SOLIGNUM.

A Remarkable Test! Locally made by
Messrs. W. & G. RENDELL.

To test Solignum as a preservative for Wood against the at-
tacks of Worms, we tried a piece of 2 x 4 Spruce, about two feet
in length, by painting one-third with Solignum, leaving the
balance clear wood, this we suspended by a wire through the
centre, in the water about one foot from the bottom, immedi-
ately over a pile of stones the remains of a sunken wharf
(which is the place where our Wharf Shores are eaten off first)
for Three Months. On taking it up at the end of that time we
found some half-dozen small holes only a very short distance
in the clear part of the wood, which shows the liquid had pene-
trated through the whole piece and the worms had hardly
begun boring before coming in contact with it.

Last year as a test of some brands of Copper Paint we
handle, we had a similar piece of wood treated at both ends,
leaving the centre third clear; this was in exactly the same
place as the piece for the solignum test for Three Months and
Three Days, when taken up the painted ends were perfect but
the centre was riddled with worm holes.

Both these pieces of wood are to be seen at our Office by
those interested in the preservation of Wharf Piles or any other
wood work.

The Evening Chit-Chat

There is a certain thing which many very upright people who would shudder at the thought of breaking the eighth commandment in a n y other way, sometimes steal.
 And yet perhaps I am unjust in saying "steal," for those from whom they take it usually seem willing to give.
 The thing I mean is vitality.
 Say you are very tired some day, nervously depressed, indigo blue. You go to see a friend. You are with her two or three hours. She sympathizes with you, encourages you, diverts you from your troubles, interests and amuses you.
 The deep blue clouds of your depression begin to break before you have been with her a half hour. When you leave, the sun is shining from your heart once more and you are able to realize that after all "God's in His heaven: all's right with the world."
 You wonder at the change in yourself. You say, "how did she cheer me up?"
 But you probably don't realize that she has been giving you part of herself, that she has actually parted with some of her vitality to you.
 And yet that is undoubtedly what happened—just as much as when a cold object is laid against a warm object, the cold object becomes warm by absorbing heat from the other and the warm object becomes cooler.
 Perhaps she doesn't feel the loss of vitality at all. There are people with such reservoirs of vitality that they are able to give it out without any apparent loss to themselves—just as the kitchen range can warm an object laid against it without any apparent loss of heat because it has a reservoir of heat within itself.
 But there are other people who have no such abounding stores of vitality, and who are visibly affected when they give too much of it to others. They may not realize what exhausts them. Very likely they don't, but that is what happens just the same.
 It is said that trained nurses who are on cases of nervous depression or melancholia, or anything of that sort, are much more likely to break down than those on merely physical cases, because they are giving so largely of their vitality to bring the patient back to normal.
 Taking your blues to other people to banish is not the only way of stealing vitality.
 Trying to make people make all your decisions for you is another.
 In many families there is one member who is always hanging back—wet blanketing things—acting sulky and disgruntled. To "make" things go pleasantly it is necessary for the rest of the family to continually conciliate him, and to use a slang phrase, "Jolly him along." This kind of person is one of the worst vitality thieves.
 Almost all of us borrow vitality from our friends in one way or another.
 Most of us give out vitality.
 Let's just try not to be too greedy in our borrowings or too stingy in our lendings.

For some months past this ball has been the topic of much conversation, as it was expected that it would be honored by the presence of the King and Queen, but unfortunately their Majesties were unable to attend, owing to the death of the King's great-uncle, Prince John of Glouceburg.
 This, however, did not prevent the Queen from honoring the Duke and Duchess with her presence at dinner, which was served in the gilded saloon, where the famous gold plate of the Cavendish family was displayed on a specially constructed sideboard.
 Finest Service in Europe.
 In view of the Queen's expressed preference for the carnation above all other flowers, pink malmalsons were used on the table, and all were prize blossoms.
 When dessert was served, the table was further enriched by a massive gold dessert service which is one of the chief treasures of the mansion, chased and repoussed, and in solid gold. This plate is probably the finest service in Europe.
 Superb jewels were to be seen on all sides. Several members of the Royal family were present at the ball, and a number of Indian princes created interest by the magnificence of their costumes.

