"While we have been generous, and much has been given to the university, we do not think the grants will exceed the halfmillion mark," Sir James observed.

P., the spokesman for the deputation, asked that, should this grant be not forthcoming that the Government revive the claim of Elgin against the county of Middlesex, which totals over \$8,000. This sum was handed over by Elgin to Middlesex in 1855, and with the latter ounty's share, was to have been paid over to the Government of old Upper Canada for the toll road which the counties took over when they separ-ated. This money, the Elgin members allege was retained by Middle allege, was retained by Middlesex along with its own share of the purchase price. Elgin's claim for a Government grant was based on the fact that the county had spent \$16,500 in getting the road back from the lessees and had since expended \$20,000



VETO OR BUDGET?

The new British Parliament assembled yesterday, but adjourned until Monday next, after the election of a Speaker and the swearing-in of members. There is nothing significant in this adjournment; it merely follows a dicitis. custom. Conjecture will be rife for at least another week. Perhaps the King's speech will furnish a clue to the course of procedure. Certainly the cabinet known for his absolute probity and highhas guarded the secret well.

Lords shall be dealt with before the budget is reintroduced, or any other legislation attempted. Even if Mr. Balfour has promised to aid in passing the budget, as reported, the Government could not accept the offer, and defer the question of the veto without alienating the Nationalists and Laborites, and risking a split in the Liberal ranks. The only condition upon which the budget could be given precedence without disrupting the progressive forces would be the assurance of the King's consent to create new peers to carry the veto bill if neces-

sary. More than once the very threat of a new creation has brought the House of Lords to its knees. It is a power scrupulously constitutional. Professor Dicey calls it "that further custom, which though of comparatively recent growth, forms an essential part of modern constitutional ethics, by which in case the peers should finally refuse to acquiesce in the decision of the lower House, the crown is expected to nullify the resistance of the Lords by the creation of new peerages." The King, whatever his per sonal inclinations, will probably be governed by the advice of his ministers in such a crisis. 
