On motion the house then adjourned till half-past three o'clock on Monday next.

Monday, May 2

Pursuant to adjournment the house met at half-past three o'clock.

ORDER OF THE DAY

Bill to amend the Act relating to the District Courts.

The Bill was read a second time and on motion the house resolved itself into Committee of the whole for its further consideration.

Mr Watson in the chair. After some brief discussion the Chairman reported from the Committee that they had agreed to the bill with some slight amendments. The Bill and the amendments were handed in at the Clerks table.

The amendments were then read a first and second time and agreed to by the House.

Ordered that the Bill be engrossed and read a third time to-day.

Accordingly the Bill was read a third time.

Ordered that the bill do pass and be entitled an "Act to extend the jurisdiction of the Central District Court and the Harbor Grace District Court and for other purposes."

His Attorney General then presented a Bill to confer certain rights on Aliens, which was read a first time.

Ordered that this Bill be read a second time to-morrow.

Ordered that a message be sent to the Legislative Council asking them to furnish this House with the amount of their contingent expenses for the current session.

The Chairman of the Board of Works and Mr O'Farra then proceeded to the Council with the message.

The house adjourned till to-morrow at half-past three o'clock.

TUESDAY, May 3

Pursuant to adjournment the house met at half-past three o'clock.

The Surveyor General presented a petition from the inhabitants of Saint Mary's praying for the erection of a light house in that neighborhood.

The Surveyor General—the petition before the House was one that especially commended itself to the best consideration of hon members. He would take the earliest opportunity before the Executive to urge the consideration of its prayer.

Mr Dwyer and Mr Collins supported the prayer of the petition.

Dr Skelton presented a petition from the inhabitants of Greenspond upon the subject of telegraph extension to that Island. He trusted that the Government would recognize the importance of this work and extend a practical consideration to the prayer of the petitioners.

Dr Skelton gave notice that he would move an address to his Excellency upon the subject of the foregoing petition.

Dr Skelton presented a petition from John Haddon, praying for an increase in his pension.

Dr Skelton observed that the petitioner seems to be of opinion that his retiring allowance of £100 a year is not sufficient. When Mr Kelly, the Inspector of Roman Catholic Schools was retired, he received as a retiring pension £165 10s. a year. The petitioner also state that Mr Kelly did not act as Inspector of Schools as long as he did. His claim would, under these circumstances, appear to be a good one and he trusted that it would receive the favorable consideration of the hon-e.

Hon the Premier presented a petition from the inhabitants of Heart's Content praying for the construction of a Railway.

Mr O'Mara presented several petitions from the inhabitants of the district of St John's East relative to the construction, extension and improvements of roads and bridges in various localities.

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HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY.

Saturday, April 20.

The Speaker took the chair at 2.30

The House was resolved itself into Committee of the whole on the Bill in reference to the construction of a Railroad.

Mr Watson in the chair.

Speaker moved the reconsideration of the fourth section and its verbal amendment.

The motion was put and carried, nem con.

The Committee rose and reported that they had passed the bill with some amendments. On motion the report was received.

Hon Mr Winter said it only remains for those who opposed this Bill to now place on the record of this house in the shape of resolutions those objections we entertain and have previously urged to this Bill. By this record posterity may see that we at least have not parties to a course that inflicts upon them calamities of an unwise and enduring character which our gentlemen fail either to estimate or to prevent.

1. That this house is of opinion that the present Bill is a departure in fundamental and vitally important points from the terms of Mr Blackman's proposals which were referred to a select committee as a basis for a contract.

2 That such departure from the original proposition was against the interests of the colony and entirely in favor of the contractors.

3 That the provision of the present proposed contract as a whole are unjust towards the Colony and, while securing to the contractors better terms than were originally stipulated for, provide no sufficient security for the due performance of the conditions on the part of the contractors, in return for the heavy subsidies in lands and money granted and obligations undertaken by and on the part of the Colony

4 That the effect of the acceptance of the present contract would not be only to entail upon the Colony heavy burthens and responsibilities which are certain and absolute as against advantages which are at the best but speculative, but further to expose the Colony and its people to dangers most calamitous and far-reaching in their consequences.

