EXPLANATION OF THE ARTICLES  CALENDAR

—AND—

ASTRONOMICAL NOTES FOR THE YEAR 1890.

On the left hand page of each month are given all the requisite data for Solar observations of Time and Latitude—namely, the Equation of Time (Sun slow or fast of clock), being the difference between Apparent (solar) and Mean (uniform clock) Time, which is given for the instant of Apparent Noon, and the Sun's Declination of Mean Noon, both Greenwich time; also the Sun's apparent semi-diameter to the nearest tenth of a second of arc for every day throughout the year. All the other particulars are calculated to the nearest minute of Local Mean Time for Charlottetown, Longitude $63^{\circ} 7' 23''$ W. = 4 hours, 12 minutes, 29.4 seconds.

NOTE.—Half the day's length before and after 12 o'clock, noon, gives the apparent or Sun-dial time of sunrise and sunset; the mean clock time is found by adding or subtracting the equation according to whether Sun is Slow or Fast.

The Sun's Declination at Greenwich Apparent Noon, if required, can be obtained from that at Mean Noon by multiplying the hourly variation of Declination by the equation of Time for the same day, reduced to the decimal of an hour, and applying the result according to the conditions here given.

From the Sun's apparent Semi-diameter in the last column of the same page may be found the Sun's Horizontal Parallax—which equals the earth's Semi-diameter as it would appear at the distance of the Sun's centre—by reducing to seconds and dividing by the constant quantity which is the ratio the Sun's true diameter bears to that of the earth. Thus, for July 1st, when the Sun is at its greatest distance from the earth, its semi-diameter is $15' 46'' = 946$, giving $\frac{946}{107.44} = 8.805$ for the Sun's Horizontal Parallax. In like manner, at the end of the year when the Sun is in perigee, the Horizontal Parallax is found to be $9'' 108$.

Parallax in altitude is obtained from the Horizontal Parallax thus found, multiplying it by the natural cosine of the Sun's apparent altitude at the time of observation. Thus, the Horizontal Parallax being $8'' 805$, and the observed altitude of the Sun 50° , we find $8.805 \times .643$ (nat. cos. alt.) = 5.661 Parallax in altitude.

On the right hand page of each month are given the changes of the Moon, times of Rising, Southing and Setting, and of High Water at Charlottetown are given to the nearest minute of Local Mean Time.

The bearing of the Moon at the times of change—its Perigee, Apogee, its crossing the Equinoctial, and reaching its greatest North and South Declination—are given for aiding and testing weather forecasts. It has been observed that the Lunar Equinoctials are accompanied by atmospheric disturbance more or less marked the nearer their times agree with those of the Moon's changes and Perigee—** or *** are added in those cases where two or three of these influences concur within the space of 48 hours.

If it is wished to use Standard or Railway Time add 12 minutes 29 seconds to the Local Mean Time, Charlottetown, for the time at the meridian of 60° West.

ECLIPSES.

During the year 1890 there will be three Eclipses—two of the Sun and one of the Moon; but not one will be visible at Charlottetown.

I. An annular Eclipse of the Sun, June 16th-17th, Greenwich Mean Time of Conjunction, in Right Ascension, 21h. 53m. 32.2 sec.; line of central Eclipse, passing from Cape Verde along Asia Minor to all of Caspian Sea to Calcutta.

II. A partial Eclipse of the Moon, November 25th-26th, Greenwich Mean Time of Opposition, in Right Ascension, November 26th, 1h. 1m. 3.4 sec.; a very small portion of the northern part of the Moon's limb eclipsed about $\frac{1}{800}$.

III. A total Eclipse of the Sun, Greenwich Mean Time of Conjunction, in Right Ascension, December 11th, 15h. 14m. 57.8 sec.; line of central Eclipse passing across the Indian Ocean South of Australia and New Zealand, not near any inhabited land.

PLANETS.

