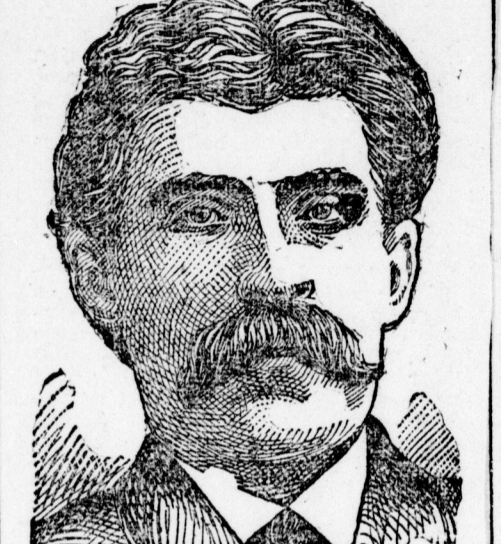

EXEMPT INDUSTRIES. A report was received from Stephen Grant on the industries exempted from taxation. The Hobbs Hardware Company were employing on an average of 27 hands (exclusive of the travelers and office hands), and manufactured beveled glass, stained glass windows, and silver glass for mirrors. The company did not manufacture nails, binder twine or hardware, as mentioned in the by-law. The assessment was \$25,000. John Watson only employed 35 hands instead of 40, as called for under the exemption by-law. The assessment was \$11,500. The Globe Tobacco Company, according to the manager, only employed the average of fifteen hands, while their by-law called for 30. The rest of the exempted industries were complying with the by-law.

WANT TO ESTABLISH IN CANADA. The Marion Steam Shovel Company stated that they were considering the erection of a branch in Canada. The weekly pay roll at the company's works in the States amounted to from \$3,000 to \$20,000. "What inducements can you offer us?" the concern asked.