5 That the proposed Charter for incorporating the contractors into a Company, is both in its express terms and its omissions, in violation of the spirit of all wise legislation in relation to

kindred matters, and calculated to facilitate fraudulent speculation and defeat the ends of justice.

That for the foregoing reasons the immediate and unqualified acceptance of this contract would be rash and unjustifiable.

7 That further in the view of the fact that large and important contingencies at a distance from St John's whose gravest interests are most deeply affected by this measure have not had an opportunity of considering the same and expressing their opinions in relation thereto: it is the opinion of this house that it is desirable that further time be taken and proper measures adopted to further negotiate for an amendment of the terms of the contract in relation to those points in which it appears at present to be objectionable and defective, and failing to obtain such amendment as will the proposed contract acceptable to negotiate with other parties who may be desirous of contracting.

8 That for the purpose of hearing and final action upon the result of such negotiations, a postponed sitting of this Legislature should be held at such a time as may be considered most convenient and expedient therefor, and that to that end such proceedings as are constitutional be taken and had.

Hon Surveyor General seconded the resolutions which upon division, were lost.

Upon motion of the hon Premier the rules of the house were suspended.

Upon motion of the hon Premier the Railway bill was read a third time and upon division, was carried in the affirmative.

It was then ordered to be engrossed and taken to the Council by a deputation of this House, to request the concurrence of that body therewith.

The house then went into Committee on the Bill for Small Savings.

Mr Norman in the chair.

Financial Secretary moved the adoption of the Bill.

On motion, the Committee rose, reported that they had passed the Bill without amendment.

The report was received and the Bill read a third time and passed.

It was then ordered to be engrossed and taken to the Council by a deputation consisting of the Financial Secretary and Mr McLoughlan.

SECOND READING OF THE DISTRICT COURT BILL.

Mr Goodridge could not see the necessity for increasing the salary of these officials as proposed by this Bill. He regarded this matter as more than either political exigency or the interest of the country required. Should the jurisdiction of the Central District Court be extended to the district of Ferryland he trusted that the work connected with the administration of there would be performed in a more efficient manner than heretofore. He was informed that on the occasion last winter a proclamation was issued on three successive days announcing that Court would be held; and the parties who had business to transact attended with some inconvenience and difficulty without having their cases heard.

Hon Mr Rorke saw no distinct provision in this bill to prevent the occurrence of what was considered to be a great grievance by the inhabitants of Carbonear. At the present time persons may take an action and drag the other party from his business in Carbonear to attend Court in Harbor Grace though the amount at issue may be less than twenty shillings. Such a case happened to himself during the busy season, and he believed the action to be taken against him for no other reason than because of this disadvantage and inconvenience to which a suitor may be subjected by reason of the present law. He had a promise from the hon Attorney General that he would endeavor to have this matter of complaint redressed; He hoped that before the bill passed some provision would be made for this purpose.

Mr Little would ask the matter to stand over till Monday.

Hon Receiver General gave notice for a bill to repeat the Act 23, Vic., Cap. 4, which was read a first and second time.

Cetewayo's Message to the Queen.

Cetewayo has been visited at Cape Town by the two young sons of the Prince of Wales. After the usual formal courtesies and exchange of photographs, the two boys rose and expressed a wish to see Cetewayo's wives. 'Stay my children,' said the ex-King with a dignified wave of his hand; 'I have a word to say. Do you see that picture?' pointing to a print of the Queen. 'I think much when I look on that. You are the grandsons of that lady. I wish you to give her a message from me. I have been long down here, no one has yet told me what wrong I have committed, nor give me an opportunity of answering for my conduct. I do not know that I ever committed any wrong against the English. Yet they have taken me prisoner and keep me here, and give me no reasons, tell your grandmother this; and say that when the war is over (the war in the Transvaal) I would like her to let me visit England.'

The Imprisoned Czar.