MERCURY.—Mercury will be at his greatest angular distance from the Sun—to the east of the Sun as an Evening Star, to the west as a Morning Star—as follows: on January 13th, 18° 51' E.; February 23rd, 26° 50' W.; May 6th, 21° 9' E.; June 23rd, 22° 6' W.; September 2nd, 26° 59' E.; October 14th, 18° 5' W.; December 28th, 19° 36' E. Between these dates he will pass in conjunction with the Sun. Inferior, or between the Earth and Sun January 29th, May 29th, and September 26th. Superior, or beyond the Sun, April 8th, July 22nd, and November 16th.

VENUS will commence the year as a Morning Star, with direct motion rapidly approaching the Sun, coming to superior conjunction February 17th, after which she will re-appear as an Evening Star, still with direct motion, till November 13th, and retrograde till the end of the year. On the 23rd September she will be at her greatest elongation, 46° 29' east of the Sun; at her greatest brilliancy October 29th, and in inferior conjunction with the Sun December 3rd.

On the 20th May there will be an occultation of Venus by

the Moon about 4 p. m., but only appearing as a near approach to place North of Equator.

MARS will commence as a Morning Star, with direct motion, till April 22nd, when he will become retrograde till July 4th, after which he will be direct to the end of the year. On May 27th he will be in opposition to the Sun, coming to the meridian at midnight. He will be occulted by the Moon three times—March 12th, April 9th, and October 24th, but the two first will be in the day time, and the last when below the horizon. His only planetary conjunction will be with Jupiter on November 13th, about 7 p. m.

JUPITER commences the year with direct motion till May 23rd, retrograde till September 28th, and direct to the end of the year. On January the 9th he will be in conjunction with the Sun, with Venus on the 18th, with Mars, as noted above, November 13th, and in opposition to the Sun July 30th.

SATURN begins the year as a Morning Star, with retrograde motion till April 28th, afterwards direct till December 28th. He will be in opposition to the Sun February 18th, in conjunction with Venus July 17th, about noon; after sunset the two planets will be seen about a quarter of a Moon's diameter apart. On August 10th he will be in conjunction with Mercury.

URANUS begins the year as a Morning Star, with direct motion till January 30th, retrograde till June 30th, afterwards, direct to the end of the year. In opposition to the Sun April 14th; in conjunction October 20th. In conjunction with Venus September 1st, 7 a. m., and with Mercury October 30th.

NEPTUNE—an Evening Star, retrograde till February 10th, direct till September 9th, and retrograde till the end of the year. In conjunction with the Sun May 25th; in opposition November 27th. This Planet, being now nearly the plane of the Moon's orbit, will be occulted almost every lunation, viz: January 2nd and 29th, February 25th, March 24th, April 21st, July 12th, August 8th, September 5th, October 2nd and 29th, November 26th, and December 23rd, but these cannot be observed unless with powerful glasses, and under favorable circumstances.

CLASSIFICATION OF MAIL MATTER, RATES, &c.

First-class Matter.

Letters addressed to all places in Canada and the United States, 3 cents per ounce. Partial prepayment is required in the case of letters addressed to Canada, and prepayment of one rate on letters addressed to the United States.

Post Cards issued at 1 cent, each are intended for use for Canada and United States, but may be sent to other countries with stamps affixed to complete prepayment.

Second-Class Matter.

Newspapers and Periodicals posted from the office of publication, and authorized to pass free of postage to regular subscribers in Canada, the United States and Newfoundland.

Third-class Matter.

Matter of this class must be so packed or put up as to be easily opened for examination, and there must be no correspondence enclosed.

Newspapers and Periodicals.

All Drop Newspapers and Periodicals (for delivery where posted) transient newspapers and periodicals posted for transmission to places in Canada, the United States or Newfoundland, must be prepaid 1 cent. per 4 oz. or fraction of 4 oz.—weighing less than 1 oz. each they may be posted singly if prepaid $\frac{1}{2}$ cent each.

Books, &c., and Miscellaneous Matter.

