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HEREAS, the General Assembly of this Province stands prorogued to Thursday the 7th instant:

I have therefore thought fit further to prorogue the faid General Assembly, to Thursday the tenth day of February, 1814, then to meet for the Dispatch of Business; of which all persons concerned are hereby required to take notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

GIVEN under my Hand and Seal at Arms, at Halifax, this 4th day of of October, 1843, in the 53d year of His Majesty's Reign.

MESSAGE from His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, by Mr. Acting Secretary Cogswell:

Mr. Speaker,

His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor commands this House to attend His Excellency, immediately in the Council Chamber.

Accordingly Mr. Speaker, with the House, went up to attend His Excellency in the Council Chamber.

And being returned,

Mr. Speaker reported, That the House had attended His Excellency in the Council Chamber, where His Excellency had been pleased to make a Speech; of which

which Mr. Speaker faid he had, to prevent mistakes, obtained a Copy, which he read to the House, and is as follows:

MR. PRESIDENT, and Gentlemen of His Majesty's Council, MR. Spearer, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly.

N meeting you again in General Askembly, I feel particular satisfaction at having it in my power to congratulate you upon the unexampled series of splendid victories which have attended His Majesty's Arms, and those of His Allies, during the late Campaign in Europe; and as, from your local situation, you may be supposed to feel a more immediate interest in the events which have occurred in this part of the world, during the same period, I with equal pleasure and sincerity, congratulate you on our late successes in the Canadas; against which Provinces, the whole of the Military operations of the Americans appear to have been directed.

Notwithstanding some partial advantages obtained by the enemy; and his arrogant expectations, that the Canadas would prove an easy conquest, we find that the judicious arrangements made by the British Commander of the Forces, carried into execution by able officers, having under them brave and well disciplined Troops, and aided by the zealous exertions of a gallant, loyal and determined Militia, have so completely frustrated the projects of the Invaders, that they have not only been expelled from those Provinces by inferior nembers; but the British Flag now slies triumphantly on the Fort of Niagara, and the American Frontier is at the mercy of the conquerors.

The gallantry and good conduct so conspicuous in the Canadian Militia, during this campaign, offer an example worthy of imitation to the Militia of Nova-Scotia; and should the active services of the latter be required, I make no doubt but they will emulate the zeal and energy so nobly displayed by the loyal and patriotic Inhabitants of the Canadas.

You will have heard (I hope with satisfaction) that Great-Britain, far from being too much elated in the hour of her prosperity, has made an offer to enter into discussion with the Government of the United States, upon principles of perfect reciprocity, not inconsistent with the established maxims of public Law, or with the Maritime Rights of the British Empire. It would be premature in this stage of the Business, for me to make any observations upon the conciliatory proposals thus offered, further than to remark, that as the President of the United States in making this communication to Congress, recommends,—"A continuation of the preparations for war," it will also be prudent in us, to continue those measures hitherto thought necessary for our security and defence, in the same manner as if no such overtures had been made.

I have directed an Estimate for the Civil Establishment and for such other Services as appear necessary to be provided for, to be presented to you, and I trust, it will appear by the statement of the Public Expenditure for the last year, which I have ordered to be laid before you, that the utmost economy (consistent with the situation of the Country) has been observed in the application of the Monies placed at my disposal. By thus husbanding our resources, we shall, I hope, be prepared to meet more pressing exigencies, should they present themselves.

MR. SPEAKER, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly,

The confidence I have in your liberality, leaves me no doubt but you will make the necessary provisions for the Civil Establishment, and for the other Services specified in the Estimate; and that you will likewise grant such further Supplies, as the situation of affairs may appear to require.

Mr. PRESIDENT and Gentlemen of His Majejy's Council,

Mr. SPEAKER, and Gentlemen of the House of Affembly,

The Loan of Provincial Notes required for the Military Cheft, and authorifed by the Act of the last Session, has been completed, and, exclusive of the advantages arising to the public, I am happy to find that great accommodation has been afforded to individuals by the circulation of this paper.

The principal part of the Notes which were first issued, have returned already to the Treasury; and the whole will, I hope, be specdily cancelled at a very inconsiderable charge of interest to the Province.

In endeavouring to carry into effect the system which was adopted last Session for the improvement of the Great Roads leading from the Capital through the Province, some obstacles have presented themselves; but as these difficulties may I hope be surmounted, it will be adviseable to appropriate a reasonable Sum for continuing this necessary undertaking.

Being aware, that it must be inconvenient to many of the Members, who come from distant parts of the country to be detained at Halisax, longer than is absolutely requisite, permit me to recommend to you the utmost assiduity and attention to the dispatch of business; and, be assured of my cordial co-operation in any measures which may appear conducive to the welfare and security of the Province.

On motion, resolved, and ordered, That Mr. Robie, Mr. Mortimer and Mr. Pryor, be a committee to prepare an address in answer to His Excellency's Speech.

Resolved and Ordered, That Mr. Lawson, Mr. Ritchie, Mr. Haliburton, Mr. Chipman and Mr. Mortimer, be a committee of this House, for the purpose of examining the Public Accounts, jointly with a committee of His Majesty's Council; and that the Clerk do acquaint the Council therewith.