St. Petersburg, June 21.—The Czar is living in complete seclusion at Peterhof. The harbor is guarded by two gunboats and a torpedo boat, and the Palace by detachments of the guards and Cossack patrols. He sees no one but the members of his suite and ministers, and when he takes a walk he is accompanied by an escort. He looks weary and haggard. The superstitious in St. Petersburg do not expect him to return alive. It is said Nihilists have been arrested in the woods, which a most surround the Castle, and attempts have been made to fire both the woods and Castle. It is stated however that precautions to secure the Czar's safety make it impossible for the Nihilists to reach him. It is reported that the Czar recently remarked that his subjects in the mines had no reason to complain seeing he shared their captivity and was at the mercy of masters, more blood thirsty than the Cossack. The Czarina is utterly broken down.

A Murder and a Lynching at a Picnic.

On Wednesday, the 11th, Dr William Tools accompanied his little daughter, 7 years old, to a picnic out on the Falson River, in Alabama. The mother of the little girl had dressed her up very handsomely, putting on gold ornaments and a diamond ring. During the afternoon she got separated from her father; and he went in quest of her, and on approaching the falls he saw a negro man carrying something with flying garments, and rushing up to him, he saw that it was the dead body of his child. The negro had choked the child to death and strangled her of the jewellery. The father attacked the negro and a terrible fight took place over the child's dead body. Help arriving, the negro was overpowered, a rope procured, and he was hung to the first tree, where he was still dangling at the last accounts.

The Season's Prospects.

From all quarters comes the most gratifying assurance of a successful result of the season's operations, whether in the prosecution of the fishery or of agricultural enterprise. The weather which from the opening of the season, has to the general observer been apparently capricious and unfavorable, has nevertheless, in our opinion tended in no small degree to the present favorable aspect of our industrial interests generally. To the variable winds and lowering state of the atmosphere, pretty generally throughout the past month or six weeks may we think be attributed that marked success which has attended fishing operations along so wide a range of our coast, whilst to the superabundance of moisture, especially within the past month, may also be attributed the present favorable appearance of the various crops, which give every promise of a yield equally as abundant, if not more remunerative to the labors of the agriculturist than for many years past, by latest advices from Labrador we are not as yet in a position to venture an opinion as to the probability for the season of future fishery operations in that quarter, but judging even from the limited intelligence received and considering that the season could scarcely be said to have opened for active operations in connection with the summer's fishery, we feel every confidence that there as elsewhere the most satisfactory results may generally be anticipated from the prosecution of the fisheries along that line of coast. Upon the whole, from the present outlook of industrial operations generally, more particularly as connected with the two leading interests of the colony, we feel that our local prospects generally, have not for some years past, presented a more favorable appearance.

On Monday evening last "the Carbonear Volunteer Fire Brigade" were out for their usual monthly practice. The engine exceeded the expectations of all present, the water being put with great force over the residence of Hon John Rorke, which is, from the lower side, the most difficult house to put the water over, it being built on high ground and in itself being very high, every person present was very highly pleased with the evenings practice. We hope the Government will extend their hand financially to this indispensable organization, as also the several Insurance Agents who are in the habit of taking risks in this town. We feel sure our friend Simon Donovan, Esq., will be one of the first of these gentlemen to come forward and show encouraging example. Of course we must give hon John Rorke his merit, as well as his deservit, as we have no prejudice against him, except when we see him working contrary to public interest it is our duty to remind him of it "in square talk" which we will ever do while we can wield an independent pen. Yes, and native interest will be attended to by us. To return to the subject of the Fire Company, the hon John Rorke has indeed given this Company every financial help within his reach as far as prudence would allow him. Certainly it would not be right to give too much of the special grant to the Company and so many other callings upon it. But we must only live on the hopes that the Insurance Companies will lend them a helping hand considering the heavy expense of organizing it and getting it in working order. Another matter which we would wish to bring under Mr Rorke's notice is the useless condition of the public pumps. Now we would suggest,

