public funerals have been held and the public invited and allowed to see the body where the persons had died of an infectious disease before the health officer had received any notice of the death. In order to secure prompt information of all such deaths I would advise that at the next meeting of the Council a bylaw be passed making it compulsory for undertakers to register deaths at the health office. A permanent building couling \$1,500, painted with special material which could be thoroughly disinfected when disease had disappeared, would be best for this city. What we should do with our sewage is still an unsolved problem. Year after year I have recommended the plan of constructing an intercepting trunk sewer along the river for the purpose of conveying the river for the purpose of the convey in the convey in t city instead of allowing it to enter the river. This trunk sewer would collect the sewage from the other sewers, making them as it were tributaries, carrying it along the left bank of the river to the low lands below the cove, and having sufficient fall pumping engines or tanks would not be required. One acre of land is enough for 1,000 people; eighteen acres would be quite sufficient for London. The disposal of sewage by spreading it over land where it is speedily destroyed by occidation is coming more and more into practice by cities in America and Europe. The sewage from the London Asylum for the Insane, with 1,200 inmates, has been successfully disposed of in this way for three years on the same four acres of land, and there is no reason why it should not prove as successful for all time to come. The fear that a point will be reached when supersaturation of the soil will take place is groundless. Destruction of deleterious, liquid matter when spread upon soil and exposed to the action of the air and sun is sufficiently rapid to prevent the creation of disease germs. The plan of placing large tanks at the mouth of the sewers, and treating the sewage by chemicals before it reaches the river, is expensive and will never be effective. The objection to the intercepting sewer is the cost, but sums of money will be spential litigation, constructing at the dam and other experiments, but sooner or later the city will have to face the music. 