Seven Persons Killed
 By Lightning During a Terrible Storm in London and suburbs—Thousands of Spectators of Epsom Derby Drenched.
 London, June 1.—The exceptionally high temperature that has prevailed during the month of May culminated last evening in a terrific thunder storm in London and the Southern and Western suburbs. Many persons were killed by lightning, which also struck numerous churches and other buildings. An electric wire fused in the building of the Royal Exchange and started a fire, which, however, was speedily quenched.
 The storm was accompanied by a deluge of rain which caused a landslide on the South Eastern Railway near Merstham, blocking that line and also flooded the Great Western Railway at Ealing, severely deranging traffic. The full fury of the storm was felt at Epsom shortly after the horse races had ended, and thousands of the spectators were drenched.
 The storm was the most severe that has visited London in many years. The thunder crashed and vivid lightning played with terrifying effect along the rails of the railroads and in the telephone and telegraph instruments, while the deluge of rain stopped motor vehicles, causing great inconvenience. Altogether seven deaths as the result of the storm have been recorded, five of these, two policemen and three civilians, occurred in the neighbourhood of Epsom Downs.

Salute Round The World.

Crash of Artillery Will Announce the Placing of the Crown.
 Not only in Canada, but in every part of the Empire, guns will boom forth simultaneously at the exact moment when the crown is placed upon the head of the King in Westminster Abbey on Thursday, June 22. The shouts of "Long Live the King!" as they resound through the abbey, will find an echo in the most distant parts of the world.
 Although no definite arrangements have yet been made, it can be anticipated that royal salutes will be fired in the usual places at all regimental headquarters in Canada boasting artillery corps or cannon.
 The Colonial Office has made a request to the Earl Marshal to be informed of the exact minute the crown will be placed upon the King's head, and the information—it is expected that the time will be within a few minutes of two o'clock—will be communicated by the Colonial Office to every part of the Empire, so that arrangements for saluting the King can be made well in advance.
 In those parts of the Empire where it is daytime when it is two o'clock at Westminster guns will be fired, and in those places where it is night rockets for bombs will be let off. Taking two o'clock as the actual time, when the King will be crowned, the coronation salutes will be given at the following hours in the places mentioned:—

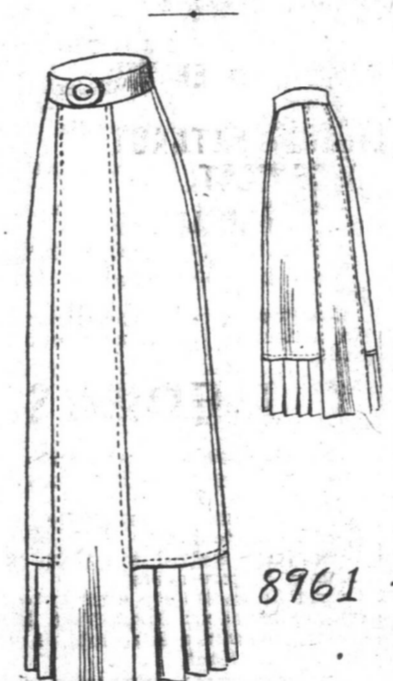

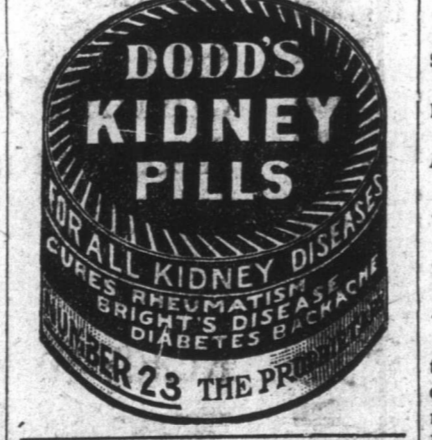

Caribou Licenses.

We observe that the Game and Inland Fishery Board proposes a radical change in the law relating to killing caribou. The Board proposes to make it illegal to hunt, kill or pursue Caribou in Newfoundland and the Labrador without a license. A person desirous of hunting caribou, if the change is effected, must take out one of the license prescribed. These licenses are of three kinds:

(1) A license to non-residents on a payment of \$50;

(2) A Householder's license to residents, issued free, but not to more than one member of a family or household in any season;

(3) A resident Sportsman's License, issued on payment of \$5, but for the purposes of sport only, and not for purposes of selling spoils of sport.

