



The Evening Chit-Chat

"I think there is as much merit in beautiful manners as in hard work."—Emerson.



Two men who are likely to become candidates for the same political office before very long, were under discussion at our office the other day.

Both men are forceful, original, brilliant personalities. The chief difference between them is that one, being brought up in very humble circumstances, lacks any semblance of breeding or polish, while the other, who is the scion of an old and distinguished family, has the bearing and breeding of a worthy descendant of a long line of distinguished ancestors.

"Well, I don't know a great deal about either of them, but I'm going to vote for A," said one man, naming the son of the humble family.

"Why?" I asked.

"Oh, because this B has too good manners," he answered. "He's too polished. I want a real man."

The old, old belief, that a "real man" can't have manners, that breeding and polish are incompatible with strength.

Every time I meet that belief I stop to quarrel with it.

I admit willingly that breeding and polish are not fit substitutes for strength, but I firmly refuse to acknowledge that they are detractors from it.

The strong man, without education or polish, is greater than the weak man with both, but the strong man crowned with breeding and polish is a greater force than either.

If a bar of iron were to be polished, would it lose strength by the process?

Is the steel that has been tempered and worked over and polished less strong than the crude iron?

In many cases undoubtedly, a life of overmuch ease and wealth rots a man and leaves a shell of good man-

ners with a rotten center.

But that is no reason to hate the good manners.

There are the good things left by the decay; not the cause or sign of the decay.

They tell us sometimes that we women, if we had the suffrage, would vote for a man for no better reason than that he had good manners.

I cannot see that that would be any more absurd than to vote against him for the same reason.

It seems to me it is an American fault to discredit the value of good manners.

We are such worshippers of strength and force and originality and brains that we forget that there are other things equally desirable.

But there are.

In one of Oliver Wendell Holmes' Breakfast Table Series is a paragraph that goes to the heart of the matter so much better than my feeble pencil can that I am going to let you have it bodily:

"I think it is unpopular in this country to talk much about gentlemen and gentlewomen. People are touchy about social distinctions, which no doubt are often invidious and quite arbitrary and accidental, but which it is as impossible to avoid recognizing as facts of natural history. Society stratifies itself everywhere, and the stratum which is generally recognized as the uppermost would be apt to have the advantage in easy grace of manner and in unassuming confidence, and consequently be more agreeable in the superficial relations of life. To compare these advantages with the virtues and utilities would be foolish.

"Much of the noblest work of life is done by ill-dressed, awkward, ungainly persons; but that is no more reason for undervaluing good manners and what we call high breeding, than the fact that the best part of the sturdy labor of the world is done by men with exceptional hands is to be urged against the use of Brown Windsor as a preliminary appearance in cultivated society."

Reform of the House of Lords.

In view of the fact that there is a competition between Lord Rosebery and Premier Asquith on the subject of Reform of the House of Lords, the following facts should prove of interest:

In the House of Lords at present there are 3 Princes of the Blood Royal, 2 Archbishops, 22 Dukes, 23 Marquises, 124 Earls, 40 Viscounts, 24 Bishops, 234 Barons, 16 Scottish and 28 Irish Representative Peers, giving a total of 616 peers.

According to cable intelligence this morning Lord Rosebery gave notice that on March 14th he would move that the House of Lords resolve itself into a Committee of the Whole to consider the best means of reforming the existing organization so as to constitute itself a strong and efficient second chamber.

Lord Rosebery's resolutions will probably be on the lines of the recommendations of Lord Newton's committee which sat in 1907 and 1908, and reported as follows:—

In the opinion of the Committee there are three main grounds for the assumption that it was advisable to modify in some respects the almost exclusive hereditary character of the House of Lords:

1. That the numbers of the House within recent years have increased so largely that some reduction for legislative purposes is expedient;

2. That it is desirable to relieve from their parliamentary duties peers to whom such work is irksome and ill-suited, but to whom it has come inevitably by inheritance; and

3. That it is necessary in the interests of the House itself to eliminate by a process of selection peers whom it is inexpedient for various reasons to entrust with legislative responsibilities.

The Committee at an early stage in their proceedings came to the conclusion that, except in the case of peers of the Blood Royal, it was undesirable that the possession of a peerage should of itself give the right to sit and vote in the House of Lords.

