REPORT

Of the Officers of the Benevolent Irish Society for the Year Ending February 17th, 1912.

Your officers congratulate the Society on attaining its 106th anniversary, and beg to present the following report for the year now closing. St. Patrick's Day was celebrated with the time honored parade. Meeting at 9.15 a.m., and accompanied by the Cadet Corps band, the members proceeded via New Gower and Hamilton Streets to St. Patrick's Church, where High Mass was offered by Rev. Fr. Pippy, who was assisted by Rev. Dr. Greene and Rev. Fr. Kelly; His Grace the Archbishop occupying the Throne. After Mass the members proceeded to the Church of the Holy Spirit, where the Rev. Fr. Kelly, His Grace the Archbishop occupying the Throne. From the Church the members proceeded via Water, Cochrane and Gower Streets to Government House, where their Excellencies Sir Ralph and Lady Williams graciously received the body. The President tendered the Society's expression of loyalty and good-will to the person and Throne of His Majesty, and the King's representative in his response expressed an especial pleasure in meeting a Society whose aims he so much admired. Continuing via Military Road His Grace the Archbishop was visited at the Episcopal Library as usual, and to the satisfaction of the members a high standard of excellence was again maintained and the financial result was likewise successful.

On Friday, July 23rd, the Society joined with the various other organizations of the city in the rejoicing in honor of the Coronation of His Majesty King George V. and Queen Mary. The Hall was appropriately decorated by day and illuminated at night. Your officers represented the body at the State service held on the occasion.

On Friday, July 21st, the members assembled at the King's wharf at 4 o'clock a.m., and in union with the various Catholic societies, escorted from there to the Palace the Apostolic Delegate His Excellency Mgr. Stagni. At 7.30 p.m. on the same day the members assembled at the hall and took part in the joint parade of the same bodies through the city in honor of the distinguished visitor. The manifestations of popular welcome exceeded anything in the memory of the oldest members on the roll, the entire town taking part in the rejoicing, and the illuminations and other evidences of joy being of magnificent splendor.

On Tuesday, July 25th, the officers attended the Society in the Corporation at the Cathedral by the Apostolic Delegate of the Bishop of St. George's, His Lordship Most Rev. Dr. Power.

The officers met at 9.45 a.m. on Sunday, July 29th, and with the executives of the different Catholic bodies proceeded to St. Patrick's Church where His First Pontifical High Mass was celebrated by His Lordship Most Rev. Dr. Power.

During the year the Society also lost the presence of one of its most conspicuous members, in the person of the Rev. Fr. Clarke, for very many years parish priest of Torbay. In accordance with the resolution adopted at a meeting of St. Patrick's Church was presented to the rev. gentleman before his departure for Ireland expressive of our appreciation of his great services in the cause of Education during his long sojourn in Newfoundland.

Eighteen names were added to the roll since our last report, but we regret to record the loss by death of two old and highly esteemed members, G. Brownrigg and Edward McHale, in both cases your officers paid the last customary tribute of respect by attending their funerals.

The reports of the School Committee, the communications from time to time from the Reverend Superior Brother Kennedy, and the personal knowledge that members can at all times obtain all indicate that the excellent standard of the past is even being outdone in our schools. The reputation made in the commercial life of the city by former pupils of the schools is such that the demand for boys by the different firms in business far exceeds the supply, though the pupils are taxed to their utmost capacity. An even more pleasing feature is the pronouncement made by the representative of the order from Ireland when on his last inspection of our schools declared them second to none amongst the many conducted by this world-famous teaching organization. In this connection we feel sure we voice the sentiments of the body when we say how pleased we are that the esteemed Superior, Rev. Brother Kennedy, should have so improved in health as a result of his recent trip to the homeland, and we hope for a like happy outcome in the case of his energetic co-worker, Rev. Bro. Ryan, who left only a few weeks ago for the Old Country.

The Industrial Department had a successful year and the work entailed in making up the twine was gladly availed of by the many poor people who are assisted by this section of the Society.

The exterior of the Hall was painted during the past summer, and apart from the improved appearance this, the outside work leaves our property in a thoroughly good state of repair.

Concerning the Literary and Amusement Committee's section it is gratifying to know that the financial results in this direction have surpassed those of the previous year. The Literary and Music Committee has also announced that their usual programme is prepared. To the officers and members of the general Committee we express the thanks of the body for their work during the year.

We are pleased to be at last in a position when the financial condition of the Society can be definitely presented. From the Treasurer's statement it will be observed that the receipts for the year have been \$12,176.77, disbursements, \$11,597.51, leaving a balance on hand of \$669.16. The total indebtedness is \$15,751.00, the greater portion of which is due to our members at a low rate of interest. With little renewed energy on the part of the members the removal of this burden should only occupy a few years.

