





I pay a man and his wife £40 a year to look after me, and they make me exceedingly comfortable. For plowing and haymaking I hire extra help. I spend one or two days out of each week in the city, and can thus look over all the English periodicals at the club, and keep in touch with my friends, who often pay me a visit, and sometimes profess to envy me. One intimate friend spends each week-end at the farm. Out of my £200, after meeting all expenses, I have sufficient left for a little travel each year. Farming, come equally foul weather or fair. 

The seismometer, to give the recording angel of the earthquakes its scientific name, makes, in fact, three separate diagrams of each earthquake. The first records the vibrations transmitted throughout the earth's intrior, and this message travels at the rate of ten miles a second. The clock which keeps the cylinder revolving also registers the time upon it.