Under this scheme the membership of the House would be as follows:—

Peers of the blood royal 3
Peers elected by hereditary Peers 200
Peers qualified by service to the nation 130
2 Archbishops and 8 elected bishops 10
Lords of Appeal (Judges) 5
Life Peers, 4 created a year, and never more than 40 at any one time 40

If we have reference to the opinions expressed by the Liberal, Labour and Nationalist parties, the scheme of reform they aim at differs radically from the Rosebery scheme. They do not desire to strengthen the House of Lords but to curb its present power.

Their object will be to take away by statute the right to vote on a Budget Bill, and to restrain their power of rejecting other legislation beyond some fixed limit of time.

Conservatives wish to make the watch-dog of vested interests sturdier and stronger; the Radicals aim at muzzling it.

The New Sealing Rules

At the meeting of sealing steamer owners held in Bowring Bros. office yesterday at 3.30 p.m., Mr. J. S. Munn occupied the chair. The steamers are to sail as follows:—The wooden fleet will sail on or after 8 a.m. on the 12th March from any port. The steel steamers to leave St. John's on or after 8 p.m. on the same day. Seals are not to be killed before the 15th March, but this rule does not apply to the Gulf ships. Should any captain violate or permit his crew to violate this rule, such master will not be employed by the owners in any capacity in their ships, nor will they permit such captain to proceed to the seal fishery for a period of two years from the commission of such offence.

Guy Celebration.

On Wednesday night a meeting was held in the Riverhead schoolroom at Cupids on the Guy celebration. Capt. Az. Smith took the chair, and the Secretary, Mr. Alex. Serrick, read correspondence with the O.B.C.A., Toronto, and the Historical Society of St. John's. The Chairman gave an address. Mr. R. Smith showed there was no doubt of Cupids being Guy's first landing place, and Capt. Wm. Smith on the possibilities of our Island Home. A vote of thanks was passed to Very Rev. Mons. Walsh for the use of the schoolroom.

The injured man on being attended by the doctor was driven to his home on George St. All that part of the hand between the knuckles and the wrist is crushed and will require careful surgery to restore it to use. It is believed that he will not lose the hand as no bones are broken.

Lady Williams Breaks Her Arm.

As Lady Williams, wife of His Excellency the Governor, was walking down Job's Hill yesterday, accompanied by her niece, Miss Dean, she suffered a very painful accident. Slipping on the ice-covered thoroughfare she fell and broke her left arm at the elbow. She suffered intense pain, was assisted by her relative and others passing and a cab being procured she was driven to Government House, where Dr. Keegan set the fractured bone.

Almost Drowned.

Tuesday last as John Drew was driving his horse with a load of wood over Stevens' Pond, near Bay Bulls, he with the horse and fit out went through and came near being drowned. Messrs. Moriarty, Mullowney and Maher saw his predicament from a distance and hastened to his rescue and after great exertions extricated the man and beast. Both were much exhausted and could not have lasted much longer had succor not arrived.

House Burned Down.

Passengers by the express from Grand Falls yesterday bring the news that a house and butcher's shop belonging to James Fogarty, at that town, took fire on Wednesday evening last and was burned down. Mr. Fogarty has been carrying on a butcher business there during the year. The place was not insured. No particulars as to how the fire originated have been received.

Died From Injuries.

Const. Fitzgerald, of the Eastern Station, had a telegram to-day telling him of the death at Sydney of his cousin, Andrew Fahey, of Western Bay. The deceased was hurt in one of the pits of the collieries there and succumbed from the effects of the accident. He was in his 18th year. His parents reside at Western Bay. The body will arrive by to-morrow's express.

Demand for Drastic Curbing of the Lords. ASQUITH'S NARROW MAJORITY LAST NIGHT.

Special to Evening Telegram.

The first trial of strength in the new Parliament occurred last night at a crowded session of the House of Commons when Austen Chamberlain's fiscal amendment was rejected by a vote of 265 to 254. Speeches were made by Arthur Balfour, Chancellor Lloyd George, Walter Runciman, the Bonar Law, and others, none of which, however, gave any new aspect to the fiscal controversy although victorious only by the narrow majority of 11. The Government may regard the result as very satisfactory inasmuch as there was no cross-voting, and no evidence of any intention on the part of the discontented groups to overthrow the ministry. The Nationalists, the O'Rientales as well as the Radicals, all abstained from voting; the Laborites were with the Government, and three Liberals abstained. Division was taken amidst a scene of great excitement and figures as announced to the Premier, having given notice that he would move on Monday that Government business would take precedence over all other business until March 24th, the House adjourned.