Ordered, That Mr. Pyke, Mr. Crane, and Mr. Archibald, be a committee to examine into, and report on, the expiring Laws.

Resolved, That no Petition of a private nature, be received after Thursday the 24th instant.

Then the House adjourned until to-morrow, at eleven of the clock.

Friday, 11th February, 1814.

PRAYERS.

Samuel S. Poole, Esq. returned duly elected as member for the Township of Yarmouth, in the room of Samuel Marshall, Esq. deceased, took his fear, having previously taken the Oaths prescribed by Law, and subscribed the usual declaration at the Table of the House, in the presence of the Honorable Richard J. Uniacke, His Majesty's Attorney "General, one of the Commissioners appointed by His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor.

Then the House adjourned until to-morrow, at eleven of the clock.

Mr. Robie reported from the committee appointed to prepare an address in answer to His Excellency's Speech; that the committee had drawn up an address accordingly; and he read the address in his place, and afterwards delivered it in at the Clerk's Table, where it was read and is as follows:—

TO HIS EXCELLENCY LIEUTENANT-GENERAL

The Humble ADDRESS of the House of Representatives in General Assembly.

May it Please Your Excellency,

E, His Majesty's Faithful Subjects, the Representatives of the Loyal People of Nova-Scotia, beg leave to thank your Excellency for your Speech at the opening of the present Sessions of the General Assembly.

The splendid Victories which have been obtained by the arms of His Majesty and of His Allies, during the late campaign in Europe; and the recent successes in the Canadian Provinces, have afforded to the Inhabitants of this Colony a gratification equal to the importance of these events.

With whatever expectations of an easy conquest our American Enemies sirst in vaded his Majesty's Dominions, we trust that the judicious arrangements of the British Commander in Chief, the valour and discipline of His Majesty's

Troops,

Troops, and the exertions of a loyal and gallant Militia, have 'ere this, convinced them of the arrogance and folly of their attempts.

We have the most success pleasure in giving to our Canadian Fellow Subjects the praise, so justly deserved by them; and we with equal pleasure affure your Excellency that should you call for the active services of the Militia of Nova-Scotia, they will endeavour to be found not unworthy of the blessings for which they are contending, or of the Leader under whom it would be their pride to meet the Invaders.

Desirous, as we must always be, for the restoration of Peace, we yet feel that undue facrifices should not be made to obtain it. The terms upon which Great-Britain has effered to enter into a discussion with the Government of the United States of America, have relieved us from all fears of her yielding to the new and absurd pretensions of that Government; and as her triumphs have not prevented her from offering Peace, so we trust that no disasters that could have befallen her Arms would have induced her to depart, in principle or in practice, from the assertion of the established maxims of Public Law; or to have surrendered any of those rights which Heaven, in given her the power to maintain, seems, for the benefit of mankind, to have inculcated the duty of preserving.

We thank your Excellency for directing the Estimate for the Public Services to be laid before us, and being convinced of the exconomy with which the Monies placed at your Excellency's disposal have been expended, we shall most cheerfully make such provisions for the Civil Establishment, and grant such further Supplies, as the situation of Public Affairs and the uncertain issue of the Negociations with the American Government may require.

We learn with satisfaction that the circulation of the Provincial Notes has proved beneficial; and that those which were first issued will probably be soon cancelled, without much charge to the Province.

Your Excellency's communication relative to the Roads leading from the Capital through the Province shall receive our serious attention, and no endeavours of ours shall be wanting to make such improvements in the system adopted, as shall be thought most likely to prevent the obstacles that have been heretofore experienced.

We will proceed to the early confideration of the business of the Sessions; and have the most perfect reliance upon your Excellency's assent to every measure that shall be considered necessary for the welfare and security of the Province.

Resolved, That the said Address be presented to His Excellency, by the whole House.

Ordered, That Mr. Pyke, Mr. Lawson, and Mr. Dewolf, be a Committee to wait on his Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor, to know his pleasure when the will be attended by the House.

On motion, of Mr. Pryor, Refolved, That a Committee be appointed to report to the House, the state of the Commerce and Fisheries of this Province; as they were regulated by Treaty, between Great-Britain and the United States of America.

Ordered, That Mr. Pryor, Mr. Mortimer, and Mr. Lawson, be a committee accordingly.

Mr. Pyke presented to the House, an account from Mr. Treasurer Wallace, of all monies received by him into, and payments by him made from the Provincial Treasury, between the 1st January, and 31st December, 1813.

Ordered, That the faid account do lie on the Table to be perused by the Men bers of the House.

Mr. Pyke reported from the committee appointed to wait on His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor, to know when he would be pleased to receive the Address of this House; that the committee had, pursuant to order, waited on His Excellency, and that His Excellency was pleased to appoint Monday next, at two of the clock, at the Government House.

Then the House adjourned until Monday, at eleven of the Clock.

Monday, 14th February, 1814.

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PRAYERS.

