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# Canadians Held the Craters De-spite enemy's Terrific Bom-bardment.

Toronto, April 11—The Tor-onto Evening Telegram has the following tonight from its Lon-don correspondent, Douglas S. Robertson: A number' of wounded sol-diers have just arrived in Eng-land from the Canadian front, where at St. Eloi, they had sharp fighting. After a terrific concentrated bombardment, the enemy at-tacked and managed to dis-lodge the troops from some four 'Canadian battalions which had been holding the craters where mines had been exploded by engineers about two weeks ago ágainst the Ger-man position, and which were taken by British troops. The position was a most dif-

Taken by British troops. The position was a most dif-ficult one to hold, and of no vit-al importance. After standing shell fire for some time the Canadians were ordered to re-tire a short distance. Notwithstanding that the tm-emy attack was the fiercest in many honths, the Canadians stood their groud splendidly and soon were firmly entrench-ed close by.

and soon were himily entrench-ed close by. Our artillery sustained its re-putation and ably supported the infantry. The Germans suffered severely from our shelling. There was no more difficult position o nthe line to hold than that which was held by the Canadians in the vicinity of the Ypres salient.

## Decimation of the German Bat talions.

Paris, April 7—The German losses before Verdun, up to the present time, have reached the huge total of 200,000 men, one of the greatest battle losses in the whole range of warfare, ac-cording to estimates made pub-lic here today from a semi-official source—the result of care-ful inquiry made in the highest quarters in which the figures have been rigorously checked and verified.

and verified. "Documentary and verbal tes-timony gathered and authenti-cated permit the giving of pre-cise details concerning the loss-es suffered by the Germans and by us on the Verdun front," says the semi.official communi-cation given to the Associated Press. During the period from Feb. 21, when the battle began, to April 1, it is known that two army corps, namely, the Third and the Eighteenth, have been withdrawn from the front, havwithdrawn from the front, have been withdrawn from the front, hav-ing lost in the first attacks at least one third of their force. They have reappeared since, and have again suffered like

losses. "The German reinforcements are practically used up as fast as they are put in line. The total effectives of the Eighteenth corps have in this way lost 17,-000, and the Third corps have lost 22,000 men.
