Rev. Mr. Armitage's Farewell.

A good-sized congregation gathered at the Methodist church last Sunday evening to bid farewell to the pastor, Rev. Mr. Armitage, who left this week to take up his duties at Windsor. The service took the form of a memorial to the boys of the congregation who have given their lives for their king and country.

At the close of his address he unveiled an Honor Roll to the memory of the twenty-six boys from the Wolfville congregation who have donated the khaki. Of these, seven have already made the supreme sacrifice.

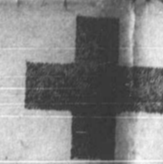
