"NE TEMERE" **DECREE DISCUSSED**

Alliance Had a Resolution Presented, But Action Was Deferred.

VALIDITY OF MARRIAGES

Question Was Considered at Length -Mrs. Thornley Charges To Be Heard.

The London Ministerial Alliance meeting in the Y. M. C. A. parlors this morning deferred their pronouncement upon the "ne temere decree" of the Roman Catholic Church until their October meeting.

Revs. T. B. Clarke, J. H. Boyd, T ditchell, B. H. Hayden and Dr. Ross, had drafted a lengthy and detailed resolution on the matter, but after it had been received by the alliance clause by clause, an amendment was moved and carried laying the whole

setting forth this decree and declar-ing all marriages invalid unless performed by a parish priest, had gone beyond the civil ordinances and the limits of civil rights and authority, oromulgating a doctrine entirely sub-cersive of the morality and welfare

promulgating a doctrine entirely subversive of the morality and welfare of the state eand society, and the resolution called for the civil powers to defend the position, integrity and respect of the state.

The resolution disclaimed the desire to express any opinion in regard to civil law, but rather confined its application to the necessity of civil law remaining dominant and independent of the decrees or regulations of any church which might interfere with it.

Some discussion arose as to just how far the canon law of the Province of Quebec, and whether a Protestant minister could, legally, that is, apart from the "ne temere decree," marry two Roman Catholies in Quebec, Rev. CANADA'S ADVANTAGE IN IMMI-GRATION.

A few years ago there was melancholy talk in some quarters regarding the calibre of the immigrants coming into Canada. But a glance at the statistics, particularly of the last few years, is reassuring. A LITTLE LESSON ON "RABBITS"

When is a rabbit not a rabbit?

They are all bigger than the real rabbit, which likes in Europe, and in Australia and New Zealand, where it has been introduced within the past 09 years, and where it has been a terrible pest.

Size is not the only difference. Hares have blud legs that are much lenger than their forelegs. Rabbits haven't, Hares are born with their fore casts on, and with their eyes open. Rabbits are born hairless and with their eyes shut, like mice. And hares live solitary lives, while rabbits live in "warrens," hundreds of them together.







The Seventh Regiment of London yesterday morning attended divines service in St. Peter's Roman Catholic Cathedral, and the turnout of the soldiers was excellent, every officer and a very large number of men being present. There is usually a good attendance at the 10:30 o'clock mass, but Sunday owing to the presence of the soldiers, the cathedral was filled to overflowing, and probably five hundred people stood up at the rear of the edifice and listened intently to the strong and cloquent address of Hiss Lordship Bishop Fallon.

The bishop addressed himself particularly to the citizen soldiers. He put himself on record as a man of peace, but he pointed to Germany, Japan and the United States as powerful and growing nations, and differences of opinions between peoples have not ceased to exist. It is only deluding oneself, the bishop stated, to believe that Britain has fought her last war, and the moral of it all is to prepare.
