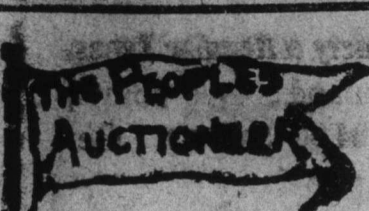

The British Victory.

(New York Times.)

The battle of the Somme is won. Whatever may be the German plan of defence, that much is secured. If the Germans retire no further than their announcement promises, the new battle will be fought on ground less favorable to them than that of the Somme. The battle in which they have been defeated was fought with the Germans entrenched on high ground, which the Allies had to take. They have given up many intrenchments between the Ancre and the Aisne, in which they could have made a defence, but on level ground. In retiring north of the Aisne they get to higher ground but not so high as that which they have given up. If they mean to make a stand there, they will have the advantage of needing fewer men to defend the new line than they had to use in defending the old. Of course, the British and the French will need fewer, too; but the German need of men is greater than that of the Allies.

Perhaps the Germans do not mean to fight over again, in the trenches, the battle they have fought and lost; perhaps, if they do mean to do it, they will not be able. Sir Douglas Haig, who is in a position to know, said some time ago that before long the war in the west would cease to be one of trenches and would become mobile again. The retreat shows clearly that all the excuses made when it began were desperate inventions. Major Morant, for instance, was proclaiming that the retreat was for the purpose of drawing the British into such a trap as Hindenburg set for the Russians in the Mazurian Lakes campaign; they were being

drawn into a desert "as had as ever fighting ground was," so as to obtain space for strategic movements. At that time the Germans were retiring on a front of only fourteen miles and had gone only three or four miles. Now they are retiring on a front of eighty-five miles, have given up more than 600 square miles to the Allies. Two whole departments of France, those of the Oise and the Aisne, are given back to her. The Germans have retreated because they had to, because they could not hold the position which they had deemed impregnable and to retain which they had sacrificed so many German lives.

It is possible that Hindenburg still holds his opinion that the decision must come in the east, and that, in order to make a last great effort against Russia, he has surrendered the French position so as to give him the needed soldiers. If he has, he must have begun the movement counting on the half-hearted opposition of the old Russian government; he could not have known that before it was completed he would be faced by Russian armies led by generals whose arms are now free, by Russian statesmen whose one aim is victory. Perhaps, even if he had known it, he would have begun the movement because there was nothing else for him to do, because all hope of successful war in France has gone. If this is his plan, he will have to act quickly for the situation in the east is rapidly growing worse. The downfall of Turkey is already visible, and such a disaster on the heels of the Somme retirement and the overthrow of Germany's friends in Petrograd, will have a disastrous effect at home.