The Government's existence now will depend upon the production of a plan satisfactory to the Nationalists and Radicals for dealing in a drastic manner with the House of Lords' power. This morning will say it cannot be stated with too much emphasis, that the Irish party has not bargained with the Government for the policy which John Redmond has laid down. The Irish party will speedily produce a veto scheme and press it to an issue. The Irish party will enter upon a policy of vigorous opposition to the Government to the result that Ministry either will be defeated in a few days or will be contented to eke out a contemptible existence by the aid of Liberal supporters. Freeman's Journal further explains that it was not out of consideration for the Government that the Nationalists abstained from voting, but because they did not desire to commit themselves to a Tariff Reform policy or to take a step which would divert the issue of the next election from the House of Lords to Tariff Reform. Meetings of Liberal and Radical groups are sending deputations to Premier Asquith asking him to take a strong line on the veto question.

Made Good His Escape.

CALCUTTA, Feb. 24. The Dalai Lama, the Supreme Head of the Lamaist Hierarchy, who fled from the Capital of Tibet, upon the approach of the Chinese troops, has made good his escape into Sikkim, a state of India on the South of Tibet and adjoining Barjiling, the British District, in which latter place the fugitive will seek an Asylum. The escape of Dalai Lama, was a narrow one, for Chinese troops bent upon his capture, hotly pursued him to the borders of Sikkim. He travelled day and night and along many of the numerous ferries. His followers, however, engaged the Chinese troops, permitting time for Dalai Lama to reach the frontier, but very few of his party will be left to him when he crosses into Sikkim.

Rosebery Proposes to Reform Lords.

LONDON, Feb. 24. The House of Lords has decided to place its own plan of reformation before the country. At to-day's session of the Upper Chamber, Lord Rosebery gave notice that he would, on March 14th, move that the House resolve itself into a Committee of the Whole to consider the best means of reforming the existing organization so as to constitute itself a strong and efficient second chamber. By the date set by Lord Rosebery the Government's more drastic plans for the reform of the House of Lords should be made known though Rosebery's Asquith told John Redmond to-day that he was unable to fix the date upon which he would present the Government's proposal.

To Curb Rioters.

PARIS, Feb. 25. Following a conference between Premier Briand and the Ministers of Colonies to-day the Government has decided to immediately despatch the armoured cruiser Victor Hugo with marines to Guadeloupe, to restore order disturbed by the rioting sugar cane cutters on strike there. A cable message was also sent to the Governor of Martinique instructing him to send 100 soldiers to the scene of the trouble.

Women's Work in the Civic Elections.

Never before in the history of Montreal have the women taken the important part they did in our recent civic elections. Pleasant, indeed, it is to feel that they lent a helping hand to this excellent work of "cleaning house." They were part of the organization that did such wonders. Without organization nothing is possible, with it all things are possible. In Boston, our nearest great city, they also recently had an election, and although the daily papers were better organized, and the newspapers, the candidate who was opposed by the papers was elected. What does this show? That our campaign was better organized, and with organization comes success.

Never, indeed, was an election so systematically managed. Women with voices as united in their charges as our ladies had stighs sent for them. Old ladies who had never done such a thing before were dragged somewhat to the polls. One man who went into vote in a western ward told me that there were three women there at the time. Here comes the point I want to make—if women can work for civic reform so successfully and go to the polls in such numbers and cast their votes for the right candidates, why cannot they do so for other elections? If the women taxpayers are allowed a say as to who shall represent them in the City Hall, why should they not have a say as to who is to represent them in Parliament? Let us hammer away at it until the logic of the demand is seen by all. And apropos of this question, it is good news to hear that the order has gone forth in England that militant tactics among the suffragettes are to be abandoned for the present. Reform in these days come more surely by reason than by force.

St. John's Mutual Improvement Association held its regular weekly session in the Congregational Lecture Room last evening. There was a large attendance, including a number of lady visitors, to whom had been extended a general invitation to be present. The prominent feature of the evening was a paper on Dr. Saml. Johnson and his biographer, James Boswell, prepared by Mr. J. E. Ray, Canadian Trade Commissioner. Mr. Ray handled his subject in a masterly manner, pointing out the marked characteristics of Saml. The British Parliament.

The King's Speech.