Mr. Speaker and the House attended his Excellency with their Address, pursuant to the resolution of Saturday last;

And being returned,

Mr. Speaker reported that His Excellency had been pleased to give this Answer:

Mr. SPRAKER, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly:

REFURN you my thanks for this Address. The sentiments therein expressed, are worthy the Representatives of the loyal people of Nova-Scotia; and I observe with peculiar satisfaction, the very proper light in which you have viewed the principle upon which Great-Britain has offered to enter into discussion with the Government of the United States; as I perfectly agree with you, that the Parent Country would not be justified in relinquishing her Maritime Rights, or in failing to give her unqualified support to the established maxims of Public Law,

A petition of John Christie, Matthew Archibald, and others, Inhabitants and Proprietors of the Presbyterian Meeting House in Truro, was presented by Mr. Kent.

Kent, and read, praying, that a Law may be passed to enable them to asses monies, for the repair of the said Meeting-House, and also for enclosing the Burying place, belonging to the same.

Ordered, That the petition do lie on the Table.

On motion, the House resolved itself into a committee of the whole House, on the consideration of that part of His Excellency's Speech, which relates to the Great Roads of the Province.

Mr. Speaker left the Chair, Mr. Poole took the Chair.

Mr. Speaker refumed the Chair.

The Chairman reported from the committee that they shad gone through the business to them referred, and that the committee had come to a resolution thereupon, which they had directed him to report to the House, and he read the report in his place, and afterwards delivered it in at the Clerk's Table, where it was read, and is as follows:

Resolved, That it is the opinion of this committee, that the Act, passed in the last Session, entitled, An Act for the improvement of the Great Roads through the Province, requires amendment, and that it be recommended to the House to appoint a committee to bring in a Bill to alter and amend the said Act.

The faid refolution was read throughout a first and second time, and upon

the question put thereupon, agreed to by the House, and thereupon,

Ordered, That Mr. Mortimer, Mr. Allison, and Mr. Dimock, be a committee to prepare and bring in a Bill agreeably to the resolution of the committee of the whole House.

A Mellage from the Council by Mr. Cogswell:

Mr. Speaker,

The Council have appointed a Committee to join the Committee of this this House, for the purpose of examining the Rublic Accounts.

And then the Messenger withdrew.

On motion of Mr. Dimock, Refolved, That a Committee be appointed for the purpose of examining into, and reporting on, the expenditure of the several Sums of Money granted by the Legislature, for the service of Roads and Bridges, and which have not before been reported upon by the Auditor of the Public Accounts, or a committee of this House.

Ordered, That Mr. Crane, Mr. Bishop, and Mr. Allison, be a committee accordingly.

Then the House adjourned until to-morrow, at eleven of the clock.

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Tuesday, 15th February, 1814.

PRAYERS.

Mr. Shaw, pursuant to leave given, presented a Bill in addition to, and amendment of, an Act for the Summary Trial of Actions, and the same was read a first time,

Refolved, That the Bill be read a fecond time.

Mr. Pryor reported from the committee on the subject of the Commerce and Fisheries of the Province, as they were regulated by Treaty, between Great-Britain and the United States of America, and he read the Report in his place, and afterwards delivered it in at the Clerk's Table, where it was read, and is as follows:

That the only parts of the faid Treaty, which in any respect regard the Trading interests of this Province, are the latter part of the second, and the whole of the third article.

The fecond article is for the purpose of settling the Boundary Lines between the possessions, which Great-Britain retained in America, and those she gave up to the United States, the latter part of the article contains the following words:

"Comprehending all Islands within twenty Leagues of any part of the shores of the United States, and lying between Lines to be drawn due East from the points, where the aforesaid Boundaries between Nova-Scotia, on the one part, and East Florida on the other, shall respectively touch the Bay of Fundy, and the Atlantic Ocean, excepting such Islands as now are, or heretofore have been, within the limits of the said Province of Nova-Scotia," which reservation comprises Moose Island, Dudley Island, and Frederick Island, in the Bay of Passamaquoddy, and those Islands, though situated within the limits of the Province of New-Brunswick, have been taken possession of by the Government of the United States, and so far as they have become the centre point of the Plaister of Paris Trade, the dispute is of consequence to this Province. The Paper No. 1, will elucidate the principle circumstances which attach to this transaction.

The third article of the definitive Treaty is that which affects the Interests of this Province, in a most especial manner; it is as follows: Viz.

"It is agreed that the people of the United States, shall continue to enjoy unmolested, the right to take sish of every kind on the Grand Bank, and on all the other Banks of Newfoundland, also in the Gulf of St. Lawrence, and at all other places in the Sea, where the Inhabitants of both Countries used at any time heretofore to sish; and also that the Inhabitants of the United States shall have liberty to take sish of every kind on such part of the Coast of Newfoundland as British Fishermen shall use; (but not to Dry or Cure the same on that Island) and also on the Coasts, Bays, and Creeks of all other of his Britannick

tannick Majesty's Dominions in America; and that the American Fishermen shall have liberty to dry and cure fish on any of the unsettled Bays. Harbours, and Creeks, of Nova Scotia, Magdalen Islands, and Labradore, as long as the same, or either of them, shall remain unsettled; but so soon as the same, or either of them shall be settled, it shall not be lawful for the said Fishermen, to dry or cure Fish at such Settlement, without a previous agreement for that purpose, with the Inhabitants, Proprietors, or Possessor of the Ground."