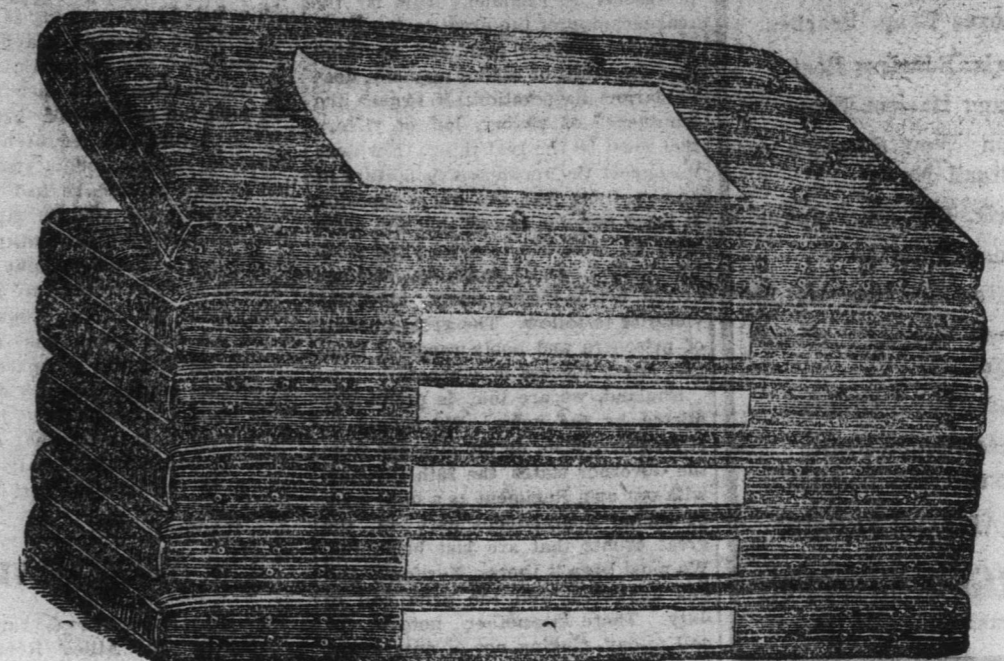

THE GARDEN SEED.
The garden seed is a melancholy disappointment which is painted in hope and yields the same kind of returns on the investment.

THE ARRAS VICTORY.

News of the greatest importance and of most encouraging promise reaches us to-day. Since the enemy's retreat from the lines of the Ancre and Somme began three weeks ago and the British and French pressed their hot pursuit with such splendid and telling rapidity, those who have studied the position closely have been looking expectantly and hopefully for a movement at the northern end of the operations, around Arras, knowing the value to the Allies of an advance there. It has come. A world of possibilities is opened up. The Cambrai and Douai region, which is immediately concerned, is immensely important for many reasons. It is a great coal district, from which the thieving Germans have industriously drawn supplies for more than two years. More than that, it is the strategic centre of the northern German line; its loss would cause that line to fall back a long distance and almost certainly involve the abandonment of most of the Belgian coastline. Further, it is the flank of the so-called Hindenburg line. Right along that line now the British and French troops have grappled with the Germans, and their huge guns are being trundled up into position. If this envelopment goes far enough they will trundle on much further, for the line will be untenable by the enemy. That a place like the Vimy Ridge, looking down onto the Canadian trenches, buttressed by concrete and bristling with barbed wire, the scene of unavailing sacrifice of thousands of French lives, that this stronghold should have crumbled in a moment before the iron deluge from the British guns and the onslaught of the Canadian infantry, speaks for itself. If this line can be taken so, no other line, whatever terrible name the Germans may give it, can hold out. One thing is now certain. The end of trench warfare is near; the British have blasted it into the open. Why, then, it may be asked, in the face of daily evidence of the superiority of the Allies in every direction, are we hearing lugubrious expressions from high places of the seriousness of the situation, the incessant demand for men, and more men? The answer is easy; there is no paradox to explain. Victory for Germany is impossible, out of the question. Victory for the Allies is certain. But victory is not an absolute term; it is relative and admits of degrees. Neuve Chapelle was not a victory and a defeat; so was Loos. What the Allies aim at, what they must achieve this year, is such a victory as will leave Germany prostrate, a victory which will allow no recovery. It will not be enough to break the line

here and there and stop just short of overwhelming results for want of men to push them home. Help and Nivelle will be prodigal of human effort, even of human lives, where such results hang in the balance. Therefore every man available must be at their disposal, and if every possible man is at the front every possible man must be in reserve in England. This is the real meaning of the great call for volunteers. That call, and anything that Churchill or others may say, does not argue desperation; it argues the imminence of victory, but of victory that must be the real thing. Nor does it suggest the reckless expenditure of human lives, but the very opposite. It is no paradox to say that the more men we have the less we shall lose. One great and smashing victory, driven home, means many bloodless victories to follow. The great number of prisoners and booty reported from this latest success is a proof. In England, we are told, is profoundly stirred by the news. We should be stirred here also. As the message from the Governor states, the 29th Division, with our own Regiment as a unit, must be taking a prominent part in the great events that are just beginning. We must keep it there. Newfoundland has answered well the grim call of duty. There is another note in the call to-day, ringing not of duty alone, but of victory and the reward of duty done. Who answers it to-day makes more certain that victory and that reward. It is good to hear the answer coming fuller every day.

