## **Austrians Hoped** Offensive Would End the War.

London, July 16.—(Via Reuter's Ottawa Agency.)—A despatch from British Headquarters contains the folowing extracts from a memorandum circulated amongst the Austro-Hun-garian company commanders, which throws an interesting light upon the recent offensive. Economic conditions forced the Austro-Hungarians to ise Italian uniforms and equipment "Our offensive will help effectively to finish the war, if we drive back our hereditary enemy and penetrate deep-ly into his territory. We, without the help of our German brothers, must reckon our own strength only. Our artillery forces will break down the

enemy resistance. "Our own country is very short of foodstuffs and we must therefore, as long as possible, live on the country. Feeding horses corn is strictly forbidden, as after July there will be no further supply of bread and flour from the rear. Any uniforms and clothing found should be appropriated for our personal use, and may be worn after the removal of the Italian badges. "We are in great need of uniforms, underclothing, boots, etc., and am nunition must not be thrown away by the men in order to let them load themselves with booty. Let every man know that the present offensive, together with that of the Germans, is the most violent, but perhaps the de-

## The New Hun Sccretary

In his speech before the main con mittee of the Reichstag the other day Chancellor Von Hertling was emphaic in declaring that Admiral vo Hintze, named to succeed von Kuehl mann as German Foreign Secretary would follow "my line of policy and not his own." The statement is wort noting because, indirectly, it sun ports the assertion contained in sev eral recent despatches that there wa much opposition in some quarters Germany to the appointment of

Von Kuehlmann was described one of the more moderate of Germ statesmen. Von Hintze, on the o hand, is a Pan-German of the Germans. He was a protege in younger days of Admiral von Tirpi author of the campaign of unrestric ed submarine warfare. His selection for the post of Foreign Secretary traced to the most violent Pan-Ger man element which gives a therence to a programme of unlimited aggression-the element which has been represented by such men as von Tirpit and Ludendorff. The heads of th Reichstag parties were not consult but suddenly, as an Amsterdam de spatch has put it, "a violent Pan German is set up as foreign ministe in a government which is presumed accept the Reichstag's majority p

The Chancellor's declaration tha von Hintze would not follow his o line of policy but von Hertling's was evidently intended to allay the anger aroused by the admiral's nomination to succeed von Kuchimann. But one n office von Hintze may be counte on to endeavor to follow the course desired by the Pan-Germans with whom he has been so closely associa led rather than the policy desired by one else. Perhaps realization of this truth will prevent the people from elug lulled into calmness again by the chancellor's assurance. However, that may be, the selection of von Hintze ought to be evidence to the German people as to how little their wishes weigh with Potsdam and another evidence to the Allies of the firm grip which the Pan-Germans still have upon Germany's affairs .- Sydney Record.

## St. John's, Nfid., July 20, 1918. More Hun Atrocities.

Boston, July 16 .- The American public can believe anything and everything it reads or hears concerning German atrocities, writes C. C. Lyon, of the Boston Record.

During my year in France, while was with the American, French and Belgian armies, a number of instances of German mistreatment of helpless men, women and children

came under my notice. For a few days, several months ago, while an American infantry regiment to which I was attached was in reserve in a little French village a few miles behind the firing line, I was billeted in a house formerly occupied by a Catholic priest.

On the mantle of the bedroom where I slept was a photo of a finelooking man of about 40, and leaning against the photo was a shattered

An old woman who owned the house told me the story: "That is the picture of my brother.

For some years he was priest of this The German army came through here in 1914 in their advance on Paris, and they began shelling our village when they came within a few miles of it. "In his priestly robes, my brother

went out to protest to the German General against it.

"My brother was ordered shot on the spot by the German General. They stood him up along the roadside and there he faced a German firing squad. "He held his crucifix before him and the bullet that ended his life struck it, glancing off and entering his heart. He was left lying beside the road by his murderers. The crucifix on the mantle is the one he held in his hand when he died."