The effect of this article, has been to introduce into the Harbours of this Province, and on the Labradore Coast, such numerous Foreigners, that the Fishermen of these Colonies have been deprived of the chief means which Providence has assigned to them, of procuring a livelihood. The two accompanying Papers, numbers 2, and 3, will exhibit some of the evils arising from this third article of the Treaty, which has, during the period, from the conclusion of the last American Peace, to the commencement of the present War with that Nation, impeded the fisheries of these Colonies, to the very great improvement of those of the United States, which, by reason of the cheaper outsits of their Vessels, are able to undersell our Merchants in the British Islands.

The committee must also observe to the House, that the American Fishermen are a People over whom there is little restraint from any sense of propriety, as is manifest from their conduct detailed in the paper No. 2, and that they resort to these Coasts and the Labradore in such great numbers (to the amount lately before the War, as it is said, of sisteen hundred Vessels in a Season,) that by throwing their Gurry or Offal overboard, contrary to the Provincial Act of this Province, (10 Geo. III. Chap. 10, page 162,) have greatly injured the Fishery to their own immediate detriment, as well as that of the Inhabitants; a decided proof of which is, that, during the last Season, the British Fishermen, have experienced a very great increase of Fish, on the Banks and on the Labradore: The intercourse is also very injurious to the political morality of the lower classes of People of these Provinces, whose attachment to the Mother Country, will be best secured by being debarred from such contagious principles.

Ordered, That the faid report, and the papers numbered one, two and three, referred to therein, do lie on the table to be perused by the Members of the House.

Then the House adjourned until to morrow, at eleven of the Clock.

Bond, of Yarmouth, was presented by Mr. Pool, and read, praying payment of a demand for Medical assistance and necessary supplies surnished by him to four persons of the crew of the brig Industry, burnt on her passage from Halifax to New-Brunswick, in December, 1801, amounting to £.22.

Ordered, That the petition do lie on the table.

Mr. Mortimer reported from the committee on the subject of the Bill for the improvement of the Great Roads of the Province, and accordingly presented

A Bill to alter and amend the Act for the improvement of the Great Roads of the Province, and the same was read a first time.

Refolved, That the Bill be read a second time.

On motion of Mr. Dewolf, resolved, that William Hill, Esq. Attorney at Law, be appointed to draft such Bills as may be required to be brought in the present Sessions; and that this House will provide payment for his services.

Then the House adjourned until to-morrow, at eleven of the clock.

Thursday, 17th February, 1814.

A petition of Caleb Forfyth, Commissioner of Roads, was presented by Mr. Crane, and read, praying the payment of £.50, to discharge the expense incurred for repairing Bishop's Bridge in Horton, on the Main Post road.

A petition of Alexander Scott, and others, Inhabitants of the Nine Mile River Settlement, in Douglass, praying an aid for the improvement of the road in said Settlement,

Ordered, That the petitions do lie on the Table.

Then the House adjourned until to-morrow, at eleven of the clock.

Mr. Archibald, pursuant to leave given, presented a Bill to establish the Current value of Doubloons, and the same was read a first time.

Refolved, That the Bill be read a second time.

A Bill to enable the Proprietors of Meeting Houses to repair the same, was read a second time.

Resolved, That the Bill be committed to a committee of the whole House.

Mr. Lawson, presented to the House an account from the Commissioners for erecting a Light House at the entrance of the Harbour of Liverpool, of their expenditures for said Building, in the years 1812, and 1813, together with the Vouchers in support of the same.

Ordered, That the account do lie on the Table, to be perused by the Members of the House.

Mr. Ritchie delivered to the House, an account from the Commissioners for the Province Building, of their expenditure for said building between the 1st January, and 31st December, 1813, amounting to £.3626, 17,12. Also,

A Petition of the Committee of the Royal Acadian Institution, in behalf of the faid Society, was prefented by Mr. Archibald, and read, fitting forth, that the petitioners impressed with a sense of the general importance of the Education of Youth, and its probable influences on the welfare, peace, and good order of Society, as well as on the morals and character of those who are the subjects of it, and taking into confideration the number of Children in the Town of Halifax, who were without the means of instruction, through the inability of their Parents or Guardians, to defray the charges of the usual modes of Education, existing among them, have affociated for the purpose of Establishing a System, upon such a plan of economy as should bring the expense within the limits of the poorer classes; or afford the benevolent an opportunity of conferring the benefits of instruction on the Children of those, who could not afford to pay for it, and by this means to educate numbers who must otherwise have remained ignorant of the important benefits of reading and writing, that with these objects in view, the petitioners have established, by funds arrising solely from voluntary contributions, a School for the education of Children of both Sexes, and all Denominations; and by the permission of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, (who has afforded the Institution his fanction and support, and has also become