as the pumps are about to be repaired, he will please make the one expense of it and have them thoroughly overhauled by a competent person, also see that the wells are deep enough and the pumps not too long for the wells, and if too long have them cut. We would not by any means interfere with Messrs Gur, who are already commenced at them; but in the interests of the public we would wish to see this work well done now, as this expense will be best in the end. As the work is now in the hands of Guy Brothers, blacksmiths, whom we believe to be competent persons to do the mechanical part of it, we would suggest that a committee of five, or seven, be appointed to investigate and report on the real condition of the pumps, and if they are to be taken up have the wells examined, then we would have our pumps set properly and they would not be out of repair as they have been for the past few years, costing a large amount of money. It is time to have matters handled in a different way in future. We leave the matter for the present in the hands of Messrs Rorke and Gur; but time alone will prove the utility of our suggestions. Next matter of public importance is the very disagreeable way in which our local and main line affairs are handled by the Road Board. This spring a large amount of money was given to men, not neatly, for hauling stone, though the work was intended for men who were at the time starving; but they only got twelve shillings and sixpence, and some less, whilst comfortable persons got pounds and pounds for hauling stone and this out of money given specially to the Road Board to help the starving people and enable them to procure seed potatoes. Now, when they got this money they commenced a work which would take half the amount to purchase and haul stone instead of repairing the different roads so badly in need of the same, and give the poor men the benefit of their own money, then the roads would not be in the condition they are now in, nor would so many gardens be without potatoes. But the interest of the poor man is forgotten. In fact it is not bad enough to be poor, but you must tell the world of it before you can get work to help you. Remember, gentlemen of the Government, if you are deaf to the voice of the people now. The people will be deaf to your voice when the time comes for it to sound in the district. We now speak the sentiments of a large majority of the people without fear of contradiction. Yes, from the Clergyman and Doctor to the poor farmer and fisherman who has to haul his caplin or provisions and other things miles on, perhaps, a half-starved horse, a couple of dogs, or his own pack. Clergymen tell us day after day that the road to Perry's Cove is in many places impassable, across the Carbonear Beach it is equally as bad, and other places too numerous to mention just now, but will return to the subject in a future issue and give further particulars as well as the names of the Roads referred to. Every day brings a new and more grave charge against the Road Board to our ears. The above facts, in connection with the Road Board, we challenge any person to contradict and we will give them the privilege of any length of space in our journal for that purpose.

Reception of Father Phippard at Placentia.

When the telegraphic announcement of the departure of Rev R Phippard from St John's for Placentia became public, preparations were immediately made to receive the first son of the Ancient Capital who fully realizing his expectations after an absence of seven years, returned from Rome with full power and authority to "go forth and preach to all nations." The Rev W Veitch, P.P., King's Cove, and Rev S Flynn, P.P., Fortune Harbor, accompanied Father Phippard as far as Holywood where he remained for the night as guest of Mr John Veitch, of the Anglo American Telegraph Staff. The next day brought him through the picturesque scenery of Salmonier Valley on to the village of Colinet until the South East Woods was reached, where, although twelve miles from Placentia, the Rev gentleman first met with the friends of his youth, the companions of his earlier days. On reaching the waters of the South East Arm the party rested, to partake of the hospitality which is always to be met with, at the house of Mr Kelly, much more so on this occasion.

On the Road from the "Head" to the "Block-House" may be seen signs of welcome, flags at every house floated in the evening breeze, and now the pretty beach of Placentia, eighty-four miles from St John's, was reached, whereon crowds of people, young and old stood to see Father Phippard and accompany him to town. The firing of guns from this point and the display of banners in the town told plainly how welcome Father Phippard was to the home of his childhood, hundreds saw him beneath the parental roof, and night closed a scene that shall long hold a place in the memory of Father Phippard, no matter where the scene of his future labors may be.

He's now at home amongst his friends, No College doubts and fears; And when a few days home he spends, He goes to Father Sears. Well done West Coast, hail native worth. And let merit have its place; Encourage the youth of Newfoundland. Like they done in Harbor Grace.