The Great Victory at Arras ENEMY'S HOLD ON FLANDERS SHAKEN. WHY WE WANT MEN.

The Governor has received official information confirming the notably successful operations commenced on the line between Lens and Croisilles. This is the northern envelopment of the new German line. If it is carried out (as one hopes) along the Douai plain the retention by the enemy of Flanders and the sea ports on the Channel will be ended very soon. And much more may come of it. The picked troops will be in this including the XXIXth Division. We want men. Surely all can understand that now.

Another Big Cold Storage Plant FOR ST. JOHN'S.

This morning about fifty workmen were engaged clearing the site for the new cold storage plant to be erected by the shareholders of the Newfoundland Cold Storage Fresh Fish Corporation, Ltd., a company recently formed to develop the fresh fish industry of the country. The building will be erected at the rear of the railway Station and south and east of the car shops, about 244 ft. long by 90 ft. wide. The base of the building is to be of concrete with foundation sufficient for the construction of six stories, but for the present only three stories will be erected. The building will be of local brick from the well known brick yards of Messrs. Pittman and Smith, Random Sound; and Pelley, George's Brook, T. B. Altogether three quarters of a million bricks will be used in the building. The west end of the building will cover the land now occupied by the electric smelter, which is being removed to a point further east. Part of the machinery to be installed is now at North Sydney and is being fitted together as far as possible so as to save time on this end. The plant will have a refrigerating capacity of 150 tons, in addition to which 50 tons of ice will be made for use of cars, steamers and bait purposes. The second and third floors will be used as storage rooms. Specially constructed scoops will be built to carry the fish beneath the Long Bridge, and foreign going steamers will load at the dock wharf, the frozen article being conveyed from the plant to the steamer on flat cars. It is also proposed that ten depots of a similar nature but of a much smaller capacity, about 500,000 lbs., will be constructed around the coast, and a large one equal to handling 1,250,000 lbs. will be built at Port aux Basques. The product from these will be shipped to headquarters of St. John's over the Reid Nfld. Co.'s railway, who have a large interest in the concern. The project when completed, possibly within three years, will be the largest of its kind in the world. Contracts have been drawn up with British firms for a period covering four years, who will take all the fish the new concern can supply. Upwards of two hundred men will be engaged on the building, which, we understand, will be subcontracted to various persons connected with different trades.

Penalties for Marrying

Matrimony is considered a punishable offence in some communities. These circles of society are small, but their edicts are strong. The larger community, if it takes cognizance of a man's single state, usually imposes a fine for not getting married, as in Argentina, where the bachelorhood requires the payment of a tax to the Government.

But in certain circles marriage is regarded as an offence. At Oxford University, for instance, a fellow of All Souls' College forfeits his fellowship if he takes to himself a wife while he is supposed to be studying the classics.

He not only must pay a penalty, but he must present his college a memorial in the shape of a silver cup, on which is inscribed the words, "Decencia in matrimonium." (He backslid into matrimony.)

The Bachelors' Club ostracizes members who forget themselves so far as to marry. Instant expulsion is the punishment for this offence. The offenders must leave the company of the bachelors for ever. As an act of grace they may pay a fine of £20 and become honorary members of the club, but that is their only salvation.

Some Thoughts in Dreams.

What absolutely uncanny things dreams are! Sometime ago I read an article which claimed that all dreams are the expression of either desire or fear—usually a subconscious. When sleep has slipped the leash from the subconscious mind, the desire or fear expresses itself in dreams.

For instance, that familiar dream through which everyone passes about once in so often, that one is in a public place with an insufficient quota of clothes, is an expression of our subconscious fear that we will sometime disgrace ourselves that way.