The Board justifies its recommendation on the grounds:—
"The killing of Deer by the so called 'poor settler' is virtually unregulated and unchecked, and hitherto there has been no protective or preventive supervision over the lumbering camps which are now so numerous in the interior of the Island. Whilst the Board have reasons to believe that large quantities of Caribou meat are consumed in these camps, and that no limitation is enforced as to the number of Caribou killed for such consumption, they have no data upon which they could even base an estimate of the number of Caribou thus killed. It is of course the object of the contractor who has to feed the men in his camps to obtain the necessary food at the least possible expense."

Blowing Up Schooner.

For several months past the hull of the old schooner Newcombe has been sunk in the stream off Bowring's premises and the past two days diver J. Taylor has been down trying to blow her in pieces with dynamite. Heavy charges have been put in and to-day he increased them to 27 lbs. of the explosive and hopes thereby to rip her to pieces. The hull has been a nuisance to shipping and masters of craft will be please when it is disposed of.

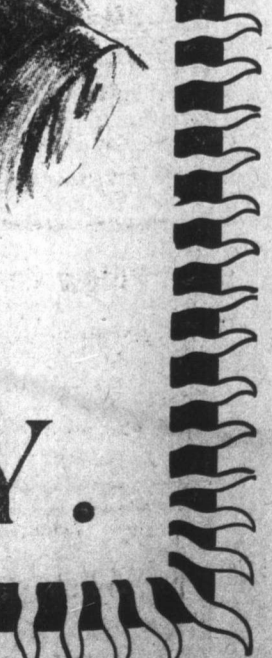

Bible Society.

Addressed by Rev. H. J. Bowen.

At a special meeting of the Bible Society held in the Board of Trade Rooms yesterday afternoon, Rev. H. J. Bowen, who is here on a visit, addressed the gathering on the work of the British and Foreign Bible Society. He spoke for an hour and being an easy and fluent talker, who knows how to present his subject in the most attractive way, he held the close attention of the audience to the finish. The objects and aims of the Bible Society were explained in detail, and a summary given of the work that had been accomplished. The main object of the Society was to have the Bible translated into every spoken language and put within the reach of every man in the language that he speaks. The work will go on till this shall have been accomplished. The Bible is distributed amongst all denominations and nobody is asked to pay. Free will offerings from the recipients, however, are gladly accepted. The Bible had been a potent factor in helping to bring civilization to heathen peoples. The work of Bishop Harcourt, who had only been mentioned to prove this, in this age renewed activity is necessary in circulating the Holy Scriptures. It is the age of emigration, the age of speedy ocean and land travelling and countries and peoples are brought into more intimate relation by means of the mails and telegraphs. Hundreds of thousands of people are every year emigrating to countries where the English language is spoken, hence the need of renewed activity and labor. In Canada the Bible is now being read in 100 languages and the spoken Word is being delivered in 26. The Society in this country would do well also to be moving with the times and to renewed interest in the work of distributing the Scriptures and make certain changes in the system heretofore in use by the Newfoundland Auxiliary Branch. A motion was proposed that to every clergyman to distribute to all who may wish to have a copy. The colporteurs will be dispensed with for this particular work as done by them in the past. No money will be asked, but any given freely will be thankfully accepted. In public places like trains and steamers Bibles will be left so that anybody wishing to get the same may be able to do so.

At the close of the meeting a vote of thanks was proposed to the lecturer by Hon. H. J. B. Woods and seconded by Mr. W. Frew. A vote of thanks was also accorded the Lord Bishop of Montreal, His Lordship in reply, said that it afforded him great pleasure on being present at the meeting. He had for many years been associated with the work done by the Society in the past and he hoped to continue till the Bible without note or comment would be in the hands of every man in the country.

The meeting was very successful. Amongst those present were Revs. Canon White, G. R. Godden, H. Uphill, F. R. Matthews, J. W. Bartlett, J. Brinton, G. H. Bolt, J. Bell and C. H. Barton. At the close the Lord Bishop pronounced the Benediction.

Well Kept Place.

Hardly a street in this city is as well looked after as LeMarchant Road, and daily from early morning till 6 p.m. a sprinkler goes over the street, and so liberally is it supplied with water to allay the dust that the street surface is churned into mud. The people of other streets are glad to see this place so well looked after, but wonder why some little attention cannot be given them. Cabot Street is contiguous to LeMarchant Road and on a parallel with it, but yesterday while the latter street was deluged with water the residents of the former had to keep their doors and windows closed to shut out the clouds of dust which blew around. Such unfair treatment is beginning to disgust citizens, who see their taxes thus spent in a preferential manner.

The Fropro Here.