ORDER OF THE DAY.

Second Reading of Aliens Bill. Hon the Premier, need not make any further reference to this Bill than simply to state that it is in accordance with the law of England at the present time and as it has been since 1810.

The Bill was then read a second time. Ordered that it be submitted to the Committee of the whole House on tomorrow.

Mr Parsons gave notice to ask the hon the Premier if any arrangement has been recently concluded between the Governments of Great Britain and France relative to the French Shore question.

Hon the Premier, in reply to the hon and learned member, said he had to inform him that no intimation has been received from the Government in a position at the present time to communicate. Negotiations will however be speedily resumed, which we have every reason to believe will result in a satisfactory solution of this difficult question.

The House then adjourned till tomorrow at 3 1/2 o'clock.

WEDNESDAY, May 4.

Pursuant to adjournment the House met at half-past three o'clock.

Mr Parsons presented a petition from John Waterman and others of Flat Rock on the subject of a road.

Mr Kent presented a petition from Thomas Quigley and others of Torbay and from James Coady and others of the same settlement on a similar subject.

Mr Mackey presented a petition from Alexander McDonald and others of St. George's and Cod Roy Valley praying for a road to Port-aux-Baques.

Pursuant to the Order of the Day the House then resolved itself into Committee of the whole upon the Bill to repeal the Act 42, Vic Cap 4, and for other purposes.

Mr Nowlan Chairman of Committee. The Chairman reported from the Committee that they had made some progress and asked to sit again.

Ordered that the Committee do sit again tomorrow on this Bill.

The House then resolved into Committee of the whole to consider the Bill to confer certain rights on Aliens.

Mr Norman in the Chair. An animated discussion on this Bill next took place, hon the Speaker and Mr Carter opposing its second reading, and hon the Premier and Mr Little supporting it.

On motion the Committee rose and reported the Bill had passed with some amendments. The report was received and the bill ordered to be read a third time tomorrow.

The House then adjourned till half-past three o'clock tomorrow.

THURSDAY, May 5.

Hon the Speaker took the Chair at 3 30 p.m. to-day.

Hon Receiver General said in reply to a question asked on a former day by Mr Parsons that the number of outstanding sights at the Custom House did not exceed fifty, and about half of these were granted in the case of a vessel from Boston that had not the invoices on board. Upon the arrival of the steamer now expected from Halifax these twenty-five sights will be discharged. If sights were refused a number of importers would in many cases suffer considerable inconvenience.

Hon Mr Shea presented a petition from G. W. Hierlihy, Preventive Officer at Bay Roberts. He (Mr S) did think, taking into consideration the great pertinacity and assiduity with which the petitioner pursues his claim here, there must be some thing substantial in it. In the arrangements made a few years ago for the purpose of increasing the salaries of certain officials no doubt from some misapprehension of the circumstances of petitioner's case he had been overlooked.

He (Mr S) considered that as Mr Hierlihy had now made out a good case he should receive that competent relief that was heretofore been withheld. His claim is that we compensate him for the extra cost incurred by living in Bay Roberts. His removal to that place was occasioned by certain arrangements of the Customs Department and was ordered by instructions from the Receiver General. He would now move that the petition do lie on the table with the hope of its receiving some more consideration than has heretofore been accorded to it.

Mr Parsons supported prayer of petition.

Mr Little had been communicated with by petitioner, and he supposed he had extended the same application

to other hon members with regard to what petitioner considers a grievance. Looking at the able and careful manner in which this document has been prepared exemplifying the care and attention which the petitioner accords, to his public and official duties, he considered that the hon Receiver General ought to reflect instead of closing his eyes to such an appeal. He considered that that gentleman should explain to hon members the why and wherefore of this seeming peremption. He had only heard one side of the case. If Mr Hierlihy has been wronged his wrong ought to be righted if not he should confine his communications to the head of his department.

Petition ordered to lie on the table. A message from the Legislative Council acquainted the House that they had passed the Bill respecting the Registration of Deeds, and also a Bill to amend the laws relating to the General Water Company.

