On Friday night last Mrs. Sydney Lobb, wife of Accountant Lobb, of the Nanaimo Colliery, was shot through the heart. Death was almost instantaneous. The shooding took place in Mrs. Lobb's bedroom. Her husband communicated the awful news to the neighbors immediately afterwards. Mr. Lobb was very much excited at the time, when at the late hour of il o'clock he rushed over to a neighbor's house and startied the inmates by crying: "My wife has shot herself!" There was no one else in the house at the sime of the shooding. The coroner decided that an inquest was necessary, and after the evidence of the distracted husband, and an examination of the surroundings, the jury decided that it would hardly be possible for Mrs. Lobb to have fired the fatal shot herself.

On their finding the authorities decided that a thorough investigation should be held, and in pursuance of this Mr. Lobb was placed under arrest and an examination of the fates is now in progress before the police magistrate. Mr. Lobb occupied an important position in the colliery and in this city he has always been held in the highest esteem. He is half crazed with grief over the death of his young wife, and the proceedings of the trial place him in a pitiable plight. He admits that he had given cause of grief to his wife and blames himself very much for his conduct.

Mr. Lobb was a former resident of Toronto and before coming to Nanaimo he was with the C. P. R. at Vancouver. The deceased lady, who was a Miss Elliott before her marriago three years ago, is also from Toronto. There are two children, the youngest six months old.

Messages of Greeting Carried From Sarnia to Montreal.

Toronto, June 16.—The great relay race from Sarnia to Montreal, an event of considerable interest to wheelmen, is over. Before daybreak yesterday a courier was handed a message of greeting from the mayor of Sarnia and from the mayors of other cities and towns on the rontes to the president of the Canadian Wheelmen's Association at Montreal. A TERRIBLE EXPLOSION. Three Men Frightfully Mangled on the COTEAU DU LAC, Que., June 15.—A terrible accident occurred at this place through which three men were killed and three others dangerously wounded. The mea

others dangerously wounded. The men were charging holes with dynamite for the purpose of blasting rocks in section 17 Soulanges Canal, when the dynamite prematurely exploded.

The. names of the killed are: Patrick Drohan, aged 40, married, leaves a family of eight children (Drohan came here from Smith's Falls, Ont.); Rory McDonald, aged 35 years, unmarried, from Glengarry, Ont.; James Scanlan, about 22 years of age, unmarried, from Welland.

Two Hundred and Thirty-one Mem Perished in the Karwin Disaster.

VIENNA, June 18.—The number of men who perished in the Karwin mines has been definitely assertained to be 23i.

During the 104 years the Karwin mines have been in existence there have been many disastrous explosions in them. The last was in March, 1885, when 102 men work killed.

The mines are in two sections, and have an annual output of 700,000 tons. Most of the coal is consumed in Vienna. All the shafts were provided with the most modern ventilators, including double doors, connecting the working shafts with the air shafts, and oil lamps of the Muzler system. The Franziska shaft is 286 mitres deep and connects by passage with the Johannes shaft, which is 333 metres deep.

DOMINION PARLIAMENT

Orrawa, June 18.—The Premier gives notice of an amendment to the Cristinal Code: "Everyone is guilty of an indictable offence, and is liable to three years' imprisonment, who, being or acting in the capacity of a train conductor or other agent or employe of a railway company authorized to sell tickets or take up tickets or collect fares from passengers while travelling on any train operated by such company, fraudulently allows any person to travel on such train for any distance without either paying the proper fare for that distance, or producing a ticket or other evidence that such person is entitled so to travel for that distance, or wilfully omits either to punch or otherwise mark omits either to punch or oth any ticket travelled on so as it has been travelled on."

OTTAWA, June 15.—In the Houss of Commons yesterday Sir John Thompson introduced his electoral franchise bill. He said that the principal feature of the bill was that the revision of the lists would provide for the coming into force of the Redistribution Act of 1892. The new lists would be as laid out in that bill, although provision would also be made for the holding of bye-elections as the constituencies were now constituted. The franchise would be the same as in all the provinces. The provincial lists would be used by the revising officer as a basis for the revision. These officers would add names and take applications of those who had been left off the local and Dominion lists were not so great as to necessitate the payment of the extra cost as under the new bill a revision could be made every year. While the Government thus gave up its present federal franchise for those of the provinces it was decided to hold control of the lists by placing them for revision, as a present, in the hands of the Dominion is provinced.

COXEYITES DROWNED

A Novel Experiment in Mid-Ocean-Fish Life in the Deep Waters Not Without Danger-Some Peculiarly Interesting

Challenger. I give the description of it in the words of the late Prof. Moseley:

"Mr. Buchanan hermetically sealed up at both ends a thick glass tube full of air, several inches in length. Household Hints.

In order to keep food hot for late comers, place it in a close covered dish over a vessel of hot water. This will keep it from drying up as it is apt to do if kept in the stove oven.

Use cold tea for washing grained woodwork instead of soap and water. If much soiled around the knobs of doors or, on the window sills, a little soap may be needed, but it should be used sparingly if you would preserve the paint with any degree of freshness.

Never fill a coal gove above the fire bricks, a little lower is better and will produce the most satisfactory results. If the stove is kept full, warped covers will soon follow, besides meedless waste of coal.