The postage on Books, Pamphlets, Circulars, Occasional Publications, &c., addressed to Canada or Newfoundland is one cent. per 4 oz.—To the United States, Great Britain and all European countries, 1 cent per 2 oz. The Postage on Printers' Proof Sheets, Maps, Prints, Drawings, Engravings, Lithographs, Photographs, Sheet Music, etc., addressed to Canada, the United States, Newfoundland, Great Britain, or any European Country is 1 cent per 2 oz. No Package must exceed 2 feet in length by 1 foot in width or depth. The limit of weight for Canada, United States and Great Britain, is 5 lbs., for other Postal Union countries 4 lbs.

Seeds, Cuttings, Bulbs, Roots and Scions or Grafts, can only be sent to the United States as 5th Class Matter; when posted for delivery in Canada, the Postage is 1 cent per 4 oz., and the limit of weight 5 lbs.

Patterns and Samples.

Bona fide Patterns and Samples of Merchandise not exceeding 24 ounces in weight, may be sent to any place in Canada and Newfoundland, for 1 cent per 4 oz. Goods sent in execution of an order, however small the quantity may be, or any articles sent by any one private individual to another, *not being actually Trade Patterns or Samples*, are not admissible as such. The limit of weight to the United States, England, and all countries in Europe, is *eight ounces*—Postage, 2 cents for the first 4 ounces, and 1 cent for every additional 2 ounces.

4th Class matter—Parcel Post for Canada.

Parcels closed at the ends and sides, and not exceeding

five lbs. in weight, may be posted at any Post Office in Canada for conveyance to any Post Office in the Dominion at the following rates:—

For each additional 4 ounces, or fraction thereof, 6 cents.

The size of a parcel must not exceed two feet in length, or one foot in breadth or thickness. The Postage must be prepaid by stamp, and the parcel should be marked "BY PARCEL POST." Parcels may be registered by affixing a 5 cent Registration Stamp thereto in addition to the postage.

Parcels cannot be transmitted by Post to any place beyond the limits of Canada, except by

Parcel Post for the United Kingdom and Newfoundland.

Parcels securely and substantially packed and closed for the United Kingdom and Newfoundland, limited in weight to 5 lbs., and in size to two feet in length by 1 foot in width or depth, will be received up to 8 p. m. daily, Sundays and holidays excepted, at the Registration Office, under conditions explained there to the senders, for transmission in the weekly mails despatched by the Steamers of the Canadian lines. Rate 25 cents per lb., or fraction of a lb.

5th Class Matter.

Postage rate 1 cent per ounce, or fraction of an ounce to be prepaid by Postage Stamp.

Miscellaneous articles of Merchandise, and generally all matter permitted to pass by mail in Canada; which is not of the nature of a letter, and therefore subject to letter rate of postage, and not entitled to be posted at a lower rate than 5th Class under one of the other classes, (including Packages of Seeds, Cuttings, Bulbs, Roots, Patterns and Samples addressed to the United States), may pass as 5th Class when addressed to any destination within the Dominion or the United States.

5th Class matter must be so packed or put up so as to be open to examination of contents, and must not exceed 4 pounds in weight nor 2 feet in length by 1 foot in width or depth. When passing between Canada and the United

States it will be subject to Customs regulations if liable to duty. The Registration charged on 5th Class matter is 5 cents in addition to Postage.

Registration fee on all classes of matter for Canada and the United States, and for Postal Union countries, is 5 cents; and it is desirable that the stamp used should be a registration stamp.

All classes of matter may be registered to all destinations in Canada and throughout the Postal Union, and letters may be registered to most of the countries not included in the Union, and the sender of a registered article to Postal Union countries may entitle himself to an acknowledgment of delivery from the party addressed by the payment of a fee of 5 cents in addition to the registration fee.

All letters for Registration should be posted 15 minutes before the hour of closing ordinary Mails, and 30 minutes before closing of English Mails.

Correspondence with United States.

On all articles of merchandise the rate will be one cent. per oz. or fraction of an oz., to be prepaid by postage stamp.