become its Prefident,) the pétitioners have at a confiderable expence converted the Theatre into a temporary School, capable of containing eight hundred Children, in which three hundred and eighty-five have been received, and are educated in reading, writing and arithmetic, and the Girls in the useful arts belides of needle work, and the Scholars are rapidly increasing, and of the numbers in the School, thirty-seven are Black Children. That in the Buildings necessary to fit up the School, and in the Purchase of Slates, &c. the petitioners have expended nearly eight hundred pounds, and have engaged a Master to superintend at an annual Salary of two hundred pounds, and a Mistreis at fifty pounds. That it is calculated that the annual expense requisite to keep up the Establishment, cannot be less than four hundred pounds, including the Salary of the Matter and Mistress, purchase of Fuel, of Books, &c. and incidental repairs to the Building. That for further and fuller information respecting the nature and object of the Institution, the petitioners beg leave to refer the Members of this Honorable House to a view of the School, which is at all times open for the inspection of those who may be pleased to honor it with their visits, and to whom it may be more circumstantially explained by Wolter Bromley, Esq. late Paymaster of the 23d or Royal Welsh Fusilier Regiment, who, under the Patronage of His Royal Highness the Duke of Kent; introduced this new System into this Province, and who has generously, and without any Salary or reward, afforded his unremitting attention and exertions in its establishment, and progress. That the petitioners, in the persuafion that this Honorable House will be sensible of the benefits of the Institution to which they thus folicit their attention, beg leave to entreat, such pecuniary aid towards its support and continuance, as to them in their wisdom shall think fit to bestow.

Ordered, That the petition do lie on the Table.

As a Building of this kind is much required here, it has been submitted to me by Rear-Admiral GRIFFITH, whether the General Affembly of this Province would feel disposed to afford any affistance towards the accomplishment of this desirable object.

Upon the utility of the measure there can be but one opinion, and as to the interference of the Province in the furtherance of it, I shall leave that part of the subject to the unbiassed consideration and liberality of the House.

Permit me only to observe that as this Harbour contains the Naval Arsenal of British North-America, and it is become a great Port of Rendezvous for the Navy of England, an Act of generosity manifested upon this occasion by the Legislature of Nova-Scotia, must afford gratification to the Parent State, and may conduce materially to the interests of the Province, independently of the many benefits that would arise to it from the residence of a Flag-Officer in its Capital.

Mr. Pyke, pursuant to leave given, presented a Bill in addition to, and amendment of, an Act, passed in the 39th year of his Majesty's Reign, to repair the Roads throughout the Province, and the same was read a first time.

Resolved, That the Bill be read a second time.

Mr. Acting Secretary Cogswell acquainted the House, that he had a message from His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor to this House, signed by His Excellency, and he presented the said message to the House.

And

And the faid message was read by Mr. Speaker, all the Members being uncovered, and is as follows:

Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly:

The Independence of the Judges, having always been considered by our ablest Statesmen, as one of the best securities of the rights and liberties of the subject, it becomes my duty to call your attention to the situation of the Assistant Justices of His Majesty's Supreme Court in this Province, as represented in their Petition, transmitted herewith, and to recommend the prayer of it to your favorable consideration.

As the Assistant Justices are prevented by a Law of the Province from holding any other employment, it seems reasonable that the Legislature should grant them a suitable provision, and as the Treasurer appears to be nearly in the same situation, if the House thinks it right to augment the Salaries of the Assistant Justices, I would recommend that the Treasurer's situation in point of income, should be made equal to theirs.

Mr. Cogswell, also delivered to the House the Petition of the Afsistant Justices of his Majesty's Supreme Court, to his Excellency, referred to in the foregoing Message.

The faid petition was read by the Clerk; and thereupon,

The Chairman reported from the committee that they had made further progress in the business to them referred, and that the committee had directed him to move for leave to sit again on the consideration of the same; which report the House agreed to.

Mr. Haliburton reported from the committee, appointed to consider, jointly with a committee of His Majesty's Council, the best method to be adopted to promote the Agriculture, Fisheries, and Commerce of the Province; and he read the report in his place, and afterwards delivered it in at the Clerk's Table, where it was read and is as follows:

That the committee have taken the objects referred to them into their most ferious consideration, and have agreed to the drast of an Address to His Royal Highness the Prince Regent; and also, the drast of an Address to his Excellency the Lieutenant. Governor, which they consider likely to promote the objects referred to them.

That the committee pray leave to continue their joint deliberations, as the committee have under confideration other measures, which may require the interference of the Legislature; and upon which the committee will speedily report.

After which, Mr. Haliburton read the said two Addresses in his place, and

delivered them in at the Clerk's Table; and thereupon,

The Address to His Royal Highness the Prince Regent, was read by the Clerk, and is as follows:

To His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, Regent of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland.

The Humble Address of His Majesty's Council, and the House of Assembly of Nova-Scotia.

May it please your ROYAL HIGHNESS,

Assembly of the Province of Nova-Scotia, and now sitting in their Legislative capacities, unite in assurances of unalterable affection and regard for your Royal Highness; and humbly beg you to accept their warmest congratulations upon the favorable prospect, which the late glorious events have afforded, of the deliverance of Europe from the grievous tyranny and oppression it has so long laboured under.

At a time when the heart of every British Subject is filled with joyful expectation that the period is sast approaching, when a sase and honourable Peace will afford permanent repose to the British Dominions, we flatter ourselves with the hope, that your Royal Highness will pardon us for humbly begging, on behalf of the people of this Province, the attention of your Royal Highness to objects in which we consider all his Majesty's saithful Subjects in the North American Colonies deeply interested.

