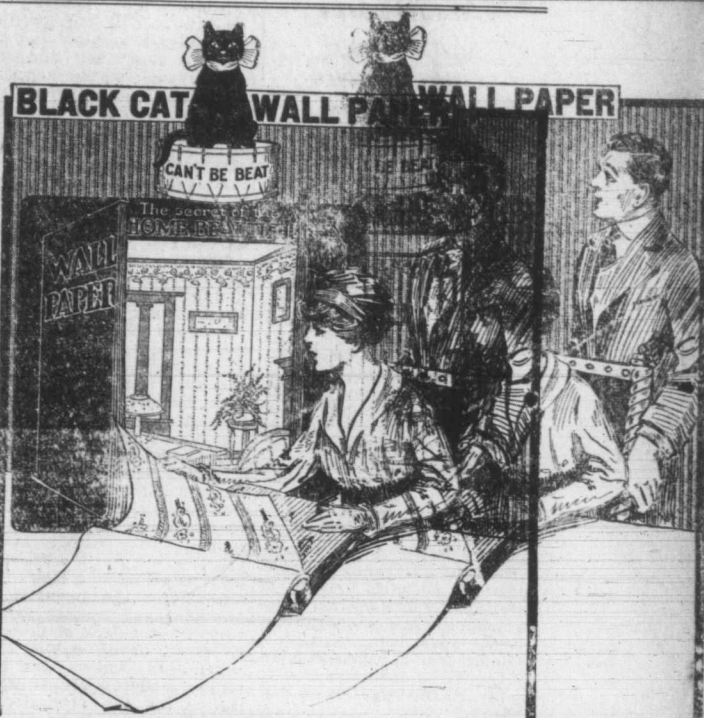

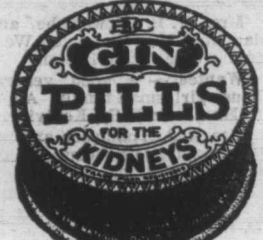

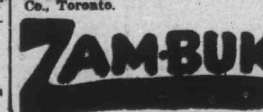
SUCCESS

Chatham, Ont., April 7.—A harrowing tale of brutality and oppression was unfolded today by Mrs. Victor Venlaven, Belgian refugee who, with two small children, joined her husband here today. The woman arrived by way of Detroit, and through an interpreter, told of the treatment by German soldiers of women and children and old men in her home city, Termonde. After the Germans occupied the city, families were taken into fields and shot down like rabbits. German soldiers marching through the streets drove the bayonet through children and carried them along impaled on the blade. Parents were locked in their houses, and at command of the German officers their children fired the houses. If they refused they were shot down. Had it not been for the relief given by Canada and the United States, millions would have starved. All provisions are exorbitant in price. Meat is fifty cents; flour fifty cents a pound; rice, seventy-two cents; coal oil, fifty cents a quart; butter, seventy cents a pound; bread, twenty-five cents a half pound.

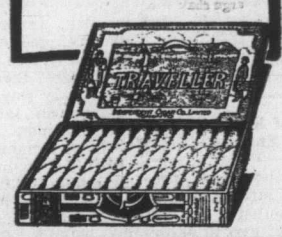

**Canadians Held the Craters Despite enemy's Terrific Bombardment.**

Toronto, April 11—The Toronto Evening Telegram has the following tonight from its London correspondent, Douglas S. Robertson:

A number of wounded soldiers have just arrived in England from the Canadian front, where at St. Eloi, they had sharp fighting.

After a terrific concentrated bombardment, the enemy attacked and managed to dislodge the troops from some four Canadian battalions which had been holding the craters where mines had been exploded by engineers about two weeks ago against the German position, and which were taken by British troops.

The position was a most difficult one to hold, and of no vital importance. After standing shell fire for some time the Canadians were ordered to retire a short distance.

Notwithstanding that the enemy attack was the fiercest in many months, the Canadians stood their ground splendidly and soon were firmly entrenched close by.

Our artillery sustained its reputation and ably supported the infantry. The Germans suffered severely from our shelling.

There was no more difficult position on the line to hold than that which was held by the Canadians in the vicinity of the Ypres salient.

**Decimation of the German Battalions.**

Paris, April 7—The German losses before Verdun, up to the present time, have reached the huge total of 200,000 men, one of the greatest battle losses in the whole range of warfare, according to estimates made public here today from a semi-official source—the result of careful inquiry made in the highest quarters in which the figures have been rigorously checked and verified.

"Documentary and verbal testimony gathered and authenticated permit the giving of precise details concerning the losses suffered by the Germans and by us on the Verdun front," says the semi-official communication given to the Associated Press. "During the period from Feb. 21, when the battle began, to April 1, it is known that two army corps, namely, the Third and the Eighteenth, have been withdrawn from the front, having lost in the first attacks at least one third of their force. They have reappeared since, and have again suffered like losses.

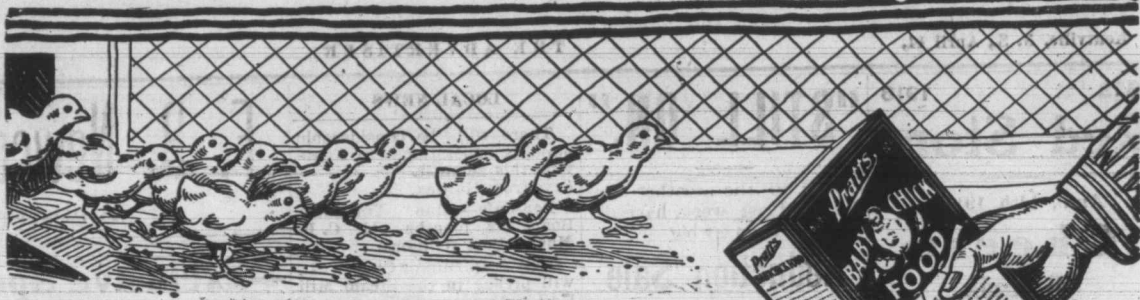
"The German reinforcements are practically used up as fast as they are put in line. The total effectives of the Eighteenth corps have in this way lost 17,000, and the Third corps have lost 22,000 men.