On books, pamphlets, occasional publications, printed circulars, prices current, hand bills, advertising sheets, book and newspaper manuscript, printers' proof sheets, whether corrected or not, maps, prints, drawings, engravings, lithographs, photographs, sheet music, whether printed or written, such as deeds, insurance policies, or other documents of a like nature, the rate will be one cent. per 2 oz., or a fraction of 2 oz., to be prepaid by postage stamp.

The registration charged on all articles of correspondence of whatever description—whether letters, printed or miscellaneous matter—when addressed to the United States, and posted for registration, will be 5 cents, to be prepaid by the appropriate 5 cent registration stamp, in addition to the ordinary postage rate.

The term merchandise will include packages of seeds, cuttings, bulbs roots, scions or grafts, patterns and samples, and the one cent. per oz. rate will apply to all these articles, and generally to all miscellaneous 5th class matter.

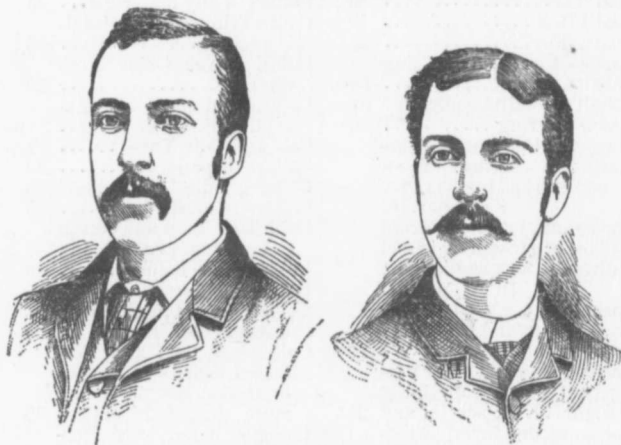

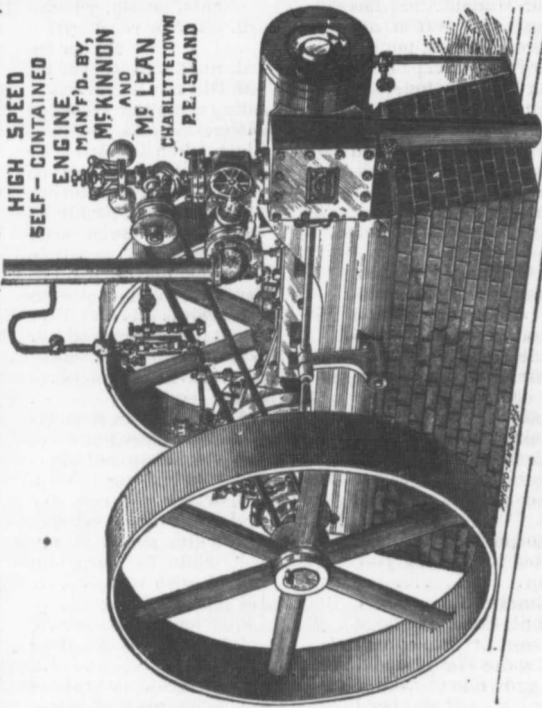

The following articles shall be prohibited to be imported under a penalty of two hundred dollars, together with the forfeiture of the parcel or package of goods in which the same may be found, viz.:

Goods manufactured or produced wholly or in part by prison labor, or which have been made within or in connection with any prison, gaol, or penitentiary, shall not be imported into Canada under a penalty of \$200; and if imported, such goods and the parcels and packages in which they are contained shall be forfeited.

Oleomargarine, Butterine, or any substitute for Butter, importation of, also prohibited under a penalty of \$400—and not less than \$200 for each offence.

Books, printed papers, drawings, paintings, prints, photographs or representations of any kind of a treasonable or seditious, or of an immoral or indecent character.

Coin, base or counterfeit.

Foreign reprints of British Copyrighted Works, copyrighted in Canada, and of Canadian Copyrighted Works.