My own particular dream of this nature is that I am in some distant place to which I really have neither the time nor money to go. "How did I ever come here?" I wonder. And then I think with true waking practicality. "Well, I had no right to spend all that money but now I'm here I'll do such and such a thing." However, I think it is quite too large a claim to say that all dreams have these two motives.

Another interesting claim of the dream psychologists is that we would never do anything in a dream that we would be incapable of doing in our waking hours. I wonder. Seems to me I have. But it is amusing to see how close we run to form in our dreams. Last night, for instance, I dreamed that I was trying to rent a room in New York. They showed me a great big dreary attic room. "That wouldn't do for me," I said. "but see here, what a splendid place it would be for four girls to live together." Recruiting Tour.

(Concluded.)

March 8th.—Lay at Bay-du-Nord all day. Very severe storm raging—S. E. and snow. Could not possibly proceed.
March 7th.—Left 7 a.m. for English Harbour East. No young men here, all left for Western fishery. Left here for Harbour Mille and lay off. Could not approach to enter so boat went in with squad under Mr. Cave. Held meeting but nothing doing so left for Little Bay—no men as usual—and nothing doing we again left for Bay L'Argent and arrived at 5.30 p.m. Here arrangements were made for meeting at 8 p.m. J. R. Courage, Esq., S. M. in the chair, who I thought acted in rather a discouraging way at the meeting. He commenced by throwing cold water on our efforts from the first by assuring us before the people at the meeting that we would have to go to some other harbour for recruits, but in spite of this we got one, and I do think that only for the conduct of the S. M. we should have got more. Fiona lay here all night.
March 8th.—Left Bay L'Argent for Anderson's Cove where ship had to water up, the tanks being empty, and a squad under Mr. Cave walked to Stone's Cove at 9 a.m. and returned at 12 noon. Nothing doing, and after dinner ship left for Rencontre East our last port and after canvassing the settlement held patriotic meeting at 7.30 p.m. in the Roman Catholic Schoolroom to a good audience. Miss White, the school teacher, being very enthusiastic. There were many young men here and several offers but the parents again intervened and they were prevented from volunteering. Went on board very tired at 10 p.m. and Capt. English immediately got under way and took his departure for Placentia.
March 9th.—This morning Dodding Head, Burin, on port bow when Capt. bore away for Placentia wind south, strong, with good sea, and arrived at

PENFIELD IN SWITZERLAND.
PARIS, April 9.

WILSON'S REPLY TO KING GEORGE.
LONDON, April 9.
The reply of President Wilson to the message sent to him by King George as given out here officially today is as follows: "To His Majesty George V., King and Emperor,—Your eloquent message comes to me at this critical moment of our national life as proof of the community of sentiment among the free peoples of the world now striving to defend their ideals, to maintain the blessings of national independence and uphold the rights of humanity. In the name of the American people and Government to which they look for guidance I thank you for your inspiring words. Woodrow Wilson."

AMERICA'S TRADE RELATIONS.
WASHINGTON, April 9.
America's commercial relations with the Allies and with the Central Powers are being studied by a Government committee to determine whether trade legislation has been necessary by the declaration of war with Germany. Britain's "Trading with Enemy" Act and the Allies' co-operation measures are under investigation. Although no move has been made yet toward commercial co-operation with the Allies, there is every reason to believe the United States will decide to co-operate fully in trade matters as in military affairs. The Government probably immediately will invite the new commercial committees from the Allies to visit Washington. America's declaration of war has changed the whole fabric of the trade relations of this country. The United States will aid Britain in rationing northern European neutrals through which countries heretofore a vast amount of supplies has reached Germany from the U.S. Now it is as much to the interest of the Allies to see that neutral countries contiguous to Germany receive from shippers only enough supplies to meet their own immediate needs. One of Britain's first acts now probably will be to make inoperative its black list decree in so far as it applies to the States.

Mutineers Gave Up German Sub.

