[Canadian Press.] PARIS, Oct. 30.-11:40 p.m.-Officers returning here from the battlefront declare that success for the allies has grown out of the series of furious conflicts on the extreme wing lying along the North Sea coast as well as in the vicinity of Ypres and Arras. Everywhere, they say, the Belgian, French and British forces have been able to resist the onslaughts of the German columns and to reply with counter-attacks so full of vigor that they carried the allies always still farther forward in the movement to recapture Bel-

The unhesitating manner in which the Germans threw their masses of men at the allied positions time after time, caused stonishment. the lines of the allies the impression prevailed that it was the determination of the Germans to break through at any cost. Their heroic sacrifices were vain, however, for after they had used themselves as a human battering ram, they were compelled to fall back without having accomplished their task.