The experience of many years has fully proved to us, that a large portion of British interest was sacrificed to the United States of America at the last Peace, without any adequate equivalent. The Treaty with that Country left the boundary of the British Colonies and Fisheries to depend on imaginary lines, and gave to the people of the United States, permission, not only to Fish on the British Banks, but also to enter all the bays, harbours, creeks and rivers, within the British territory, and under colour of this Treaty, the Government of that Country, not only encroached by land on the ancient possessions and commerce of Great Britain, but their people on the seawrested from us a large share of our Fishery, and carried on in their Fishing Vessels an extensive trade with British Subjects, in all sorts of stores and provisions used by them in that business. The unjust War, which the Government of that Country has waged against his Majesty, for the express purpose of seizing the whole of the British Domini-

ons in North-America, has fortunately terminated the evils which were daily growing out of this Treaty, before they had got beyond remedy, a point to which they were rapidly approaching. We now flatter ourselves with the hope, that we have escaped falling under the dominion of a Government that vainly imagined by their artful infinuations to have weakened our allegiance and attachment to the mother Country, and to have rendered us an easy conquest. Now that the period seems to approach for restoring Peace to the two Countries, we humbly entreat your Royal Highness to guard and protect us from the innumerable evils which the improvident provisions of the Treaty we refer to brought on the best interests of the British nation, in North-America.

When we reflect on the hostile measures for the destruction of British Commerce, which the Government of the United States has already cherished, and in a particular manner practiled for some years, we are of opinion they have proved beyond a doubt, that the British Trade with that Country was estimated by both sides, of more value to the mother Country, that it really was, and has also shewn, that the Government of the United States was deceived in vainly imagining that the existence of the West India Islands depended on a commercial intercourse with their Country. Long experience has proved to us, that such intercourse has been destructive to the best commercial interests of Great Britain. British Fisheries. (in which none as we humbly conceive but British Subjects should, on any account be allowed to participate), we now hope are proved equal to supply the West Indies, with Fish to any extent their wants may require, and experience has also proved, that any other articles the produce of the United States, which are not as yet grown in sufficient quantities within His Majesty's Dominions, adequate to a full supply of the West Indies, that fuch articles can be obtained in abundance by a beneficial and profitable intercourse with the coasting vessels of the United States, carried on at convenient ports in the North American Colonies, and from thence transported in British ships to the West Indies, which can be done we believe in Peace, upon nearly as cheap, and as good terms as the fame articles can be thipped from any of the principal ports in the United States, accompanied with the great advantage of Jeaving with British Subjects, the whole profits of the Trade, together with the carriage to the place of confumption, not only of the productions of the United States, but also of the British products and manufactures given in exchange for the same, deducting only that part of the carriage which the coasting vessels of the United States perform, and accompanied also with the additional advantage of depriving the United States of the export of a very large portion of our colonial produce, which, under the old system, they carried to the Foreign Ports of Europe.

The strength which the United States of America, now hostilely turn

against the Mother Country, we firmly believe is in a great measure produced by the emigration of British Subjects. The Government of the United States at all times has spared neither pains nor expence to promote fuch emigration, and the advantages held out to emigrants we believe are to a certain extent fallacious, and in no respect adequate to the advantages which the British possessions in North America afford. The present War has suspended the intercourse between the people of the Mother Country, and their friends who have emigrated to the United This correspondence is one of the greatest causes of that vast annual emigration that has heretofore existed. We consider the present time as favorable to turn fuch emigration into a channel that will encrease British strength and influence in a double ratio. It is not for want of extent of territory, accompanied with every species of natural advantage in the British possessions in North America, that our numerical force is not at present so great as it might have been; for, if the United States of America had been deprived of the emigration from the old Countries for the last thirty years, and that emigration turned to the Colonies in North America, we should at this day have been able to repel every hostile attempt on their part, and with a small assistance from the Parent State. to carry the War into the very heart of their Country. We humbly submit to your Royal Highness's confideration, the propriety of the British Government making the natural advantages of her North American possessions better known throughout Europe, accompanied with an offer to the distressed population of the old Countries, of advantages, commercial and otherwise, equal to what the United States of America afford, which, coupled with the inestimable privileges the British Constitution gives to her Colonies, would foon make her possessions in North America the Affylum of all those disposed to emigrate to that Country. At the present time, our Fisheries and Agriculture are impeded for want of useful labour, and we are well affured great numbers would refort to this Province from Great-Britain and Ireland, if the provisions of the Act of the 44th year of his present Majesty's Reign, Chapter 44, was extended to vessels carrying passengers toor from the Fisheries of Nova-Scotia, and if such passengers not being Seamen, were effectually protected from Naval Impreisment.

We humbly beg your Royal Highness to pardon us for presuming to bring before you the Interests of His Majesty's Subjects in this Province, at a time when your Royal Highness is so fully engaged in the great and arduous task of conducting the British Government to a pitch of glory and prosperity greater than our Country ever attained before. It is with sincere joy we contemplate the vast success which has attended every part of the administration of His Majesty's Government, since the power of ruling in the name of his Majesty came to the hands of your Royal Highness, and we humbly beg you to believe that we do not approach your Throne in the language of complaint, nor do we wish or defire to

have the interest of the Mother Country sacrificed to our particular advantage. We are truly fenfible of the honor and happiness of being British subjects, and are convinced that the example which the United States afford, will ever be a warning to the British Colonist, not to depart from his allegiance to the Crown of Great Brtiain.