Panic Stricken Over Attack by British Patrol Boat, Crew Killed the Officers—Surrendered to Pursuer—Incident Recounted as an Evidence of Badly Broken Morale of Men on Submersibles.

(From a Private Letter.)

London, March 9.—A thrilling tale of panic aboard a German submarine that had its climax in the murder of some of its officers by frenzied members of the crew, the suicide of other officers, and the surrender of the crew to a British patrol boat was related to-day by a high official. The crew is now in a London jail, and the British authorities have affidavits from some of them that makes a vivid chapter of submarine life.

As related to me, the insurrection aboard the submarine was the outcome of badly broken morale on the part not only of the crew, but of the officers. My informant stated that this was not the first instance the British Admiralty had come upon of wavering morale among German submarine crews, but it was assuredly the most flagrant.

"Naturally submarine crews work at terrific tension," he said. "To get accurate results they must work perfectly, with clock-like precision, and the work must be uninterrupted expert. With the morale of the submarine crew shattered, expert work disappears and the submarine becomes powerless. That is what happened in the case in point."

Attacked British Trawler.

The German submarine somewhere off the Irish coast attacked a British trawler. It had fired one torpedo, which missed its mark, and was preparing to fire another when a British patrol steamed up. The patrol fired a shot that went just over the top of the submarine. It splashed in the water beyond.

The submarine started off, its commander evidently not wanting to fight.

Your Boys and Girls.

In contrast with the boy who knows how to fight and when not to is the case of one who would not fight under any circumstances. This boy was the delight of a dozen tormentors, who would chase him after school until he took refuge in some store, from which he would telephone home to his mother to come and fetch him.

The principal of a large city school tells me that he finds among the parents of his pupils just two attitudes towards children's fighting: Either they encourage the fighting instinct without regard to circumstances or they lay down the rule that their boys must never fight. One attitude is just as arbitrary as the other, and neither fits all cases. Some boys need just as much to be discouraged in their belligerent activities. Each individual has to be judged by himself. And each boy has to learn to judge each fighting opportunity by itself.

The moral effect of one's attitude toward fighting is even more important than the physical effect. While aggressive combativeness is to be discouraged, we should try to retain enough of the fighting instinct in each child to make sure that the young people do not grow up with a soft indifference to injustice.

British Deal Another Smashing Blow at the German Lines --- Great Victories Near Arras. Canadians Do Valiant Work and Take the Vimy Ridge

BRITISH ADVANCE --- CANADIANS CARRY VIMY RIDGE.
LONDON, April 9. An advance of from two to three miles have been made by British troops on a front extending from Henin-sur-Cojeul, southeast of Arras, to Givency-en-Gobelle, a distance of about 12 miles. The official report from the Army Headquarters in France makes this announcement to-night, and adds the advance continues. The famous Vimy Ridge was carried by the Canadian troops. Some 5,800 prisoners have been captured in the new drive against the German lines, by one of the British armies alone, Reuter's correspondent reports. The fighting is increasing in intensity as the battle progresses. British casualties thus far are reported comparatively slight.
GERMAN POSITIONS TAKEN.
With the British Armes in France, April 9.—The British to-day delivered a strong blow against the Germans from the region southwest of Cambrai to a point south of Lens. They swept over the German positions from south of Arras northward to the famous Vimy Ridge, fighting for the possession of which cost the French one hundred thousand casualties earlier in the war. Once before the British gained the crest of this ridge, but under tremendous concentration of German guns were compelled to give it up. All winter long the Canadians have held a footing on the ridge with the German lines looking down on them. All the fighting to-day was against dominating positions on high ground, some of which have been held