**In British Internment Camps**

London, April 6—Sir Herbert Samuel, the home secretary in reply to a question in the house of commons today, said that the number of civilians in British internment camps at present was 32,149. The number released from these camps between October and April, he said, was 834.

Charlottetown, April 3—Privates John White, of the Princess Patricias, and W. C. Crosby, of the 12th Battalion, 4th Infantry Brigade, returned wounded Island soldiers, were tendered a big reception on their arrival here today. Thousands of people were out to welcome them, the mayor and others delivering addresses.

The rate of taxation for Digby this year is fixed at \$2. This figure \$1.80 for the town's current expenditure and 20 cents for the Patriotic Fund. Halifax has been assessed \$2.02 for the present year.

**THE OPPOSITION'S GREAT WORK**

House of Assembly.  
Halifax, N. S.,  
April 10th, 1916.

A press letter on the legislative proceedings, prepared in Halifax, is sent out to Liberal weeklies every week. Last week's letter was noted for its gross misrepresentations of the history of the temperance legislation, its distortion of the facts of the personally offensive reference to Mr. Tanner and other leading Opposition members. But perhaps the Murray Government's news bureau should not be strongly censured for these things. No government having such an unenviable record in the matter of temperance reform would be desirous of having the facts given to the people. The outstanding facts of the present situation is that there is an alliance existing now between the Murray Government machine and the liquor trade. The liquor men know that Premier Murray offered all the resistance he dared to the Corning Prohibition Bill, that it is by his orders that the Bill is still tied up in the Council, that he is the one valuable friend they have at Court, and that if he should be returned to power again this year, the new prohibition law will not be enforced against them. During the debate on the Bill Hon. Mr. Murray made this clear. He said that if the people of Nova Scotia expected prohibition to be enforced they would have to pay the price in the shape of an army of inspectors, informers, police, special constables, and prosecuting lawyers, maintained at a staggering cost. His words and his attitude made it clear that so far as he and his government are concerned, there is no intention to "pay the price" necessary to enforce the law. The Halifax liquor interests therefore still look to Murray. They will be the chief contributors to the local government election fund. This is an open secret and common talk in Halifax, where hundreds of the best thinking Liberals will work for the return of the Conservative candidates.

Another matter dealt with in the Liberal press letter last week was the Hervey scandal. The facts of this case are so well known that it is not necessary to renew them here. Mr. Murray's illegal payment of \$48,500 of provincial money to R. G. Hervey in defence to a decree of the Court, was the first defended by the Government press by the assertion that it was for "labor and supplies." The falsity of this defence having been exposed by Mr. Tanner and his supporters, who showed that not one of the Hervey payments had been certified by Commissioner Ross as "labor and supplies," Murray Government newspapers take final refuge in the statement made in last week's Liberal press letter that "the result of the suit means that McKenzie and Mann must pay \$48,500 and there is no liability on the Government to pay one cent." This is a defence that is only open to out-laws. The government has been held by the highest Court in the Empire to have knowingly and wrongfully paid to Hervey \$48,500 of money that the Province owed to McKenzie and Mann, and supporters of the Murray Government now say that McKenzie and Mann, and not the Government must face the loss. Such a principal might be accepted in Mexico or the Barbary States, but it has a strange sound in a British country. Decisions of the Court cannot be flouted and legal liability repudiated by the Government of Nova Scotia. The Murray Government's liability is thus set forth by the decision of the Full Bench of Nova Scotia: "McKenzie, Mann and Company, Limited, cannot recover from the Crown the money which did not go to their credit in consequence of the illegal payments to Hervey, but under an Eng-

lish authority (Dyson vs. The Attorney-General, 1911, 1 K.B. 413) decided since Mr. Murray was dismissed as defendant, they are entitled, I think, to a in its own wrong, and ought to remember McKenzie, Mann and Company." Nova Scotia Reports vol. 47, p. 325). Referring to Premier Murray's conduct, the Privy Council says in its decision of last year: "If it were the case of a private individual, he would be clearly liable to make good the wrongful payments and to purge his contempt." The apologists of this unsavory transaction will have to seek some other cover.

Last week's angry attacks by the Liberal papers on Mr. Tanner and other prominent Conservative members of the Assembly are significant. There has never been a session in which the superiority of the Opposition Members pronounced as it has been this year. There has never been such an exposure of financial waste, of bad administration of the roads, the schools and other provincial services, as that to which the Murray Government has been subjected this session. Besides the waste of \$31,000 in so-called immigration in a non-immigrant year, the expenditure of over \$50,000 in 1915 to help 28 students get their University degrees as professional engineers, the Government, according to their own statement, kept and poured into the year's deficit \$28,426.42, which has been collected as Motor vehicle fees, and which, under the law, should have been spent in highway improvement. Week after week, the government's administrative methods are thus being exposed by the Opposition in the legislature. The work thus far accomplished has wrought consternation in Murray political circles. The feeling has become widespread, not only that the coming elections will be easily won by the Opposition, but that Mr. Tanner's victory in the Province will be a record one. In the circumstances, the warmth of the 34-year-old government leader the Liberal-Conservative is not surprising. Nor is the attempt of certain party wire-pullers to get an extension of the legislative term, so that the Murray government will not have to face the elections this

year, But both lines of tactics will prove futile. The Murray government will have to face the consequence of its record at the polls within a few weeks.