We therefore, for ourselves, for the people of this Province, and for all His Majesty's Subjects in North America, humbly entreat your Royal Highness to turn your attention to the objects we have ventured to bring

before you.

And we affure your Royal Highness, that the restoration of our good and venerable King's health, the prosperity and happiness of your Royal Highness, and every branch of your Royal and Illustrious Family, will ever be the prayer of His Majesty's Council, and the House of Assembly anosoli a s guidlola un chidol bh i of Nova-Scotia.

On motion, Resolved, That this House doth agree to the said Address.

A Message from the Council by Mr. Cogswell:

Mr. Speaker,

His Majesty's Council have agreed to the Address to His Royal Highness the Prince Regent, and also, the Address to His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor, without any amendment, as reported by the Committee of his Majesty's Council who were appointed to consider jointly with a committee of the House of Assembly, the best method to be adopted to promote the Agriculture, Fisheries, and Trade of the Province.

And then the Messenger withdrew.

Ordered That the Clerk do acquaint His Majesty's Council that this House hath agreed to the Address to His Royal Highness the Prince Regent; and also, the Address to His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor, as reported by the joint committee of both Houses this day.

Refolved, That Mr. Speaker and the House will attend his Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor, with the Address to his Excellency, passed this day, at such time as his Excellency may be pleased to appoint, and that Mr. Speaker do communicate with the President of his Majesty's Council on the subject.

Mr. Pryor reported from the committee appointed to examine into the accounts of the Commissioners for erecting a Light-House at the entrance of the Harbour of Liverpool; and he read the report in his place, and afterwards delivered it in at the Clerk's Table, where it was read, and is as follows:

That the committee have examined the accounts referred to them, together with the Vouchers for the several sums expended: That there appears to be a balance due to the present Commissioners of £182 2 11\frac{1}{4}, over and above the sums granted by the Legislature. Also a further sum of £297 13 10\frac{1}{2}, due to the Estate of the late George Collins, Esq. deceased, which appears to have been expended by him, and no account before rendered.

That the committee in reporting the faid Accounts as appearing correctly vouched, cannot nelp remarking the very high price at which a great part of the articles supplied are charged, and the want of economy in almost the whole of the expenditure, which the committee are forry to observe, as they consider the establishment of the Light-House, to be of great public utility.

The committee also beg leave to refer the House to a letter and estimate received from the Commissioners, and annexed to the report, by which it will appear that the sum of £908 16 $9\frac{3}{4}$, will yet be required to complete the Building, and pay off the Debts contracted, and not discharged, and to which sum is also to be added, a commission for expending the Money.

On motion, ordered, That the report be referred to the Committee of Supply.

Mr. Chipman reported from the committee appointed to examine into the expenditure of the sums granted for the repairs of the Government House, and its appendages, in the years 1812 & 1813. and he read the report in his place, and afterwards delivered it in at the Clerk's Table, where it was read, and is as follows:

That it also appears by an Estimate laid before the committee that the sum £374, will be required in the present year for making suther necessary repairs to the said Building and erecting sences on the grounds belonging to the same; and likewise, that a surther sum is required for purchasing Carpeting for the Dining and Drawing Rooms of the Government-ticuse.

A Meffage from the Council, by Mr. Cogswell: Mr. Speaker,

Mr. Haliburton reported further from the the joint committee of his Majesty's Council and the House of Assembly, on the subject of the Agriculture, Commerce, and Fisheries of the Province, and he read the report in his place, and afterwards delivered it in at the Clerk's Table, where it was read and is as follows:

That it appears to the committee that the increase of our population is a matter of vital importance to this Province, and in the opinion of the committee the present time offers a favorable opportunity to turn to this Country, and the other British Provinces of North America, the emigration from Europe which

which heretofore prevailed to the United States of America, to so great an extent, and for that purpose, the committee recommend that a Bounty of sive pounds be paid to every healthy male person, of the age of from sixteen to sifty years, and three pounds to every semale person of the same age, who shall emigrate from any part of Europe (France and the Dominions of France excepted) and arrive in this Province, at any time, from the sirst day of of August, one thousand eight hundred and source, until the thirty-sirst day December, one thousand eight hundred and sisteen; for the purpose of settling in this Country; Provided, such emigrants to the number of twenty-sive, at the least, shall arrive together in one and the same vessel.

The committee further recommend that Commissioners may be appointed to examine such Emigrants, and that the Bounty may be paid to them, on the certificate of such Commissioners, and that the Commissioners so to be appointed, should take the most effectual methods to cause to be circulated throughout Europe a brief and concise account of the privileges, religious and civil, as well as the natural advantages of soil and climate, which emigrants coming to British North America, may reasonably expect to enjoy; and like, wise that such Commissioners should open and carry on a correspondence, through his Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor, with the several Governments in the British North American Colonies, for the purpose of moving such Governments to unite with this Province, in this undertaking.