by the Germans for two years, and were lavishly hemmed with wide belts of some of the toughest and longest pronged barbed wire which has been seen in this war.
The bombardment of the ridges before the attack was delivered before dawn proved to be one of the greatest spectacles of the war. The firing at times exceeded that which marked some of the sturdiest battles of the Somme. At night the sky was illuminated for hours by a continuous flash of guns. The attack was carried out in several phases. The first lines had scarcely been entered when numbers of German prisoners began to come back. To-day the attack hit the north hinge of the recent German retreat from Arras to the Aisne. The Germans evidently expected a renewal of the offensive in the valley of the Somme, for in making retreat in that sector they announced they had completely disarranged the British offensive plans. To-day's blow was Britain's answer.
It is estimated at the British Headquarters that approximately five thousand Germans were captured by the British in the last twelve hours in the region northeast of Arras. The British penetrated far into the German lines and inflicted heavy casualties on the Teutons. It is reported the British are in possession of Vimy Ridge.
The German defensive barrage or curtain of fire was slow in starting, notwithstanding frantic signals for help sent up with rockets all along the line. All the British guns have been hammering the Germans night and day for a week past. Most of

their trenches were fairly pulverized. No definite report of prisoners taken is yet available. All those captured were mostly Bavarians, Wurtembergers and Hungarians. After a beautiful warm Easter Sunday the weather changed last night and to-day's attack was carried out in pelting rain driven before a gale in which was the sting of January cold.
Along the greater part of the front the advance of the infantry was strenuously opposed. Near Arras the Germans offered a determined resistance. A large pocket of Germans was reported to be still holding out at mid-day, although entirely surrounded. The famous redoubt named "the Harp," only a little less formidable than the noted Labyrinth, was captured with virtually the whole battalion defending it. Several tanks were seen climbing Telegraph Hill which commands the "Harp," and probably had much to do with the surrender of this position. Along the ridge running through the valley of the Scarpe the British made good progress, while up on the Lens branch of the line they captured Maison Blanche Wood.
BERLIN ADMISSION.
LONDON, April 9. The official communication issued by the War Office at Berlin says that heavy fighting took place throughout the day on both sides of Arras, the enemy having forced his way into parts of our position. Reports add there was strong artillery firing on the Aisne and Champagne fronts. Canadian troops have carried the famous Vimy Ridge.
OFFICIAL.
LONDON, April 9. The British official to-night reads: The operations continue to be carried out successfully. In accordance with plans our troops have everywhere stormed the enemy defences from Denin-sur-Cojeul to the southern outskirts of Givency-en-Gobelle to a depth from two to three miles, and our advance continues. The enemy's forward defences on this front, including Vimy Ridge, which was carried by Canadian troops, were captured early in the morning. These defences comprise the network of trenches and fortified localities of Neuville Vitasee, Telegraph Hill, Tilloy-les-Mofflaines, Observation Ridge, St. Laurent, Blangy-les-Tilleuls and La Folle farm. Subsequently our troops moved forward and captured the enemy's rearward defences, including in addition to other powerful trench systems the fortified localities of Feuchy, Chapelle-de-Peuuchy, Hyderbad Redoubt, Athies and Theus. Up to 2 p.m., 5,815 prisoners, including 119 officers, were taken. In the direction of Cambrai further progress

has been made. In the neighborhood of Havincourt Wood we have captured the village of Demicourt. In the direction of St. Quentin we captured the villages of Pontra and Le Verquier. The aerial activity of the past few days continued with great energy. Several successful bombing raids were carried out by us. Our machines are co-operating with our artillery with excellent results. Two machines were destroyed and 15 others were driven down and probably crashed. Two German kite balloons were brought down in flames. Ten of our airplanes are missing.
GERMAN OFFICIAL.
BERLIN, April 9. Seventeen Entente airplanes were brought down yesterday on the western front, the war office announces. The statement says the battle of Arras begun this morning after several hours of strong gun fire, and continues. Between Lens and Neuville St. Vaast artillery fighting increased yesterday to great violence. In the region between the roads from Albert to Cambrai and Peronne a minor en-
agement developed, taking the course intended by the Germans.
AUSTRIA SEVERS RELATIONS.
WASHINGTON, April 9. Austria-Hungary, ranging herself unreservedly with Germany, has severed diplomatic relations with the United States, a situation which generally is expected here to lead to war. Baron E. Rich Szwidnik, the Austrian charge asked the State department to-day for passports for himself and staff, and the Austrian Consular force in this country. Simultaneously the American minister Stovart reported from Bern that Austria had announced a break of relations to the American Embassy at Vienna yesterday. Immediately the Treasury Department ordered the seizure of all Austrian merchant ships in American harbors. The Austrian crews were taken off and sent to immigration stations and American guards put on board. The measure was explained as purely one of precaution but it is realized it may be interpreted by Austria as an act of war. Whether Bulgaria and Turkey are preparing to follow suit is still unknown.