In another French community is a little blind boy of between 3 and 4 who would grope his way about, pathetically trying to play with the other children. Here is his story:

During the German advance in 1914 a young wife was about to be delivered of a child, but there were no native physicians left in the village. So request was made that a German surgeon attend the mother. He did so and a baby boy was born.

The Surgeon Monster. The grateful young mother and her relatives thanked the German surgeon, and in it he said:

"You thanked me to soon for attending you during the birth of your baby son. I am a German and Germany is at war with your country, so I took good care that your son should never become a soldier. He will nev-

Another day I visited a town in the area that was evacuated by Hindenburg a year ago last spring when he was forced to shorten his western line. It was a beautiful town of 10,000 pegple. The Germans systematically dynamited every building in the little city, except those in three blocks at

Took Women to Germany. This story was told me by an old man I found wandering about:

"Before they began their dynamiting," he said, "they picked out of the civilian population all the able-bodied women and girls and sent them to Germany, leaving only old people and little children. Then they put us in three blocks and told us they were going to blow up the town, but the three blocks we were in would be

## FRENCH ADVANCE UNCHECKED.

LONDON, To-day, The enemy is still fighting very hard bringing up fresh men and delivering local attacks, but doesn't seem to be able to hold the French advance along the line north of Chateau Thierry, according to advices from the front. German traffic at Fere on Tardenois is being vigorously and continually bombed by French airmen. The situation is considered as being distinctly promising. The Germans apparently have to do one or two things, clear the French off the railway west of the Fere-en-Tardenois, or bring back their troops from north of the Marne to flatten out the salient. Further north the French have reached the high road from Soissons to Chateau-Thiery near the village of Harbennes et-Taux. The high road and the railway from Soissons to Chateau Thiery is well within range of the French guns, along its whole length, and is being subjected to artillery fire. The same applies to the function of this road with the only possible alternative line, which comes from Fismes and joins it at Nabteuil Notre Dame. The latter place is also within gun range. The supply situation of the enemy on the Marne is thus becoming more difficult each hour as the latest gain in this region brings the depth of the French advance over the 27 nile front between the two rivers, up to between six and eight and one half





The general color scheme is green, distinguished from the bronze effect of the higher valued note, and instead of St. George and the Dragon is the conventional figure symbolising Britannia, On the reverse side are the Houses of Parliament. Like the present note, the new issue is smaller than the £1 note, which has proved to be virtually forge-proof. No single case of attempted counterfeiting has come before the authorities. The same immunity from fraud is anticipated in the case of the new notes-design, method of printing, paper and watermark all contributing towards the result.

> SALE OF DRUGS TO SOLDIERS. For the last two years chemists have been forbidden to sell to sailors and soldiers certain drugs, as, for instance, powerful narcotics like cocaine and morphine, and less potent hypnotics like sulphonal and bartikne. The last named, by the way, used to be commonly known under the Germanowned title of veronal. In several respects the Order forbidding such transaction was either obscurely worded or misread by many chemists, for it not infrequently happened that medical practitioners in khaki were refused supplies. In order to remove any embargo that may have appeared to exist on the sale of these drugs to medical practitioners, a further Order in Council has been made which makes it clear that pharmacists may sell these drugs to doctors, dentists and veterinary surgeons. On the other hand, the new Order strengthens the restrictions as to the sale of the drugs in question to other members of His Majesty Forces; and henceforth a sailor or soldier may only be supplied with them if he has a duly signed prescription specifying the total amount of the drug to be supplied. Moreover, in order to prevent the abuse of the prescription the chemist is ordered not to hand it back to the customer, but to keep it in the premises where it is

To clean a copper kettle, make a strong solution of water, soap, and soda, and let the kettle stand in it for a time. Then mix some fine coal ash with a little paraffin to form a paste, and rub it well on to the kettle. Afterwards polish with dry, powdered brickdust.