The committee further recommend, that the Commissioners so to be appointed, should have power to nominate in each County and District in this Province, a corresponding committee for the purpose of arranging the distribution of such emigrants, and obtaining the best and most correct information, what extent of Lands belonging to his Majesty, and convenient for the settlement of such emigrants, may lie within such County or District, and also to promote subscriptions amongst the present Settlers, for giving gratis certain portions of their uncultivated Lands for the accommodation of such emigrants, likewise to receive subscriptions for the sale of uncultivated Lands, at certain sixed prices, to persons emigrating and settling the same, and generally to do every thing that may be considered necessary to promote the object intended.

The committee are further of opinion, that it will afford encouragement to poor fettlers, if the bounty heretofore allowed for Grain, raised on new Lands, should be continued for the year one thousand eight hundred and fifteen.

The committee recommend for the encouragement of the Fisheries, that the former bounty, granted on the importation of Salc, may be renewed with the alteration of seventeen shillings and six pence per Hogshead to be established as the price to secure the Importer; instead of sisteen shillings which was the former price.

The committee further recommend giving encouragement to those engaged in the Fishery, to employ vessels of a larger size, and better sitted for sishing voyages, than those generally used in the Province, and for this purpose. The committee

The committee are of opinion that the Tonnage Bounty formerly granted to veffels employed in the Fisheries should be revived, and extended to vessels of sifty Tons and upwards, which the committee think will produce more real benefit to the Province, than a Bounty on the quantity of Fish caught and cured.

The committee further report, that in confidering the important objects referred to them, they turned their thoughts to an inconvenience, at present existing, in consequence of the great disproportion in the extent of some of the Counties, and the want of a judicious distribution of each County, into Parishes, and Townships. This measure although not immediately connected with the objects referred to the confideration of the committee, they humbly conceive if judiciously arranged, it would operate to a certain extent in promoting the immediate purposes of this report. The committee therefore submit to the consideration of the House the propriety of soliciting his Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor to represent to his Majesty's Government the necessity of increafing the number of Counties in this Province, by creating three new ones. And in case the measure should be approved of, that his Majesty's permission to the Governor, to give his affent to an Act of the Legislature for that purpose, may be obtained; and that in the mean time Commissioners may be appointed to adjust and prepare against the next Sessions of the General Assembly, a Plan for the purpose of making such distribution, together with the Drasts of such Bills, as may in their judgements be necessary to carry this measure into full effect.

The committee further report that to enable the Commissioners to carry into effect the various measures they have recommended, it will be necessary they should be enabled from time to time, to defray such expences as they may incur, for which purpose a sum of Money should be placed at their disposal, for the application and expenditure of which the Commissioners should be held accountable to the Legislature.

The committee having reported to the best of their judgement on what appears most likely to promote the several objects referred to them, they humbly submit the whole to the consideration of the House.

Ordered, That the report do lie on the Table to be perused by the Members of the House.

The Humble Address of the House of Representatives in General Assembly.

May it please your Excellency,

HAΓ folong ago as the year 1807, the Inhabitants of the District of Colchester, and Pictou, petitioned the House of Representatives, praying to be erected into Counties, and a Bill was brought into the House of Assembly for that purpose.

That the then Lieutenant Governor of the Province, not being authorised by his Majetly to give his affent to any Act by which the number of Representatives was to be increased, the said Bill was not passed into a Law, and the said Districts although now very populous and remote from Halisax, still continue part of the County of Halisax. That it appears to the House of Assembly that the Interests of the Province would be advanced by the creation of several new Counties, not exceeding three and making a suitable idistribution of the several Counties into Townships and Parishes; but as the necessary plans and arrangements would be attended with expence, they have not thought it advisable to pass any Bill for that purpose, until your Excellency shall be authorised to assent thereto.

They therefore humbly request, that, if your Excellency shall approve thereof, you will be pleased to represent the same to his Majesty's Ministers, and request that his Majesty's permission may be granted to your Excellency, to give your affent to fuch an Act as shall be passed for that purpose, and approved of by your Excellency; and thereupon,

The Chairman also acquainted the House, that he was directed by the committee to move for leave to six again on the consideration of a Supply; which report the House agreed to.

MR. PRESIDENT, and Gentlemen of His Majesty's Council:

Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly:

IN consequence of the diligent attention you have paid to the Public Business during the present Session, the necessary Legislative arrangements are already completed; and I am enabled to release you from further attendance, at an earlier period than usual.

At the time I offer you my thanks for the provision you have made for the defence of the Province, and for the other services recommended by me to your consideration, I beg to express my particular approbation of the liberality you have displayed in voting a sum in aid of that already granted by the Imperial Parliament, for Building a House at Halifax, for the residence of the Naval Commander in Chief on the North American Station.

But most gratifying to me, and most honorable to your own feelings, is the sympathy you have manifested in the distress of our fellow Subjects in Upper Canada, and the generous assistance you have determined upon affording them. I shall feel peculiarly happy in calling the attention of His Majesty's Government to this voluntary act of benevolence; and in doing all in my power to promote the good design you have in view, I will immediately communicate to Sir George Prevost your humane intentions, and, by his Excellency's assistance. I shall hope to carry them into effect in the manner you wish.
