

URGES FULLER EDUCATION BE GIVEN YOUTHS

Dr. Merchant Would Build Up New System of Apprenticeship.

BELIEVES SHOP COUNTS

Declares School Alone Cannot Equip Boy As Journeyman in Trade.

TORONTO, Dec. 30.—There is need for the building up of a new system of apprenticeship, closely allied with the work of the technical schools of the province, declared Dr. F. W. Mer chant, director of industrial and technical tducation for Ontario, who to-day addressed the Society for the Promotion of Engineering Education.

Dr. Merchant declared that the apprenticeship system had broken down, and that training for industry and commerce was now in a perion of reconstruction. The tendency today was to make the practical training of the apprentice a specialized service, and to place the burden of this training on the vocational schools.


The speaker was of the opinion, however, that a school alone could not fully equip a youth as a journeyman in any trade. "I am convinced," he in any trade. "I am convinced." he continued, "that some form of apprenticeship should be restored in which the school and the shop should both take a part in the instruction. The function of the school should be to give instruction in the related knowledge and the operations fundamental to an industry while the apprentice perfects his skill and develops his industrial intelligence at work in an industrial establishment under pro-

ductive conditions."

Strathroy Boy Bares Brutality of Spaniards To

DELATING a graphic story of distress, brutality and intense hardship, Thomas Beckett stopped a few minutes

Acase hardship. Thomas Beckett stopped a few minutes in London Friday afternoon en route to his home near Straithroy, after a brief sojourn on active service in Morocco, North Africa, with the Spanish Foreign Legion.

The youthful Canadian veteran of the latest Spanish war effort was actually one of 56 disillusioned ex-members of the Spanish army who, ragged and penniless, reached London, England, a month aso from the Spanish capital, and his story of inhuman treatment by the Spaniards confirms in every detail the accounts that have been dispatched to America by other legionaries from time to time.

Repatriated through the intervention of the British war office, these men were suddenly discharged ("kicked out" us young Beckett describes it), and traveled to England via Paris. Few of them were properly clothed. Many lacked underwear of any description, and several were without bendgear. Beckett himself returned to Canada a semi-civilan, his trousers being obtained overseas from the Britishing in the several were without property clothed. illan, his trousers being obtained overseas from the Brit-military authorities.

He was instantly struck from behind with a rifle end by a non-commissioned officer and rendered un-

soon recovered and was fortunate to survive with but a severe bump on his head.

Others were less lucky, however, he says. An Irishman named Carver, from Kinsale, asked for rations for himself and a Canadian 'pal,' and was so man-handled by Spanish non-commissioned officers that he was terribly cut about the head and face and was actually unconscious for fi

American Association For Advancement of Sciences Sifts Committee Report.

PREFERS ESPERANTO

Dr. Guerard of Texas Favors Proposal As Provisional Scheme.

TORONTO. Dec. 30 .- Shall there be one language for all the world? Shall Canadian, Asiatic, European and Poynesian all speak the one tongue in addition to their own national or native speech?

That question came up for discussion here this afternoon when the special committee on auxiliary language presented its report to the Ameri-can Association for the Advancement of Science.

In the absence of the chairman, S. W. Stratton, director U. S. bureau of standards, the document was read by Frederick G. Cottrell, chairman of the international committee of the national research council.

After pointing out that no attempt had been made to discuss the detailed requirements of an international aux-iliary language and to judge between the various proposed schemes, the report states that two things are essential if practical results are to be obtained in this direction. Firstly, a searching, fundamental study must be made of some of the

principles involved, and there must be xperimental data available. Secondly, authoritative, international agreement must be reached as to linguistic details and experimental data available.

The committee then asked the association as a whole to place itself on record as being in favor of the standardization and introduction of an in-ternational auxiliary language.

In drawing up the general technical specifications for the ideal auxiliary language, the report emphasizes the fact that it must include all the ele-ments and structures suited to serve the functions which languages now perform. In addition, there must be such simplification of method as will facilitate learning and use to the ut-most, and at the same time serve as a vehicle for the evident ranges of thought and the finest shades of mean

Provide For Development. Once formulated and defined, the

new language would not be permitted to grow weeds in its freshly tilled soil. Spontaneous development and expansion would be provided for, but all additions would be consciously made and, when approved, promulgated in prescribed manner. The administra tion committee in charge of this task of censorship would insure that the new superimposed elements would not violate the basic principles upon which the language was founded. That the claims of such existing

invented language as Esperanto, Volapuk, Ido, Latino or Romanol for holus-bolus adoption as the new official international medium of expres-sion will not necessarily be recognized is indicated by the favor with which the committee regarded a treatise sub-mitted by Prof. Albert Leon Guerard

of Rice Institute, Houston, Texas.
Of the various systems, Dr. Guerard is inclined to favor Esperanto as the most practicable. He recommends it as a "business proposition," a provisional scheme but one which is guaranteed against capricious changes until the final victory of the broader ideal is

THOMAS, Dec. 30.—Out of taxes for the year, totalling \$449,238.91, the sum of \$423,462.29, or a percentage of 94.26, has been paid into the city coffers by the citizens of St. Thomas, according to the annual report of the city treasurer. Only \$25,776.62 remains to be collected.

Of that which remains \$3,740.70 is on vacant lands, leaving only a percentage of 4.94 yet to be collected on improved

Less than 2 per cent of the whole business tax of the city remains un-paid. Out of a total of \$31,856.47 only \$606.61 must still be collected. One per cent of the income tax is outstanding, amounting to only \$282.54.

Promise and Performance of 1921 Now Fades In Memory's Ken

BATTLE TO INSURE PEACE OF ENTIRE WORLD RAGING AS YEAR REACHES CLOSE

Opening of Chippewa Canal, Election of Miss Agnes C. Mc-Phail, First Woman To Gain Dominion Parliament Seat, and Road-Building Program of Drury Government Mark Activities of O ntario in Past Twelve Months.

The year 1921, which has but a few more hours to live, has been a year of momentous importance in the history of civilization. The disarmament conference at Washington, which made a splendid beginning in its plan for the limitation of armaments and for the settlement of problems that tend to vex the world's peace, is a new departure in world politics.

Then after weeks of negotiation and conference a practical basis of settlement was reached with regard to the relations between England and Ireland, and after centuries of struggle there seems some hope of permanent peace between the two nations, providing the Dail Eireann ratify the pact when it re-convenes on

Ireland becomes the Irish Free State save for the portion of Northern Ireland which still chooses to remain an integral part of the United Kingdom while the Free State becomes a unit of the British Empire on terms practically similar to those of Canada and other overseas dominions.

A notable achievement in Ontario on Dec. 28 was the opening of the 121/2-mile Chippewa Canal, the largest single power development in the world.

In October and November a strenuous political campaign was waged and the polling took place on Dec. 6, when the Liberals were returned by an overwhelming majority, the Progressives being second and the followers of the late government taking third place.

A feature of the election was the return to parliament for the first time in the history of the Dominion of a woman member, Miss Agnes C. McPhail, for the Ontario riding of South-East Grey.

Lord Byng of Vimy, who for some time during the war had charge of the Canadian forces, was chosen governor-general, and his appointment proved a very popular one. The decennial census was taken and the results of a large number of cities and rural districts has already been made known.