"My Lords and Gentlemen: My relations with all foreign Powers continue to be friendly. The establishment of the Union of South Africa has been fixed for the end of May, when its new Government will be constituted and soon afterwards its first Parliament representing the consolidated electorate, will be ready to be assembled for its important deliberations. I am sending my son, the Prince of Wales, to make an extended journey through my South African possessions in the Autumn before the opening, in my name, of the first Legislature at Cape Town.

A HAPPY CONSUMMATION.

"It is with peculiar interest and pleasure that I contemplate this visit, when my son will have the privilege, not for the first time, of inaugurating the Parliamentary life of a great united Dominion, and will convey to South Africa on behalf of myself and the Empire, our ardent prayers for the welfare and future of her people.

"In conformity to an important measure of last year, for extending the Legislative functions of the Legislative Councils in India, and increasing the number of their members, these bodies have been elected

and have met. They have entered with good promise upon the enlarged duties and responsibilities entrusted to them."

THE FINANCIAL SITUATION.

Addressing the members of the House of Commons, the King said: "Gentlemen of the House of Commons:

"The estimates for the services for the ensuing year will be laid before you in due course. They have been framed with the utmost desire for economy, but the requirements for the naval defence of the Empire have made it necessary to propose a substantial increase in the cost of my Navy.

"You will also be asked to complete the provision which was made in the last session for the year which is about to expire, but which effect has not yet been given. The expenditure authorized by the last Parliament is being duly incurred, but as the revenue required to meet it has not been provided by the imposition of taxation, recourse has been had under Parliamentary sanction, to temporary borrowing. Arrangements must be made at the earliest possible moment to deal with the financial situation thus created."

THE MOMENTOUS ISSUE.

Addressing both Houses the King said:

"Recent experience has disclosed serious difficulties due to recurring differences of strong opinion between the two branches of the Legislature. Proposals will be laid before you with all convenient speed to define the relations between the Houses of Parliament, so as to secure the undivided authority of the House of Commons over finance and its pre-eminence in Legislation.

"These measures, in the opinion of my advisors, should provide that this House of Lords should be so constituted and empowered as to exercise impartially, in regard to proposed legislation, the functions of initiation, revision and, subject to proper safeguards, of delay."

PREMIER ASQUITH'S SPEECH.

Apart from the financial provisions, the only question in which the Government announced legislation was the relations between the two Houses. Nothing more would be introduced this session.

"The House of Lords," said the Premier, "last year rejected the Budget—a glaring breach of the unwritten conventions of the Constitution. That was the climax of a series of acts which the Lords claimed overriding authority over the decisions of the popular Chamber, and the Government's appeal to the country was primarily an appeal to give them authority to put an end to this state of affairs.

NO GUARANTEE FROM KING.

"I have said that we must have legislative safeguards, but some of my friends say that I talked about guarantees of the exercise of the Royal prerogative. If I had said such a thing I would not now be standing at this box. I received no such guarantee. It is the duty of a responsible Minister, so far as it is possible, to keep the name of the

Sovereign and the prerogative outside of the domain of party politics.

"To ask in advance for indefinite authority to use the Royal Prerogative in a measure not yet submitted to the House, was a request, Mr. Asquith declared, a Minister could not properly make.

WILL TACKLE THE LORDS.

The Premier said that the House would proceed on the question of the Lords resolutions which would be laid on the table soon, discussed before the Easter recess and passed and later would be embodied in a Bill.

The Government had only wished to put an end, at the earliest possible moment by the wisest and most adequate method, to the constitutional conditions giving to a non-representative and irresponsible authority the power to thwart the purposes and mutilate the handiwork of the chosen exponents of the people's will.

REDMOND'S POSITION.

John E. Redmond, leader of the Irish Party, announced that the fact should be emphasized that the Nationalists stood as they had always had apart and independent, allied to no British party. They had supported

the Government at the last election because the Prime Minister's pledge on Home Rule was supplemented by one still more important to Ireland, the abolition of the veto of the House of Lords, which was tantamount to the adoption of Home Rule. He thought and the country thought, he continued, that Premier Asquith had promised to ask for guarantees of the exercise of the Royal Prerogative and that if he did not get them, he would decline to hold office. But it appeared that the Nationalist were mistaken.

A DISASTROUS POLICY.