The s.s. Prospero, Capt. A. Kean, arrived here at 1.30 a.m. to-day, after making a very quick round trip north. Leaving here on May 31st she reached Quirpon Sunday last, where she met a solid jam of heavy Arctic ice, and the ship could not force her way further. From the lighthouse Capt. Kean could see no water, but a field of ice extended to the horizon. The ship then started on the return trip and had fine but very cold weather coming south. LATEST CABLE NEWS.

Special Evening Telegram: OTTAWA, To-Day.—The impression prevails here that the King may come to Canada en route to or returning from the Durbar in India.

LONDON, To-Day.—The Queen yesterday received at Buckingham Palace the Committee representing the Marys of the Empire, who presented the Coronation gift in the shape of a cheque for \$60,000.

MONTREAL, To-Day.—A dramatic incident occurred at the opening of the annual meeting of the Canadian Medical Association when the President-elect, Dr. Armstrong, of Montreal, was taken suddenly ill and collapsed on the point of delivering the inaugural address. The illness is of a serious nature.

MEXICO CITY, To-Day.—The tale of victims and losses—62 killed and 75 wounded, and \$100,000 worth of property wrecked in the earthquake yesterday—injected in the Mexican capital a note of tragedy into what was to be a day of rejoicing over the arrival of Madero, Jr. When the work of searching the ruins is completed it is expected the list of dead will be increased.

"Head" Peet's Mission.

The belting was consigned to the Ming's Bight mining people and some time ago some boys found it on the strand there and giving it to their parent he placed it in his store intending to try and locate the owner. A few weeks ago a man tried to sell it to a lumber coy at the S.W. of Paquet for a barrel of flour. Head Peet has his name and is working up the case. He hopes soon to capture all implicated in the larceny. Other matters of similar import are also demanding his attention.

Yesterday morning the Executive of the Children's Coronation Festival Committee met under the presidency of Mrs. A. W. Harvey, and after deliberating on matters adjourned to meet the ladies and gentlemen of the Managing Committees in the afternoon. At the close of the general meeting the ladies remained to draft a Bill of Fare for the festival. Mr. Fearn, the Chairman, announced that His Excellency the Governor had promised his patronage. It was decided to avail of His Excellency's offer of Government House grounds for the festivities, which will be held on Friday, the 23rd, the day after the Coronation. A committee was also appointed to approach the City Council to secure the location of Bannerman Park, so that additional playing ground would be available if needed. A catering Committee was also appointed, and the age limits were settled as 6 and 14, with power to extend to 5 and 15 in special cases. The Executive Committee will meet again at 3 o'clock this afternoon and appoint a number of sub-committees and organize the work of the male helpers. To-morrow afternoon the ladies of the General Committee will meet, and it is hoped that all ladies interested in the movement will make a special effort to be present. A thousand dollars is already in sight, and with a continual flow of cash subscriptions and contributions in the form of sweets, biscuits, cakes, oranges, nuts, raisins, tea, sugar, milk, butter and other comestibles, a good foundation will be laid to build up the success of the Festival. Tables, lumber and free labour will be needed, and the Secretary, Mr. O. Steele, will gladly enroll workers and acknowledge the promises of gifts.

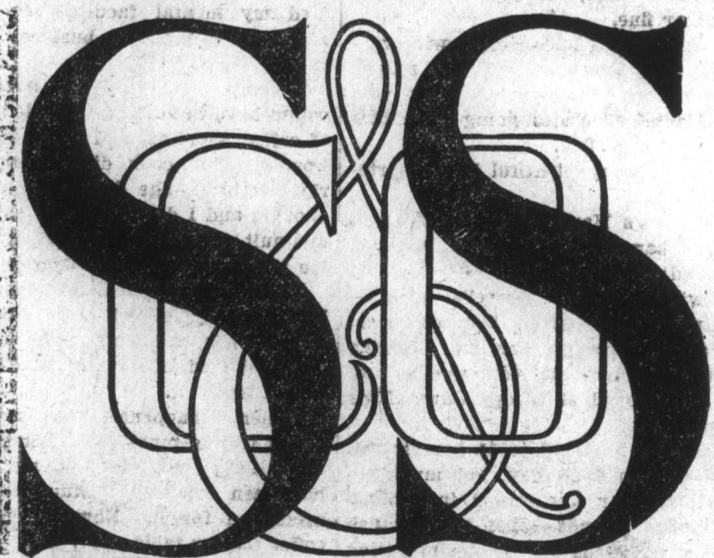