In conclusion, we have but to urge upon all to preserve the heritage which has been handed down to us by our worthy predecessors, and as we advance along the second century of our existence to remember that in the changed circumstances of the age our work has taken on a more truly benevolent aspect in the Education of the youth of the city. Let our vigour not be diminished by the passing years, but rather let us endeavour to increase the fields of our activities and continue to advance along the path of true Christian Charity opened up by the noble band who gathered together one hundred and six years ago to-night.

NEW SEALER ARRIVES.

Nascopie Enters Port After Very Story Trip. A Splendid Ship in Every Respect.

Messrs. Job Bros. & Co.'s new sealer Nascopie, Capt. Waite, steamed into port shortly after 7 p.m. yesterday, after a voyage of 11 days from Penarth, Wales.

She left there on Wednesday week, the 7th inst., and on the run out had very stormy weather all through, and this tested the ship's qualities as a sea boat. She was more than up to expectations in this respect. Gales raged continuously from S.W., veering to N.W., with a heavy sea but no special incident occurred. About 200 miles due east of St. John's, before the steamer came to the edge of the Banks, and the ship's qualities as an ice breaker were tested in butting and forcing her way through the heavy floes which covered the ocean. The floe consisted of the heaviest kind of slob which was rafted in some cases.

The ship, however, with her superior speed and ice breaking qualifications bore her way through it, and Wednesday last at noon, as reported by a Marconigram transmitted by the Cunarder Carmenla, was 526 miles east of St. John's, and 200 miles off at 10 a.m. Friday, so that she progressed at the rate of 7 knots an hour, in coming along and covering the distance of 326 miles. She would have made a fine run to port but for meeting so much ice. Saturday at 1 p.m. Motion Head, Petty Harbor, was sighted and shortly after as a thick snow storm raged the ship bore away to the E. by S. to avoid the coast which now could not be discerned owing to the storm. Yesterday morning at 8 o'clock the ship was again headed for the shore and by 11 a.m. she was off Red Head, near Torbay. At 5 p.m. after forcing her way up through the slob she was headed for the Narrows. Here the slob was rafted on the shore and several feet thick, and the ship had her work cut out for her. After an hour's hard butting she got a lead

and the North Head came full speed through the Narrows. The weather having momentarily cleared and she later berthed at the wharves, Capt. Waite was on the bridge from 4 a.m. yesterday until port was reached and was pretty well used up. The Nascopie is a splendid ship in every respect. She was built by Swan, Hunter and Wigham Richardson, of Newcastle. She is laden with 1,500 tons coal; her registered tonnage is 1,004, and she is 285 ft. 5 in. in length, 43 ft. 6 in. beam, and with cargo and stores on board draws 17 ft. 6 in. forward and 21 ft. 10 in. aft. The ship is a speedy boat and several days rolled off her 240 miles, her lowest run being 128 knots. In her construction special attention was given to strength to fit her for forcing through the Northern ice floes, and she is the equal of any of the modern ships prosecuting the voyage. Her beams, knees, girders and stanchions are of unusual strength and thickness, her plates are of the best kind and are particularly heavy at the bows. Capt. Waite is delighted with her and believes her to be a superior ship to the Beothic. The apartment of the Mate and operator and the wheel house are on the upper bridge, and the chart room and captain's room are immediately below this and are comfortable and fitted with every modern convenience. The rooms of the other officers are on the main deck, on the starboard side in the midships section of the vessel, and the engineers' rooms are on the opposite side, while those of the firemen and sailors are forward and aft and are very commodious and comfortable. Her cabin is fine, large and excellently equipped. She is lit with electricity; her engine is of a very powerful type, and all who have seen her believe the ship will give a good account of herself. She is a fine vessel in appearance, and we congratulate the owners, Messrs. Job Bros. & Co., on possessing such a splendid boat. Capt. Geo. Barbour will command her at the sealfishery and we wish her a bumper trip on her maiden voyage. We understand that she will ply on Hudson's Bay next summer.

The repairs to her engines were completed at 8 o'clock last night, when the work of butting into the pier was commenced and successfully accomplished by 6 o'clock this morning. The Bruce will bring a very large mail this trip.

Glencoe Safe.