The Government's policy was to pass the Budget before any assurance was given that the Veto Bill would pass. It was a disastrous policy and meant the throwing away of the mandate which they had received from the country. They would be enabling the Lords on the Veto Bill, to force a second election in a year, and the Government would be beaten by the weary electorate.

"If the Prime Minister gives us reasonable assurance that he will be able to carry the Veto Bill into law this year," said Mr. Redmond, "we will vote for the Budget, but we are not willing to pay that price for nothing."

HOUSEHOLD NOTES.

To remove scratches, an excellent furniture polish is made of equal parts of alcohol, olive oil and pure cider vinegar.

Whitefish that is to be boiled will be greatly improved in flavor if lemon juice is rubbed on it generously before cooking.

All porcelain yellowed with iron sediment may be cleaned with muriatic acid, but this must not be allowed to touch the hands.

To test tea, put a little of it in a pan and touch a match to it. The best tea leaves very little ash; inferior tea leaves considerable.

One housekeeper prevents her salt neat from moulding by rubbing every fortnight with white of egg, mixed in a little salt water.

If water is spilled on a book, do not try to dry it by the fire, as this will ruin it. Mop it up as gently as possible, and then put it in the open air.

To whiten tea towels, wash them in the usual manner, then boil in good soda containing a large amount of borax; then rinse it several times.

Salt mackerel should be soaked overnight with the skin side up. Change the water the last thing before going to bed and again on rising.

Potatoes should be peeled as thin as possible. Turnips must be peeled thicker, taking as a guide the line that appears just inside the skin.

The cellar should be thoroughly ventilated every day, even in the coldest weather. Mustiness is more likely to cause bad colds than cold air.

Peroxide of hydrogen will remove ink stains from colored goods without fading the color. Soak the spots and put the material in the sun for half an hour.

Never allow the knobs of any of the stove or draft doors to become loose. They are all fastened with nuts inside, which often drop off and are lost.

Fine old lace can be made to look new if put away in starch for several hours, and then hung on the clothes line in the sun for a short time. Use the dry starch.

Always moisten linen that is to be drawn with a damp cloth or sponge.

The threads will pull more easily if they are rubbed with soap after they are moistened.

To make a delectable lemon pie, add the pulp of a banana to the custard before turning into the paste-lined tin. Cover with a meringue when it comes from the oven.

To keep the coffee pot free from strong odor, put a pinch of bicarbonate of soda in it once a week, fill with water and allow to boil slowly or simmer for a quarter of an hour.

Don't throw away broom handles covered with cretonne or crepe paper and with a long cord or ribbon loop tied in the centre; twelve-inch lengths are fine for coat and skirt hangers.

When buying fowls for fricassee, never allow the butcher to splinter the bones by chopping with a cleaver. Ask him to remove the sinews from the legs and cut through the joints.

Mr. Cashin's Interview

Hon. M. P. Cashin, while in New York was interviewed by a reporter on Newfoundland affairs and gave a splendid account of the progress of the Colony during the past few years. He was brilliantly optimistic as to the future, and was particularly emphatic in stating that Newfoundland was not desirous of reciprocity with the United States having arrived at such a stage of development that better trade relations with the Republic were no longer needed. The West Coast begs leave to take exception to this statement of Mr. Cashin. We know of no greater boon than could be conferred upon this section of the island than reciprocity with the United States. It is a "consumption devoutly to be wished" by every fisherman and merchant on the West Coast. Reciprocity would open up for us a market fraught with endless possibilities. West Coast residents fully realize the great impetus reciprocity would give to all lines of endeavour in this section and the great prosperity and happiness it would entail. While Mr. Cashin is correct in other statements he cannot convince our people that we do not want better trade relations with the United States.—Western Star.

Agreed to Regulations.

The owners and agents of the different sealing steamers met at Downing Bros. office yesterday afternoon at 3 o'clock and practically agreed to certain proposals recently made and referred to by the Telegram yesterday. The meeting agreed not to kill before March 15th, as the seals are immature when killed before that date. Steamers in the bay by the 15th of the month are generally home early.

Blocked With Snow.

The snow fall of Wednesday blocked most of the country roads, and yesterday people had a very difficult coming along. Yesterday in several instances people had to shovel paths through the snow in the country for their own convenience.

Sealers to Arrive.

Next week the familiar figure of the sealer will be seen on the city streets and most of those who are going to the sealfishery, with their captains, will arrive here by train. Some of the men have long distances to travel before connecting with the train.