The Alien Bill was read a third time and passed, and was ordered to be engrossed and taken to the Legislative Council by the hon Attorney General and Mr Kent.

On motion the House went into Committee on the Loan Bill.

Mr Parsons said the present Bill empowered the raising by loan of \$145,000. With all the money that has been spent during the past year we cannot point to a single beneficial reform or to the establishment of any enterprise by the Government except perhaps, the Bank Factory, that has proved of any benefit to our people.

Agriculture was not encouraged; the former encouragement given to the farmer for the clearing of land had been taken away, and the bounty to the Bank fishery had now been withdrawn. He would record his opposition to this Bill.

The Committee rose and reported that they had passed the Bill. The Report was received, and the Bill read a third time and passed. It was then engrossed and ordered to be taken to the Legislative Council by the hon Receiver General and Mr Nowlan.

On motion the House then adjourned till tomorrow at half past three o'clock.

FRIDAY, May 6.

The House opened at half past three. Mr Kent in the absence of the hon member for Harbor Grace occasioned by the arrival of the mail steamer would beg leave to present a petition from William M. Barnes of St. John's with his read.

Mr Little presented the petition makes out a very good case. He trusted that hon gentleman seated around the Council board would accord to the petition and favorable consideration it merits deserve.

Mr Little and Mr Parsons supported the prayer of the petition.

Mr Kent moved the adoption of an address on this petition, in the usual form which was carried.

A message from the Legislative Council acquainted the House that they had passed the Bill respecting the Newfoundland Railway without amendment. Message to the Council was then sent in reference to the Aliens Bill.

Hon Premier presented the report of the Joint Committee on the subject of the tenure of lands. It was hardly necessary for the Committee to prosecute very extensive, and would require some considerable time. He would therefore move that the report be adopted, and the Committee have power to sit out of session and to report to the Legislature on next session.

The motion was carried. Mr Parsons asked the hon Surveyor General if he personally held any interest in mines in this country.

Hon Surveyor General would befit to state that he had no interest in any licence of search. He could not see any such a question had been asked. If necessary implies the omission of his name from the list with which he furnished the House. Some time before he became Surveyor General he was a knight to take an interest in a mining licence but when that expired his connection ceased.

Mr Mackay, from the Select Committee on Printing and Reporting, presented the report which was read and adopted.

The Chairman of the Board of Works, from the select committee on contingencies, also presented the report of the committee, which was read and adopted.

The house then went into committee of the whole on the contingency bill.

Mr Watson, Chairman. The chairman reported from the committee that they had passed the bill without amendment.

Ordered that the bill be

taken to the Legislative Council for their concurrence.

The hon Speaker then informed the house that he had received a communication from the hon Colonial Secretary stating that it was the intention of the Governor to prorogue the Legislature on Monday next at two o'clock.

The house then adjourned to Monday next, at 11 a.m.

Monday, May 9.

The house met pursuant to adjournment at 11 o'clock.

On motion of Mr Watson seconded by Mr Nowlan,

Resolved.—That the Select Committee on reporting and Printing be continued in office during the recess and until one week after the opening of the next session of the Legislature or until the appointment of a similar Committee.

On motion of the Chairman of the Board of Works, seconded by Mr O'Mara,

Resolved.—That the present Select Committee on the contingencies of the House be continued after prorogation until the appointment of a similar committee in the next session of this house.

The Contingency Bill was brought down from the Legislative Council.

Ordered that this Bill do lie on the table.

At two o'clock, p.m., to-day a message was delivered by the Usher of the Black Rod commanding the immediate attendance of Mr Speaker and the House of Assembly in the Council chamber, where his Excellency was pleased to give his assent to the several Bills passed during the session. His Excellency having delivered the closing speech, the hon the President of the Legislative Council by command of His Excellency, said that it was His Excellency's will and pleasure that this General Assembly be prorogued, until Thursday, the 14th day of July next.

The third session of the thirteenth General Assembly of this Island accordingly came to a close.