Mr. R. C. Smith, of the Anglo-American Telegraph Company, received a message last evening from Sydney saying that the S. S. Glencoe had been seen by the S. S. Adventure, Saturday evening, 12 miles off Louisburg. She was steaming slowly west and showed no signals. The Reid Nfd. Co. also received a message from their agent at Sydney saying:—

"Adventure arrived at Louisburg this morning; saw the Glencoe 12 miles off Louisburg steaming slowly westward through the ice. The Glencoe appeared to be all right; the Adventure did not speak to her."

A good deal of anxiety was felt the past few days about the ship and this news comes as a relief to the public. No doubt she was frozen in all last week and got clear Saturday when the S. E. gale knocked up a swell and loosened the ice.

SEVEN PRISONERS JAILED.—The police jailed seven prisoners on Saturday evening and night. Two were ordinary drunks and four were disorderlies. It was well for most of them that they found the friendly shelter of the lock up, for to be about in the snow storm the men ran the risk of being smothered in the drifts.

DIED AT ASYLUM.—There died at the Lunatic Asylum Saturday evening Mr. Benjamin Le Roux, a native of St. George's, in his 35th year. The deceased had been very ill in the General Hospital for over a month, and the disease from which he suffered affected his mind. The remains will be sent to St. George's for interment by the express to-morrow evening.

Friday an oil cask worth \$1.50 was stolen from opposite a grocery store on Water Street West. The matter was given into the hands of the police who have located the thief.

MIDNIGHT BLAZE.

WOOD FACTORY AND LAUNDRY DESTROYED.

Shortly after midnight Saturday, and while the snow storm raged, a destructive fire occurred at Nagle's Hill by which James R. Johnston's wood factory and the laundry of the Country Laundry Co., Ltd., were completely destroyed. The reflection of the fire could be noticed for a great distance and it was seen by the men of the Central Fire Station, but it being so far countrywards it was deemed futile for any of them to go to the scene. The building in which the two establishments were contained measured 60 x 60 feet of two storeys and a basement. There was a boiler house of concrete at the eastern end of the structure. Mr. Johnston's wood factory occupied the lower flat and the upper part was occupied by the laundry people. Both had installed in their respective establishments a good lot of valuable machinery. The building was bought by the Laundry Co. for \$4,000 from Mr. Johnston in October last, and he valued his machinery at \$3,000, which was covered by insurance. He paid rent for his part of the building, and having had a large stock of doors, sashes, mouldings and other kinds of woodwork there which was not insured, he claims that he loses about \$4,000 by the conflagration. The Laundry Co. value the machinery they had in the place at \$3,000, and the building and machinery were insured for \$7,000. The employees of the Laundry Co. only began work there four days ago and no person worked at the wood factory since 5 p.m. on Friday last. The Laundry Co. have a lot of new machinery now on the way from the United States. How the fire occurred is a mystery. The wood work of the new roofing had not "blimmed" and as a result the water got down through to Johnston's place and all the shavings, slabs and other debris about were saturated with water and could not possibly ignite unless some miscreant deliberately fired the building. Mr. Johnston lives at Howley Avenue, this city, and did not know of the fire till 8.30 a.m. yesterday. Mrs. Murran, who lives near, was the first to see the fire, and calling her husband he dressed and proceeded to the scene. It was then near 1 o'clock yesterday morning, and when he arrived the building was almost consumed. Mr. W. Baird, the manager of the laundry, visited the place at 8 o'clock Saturday night with his two sons and telephoned the city for some things, and everything about the place, he says, was O.K. Detective Byrne of the police department yesterday afternoon walked in to the scene of the fire and thoroughly investigated the matter. The origin of the blaze is shrouded in mystery.

Broke Down.
In working through the storm of Saturday night the motors of the two sweepers broke down as they went over the rails and they were towed up to the car barns where a staff of men were engaged repairing them until yesterday morning, when both again went into commission and did good work clearing the street car tracks yesterday. Men were at work from an early hour yesterday morning keeping the tracks clear of snow with shovels, and the trams negotiated the line all through the day. In parts of Water Street the track was covered with water to the depth of a foot in several places.

In some of the smaller stores where people reside, the proprietors and families were yesterday engaged hauling out the water. Several private residences in other parts of the city had their basements badly flooded also.

AVALANCHES FROM ROOFS.—Yesterday miniature avalanches of snow fell from the roofs of the old time buildings of Water Street to the sidewalks filling the latter. The snow was heavy with the rain which fell, and pedestrians had to be very careful as they passed along. Tons of it fell from some buildings and came to the sidewalk with a crash.

VESSELS DUE HERE.—Several vessels are now due on this coast from various places, including the Grace and Empire which had to put into the Azores, and the Maggie which is now about 6 weeks out from Oporto. With heavy slob ice now blocking the coast they will have great difficulty in making port.