AMERICAN STEAMER TORPEDOED.
WASHINGTON, April 9. The American steamer Seaward was reported torpedoed and sunk without warning in the Mediterranean by a German submarine, says a despatch from Consul Gaulin, at Marseilles. All the crew of 39, of whom 30 were Americans, were saved.
HINDENBURG COMPLETE PLANS.
COPENHAGEN, April 9. There are various indications from Germany that Field Marshal Von Hindenburg is now completing his new strategic dispositions and that extensive movements of troops for spring operations which were somewhat delayed by long continued cold weather are now nearing an end. Passenger traffic on the railroads which during the troop movements was conducted only under extreme restrictions is now being resumed on a more normal basis. Various express trains and sleeper services which for the time being were abandoned have now been re-introduced. The current articles of German military critics are based on the assumption that the first developments from the troop movements will come from the western front.
CHILI REMAINS NEUTRAL.
SANTIAGO, Chili, April 9. Chili will maintain an attitude of neutrality in the war so long as she is not made the object of a direct attack, according to an assurance given by a government official.
GERMAN TORPEDO BOAT SUNK.
AMSTERDAM, April 9. The German torpedo boat G-88 was torpedoed and sunk by an enemy submarine off the Flemish coast, April 7, according to an official from Berlin. Most of her crew were saved. Another torpedo boat was severely damaged.
BRAZIL AND GERMANY.
RIO JANEIRO, April 9. An ordinary rupture of relations between Brazil and Germany is expected by to-morrow morning at the latest. The break depends upon the formality of the reception of the official report from Paris on the sinking of the Brazilian steamer Parana by a German submarine.
REFUSED TO RECEIVE GERMAN MINISTER.
RIO JANEIRO, April 9. Dr. Lauro Muller, Foreign Minister refused to receive the German minister to-day. Dr. Muller gave urgent orders that a steamer at Rio Janeiro be made ready at once for a mission abroad. Muller conferred with the war minister and chief of staff, and he also urgently requested a report

from the Brazilian legation in Paris.
Washington.—In Latin American diplomatic quarters here it was said late to-day that Dr. Muller's refusal to receive the German minister to Brazil undoubtedly meant the Government has definitely decided to sever diplomatic relations with Germany. Dr. Muller's orders that a steamer be prepared at once for a mission abroad was interpreted as meaning the Brazilian Government had determined to arrange for the immediate departure of the German officials. It is considered doubtful that 46 German ships in Brazilian ports would be seized at this time, unless it should appear the vessels might attempt to escape or were in danger of being damaged or destroyed by their crews.
NEUTRAL SPAIN.
MADRID, April 9. The official journal to-day published a decree declaring the neutrality of Spain in the war between the United States and Germany.
THE CANADIAN PARLIAMENT.
OTTAWA, April 9. Sir Robert Borden and his colleagues overseas will not have returned to Canada in time for the reopening of Parliament on the 19th, and it is now suggested unofficially that further adjournment should be agreed upon. No definite action has been taken, however. It is not probable the Premier will be back before the middle of May.

HEAVY PENALTY TO BE INFLICT-ED.
WASHINGTON, April 9. The Administration bill, imposing a penalty of thirty years' imprisonment on any person who destroys war material in the United States in time of war, was passed by the Senate to-day in five minutes, without debate.
